THE TREASURER'S REPORT.

To the Members of the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto.

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit my report on the financial condition of the Board for the year ended 31st December, 1888, as follows :—

Our INCOME during the year has been derived from the following sources, viz. :—

Our EXPENDITURE (as per annexed statement in detail) amounted to.....\$7,424 73

Leaving as a balance of Income over Expenditure,....\$2,407 79

This I have added to the \$7,095.78 in the Bank on 1st January, 1888. We have, therefore, now a total of \$9,503.57, available for all legitimate purposes; and a membership of 916, including one life member.

The third year of our GRATUITY SCHEME began on 1st of July last, and now 820 members are entitled to participate in its benefits.

The total number of deaths since its establishment on the 29th of June, 1886, has been 19. Four have occurred since the beginning of the current term.

The amount of money paid out to families of deceased members to date has been \$15,772.60.

The balance in hand is \$32,000.00, part of which is invested in valuable land securities, in Board of Trade debentures, and on deposit in the Bank of Commerce.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT.

The third annual report of the Trustees will be issued on 1st of July, 1889, in which will be found fuller details than I can give at this moment.

TORONTO BOARD OF TRADE.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS, 1888.

The rapid increase in the population and wealth of the city of Toronto is largely the result of the public spirit and enterprise that has at all times characterized its merchants in the support of measures pertaining to the public good.

This same spirit of enterprise enters into the competition for business, and her merchants extend their operations to all parts of the country.

It therefore is proper that the annual report of the Toronto Board of Trade should refer not only to the business of our own city, but include a reference to questions of public interest to the Dominion at large.

TRADE.

While it is admitted that the results obtained from last year's business have not been quite satisfactory, owing to keen competition in trade, and mainly because of the unfavorable weather during the fall and winter, preventing free deliveries of produce by farmers, causing slow payments by country merchants, yet circumstances are favorable for an improvement in the near future.

The Ontario Government Bureau of Industries, reviewing the harvesting operations of the year 1888, presents the yield of all field crops in the Province of Ontario as follows:

Comparing the probable cash value of the grain crop in each year, based upon present prices for the crop of 1888, as against values ruling at the same date last year, and which would form a fairly correct estimate of the average prices obtained for the crop of 1887, gives the very satisfactory showing of about \$20,000,000 more to be realized by our farmers for the crop of 1888, than was obtained for the crop of 1887.

The market for all kinds of grain at the opening of the season was greatly disturbed owing to unfavorable crop reports from Europe and the Western States, together with the unfortunate wheat corner in Chicago during September, causing a feeling of speculation among our farmers, the result being that with our enormous crop of cereals, deliveries by farmers throughout the Province up to the present time have actually been less than during the same period of 1887.

But if these statistics are, in the main, fairly correct, there must be a very large quantity of produce still in the hands of farmers. It must be conceded that the prospect of improved trade in the near future is to be relied upon, and the magnificent success realized by the farmers will be shared by all branches of trade and commerce.

SUBSIDISING OCEAN STEAMSHIP LINES.

In the past few years many gratifying signs of increased business and material gain in commercial importance have become apparent.

The Canadian Pacific Railway having opened a new means of communication between Great Britain, India, and China, the importance of the establishment of rapid communication direct from Great Britain to Canada, and from the Pacific coast to these important centres of trade, has engaged the attention of the Imperial Government, and resulted in a subsidy of 45,000 pounds sterling being offered for the establishment of a fast steamship line from Vancouver.

The Hon. Mr. Foster, at our annual dinner, indicated the policy of our own government in the direction of a fast steamship service from Canada to Great Britain, and it is to be hoped that both projects will be speedily consummated, for, independently of the increased trade it would bring us, both directly and indirectly, in the opening of new markets for our natural and manufactured products, it would prove an important factor in

TRADE RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES.

I am certain that I voice the sentiment of the people of the Dominion in expressing the hope that the friendly relations existing between Great Britain and her colonies, and the United States, may not only continue, but increase.

