**Miramichi Advance.**

**Chatham Town Council.**  
The Town Council of Chatham met on Monday night in regular monthly session, Mayor Winslow presiding.  
After the minutes were read, Ald. Neale referred to their being called upon by reports of the observations of aldermen on resolutions, etc., which the clerk had before been instructed by the Mayor to omit.  
The Mayor reiterated his former suggestions to the clerk on this subject and in effect asked him to remember that he should act as clerk of the Council and not attempt to be a reporter.  
Ald. Neale submitted an offer which had been made to the public works committee by the Chatham Electric Light Company, in connection of the committee, for installing the lighting system of the Public building. The offer embraced 46 lights, including one at the police and front entrance, outside; suitable protected lamps in the stable, basement, hay-loft, etc.; lights in the janitor's quarters and the engine rooms; grouped lamps, with brass hangers and fixtures in the council chamber and police court and shaded lamps in the treasurer's office, etc.; all lamps in the building to be 16 candle-power—the cost for the whole, including lamps ready for turning on the light to be \$120. Should the brass hangers and brackets not be desired the work to be done for \$100. Ald. Neale explained that the offer was made on a decision of the committee after they had examined the building and decided where the lights should be placed. It was further stated that the report be referred to the public works committee with power.

Ald. Robinson presented a communication of Mr. Wm. H. McLaughlin who showed that his father, Mr. Donald McLaughlin had given him \$1,000 last spring to start a store in town, but that the assessors had required him to pay taxes on that amount, as well as on other value he had in his store, while they had not deducted the \$1,000 from the valuation they had made of his father's assessable property. He further asked that the \$1,000 in question be deducted from his valuation for assessment.

Ald. Loggie thought the matter should be referred to the assessors by petition under oath and Ald. Robinson said Mr. McLaughlin had already sought redress from the assessors, who had told him he should petition the Council. The matter was finally referred—after further discussion—to the finance committee.

A letter was read by Ald. Neale from John R. Hamilton of St. John who offered to furnish a snow plow for \$40 or \$60, not to exceed \$60. Ald. Neale read also a letter from Ald. McGoldrick of St. John, in reply to an enquiry of Ald. Neale as to whether a second lantern bell might not be procured in that city, to which Ald. McGoldrick promised information early this week.—Laid on table.

Application of R. A. Snowball, W. H. White, C. P. Hickey and W. A. Loudon for permission to establish an open air skating rink on the river-ice opposite Chatham was granted.  
Clerk Benson read a report of the Police Committee, of instructions which had been given to the policemen of the town as follows:—  
To the Officers of the Police Force, Chatham, N. B.  
I have to inform you that at a meeting of the Police Committee appointed by the Town Council, attention was called to the fact that the policemen frequently employed while on duty and paid fees for performing duty connected with service of summonses, subpoenas and other work which falls more properly within the duties that constables who are not policemen are required to perform, such as instance as the service of papers in connection with the hearing of the Canada Temperance Act. I beg to inform you that in conformity with section 108 of the Town Incorporation Act of 1895 or any member of the police force to accept any fee, reward or compensation for any service to be performed by his official capacity, whatever it may be, and the penalty for so doing is imprisonment for six months. Any fees which the Police Magistrate may charge for your services properly form part of your salaries. This does not apply to any reward by public proclamation or by the police authorities for the apprehension of any offender. Therefore, while you are required to serve papers and execute warrants in connection with the prosecution of justice in criminal cases, and also in quasi-criminal cases under the Canada Temperance Act and the like, you are forbidden to accept any fee or reward therefor, and you are also instructed to refuse to occupy your time in the serving of civil process except the execution of warrants, issued for the collection of town rates, which you are expected to do duty if required.

Complaint is made that you have refused admission to a person who was desirous of interviewing a prisoner confined in the lock-up, and the particular case to which our attention was called appears to have been a complaint against Officer Forrest was somewhat unreasonable. In matters of this kind care should be observed that no such complaint may be justified in future. Unless in some very extraordinary cases, and under the direction of the Police Magistrate, prisoners are entitled to consult with friends under fair restrictions.

The Committee also desired me to urge upon you the necessity of exercising forbearance in using your powers while making arrests, so that no one may be justified in complaining that you are cruel or unnecessarily severe, and in all matters pertaining to your duties, which you are expected to perform faithfully, that you should on occasions be courteous to the general public.

