ILL LUCK FOLLOWS OLD INDIAN IDOLS

Jews are Rapidly Repopulating Cast Their Spell on Clergyman's Family

gnorant Peasants Ousled by Immigran's Now Anxious to 63t Rid of Them-General's Wife Murdered to Recover Sacred Stone.

LONDON, Feb. 2—Not long ago a surprising explanation of the mysterious murder in England of the wife of General Luard was given. The story went that the murdered woman had in her possession a ring set with a precious stone stolen from a Buddhist temple a century or so ago. A message from the Far East said that an idol which had been without one of its jeweled eyes for many years had lately recovered its other eye, and it was suggested that a fanatical sect had made it the life duty of its members to search for the missing eye throughout the world.

A similar story of Oriental fanaticism comes from Longborough, a rural parish in one of the most prosaic corners of Leicestershire. The vicar of Loughborough is the unhappy possessor of some curious idols over 2000 years old, which he has reasons for believing are being earnestly sought for by an Indian secret society.

They consist of two slabs, about a yard squale, of baked brick, on each of which are two quaint figures in relief, in wonderful green and fiesh tints. One pair has elephants' heads, the other dogs' heads. The slabs, so the vicar relates, were picked up by his father, then a young subaltern officer, from a pile of loot in the course of a campaign in northern India.

"My father," the vicar says, "was one

"My father," the vicar says, "was one of the most unlucky of men, and during the seventeen years I have had these two slabs nothing has seemed to go right with me or my affairs. He gave them to me before he died. But this is the most mysterious part of the family's experience:

"Ten years ago my brother was staying at Lyndhurst in Hampshire, when a Hindu came to him and asked him about the idols my father brought home. He named my father, and had evidently traced his career from his subaltern days.

"My brother said he had no idols himself, and laughed when the Indian grew very solemn and declared that misfortune would accompany the idols everywhere until they were returned to India. He told my brother to give the message to their possessor, but said that he would not demand to know who had the idols for ten years to come.

"A few days ago he received a letter from India, ten years after the Lyndhurst interview, saying simply, 'Remember the judgment of the gods.' By the same mail came a letter from London announcing that his wife had suddenly had a paralytic stroke."

The coincidence gave him a scare, and now the vicar and his relatives have become obsessed by the idea that the idols carry a curse. They fight against this feeling, but they will be much happier when the idols are safely on their way to India, or wherever they belong.



with the Robt. Wright Co., the employes of the staff gave him a roll top desk and chair for his new office, and his former employer gave him a gold watch. The congregation of St. Paul's presented him with an electric desk late Count of Flanders, he had the

desire to reign. Like his father, the late Count of Flanders, he had the tastes of a country gentleman of moderate means, and no inclination to live otherwise. He had, in fact, a positive aversion to ostentation, as was seen by his manner of living, which was extremely modest for the heir to the throne. After his marriage it was proposed to lease the Duke D' Arenberg's palace in Brussels for Prince Albert. The present king, however, informed Leopold II, that he could not resign himself to reside in this sumptuous, but far from homelike, ancestrial abode. He chose, instead, the unpretentious town house of the Marquis d'Assche. There, Prince and Princess Albert have led a quiet and most uneventful existence since their marriage in 1900.

King Albert, as those who have been presented to him at court well know, is far too bashful to be a man of the world. It was against this shyness more than anything that King Leopold had to contend in educating the throne's future incumbent. The prince was well endowed mentally, and would have made a successful civil or mining engineer, had he been able to follow his natural bent. But a soldier's career, which tradition obliged him to follow, was most distasteful to him. It was for the purpose of overcoming if possible the prince's shyness that King Leopold sent his nephew on a trip around the world. The prince, it will be remembered, made a long stay at the time in the United States. It was then that he acquired a taste for railroading. While in St. Paul he was the guest of James J. Hill and toured the northwest in Mr. Hill's private car. After his return to Belgium the prince took a long course of instruction in the State Railrad Department and became thoroughly versed in the science of building and of running a railway.