It is almost impossible to conceive that two countries so closely bound together by the ties of blood, and speaking the same language, should ever be on any other than friendly terms, and yet during the past year we have realized that the attempt to settle by arbitration the disputes that had arisen regarding the Fisheries had failed, and during a period of political excitement over the elections contests, the possibility of trouble arising.

It is to be hoped that the governments may still find a means for the speedy settlement of all disputes, and that the threatened so-called retaliatory legislation on the part of the United States against Canada may be abandoned.

There is no greater civilizer than commerce.

Commerce tends to wear off those prejudices which maintain the distinction and animosity between nations. It unites them by one of the strongest of all ties, the desire of supplying their mutual wants.

Therefore, we trust that our Government, while maintaining an independence for treaty rights, and cognizant of the fact that our country, stretching from ocean to ocean, possessing unbounded wealth in natural products, her citizens possessed of enterprise, frugality, and independence, and with a strong and ever growing national sentiment showing their unbounded confidence in the future of this great Dominion, will fully realize the importance of a continuance of friendly commercial relations with the United States as tending to our mutual advantage.

ABSCONDING AND FRAUDULENT DEBTORS.

During the past year the Board memorialized the Government at Ottawa that in the interest of trade and commerce, the provisions of the Extradition Treaty between the United States and Canada should be extended so as to include the cases of absconding and fraudulent debtors and that the laws of Canada should be so amended as to prevent this country becoming a refuge for the absconding and fraudulent debtors of other countries.

BANKING LEGISLATION.

The approaching expiry of the bank charters has given rise to a discussion as to probable or desirable changes in the law, and propositions more or less radical have been made by way of improvement. It may be taken

for granted that the executive officers in the Finance Department at Ottawa, have watched most carefully the operation of the law for the past eight or nine years, and it will be well if parliament is guided by their suggestions, embodied in a Bill, which the Government should introduce and become responsible for.

The subject has an absorbing interest for every man of business, for anything that is likely to have an injurious effect upon the banks must speedily re-act upon the business community; and everything in the nature of violent or radical changes is therefore to be deprecated or approached with the utmost caution.

The discussion having centred round the bank note circulation I desire to point out to those whose jealousy of, or enmity towards, the banks, blinds them to the important part they play in the conduct of our commerce, and the intimate relations that exist between them and our agricultural and business interests, that the circulation of the chartered banks is regulated not by any volition of theirs but by the actual requirements of the people and their trade, which varies at different seasons of the year, and can neither be increased nor diminished apart from these requirements. The elasticity secured under the present arrangements is one of its most valuable features; for if the banks were compelled to hold gold or government securities against their circulation, their ordinary mercantile loans to merchants and manufacturers would have to be contracted when an increase of circulation was necessary to move the natural products of the country, and an enhanced price would have to be paid by grain dealers and lumbermen, and others who only require to borrow periodically. This in turn would react upon the farmer, who would get less for his grain, or his cattle, or his timber, because the additional demand for money to market these products would make money dearer, and to that extent would lessen the value of the marketable produce in his hands.

That the public should be secured against loss from, or discount upon, the circulation in their hands is equally important. The banks have such a vital interest in this themselves that they may safely be left to adopt measures to remove all suspicion from the public mind as to the safety of the bills; for there is fear only, and not real danger of loss. The Government, however, can defeat all their efforts in this direction by granting charters to new banks as they have heretofore done. No concerted action is possible while charter brokers can obtain bank charters for speculative purposes.

The public will regard with much interest the efforts of the bankers in the various trade centres to establish

CLEARING HOUSES,

for, while the conveniences in connection with them chiefly concern the banks themselves, the statistical information afforded as to the volume and fluctuations of trade exhibited by these clearings would form a most

valuable addition to the barometrical evidences of the condition of business throughout the Dominion. This being essentially the mission of this Board, the bankers' section may rely upon our active co-operation in any efforts it may put forth towards the establishing of a clearing house in this city. It is not a matter of easy accomplishment, but it is not beyond the ability of our leading financial men, if only they are animated with a determination to carry it to a successful issue, and will co-operate to this end.

