LISTS FILLED TODAY FOR FEDERAL CONTEST

Two Victims of Melita Shooting Tragedy Are Near Death

WOUNDED CREW MEMBERS ARE IN CRITICAL STATE

Head of Assistant Chief Engineer WIDOW OVERCOME

Wife of Captain Clews Expecting Husband Home First Time Since January

ANTWERP, Oct. 22.—David E. Gilmore, assistant chief engineer of the Canadian Pacific liner Melita, underwent an operation today for removal of the bullet which lodged behind his ear when he went to the aid of Second Engineer John Holiday, during the shooting affray on the liner yesterday, in which Captain A. H. Clews was killed. The bullet was removed but Mr. Gilmore is in a critical condition. Mr. Holiday is also reported near death. The Melita left for Montreal via Southampton, where the body of Captain Clews will be removed. Thomas Towers, first officer, who was arrested after the shooting, will be handed over to the British authorities at Southampton.

Manitoba Government And Courts Accused of Aiding In Infringement of Liquor Laws

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 22.—Mayor Ralph H. Webb, speaking before the First Manitoba conference of the United Church, made sensational charges against the provincial government and the law courts. He declared that while conditions under prohibition were had, present conditions under government sale and control of liquor, were a thousand times worse, that responsibility rested with the provincial government, and the law courts and that these were a party to infringement of the liquor laws by allowing such infringements to continue. The mayor said that he could clean things up in a week, if the government and the law courts would give him support. As a result of the Mayor's charges, a delegation from the conference will wait upon the attorney general today, to ask him for information on the enforcement of the liquor laws.

N. B. Wilds Are Compared With Dane Forests

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—In Denmark and Europe we have forests, but for centuries they have known the fostering hand of man; in this country the forest is primeval, as it was in the beginning of things. That was the biggest impression left upon me by the New Brunswick wilds. Heinrich Carl, Count Schimmelmann, owner of the largest landed estate in Denmark, who with his wife, is here after a 20-day hunting trip in the Cain River district of New Brunswick, thus summed up his views when interviewed.

British Cattle Raisers Again Alarmed Following Lifting of Restrictions.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Cattle raisers are worried over a recurrence of the foot and mouth disease at several places in England. Scarcely had the Minister of Agriculture's withdrawal of the last restriction dealing with the disease been announced, when an isolated outbreak was reported. Since then, there have been several others. The restrictions have been re-imposed in some places, notably Manchester, where hundreds of cattle and sheep are brought in from Wales and Westmoreland and slaughtered. Yesterday there were no arrivals from foreign ports. Under the restrictions, any sheep or cattle coming in must be immediately slaughtered.

Missing N. S. Man Is Alive and Well

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 22.—Nathan Higgins, absent from his home in Shubenacadie, N. S., since early in September, when he left to go to the Bridgewater exhibition, is alive and well at Cherry Hill, Lunenburg county, according to word received last night by the Halifax police, who had been asked to make a search for him.

HALIFAX, Oct. 22.—When his 22 calibre rifle failed to discharge while he was out bird hunting yesterday afternoon, Harold Hopkins, aged 16, of Bedford, threw the weapon from him in disgust. When it struck the ground the rifle went off and the bullet entered young Hopkins' eye penetrating the brain. He was rushed to hospital and this morning was reported as appearing "slightly better." No attempt had been made up to noon, to remove the bullet.

ATLANTIC WATER POURED IN PACIFIC

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 22.—Mayor Carl Pendray and Hon. William Sloan, Provincial Minister of Mines, officially welcomed the trans-Canada automobile which arrived here yesterday. Mayor Pendray poured a bottle of Atlantic water into the Pacific, signifying the trip from ocean to ocean made by the car. The car began the journey at Halifax.

CHICAGO BANK MEN ROBBED IN STREET

Chicago, Oct. 22.—In a daring hold-up in Chicago's financial district early today three Federal Reserve Bank messengers were robbed of an express package and two small sacks of registered mail by three men, who escaped with others in two automobiles. The robbery took place during a snowstorm of almost blizzard proportions. James B. McDougall, governor of the bank, said it was impossible to identify the nature of the shipments to the bank or the extent of the loss, pending checks.

