



The memorial, standing where four roads meet, dominates the whole stretch of country which our troops knew as the salient. It is thirty-five feet high and consists of a pillar of granite developing at the apex into a bust of a Canadian soldier with head bowed and wearing the famous tin helbust of a Canadian soldier with head bowed and wearing the famous tin hel-met. To Electrify Roads In South America

Success of Chilean Undertaking Encourages Plans of Other Countries.

New York, July 7. - With South America entering an era of electrication development it now appears that the United States will play a larger share in this work than any other foreign country, both in the actual selling of materials and services necessary to such development and with respect to the huge financing work fhich will accompany it, according to reports reaching Wall Street offices from their South American correspondents.

The largest piece of work done in South America recently was a \$20,000,000 undertaking by Chile. Other similar plans are under consideration by all the larger countries of the continent, it is reported, and in the course of ten years it is estimated that new hydrelectric and electric railway work in Brazil, Argentine and other South American nations will amount to more than \$100,000,000. America entering an era of electivica-

than \$100,000,000.

Through winning the Chilean contract the United States took the lead in work of this kind. Until September of 1921 British financiers and railroad men had held a slight edge on American competitors and practically on a can competitors and practically on a par with the British were the electric development experts of Germany. Both were conceded better chances at that were conceded better chances at that time than American competitors. This was due largely to a reputation for excellence which the Germans had achieved in the manufacture of electrical apparatus. Britain's bid for success lay in the fact that England had financed much of Chile's railroad work and was known to be in a position to finance more of it.

American interests, represented by

American interests, represented by Spruille Braden of New York, outmanocuvred both German and British competitors, however, by arranging both for the actual work of electrification and also for the financing.

and also for the financing.

"The United States will not only supply you with the best of electrical apparatus," Mr. Braden explained to Chilean officials, according to a report of the transaction which was made public this week for the first time, "but it will raise the \$7,000,000 necessary to finance the actual installation; it will raise an additional \$3,500,000 for cars and other equipment, and it will cars and other equipment, and it will supply the Government with \$9,500,000 required for other expenses."

After a report on American electric railways by Chilean Government engineers the offer was accepted, the apparatus to be furnished by the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company and to be installed by the Errazuriz, Simpson y Cia of Chile. This was on Sept. 27, 1921. One month later Chilean Government bonds totaling \$20,000,000 were marketed in the United States by a syndicate headed by Blair States by a syndicate headed by Blair & Co.; nine months later a train of thirty-two cars left East Pittsburgh bearing the first shipment of electrical apparatus to Chile; and in less than nineteen months from the date of the contract the new electric system began

How the Mortality Rate Varies From Year to Year.

Great variations occur from year to deaths from heat prostration and sun-stroke, says a statistician of the Met-ropolitan Life Insurance Company, giving some figures on the mortality from heat and sunstroke. Their occurrence, he points out, is obviously de-pendent upon conditions of atmospheric heat and humidity. When the summer months of any year are featured by frequent and protracted periods of high temperature, there result relatively large numbers of both fatal and non-fatal heat strokes. Meanwhile, the variations in the death rate from this cause in different

years are extreme. There were about forty-three times as many deaths from heat and sunstroke per 100,000 popula-tion in the maximum as in the minition in the maximum as in the minimum year of several studies. For no other single cause, says the writer, has there been as marked variation in the death rate during the last two decades as for heat and sunstroke.

An investigation carried out among the industrial policy holders of the insurance company during the period from 1911 to 1922 showed that fatal heat prostrations were thirty-three and one-third times as numerous in one year as another. In 1911 6.7 policy

The states which in most years show above average rates are Michiban, Wisconsin, Indiana and Ohio, in the East, North, Contral region, particularly the first two; all of the Middle Atlantic States, New York, the Middle Atlantic States, New 10rk, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania; Con-necticut and Rhode Island, in New England; Maryland, in the South At-lantic region, and Missouri, in the West, The statistical tables show that the death rate from this cause is very much larger, year after year, in the cities than in the rural districts. 