COMBINES.

The question of combinations having been brought into prominence during the past year, and the subject being considered of sufficient importance to engage the attention of a special committee of the House of Commons at its last session, it will naturally be expected that I should make some reference to it in my report.

Speaking for myself, while I would deprecate all attempts to form gigantic and oppressive trusts, I fail to see any reason why persons engaged in business in order to better co-operate in all reasonable efforts to advance their interests, and to prevent the selling of goods below cost, which has a tendency not only to lower the quality of the supply, but to encourage reckless and unscrupulous methods in trade, should not arrange amongst themselves fair and reasonable prices at which special clearly defined lines of goods should be sold at general terms of credits and discounts, and that they should take every precaution to prevent persons who might be disposed to do so, availing themselves of such arrangements by underselling or offering more favorable terms as would entirely defeat the object had in view.

I cannot but think that such arrangements if wisely and carefully directed, and only fair and reasonable prices for staples established, would be in the interests of both the retailer and consumer, for it would be an assurance that neither was paying more for their goods than they were worth.

It is a fact patent to all that if one article is sold at cost or less, some other must bear the loss, and thus, articles, values of which are not well known, earn a disproportionate amount of profit.

I sincerely hope that in legislating on the subject, Parliament will not press through any measure which might have the effect of restricting the trade of the country, and of creating antagonism between consumers of merchandize and those who undertake its distribution.

MINING.

I would refer to one interest of immense importance to Canada—that is, the Mining interest—which it appears to me does not receive from the Government that attention and aid which it rightly calls for.

From all the information that is obtainable, there seems to be no doubt

but that the Northern portion of the Province of Ontario and British Columbia is probably richer in minerals than any other portion of this continent.

In consequence of the nature of the country, the difficulties in the way of prospecting are exceptionally great.

Mining ventures in their early stages of development do not readily attract capital, and there is always more or less difficulty in procuring money to properly develop new fields.

The Government surveys and reports, so far as they have gone, have been most serviceable, but in the view of the enormous interest to the country in having the mineral resources properly developed, it seems to me that while the Government is liberal, even generous, in the promotion of railway and other public works, advancing large sums of money in the way of free bonuses, the Mining industry, which has quite as large a claim as any other in the Dominion for Government assistance, has been neglected.

I believe it would be greatly in the interests of the country that the Geological staff should be very largely increased; that the very fullest explorations and examinations—especially in the British Columbia mining regions—should be made; that the fullest reports should be published from time to time, giving information which would enable the explorer and prospector to direct their energies to the most likely portions of the country, and I further believe it would be largely beneficial to the country if the Government were to establish at one or two points to be indicated by the Geological Department, assay and smelting works where the various ores could be tested and fully reported upon.

An assay and report under authority from the Government works would carry a weight and influence not obtainable from any other source.

The Mining laws should be put upon the most liberal footing, and every encouragement given to the development of the vast mineral resources of the country.

Much of the ore, not only of British Columbia but of other parts of Canada, has to be sent out of the Dominion to be tested, before any true test as to its richness can be obtained.

INSOLVENCY LEGISLATION.

We would again refer to the question of the necessity of some legislation governing the equitable distribution of insolvent debtors' estates, and applicable to all the Provinces of the Dominion.

ARBITRATION.

Among the desirable features of the Board are the By-laws relating to the settlement of disputes that arise, and honestly arise, among the members of an organization such as ours, comprised of nearly 1,000 merchants.

I do not believe that too much prominence can be given to the great value of commercial arbitration.

It only needs to contrast the system of Common Law procedure, the jury men found there, and the tedious and expensive delays experienced, with our own Court of Arbitration, the men who compose it, and their mode of procedure, to know why it has been so well appreciated, and is so acceptable to our merchants, that I am not aware that any law-suit between our members has been adjudicated in a court of law during the past year.