Klan Locates Headquarters In Washington House of Death

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—The hooded business of the Ku Klux Klan will benefit from the directed from a house with an epic reputation in Washington: Every occupant of the forbidding brownstone castle has met with a tragic death, but Hiram W. Evans, imperial wizard of the Klan, with the rest of his headquarters staff, are busy moving in. The house was built by Anthony Pollock, a lawyer, for his bride, who died a few months after she moved in. Pollock married his housekeeper and she sailed on their honeymoon for Europe. A storm off the Nova Scotia coast wrecked the vessel and both were drowned. For many years the shutters of the house were drawn and children crossed to the other side of the street when they passed that way. Then Senator Frank D. Brandegee moved into it. He committed suicide.

APPEAL IN J. A. GREGORY CASE IS DISMISSED
Judgment of Privy Council Against Companies in Insurance Matter
SOME \$15,000 ON LUMBER INVOLVED

A cable from London, England, today stated that the judicial committee of the Privy Council had dismissed the appeal brought by the Palestine Insurance Company and seven other companies respecting a decision of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick re an action for recovery by J. A. Gregory of some \$15,000 insurance on lumber destroyed by fire.

FALL RIVER, Oct. 22.—Arthur Bouchard, 18 years old, left his home in South Somerset Saturday noon, with 15 cents that his mother had given him. Weight Betrays 2 Carloads of Beer
ST. ALBANS, Vt., Oct. 22.—The seizure of 10,000 bottles of Canadian beer in two freight cars marked "Hay" was reported by United States customs officers as part of their week-end activities. The capture was made at Alburg, they said, and came after the cars were found to tip the scales at around 30,000 pounds each. Their suspicion aroused by the heavy weight, three collectors searched the cars and found the beer, with the only hay in sight used to camouflage it.

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CUNARD LINE SENDS DETAILS OF SHIPS
All Five Above 3,100 Tons Net Register—Largest Above 3,600.

The list of the five steamers, which the Cunard Line is placing on the new London-Saint John service this season, has arrived at the local office of Robert Reford Co., agents for the Cunard Line. The list shows that every one of the steamers is more than 3,100 tons net register and capable of handling between 7,000 and 8,000 tons of cargo. Every steamer has been built within the last eight years and all are modern in every respect. The service will commence with the sailing of the Verania on Dec. 12. The steamers to operate on this service are Verdulia, Yellu, Verania, Verulia and Verilia. All were built in 1918 except the Verdulia, which was launched one year earlier. The Verdulia and Verania are slightly more than 3,100 tons net, the other two steamers of larger tonnage are about 423 feet in length, while the others are just over 400 feet.

That the Canadian postal service is steadily advancing is set forth in an attractively-bound volume, entitled "Post Office Progress" sent out by the headquarters at Ottawa. From the front cover, bearing an artistic picture of a speeding train, outlined in gold, to the back cover, bearing a gilt map of Canada, the book is full of illustrations showing the manner of sorting His Majesty's mail, and the processes through which letters and parcels posted in Canada pass until they reach their destination.

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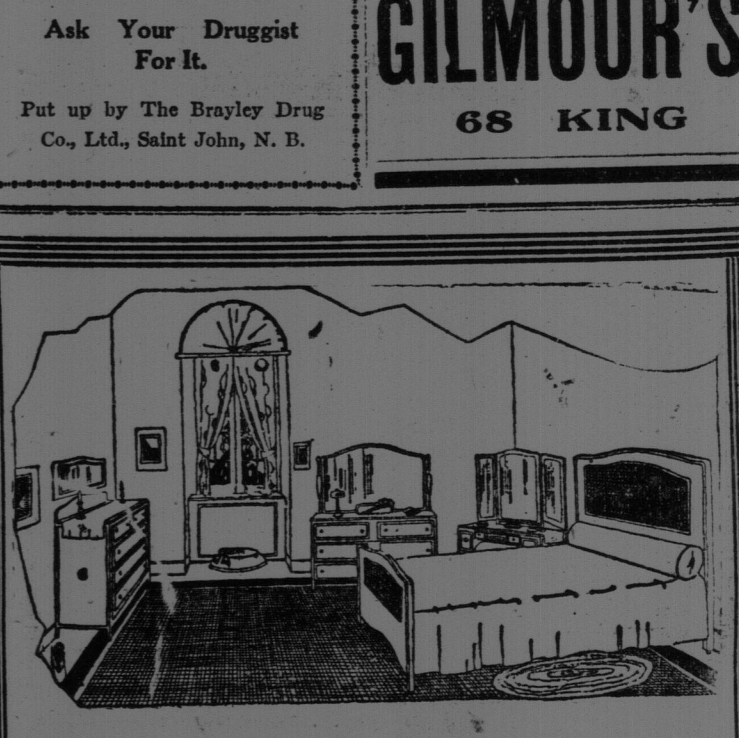

