

Sir:—The "World Wide" quotes from the Evening Post of New York as follows: "If, as Mr. Folks believes, the general hospital is to be the chief agency in disease prevention, the question instantly presents itself, What will be the attitude of the medical profession towards it? Comparitively few doctors can have the advantage of permanent hospital affiliation.

In some places the competition is keen, indeed, between those surgeons who may take their patients to a hospital and those who cannot offer these privileges. If then, the hospital in a small town is to become of its own voiltion, the dominant medical factor the supervisor of the public welfare, what is to become of the unattached practitioner? The answer is, we believe that he will be affiliated more and more with the hospital itself, if not in direct service, then through outpatient work. He will be utilized in the preventive campaign and finally there is bound to come, with the newer and broader aspect of the hospital's function a broadening of the medical and surgical staffs themselves.

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
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

## **MARKETS**

Messrs. Churchill and Simms furnish the following report of the London Wood Market.

The London Wood Market in October has not been so strong as it was in September. The importation has been a large one, and the consumption, although no worse than it was last year, is still so far below the normal, tht the market is more than ordinarily sensitive even to the appearance of a full supply. This has in no way affected the free on board markets. Assisted by a fair demand from the British outports and from the Continent, shippers have practically cleared the remainder of their available supplies at something more than the highest prices of the season. The deficiency in the London Dock stocks as compared with last year has been reduced during the month by some 5,000 Standards, the chief items that are now short being Swedish battens and both rough and prepared boards. The Dock deliveries for the pest month are some 600 Standards only behind those of October, 1908, while the overside deliveries have been nearly 7,000 Standards, more than in the corresponding month last year. Freight room has been more difficult to obfain than at any previous period of the year, and rates have stiffened materially.