Then why should not the benefits of this admirable system be extended so as to include every interest with which Commerce and Manufacture is directly allied?

Capital and Labor find a common centre in mercantile pursuits, the one just as essential as the other, and neither prosperous and healthful unless actively employed.

There should not be any antagonism between them; in fact every good reason demands that they should join hands in mutual confidence and trust.

If this be admitted, should not all questions which may arise between capital and labor be submitted to such a court of commercial equity as we possess, in the confidence that the interest of the country at large would demand an equitable decision.

Nothing more would then be heard of the arrogant demands of capital or the disastrous and damaging and too often vicious "strike" result of labor.

NEW BOARD OF TRADE BUILDING.

In May of last year your Building Committee, through the valuable assistance of The Toronto Architectural Guild, completed arrangements for the inauguration of a competitive plan for procuring drawings for the new building, and on October 1st twenty plans in all were received by Professor Ware, of Columbia College, New York, who was chosen your Committee's Professional adviser at the special request of the Toronto Architectural Guild.

The Committee having this most important feature of the Board's interests in charge, will very shortly issue a report, and there is every reason to anticipate the erection in the near future of a building which will be at once a profitable investment for the Board, one calculated to advance its best interests, and at the same time be another valuable addition to the many handsome buildings now under course of erection in this city.

BOARD OF TRADE AMENDMENT TO ACT OF INCORPORATION.

Acting upon a resolution of the Board, application was made to the Dominion Parliament, and Legislature of Ontario, for amendments to

the Act of incorporation, enabling the Board to make By-laws respecting the admittance to membership, also for the better conduct of arbitrations.

BUCKET SHOPS.

Owing in a great measure to the agitation begun by this Board the legislation necessary to prevent active trading through what are termed "bucket-shops" has been obtained, and if it is found that the provisions of the Act passed are in any way insufficient to completely root out this system of gambling, we trust that such amendments will be introduced at the next session of Parliament as will remedy the defect.

GRATUITY FUND.

It gives me pleasure to report that the results arising from its inception have been more than realized. During the two-half years of its existence, the death rate has been under one per cent. of the membership of the Board.

The sum of \$8542.38 was paid out during the past year to beneficiaries, the next of kin of deceased members.

The surplus or guarantee fund is now \$33,000.00, and is evidence of the ability of the trustees to pay the claims that may be made upon it.

The gifts from the fund in many cases have helped to lessen the burden of deep sorrow that was crushing the hearts of those who had lost through death, the family bread-winner, and proves the assertion that a fund of this kind forms a desirable interest in a large organization such as ours.

In conclusion, I would express the gratification I feel in the fact that the Board at the close of the present year is not only stronger in numbers and financially than ever before in its history, but that the interest manifested by its members, and the influence exerted by it in all commercial and public enterprises of the country, has greatly increased.

I would sincerely thank the members of the Board, and especially the Vice-Presidents and members of the Council, for their unvarying courtesy and for the generous support accorded me in my humble efforts for the welfare, usefulness, and advancement of the Toronto Board of Trade.

Of Mr. Edgar A. Wills, your indefatigable Secretary, I cannot speak too highly.

His interest in the Board never flags, and it is largely owing to his untiring energy that the Board is maintained in its present important position.

During the year 58 members have been elected, qualifying by the transfer to themselves of outstanding certificates of membership, and one member re-instated, thus bringing the total membership to 916, including one honorary membership.

Nine members have died, all of whom were members of the Gratuity Fund, making the total number of deaths of members since the organization of the Fund on the 3rd of June, 1886, 19.

Eight hundred and twenty members out of the total 916 are members of the Gratuity Fund, an increase of 14 since the 31st December, 1887, or an average increase of 3 per month, and of 85 since the 1st September, 1886.

Pursuant to a By-law to that effect, certificates of membership suitably engraved were issued to the members on the 16th of March, 1886. From that period up to the close of the present year, 188 certificates have been transferred. Of this number 21 were those of deceased members.