BAXTER RAPPED FOR SUPPORTING MEIGHEN POLICY

Broderick Quotes Premier as Saying He is Against High Tariff

HAYES ANSWERS BELL ON SHOE IMPORTATION

Hon. Dr. Foster Contends Liberal Tariff is Best For Canada

ALBERT, Oct. 21—Contending that the greatest good to the greatest number was the policy of the Liberal party and that conditions under Liberal rule well justified the return to power of the Government led by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Hon. W. E. Foster,

Secretary of State, Liberal candidate in Saint John-Albert, addressed a large audience in Oulton Hall this evening. Addresses were also given by R. T. Hayes, the other Liberal candidate, and Dr. W. P. Broderick, of Saint John, who was a candidate four years ago, Councillor W. J. Carnwath was chairman.

DR. BRODERICK SPEAKS

Dr. Broderick, who spoke first, referred to the overthrow of the Conservative Government in 1921 and asked for a further lease of power for the present Liberal Government which, he said, had not only a platform to get in on, but one to stand on as well. He strongly condemned the high tariff policy of Hon. Mr. Meighen and said he believed it was a camouflage and that the Conservative party did not really believe in it themselves. He severely rapped Hon. Dr. Baxter for going about as an apostle of the Conservative policy when only a short time ago, in February, 1923, Dr. Broderick said, he had stated on the floor of the House that he did not pose as a high tariff man. Dr. Broderick quoted Hon. Mr. Meighen as admitting that the policy was not the best for the Maritime Provinces or the West but best for Quebec and Ontario, he contended, were not real friends of the country.

REPLIES TO BELL He replied to the reported statement of Thomas Bell, one of the Conserva-

tive candidates, that 65 per cent. of the boots and shoes used in Canada were imported from the United States. Mr. Hayes said that as a matter of fact statistics showed that against \$42,000,000 worth of boots and shoes made in Canada only \$2,000,000 worth was imported or less than five per cent. He referred to Meighen as an apostle of gloom and quoted a Conservative paper, as saying "Meighen is no good, sees no good, and seeks no good."

Hon. Dr. Foster expressed regret that Albert county had not seen its way clear to accept the offer to have a candidate from the county on the ticket. He wanted the county residents to look upon Mr. Hayes as their special candidate. He made reference to the large number of women present and urged them to weigh well the question of taxation. The minister referred to the statement attributed to Hon. Lewis Smith, Provincial Minister of Agriculture, concerning the importation of agricultural products into Canada, which Dr. Foster claimed to be entirely misleading. There was \$40,000,000 Dr. Foster said, of the \$75,000,000 quoted by Mr. Smith which referred to such products as bananas and other tropical products which were not and could not be grown in Canada. Dr. Foster dealt fully with the tariff, contending that the Liberal policy was best for all parts of Canada. He urged the electors to see to it that high protection be not forced upon the people.

FRANCE LOSES 17,000

Three Billion Francs Spent Since Taking Over Moroccan and Syrian Tasks.

PARIS, Oct. 22—France has lost more than 17,000 men and has spent more than 3,000,000,000 francs in Morocco and Syria since she assumed the protectorate of Morocco and assumed the League of Nations mandate over Syria. In Morocco, 2,176 men were killed and 8,297 wounded, and in Syria 6,626 were killed, wounded or are missing.

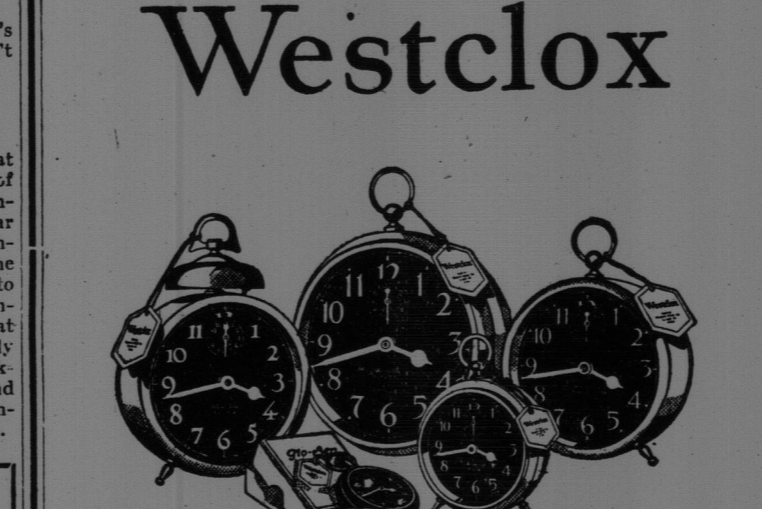

ST. MATTHEW'S CALL SUSTAINED

Rev. Dr. Morison is to be Inducted on October 30

The Resignation of Rev. W. M. Fraser Accepted—Loan to St. Stephen Approved.

