

9. That for the encouragement of dairying, a change of departmental methods is desirable. The encouragement of economical and sanitary milk production in dairy sections seems the most urgent need. Money spent on bonuses and factory inspection having largely failed of its object, the usual expenditure in this direction should, in our opinion, be largely directed for a few years to encourage the production of milk and to promoting the collecting of cream to butter manufacturing centres. The dairy school work should be extended for farm dairy needs and where classes can be formed, carried to local centres.

10. That the department of agriculture get the best expert advice upon the whole question of fertilizers, including:

(a) Cost per unit of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash in various countries.