During the year the legislation sought for from the Dominion Parliament was obtained, and the By-laws amended in consonance therewith. The same were carefully revised, and on the 3rd of September, 1888, the Board approved of the amendments as prepared by the Council, and ordered same to be printed; this has been done and members can obtain copies from the Secretary.

TRADE SECTIONS.

I am glad to be able to report that the organizations at present in existence are working well, and have proved of great value and importance to the trades interested; it is of the greatest moment that the largest encouragement should be given to the organization of individual trades, so that just as early as possible each department of business may feel that it is permitted to address itself to the consideration of its own special interests, feeling at the same time that it has all the support of the general body for its preservation and development. It is already provided in the By-laws of the Board, that the rules for the government of individual departments, on the recommendation of the departments themselves, be adopted by the general body, so that any branch, however weak, can invoke the aid of the whole business body of the community in its support.

Just as our city increases in population will the temptation increase for the individual trades to organize for the exchange of views and for the securing of mutual aid in every direction; this is inevitable. Now, if this tendency is not recognized by some general body, which stands ready to exercise general care, it will lead to completely independent organizations, but with relatively diminished influence. The whole business body, if possible, should be directed as an entirety, because the expression of the sentiments of the community generally must be more potential than the individual expression of many small bodies. My observation has been that there is nothing our Legislatures so much desire as to arrive at a fair interpretation of the sentiments of their constituents.

In the matter of civic, provincial and national legislation this body has become a potent factor, stronger with each successive year, and occupies a more conspicuous position than ever before; propitious circumstances and wise administration having combined to secure the results that we see, but this state of things cannot be maintained by spasmodic efforts, actual personal interest must be secured, and I know of no better way than by a united effort to encourage the formation and development of Trade Sections.

I hope the day is not far distant, therefore, when others than Grain and Produce men will gather at stated periods, if not daily, for the exchange of commodities, on the floors of the Chamber.

Originally this Board was not formed exclusively for the exchange of commodities on the floor of the Exchange, the matter of buying and selling having appeared only on the amalgamation with the Corn Exchange. It was a body formed for creating a high standard of commercial morality; for the discussion of questions affecting the business community; for adopting uniform regulations for the government of trade; and for the collection and dissemination of statistics from year to year. Since the amalgamation referred to, the scope of its purpose has been somewhat extended, and the increase of its membership has caused it to assume the character of a social organization, which business men seek because of this peculiar feature. It may now be said that the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto is a pivotal point around which the great commercial interests of the city and province revolve.

Similar Associations, encouraged by the status this Board has attained, are being actively organized all over the Province, and applications for assistance in organizing are constantly being received by your Secretary, four having been received during the past month. The large number of meetings of a commercial character held in your room (585 in number) constitute further evidence of the value of this and similar organizations.

Fifty-six donations have been received for the Library, irrespective of the reports, etc., from the Dominion and Local Legislatures.

The second Annual Dinner of the Board was held on the 4th of January, 1889, in the Pavilion, Horticultural Gardens, and one of the many gratifying features of the same was the large attendance of non-resident members. The total number present on this occasion, including guests, was 582, of this number 487 were members of the Board, the balance were the guests of the Board and members' friends.

The presence of 450 ladies in the Galleries added to the brilliancy and success of an event, unique in the history of the Board and the Dominion. The importance of the occasion is fully demonstrated by the very extended and elaborate reports given by the leading journals.

GRATUITY FUND.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

TORONTO, July 3rd, 1888.

To the Council of the Board of Trade, Toronto.

GENTLEMEN,

The Trustees of the Gratuity Fund in this their Second Annual Report, have to record that during the past year nine deaths of members have occurred, the average age of whom was 53-11 per cent., while the percentage of deaths to the whole membership has been about $\frac{1}{4}$ of one per cent.