The Saint John Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, at a special meeting yesterday afternoon in Knox Church rooms sustained the call of St. Matthew's congregation to Rev. Dr. J. A. Morison and set October 30 as the date of his consecration which will be the first settlement in New Brunswick under the new regime. Rev. W. M. Townsend, moderator, presided.

The resignation of Rev. William M. Fraser from the charge of Greenock church, St. Andrews, because of illness, was before the Presbytery. No representative of the congregation appeared. The resignation was regretfully accepted to take effect on October 31 and Rev. Mr. Townsend was authorized to declare the pulpit vacant on the first Sunday in November.

DR. MORISON'S CALL. As interim-moderator of St. Matthew's church, Rev. R. Moorhead Legate reported a unanimous call had been extended by the congregation to Rev. Dr. J. A. Morison. The call was signed by 53 members and 46 adherents and the stipend was fixed at \$1,800. Dr. Morison's reply read expressing his willingness to accept the call.

CALL SUSTAINED. It was agreed that the induction take place on October 30.

NO SERVICE MISSED. For the St. Stephen Presbyterian congregation it was reported by Geo. W. Boyd that no service had been missed since the vote on union had been taken. There were now 107 communicants on the roll, while only 81 had voted out of union. There was a fully organized Sunday school with 11 teachers and officers. There was \$1,100 pledged for the minister's salary and it was thought collections would bring in the additional amount to provide a stipend of \$1,800.

HEALTH CENTRE TAG DAY PLANS ADVANCE. A meeting of the ways and means committee of the Health Centre and ward conveners for next Tuesday's tag day was held yesterday afternoon at the Health Centre with Mrs. T. N. Vincent, convener of the committee and general convener for tag day, presiding. Gratifying reports were received. The workers are hoping to raise \$1,500 necessary to pay the running expenses of the Health Centre. All salaries are paid by other funds.

GENERAL APPEAL. At the meeting yesterday stress was laid upon the fact that the Health Centre is appealing to the people generally and that if 10,000 will give five cents each, 5,000 give ten cents each and 2,000 give 25 cents each the objective of \$1,500 will be reached.

PORT ELGIN CHURCH. Mr. Mackintosh reported the deed of the Port Elgin church had been handed over to the Presbyterian congregation on Oct. 9 and services were being held regularly. In Harvey there were 64 families in the Presbyterian congregation and the unionists numbered 42 families. The Presbyterian worshippers had arranged for three services each Sunday in that district and had already promised material for the building of a church.

LIKES NEW BRUNSWICK. Rev. C. H. Elliott, who comes from Toronto, said the country in New Brunswick was far better than he had been told. He had visited all of the five appointments in the Hampton district and said that during his short stay in New Brunswick he had come to love the country, the scenery and the people. His brief address was heartily applauded.

national outlook is no wider than his personal ambitions. I am convinced that a reasonable and definite presentation of our needs and a national remedy for them will receive fair consideration. Sentiment is changing here as knowledge grows.

I HAVE not attempted to answer the question in other than a general way. The answer must be given by the Charlottetown conference and it must be as reasonable, and well fortified with facts, as it is definite. It must recognize the diversity of conditions and needs in the four divisions of Canada, while pointedly and fearlessly presenting the case for the Maritimes. I have suggested four ways in which the country at large may assist: First—to make it somewhat easier to do business with the rest of Canada; second, to give greater encouragement in the development of industries based on our natural resources; the products to go to markets overseas; third, to give better transportation, and aid in opening up those markets; fourth, to adopt a real immigration policy for the particular benefit of the Maritimes.

