



For the Cook

APPLE JELLY.

Peel, core, and slice the apples thinly without removing the core or pips. For every pound of apples allow one pint of water and stew till perfectly soft and pulpy. Then strain through a jelly-bag and return to the stewpan with three-quarters of a pound of sugar to every pint of juice, add the juice and grated rind of one lemon to each pound of fruit. Boil till it jellies, then place in preserve jars and tie down.

LEMON MERINGUE PIE.

Have a custard pie plate lined with paste, beat the yolks of 3 eggs lightly with 5 tablespoons of sugar, add 1 cup of sweet milk, grated rind of lemon. Bake until custard sets. Take two bowls, in one have the beaten whites of the three eggs, and the other juice of one lemon, add enough powdered sugar to make stiff; then add beaten whites and whip again thoroughly; spread over the hot pie and bake a delicious brown.

WHOLESALE GROCERY MARKET

The wholesale grocery markets have been quiet during the last fortnight or more, and very few changes are recorded, although in some cases staples are unsettled and an advance or decline might come almost at any time. Molasses is reported very firm and the tendency is to advance rather than decline, as reports from Barbadoes, the chief centre of supply, are that crops are short so that orders are now being taken at an increase over last week's quottings.

Sugar remains about the same and there is believed to be little prospect of a change of anything, lower quotations are expected as soon as the full extent of the crop is determined, for present indications are that stocks will be very plentiful. Pork has steadily advanced and domestic mess is now up to \$28 a barrel, a remarkably high price. Pork products are also decidedly firm.