Fourteen members have subscribed to the Fund during the past year, thus bringing the total membership to 812, leaving still 100 original certificates of the Board outstanding. The aggregate ages of the fourteen members was 482 years, the average thus being 34 years.

Thirty-one Certificates have been transferred during the past year to new members. Of these, two were taken by subscribers past the limit of age (50 years) for participating in the benefit of the scheme. The average age of the balance of those retiring (29) was 40 years, and the average age of the new members was 36 years.

It will be noticed that the sum of \$22,251 has been collected during the year in assessments, and that \$8,542.38 has been paid by way of gratuities—the average amount of each gratuity being \$949.15, and the number of beneficiaries being forty-nine, the representatives of the nine deceased members. The expense of administering the Fund has been \$701.73, and the assessments outstanding at the end of the year and to be collected, \$126.00, is evidence of the punctuality with which the various assessments have been paid.

In every important respect, therefore, the anticipations of the promoters of the scheme have been fulfilled—the estimated surplus at the end of two years on a membership of nine hundred having been \$31,824, while the actual amount on hand with a membership of eight hundred and twelve is \$26,423.35.

While the circumstances of the representatives of two or three of the deceased members were such as to make the Gratuity of little importance, the families of some others found the Gratuity an immense boon, tiding them over the temporary difficulties in connection with the removal of their bread-winners, until they were able to adapt themselves to their altered circumstances.

During the year the Trustees have held twelve meetings; and the sum of \$16,000 belonging to the fund has been invested in Board of Trade and other debentures, yielding interest at the rate of 5.60 per cent. per annum.

The unqualified success of the scheme is such as should give confidence to the remaining members of the Board who, for various reasons, have not yet subscribed, and who are eligible for participating in the scheme; and it is earnestly hoped they will not any longer withhold their support and influence from this most valuable adjunct

of the Board, but will at an early date co-operate with their fellow members in giving it the further unity which it deserves.

A new Trustee falls to be elected at the First Annual Meeting of the Subscribers, in lieu of Mr. W. Ince, who retires by rotation.

ORDER OF DISTRIBUTION OF THE GRATUITY FUND.

BOARD OF TRADE OF THE CITY OF TORONTO.

1. If the deceased member shall leave surviving him a widow and no children, the whole is payable to the widow.
2. If the deceased leave a child or children and no widow surviving, the whole is payable to such child or children in equal shares.
3. If the deceased member leave a widow and a child or children surviving, one-half shall be payable to the widow and half to the child or children in equal shares.
4. If any case under which any child or the children of a deceased member would, if surviving him, be entitled to the gratuity payable on his death or a share therein under any of the foregoing clauses, and such child or children do not survive him but leave (surviving him) more remote descendants, they shall take (in equal shares, per stirpes) the gratuity or share therein to which their parent or parents respectively, if surviving, would have been entitled.
5. If the deceased member leave no widow or children or more remote descendants surviving him, the Gratuity shall be payable :—
6. If the deceased leave father and mother, or either surviving him, then to the father and mother in equal shares, or to the one if only one surviving.
7. If the deceased leave no father or mother surviving him and leave brothers and sisters, or both, the gratuity shall be paid to the brothers and sisters in equal shares, and if there be also children of any deceased brother or sister, such children shall take in equal shares the share which the deceased parent if surviving would have taken ; relatives of half-blood to take equally with those of whole blood.
8. The shares of minors to be paid to the legal guardians or their personal estate.
9. If there be no person entitled to the gratuity under any of the foregoing clauses the same may be disposed of and paid to any person or persons whom the Trustees of the Gratuity Fund in their uncontrolled discretion shall deem to have been wholly or partly dependent upon the deceased member or reasonably entitled to the benefit of the gratuity, or if the same be not so disposed of by the Trustees, it shall go to and form part of the Gratuity Fund.
10. The shares of minors for whom no guardians shall be appointed, may be paid into a legal depository of trust funds, subject to the order of such minors when they shall arrive at full age, or to the order of their guardians when appointed.
11. All guardians must accept the guardianship in writing.
