Paris, June 17—(United Press)—The Government of Edouard Herriot today faced the severe Left Chamber interpellations, which were expected to last for two days. Communists and minority Socialists as well as deputies for the Right, had questions for the new Premier regarding policies his Government propose to pursue.

The new Cabinet met today, heard President Doumergue's message, which it will carry to the Chamber and Senate, and discussed the final text of the programme which will be read in both Houses of Parliament at 3 p.m.

ada is freely predicted. Position Set Out

It is no great secret that in the long negotiations which have taken place on the question of postal salaries the post office department officials were favorable to a schedule of salary somewhat higher than that proposed by the commission. Under the act of 1919, however, the commission is the paramount authority in all appointments to the civil service and in defining the salaries which attach to them. Its authority can be challenged only by an amending act of parliament, giving to the Government some discretionary power in such cases as the present.

It is necessary for the Government to approve what the Civil Service Commission does but if it does not agree with the recommendation it can be referred back. This was done in the case of the Postal workers. Ultimately, it is claimed, the alternative lay between approving the schedule submitted by the commission or disapproving it. The latter course, it is said would have simply meant the perpetuation of last year's salaries minus the bonus.







TOLSTOY IN HIS WIFE'S EYES. Tolstoy's wife was not in sympathy with her husband's extreme views, it is well known, and their son, Count Leon L. Tolstoy, tells in "The Truth About My Father" why in these

About My Father" why in these words:

"Well-balanced and conservative, she found no word of approval for destruction without creation. She loved everything that was right, sincere, true, and fine, and she reacted instantly against any note that was false or obscure. Another feature that she did not like in her husband's character was his pride. "Do you know," my mother once said to me, "what is the strongest force that has animated your father's work? Vanity!

Tolstoy, we learn, had a superstition that the number 28 was specially important to him. His son says:

"He was born on August 28 in the year 1828. He was married on the 28th, and so on. When he had completed his 82nd year on August 28, 1901, we naturally spoke about the matter. I remarked. 'And this year you will be 82. Why, that is your figure 28 reversed."

Tolstoy loeked keenly at his son and said: "Yes, perhaps. And it is well that it should be so." That year brought his death. His wife survived to witness the horrors of Bolshevism, dying in 1919.

History Society's museum in Union street are exceptionally interesting and curious this week. Objects shown are a sounding box of the natives of Africa, presented to the society by Senator A. H. MacDonnell, former O. C. Military District No. 7; a duck-billed platytus, which is one of the world's strangest animals; and a horn-bell, one of the most curious of birds.

The sounding box is a very fine piece of native workmanship. The wood carving and iron are all of native work. It has by way of ornament a meer cat, a small African animal of the squirrel type, and on the meer cat's back are a row of parrots. The carvings probably have some proper significance. The box itself was used to send messages and when hit with the accompanying stick it has a peculiar resonance which can throw sound for a very great distance.

It was for a long time a source of wonder to Europeans to discover how the natives of Africa received word of events long before it was possible for the news to have been conveyed by messenger, however fleet his rate of travel. The discovery of these sound boxes solved the puzzle as it was understood that with a series of sound boxes news could be relayed with well nigh incredible speed.

The duck-billed platytus might well be classed with the creatures of which it is said "There ain't no such animal." The creature is 20 inches in length and is an Australian mammal which has many of the speical features of a bird. Its young are produced as eggs and the adults have a flat bent-like mouth. The eggs are non-calcareous but like those of birds have a yolk. They haterout soon after they are laid and the young platytus is at first naked and blind and feeds on its mother's milk. It develops teeth at an early stage but they fall out later and hard horny patches develop in each jaw to replace the teeth. The adult has short fur and is web footed but with powerful claws en its front feet with which it corburrow. The male sometimes has a

herny spur on the hind foot which is capable of inflicting a poisonous wound. For its food the platytus eats simple organisms which it filters from the

The ground horn-bill has a most amazing beak. It is a tropical bird found in Africa, Indo-Malayan regions and in the Solomon Islands. Its flight is as noisy as an express train, the noise being caused by the air passing through the open bases of its quills. The horn-bill lays its eggs in the Lollow of a tree and has a very strange procedure when the eggs are being hatched.