But I have also been asked this pointed question: "Are there things you could do for yourselves in the Maritimes that you are not doing?" When I point out our seaboard location, with the cheapest of all means of transportation to all parts of the world; and the richness of our resources in the field, the forest, the mine and the sea, such a question is natural. Can we assert that lack of markets is fatal to all enterprise? I can explain that years of disappointment have led to a degree of discouragement and apathy, but does that suffice? I can say that our provincial revenues are limited, and cannot take care of large expenditures for development purposes; and that financial aid is not as easily available as in the Central Provinces, where the great financial institutions are now, unfortunately for us, centred; but do these explanations fully explain? When our case is presented to the country at large, let us hope the response will be such as to stimulate a new spirit of enterprise, in every branch of Maritime development. But first—Charlottetown and the Conference.

Montreal Scientists Find Explosives In Gift Packet

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—Two organizations discovered that their members had literally although unknowingly been flirting with death for years. Unpacking a wooden box of rock specimens, the gift of some long-forgotten mineralogist to the Natural History Society Museum, experts at the Pathological Institute of McGill saw something which made their scientific hair stand on end. To the casual eye there was nothing to get excited about—just a quart and half bottle of nitric acid and a ditto bottle of glacial acetic acid, lying lovingly together among the rocks.

But the men of science paled, gasped for breath, then gave a shout. In the quickest possible time those two bottles were as far apart as space allowed. They were locked up in separate cabinets. Nitric acid and glacial acetic acid together are as harmless as gunpowder and a lighted match or a naked flame in a gas tank. Yet the deadly pair had been bedfellows for years. Glass that is so brittle that it shatters when a common piece of cork and a glass stopper that might have sprung a leak—these were all that stood between fire, explosion and accident or sudden death.

For years that box with potential explosion inside had stood in the cellar of the Natural History Society regularly held its meetings. On the floor above the Plymouth Brothers held and still hold their services. Ignorance and bliss, were the portion of the men who moved the box from Mountain street to the Pathological Institute, at the top of University street. A slip of the foot, a jolt or a crash and the next call would have been for the ambulance.

The price paid varies with the grade of the champagne sold.

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 22.—William Dunning, publicity man for the Y. M. C. A., and therefore naturally accredited with being veracious, mended down from his country home in East Otis, and announced that many cows in the Berkshires had a grand spree Saturday. Some of them were so drunk that they would not give milk that night and others were off color for two or three days. They were more glum than hilarious.

General observance of the coming half-holiday is expected and it is likely to increase the number of voters.

DEAR MISS DIX—There are no more pitiful people in the world than the middle-aged widows and widowers whose homes have been broken up by death, whose children are married and gone and who are forced to live about in dreary lodging and boarding houses.

I think your suggestion is an admirable one, Mr. Reader, and that thousands of lonely old men and women might act upon it with advantage.

THE man who has been used to home cooking finds that restaurant meals have no flavor. To the man who is accustomed to coming home after his day's work to the eager welcome of a wife, it is desolation to come home to a dark and lonely room.

THE woman who has been accustomed to her own home can never be happy in any one else's home or with no home at all. And even when she establishes a home of her own, it lacks all savor to her if there is no man in it.

We always think of romance as belonging to youth, but in reality it is the elderly who need the companionship of husbands and wives far more than youth does.

IT IS, of course, a pity that the woman should have to continue to work after marriage. It is unfortunate that every man cannot make enough money to enable his wife to devote her sole attention to her home.

GREEK GUNNERS CROSS BORDER INTO BULGARIA

Petrich Village Shelled, According to Sofia Despatch

3 POSTS TAKEN

Greek Version of Affair Denied—Matter Submitted to Nations' League

SOFIA, Oct. 22—The Bulgarian Telegraphic Agency declares Greek artillery has penetrated Bulgarian territory, killing five sentinels and firing shells against the village of Petrich. The Greeks occupied three Bulgarian posts, the agency adds.

PROTEST TO LEAGUE

VIENNA, Oct. 22—Sofia advices say the Bulgarian government, as a counter-move to the Greek ultimatum, has forwarded a protest note to the League of Nations, based on Article 10. The Bulgarian troops along the Greek frontier have been instructed to offer the utmost resistance to the Greek advance against Petrich.

The Bulgarian Government thus far has received no response from Athens to its demands, thrice renewed, for an immediate inquiry to establish responsibility for the frontier incident of Monday near Demirhisar.

Petrich is reported to be crowded with Macedonian refugees, who are menaced by falling shells.

The Greek version of the affair, to the effect that Bulgarian soldiers attacked the Greeks first and occupied several high points along the border, is officially denied.