TREATY AGREEMENT How to Find a Good Room-

EVADED BY SOVIETS Poles Find Difficulty in Re-

Warsaw, June 4.—(By mail.)—Since the signing of the Treaty of Riga be-tween Poland and Russia in 1920, Poland has been playing a sort of hunt-the-thimble game in Russia for her art treasures. These treasures comprise libraries, pictures, tapestries, statues, bronze bells, and various art collections that were taken to Russia either in the days of the Monarchy or

collections that were taken to Russia cither in the days of the Monarchy or during the war owing to the German invasion of Poland. In addition to these historical and artistic objects, machinery evacuated from the factories and rolling stock has to be returned and reparations made in gold.

The principle of restoration is established, but infinite patience and tact has to be pitted against Soviet procrastination and chicanery.

The Polish delegation concerned comprises sixty members, each expert in his own special subject, and is divided into nine sections; the property for which they are in search has been dispersed all over Russia; and it is no light task to follow up the scanty clues and to prove the original Polish ownership, opposed as the delegation is by every hindrance that passive resistance and bureaucracy can compass, and at the same time refute the charge of "economic espionage."

To make the task more difficult many of the collections have been scattered, and it is not whole libraries but in many cases individual books or objects that are the subject of protracted negotiations. The experts have to wander far and wide with bad communications, where they experience to the full the ignorance and power of the local Soviet officials, who, owing to the decentralized system of administration, pay little regard to treaties or agreements made in Moscow. 

Fine War Record Of Our Governor-General

In the Service Since 1884, He Reached Pinnacle of Fame With Canadians at Vimy in 1917-Loved and Respected by All Ranks.



BARON BYNG OF VIMY, The Governor General of Canada.

The name of General Byng will ever be associated in Canadian history with the great battle of Vimy Ridge when for the first time the Canadian Corps fought together as a Corps unit, owing much of its success to his leadership. After that victory he was promoted to command of the Third Army and was succeeded in command of the Canadian Corps by General Sir Arthur Currie, who had the satisfaction of directing the Corps during its triumphal progress through the last stage of the war until on Armistice Day it found itself in historic Mons.

General Lord Byng of Vimy, G. C. B., G. C. M. G., M. V. O., was created first Baron of Vimy in 1919, and his title will forever link his name with that of the Canadian Corps. Born on September 11, 1862, the seventh son of the second Earl of Strafford, he comes of an old English family possessed of a notable record both by sea and land. In 1902 he married Marie Evelyn, daughter of the Hon. Sir Richard Moreton, K. C. V. O., a younger brother of the third Earl of Ducie.

First War Experience.

Joining the 10th Royal Hussars in 1883, his first experience of war was with the Sudan Expedition in 1884, when he was present at the actions of El Teb and Tamai. He served in the South African War, 1899-1902, being promoted Brevet Lieut-Colonel, commanding the South African Light Horse in 1901. From 1904 to 1905 he had charge of the Royal School of Cavalry at Nethaveron, afterwards taking command of the Second Cavalry Brigade; in 1909 he was promoted Major-General and given the East Anglian Territorial Division.

In the Great War.

On the outbreak of war in 1914, he was recalled from Egypt where he had been G. O. C. for two years, to take comamnd of the Third Cavalry Division. Landing in Belgium in October, 1914, he, along with the Seventh Cavalry Division, under General Rawlinson, covered the retreat from Antwerp to Ypres. During the First Battle of Ypres, Byng's Third Division was part of Allenby's Cavalry that held the right of the salient, and at the Second Battle of Ypres, the Cavalry Corps now under Byng, as General Allenby had been transferred to command the Third Army, was in close support ready to cover a retreat on St. Omer if the line should break.

In Angust, 1915, he was given IX Corps at the Dardanelles and remained at Suva Bay until the expedition was withdrawn four months later.