King lbert is credited by those who know him best with most up-to-date ideas concerning the functions of royalty. He is a steady worker, and his daily routine shows him to be as busy, if not busier, than the average business man. He rises punctually at six o'clock, breakfasts at 7, and immediately proceeds to examine his correspondence and to answer the most pressing letters; he then devotes two hours to mechanical engineering, his favorite pursuit. Latterly he has given much time to the various new railroads projected in the Congo.

The king takes a horseback ride at about 11 o'clock and returns shortly before lunch, which is served at 12.30. After this meal the king returns to his private study and examines the matters pending relative to the First Grenadiers—his regiment. This generally occupies him until 5 o'clock. The king and queen then take tea, and afterward, if not pressed with business, King Albert accompanies his wife on a brisk walk. The royal pair dine at 7 o'clock, and when not at the theatre spend the evening quietly en famille.

atre spend the evening quietly en famille.

There is good reason to hope that the condition of the natives in the Congo will be improved under King Albert's rule. The king has taken an active interest in Congo matters for several years, and this interest was heightened by his recent sojourn in Belgium's great African dependency. A deep impression was made in Belgian colonial circles by Prince Albert's Entwerp speech on his return from the Congo. He announced that he would head the movement in favor of the natives' welfare by every means in his power. The great stress which he likewise laid on the necessity for increasing railroad communication throughout the Congo is now taken to mean that King Albert will himself be the leader of the colonial party and hasten the development of the colony. King Albert has considerable talent as a writer and gave his impressions of America in a breezy book of travels published a year after his return to Belgium. He has likewise published a history of the rise of the great Flemish towns. This is now to be followed by a book giving his personal impressions of the Congo.

The king is a keen motorist and generally drives his own car. Nor is he at a loss in case of an accident. While he was driving with his wife, not long ago, a tire was punctured, and he promptly mended it himself.





DECISION WILL AFFECT

NEWSPAPER READERS

Railway Commission Upsets Existing Arrangements for News Services-Companies Will Jump Their Rates.

A recent decision of the Board of Railway Commissioners, who also have jurisdiction over telegraph business will seriously affect all the newspaper The monthly tournament of the City of the Dominion which are in the habit Bowling League will be held on Black's of receiving their news by wire. The most important feature of the ruling of receiving their news by wire. The most important feature of the ruling is the clause forbidding the telegraph companies to furnish or transmit news services at a flat rate of so much per week. As all the Associated Press, the Canadian Associated Press and the Western Associated Press matter is handled at flat rates at present the newspapers simply paying a fixed rate and receiving everything sent out by the central bureau, the change will materially affect their telegraphic service. That the change will not be for the better is certain, as at the inquiry the C. P. R. Telegraph Company, which controls the Associated Press in Canada, claimed that they lost \$50,000 on this feature last year and will find it necessary to raise their rates under the new system.

Representatives of the telegraph companies and the newspapers have been called to meet in Montreal next Tuesday to discuss the matter and try to come to a working arrangement.

The trouble arose over a complaint of undue discrimination which was made by the Western Associated Press which is an organization formed by the Winnipeg papers to protect themselves against the telegraph companies. The association formerly paid so much per word but later secured an agreement for a flat rate. This rate was higher than that which the C. P. R. Company charged for the Associated Press seris the clause forbidding the telegraph

than that which the C. P. R. Company charged for the Associated Press ser-vice and this was one cause for the complaint.

After the matter was thrashed out

After the matter was thrashed out the Commission refused to force the company to give the association the same rate and instead declared that the whole flat rate arrangement was illegal and ordered that it be discontinued and that about February all matter be charged at a word rate. The Commission also directed all telegraph companies to prepare and publish a tariff of their rates and that the rates given should apply to everyone without any discrimination.
