



This is to certify that after the S. S. "Columbian" caught fire and exploded in Lat. 41 deg, 30 minutes, Long 59 deg. 00 minutes W. on May 4 at 0 hours 5 minutes a. m., that I with fifteen other members of the crew left the ship in No. 4 boat (one man was drowned and another died) leaving a total of fourteen alive in the boat. Strong winds were blowing and a heavy sea was running. It was perishing cold weather. We were in the boat for fifty hours, Captain F. W. Lazell of the Atlantic Transport Liner "Manhattan" bound from New York to Antwerp intercepted a message from the Cunard Liner "Franconia" stating that he head picked up one of the boats of the "Columbian" and the other two were still adrift. Captain Lazell deviated from his course for seventy miles coming up with my boat on May 6 at 2 a. m. while I was lying too with oil bags out in a heavy sea, and bitter cold weather; taking us on board without any mishap, and continuing the search for No. 3 boat for eighteen hours afterwards.