Your attention is directed to section 103 of the Town Incorporation Act which provides that if any tavern keeper of any house, shop or room for the sale of any liquor, or any other person, knowingly entertains or allows any police officer to remain in his house or shop or room during any of the time appointed for his being on duty, every such tavern keeper or keeper of any such house or shop shall be liable to forfeit the sum of twenty dollars, as the Magistrate may think proper, and the Magistrate may think proper to patrol the town, and to divide your time so as to cover as far as possible all sections of the town, and to report each day to the

Police Magistrate any matters which may require to be brought to his attention in the interests of law and order.  
The foregoing comprise instructions for your future guidance.  
Dated at Chatham, N. B., this 30th day of November, A. D. 1897.

**ROGER FLANAGAN, Chairman.**  
Ald. McIntosh, as soon as the report was read, rose to put some questions to Ald. Flanagan, but being out of order gave way to Ald. Robinson, who moved the reception of the report. Carried.  
Ald. McIntosh enquired whether there were any instructions—verbally given to the policemen?  
Ald. Neale said before the report of the Police Committee is passed, I wish to state as a member of that committee, for the information of the Council and the public in general that the instructions given to the policemen by the chairman of the committee as printed in Saturday's World, were the only instructions agreed upon by the committee to be given; that no alterations were made in the instructions originally agreed upon and further that no scheme or proposal having for its object the frustration of the administration of the Canada Temperance Act, was advanced by any member of the committee; or in any way considered; the instructions agreed upon were committed to writing and a type-written copy made early next morning and each policeman was given a copy during the day; the chairman of the committee in the meantime having given the policemen a rough idea of what the committee had decided on; it was thought advisable to commit the orders to writing, so that no misunderstanding could be placed on the orders given; and I venture to say that no right minded citizens can take exception to the action of the police committee. Certain letters have appeared in the last two issues of the World criticising the police committee, which letters contain statements both false and misleading; but I feel that every citizen with any sense of justice and fairness will agree with me, when I say that persons who attack and vilify men holding public positions, in letters inserted in newspapers, and have not the courage to sign their names to what they write, but protect themselves behind a non descript name, are simply endeavoring to create unjust prejudices, and deserve to be treated with utmost contempt.

Ald. McIntosh: Will you deny that the policemen were invited to that meeting to receive their instructions? Answer that?  
Ald. Neale said he believed they were, although he had no personal knowledge of it. After the instructions to the policemen were decided upon and settled the members of the committee retired and the chairman, Mr. Flanagan, he understood, gave the policemen a rough sketch of the instructions which they were to act upon. He could only say that the chairman was in full accord with all that was contained in the instructions agreed upon, and which were reduced to writing next morning by the Mayor. What Ald. Flanagan may have told the policemen, or what the policemen had thought necessary to report to any one outside that he had told them could not affect the committee. The chairman may have omitted to tell them they would get their instructions in writing, but they should have waited, in any case, before doing so much talking.  
Mayor Winslow endorsed all that Ald. Neale had said. He was a member of all committees and was present with others of the Police Committee when the instructions were decided upon. He had noted them all and that might prepared a copy of them. In the morning he gave the copy he had prepared to his clerk to be type-written, and had given the type-written copy to Chairman Flanagan before dinner-time on the next day, notwithstanding anything to the contrary that Mr. Scott or any other person might assert. The policemen were informed that they must respect the law under which they were acting; that they were paid salaries by the town; that the law rendered them liable to fine for receiving extra fees for performing their duties; that such fees, if earned belonged to the town. It was a fact that the policemen had acquired the habit of spending their time at the lock-up as Scott Act cases were being tried when they were not needed there but should be patrolling the town and looking after their more direct duties—those of maintaining and enforcing good order and law generally, to which he regretted that they seemed to pay little attention. The members of the police committee could not, of course, prevent the policemen from misrepresenting them or protect themselves from the tales they told in the corner shops and other places which were their resorts.  
Ald. Flanagan said that as chairman of the police committee, he had told the policemen, before the committee met that they might be wanted at the office of the Mayor to receive instructions. The Mayor and after the members of the committee retired he told them in substance, what had been decided upon and instructed them that they were not to serve papers in civil cases; that they were to assist and protect the Scott Act inspector in the service of papers, etc. He received type-written copies of the committee's instructions before dinner time from the Mayor and gave one to policeman Forrest.  
Ald. Coleman, who said he would like to see the Chatham policemen go to any part of the county and
