SECOND DAY OF STRIKE FINDS BOTH CONFIDENT

All Freight and Suburban Service Tied Up on DROWNED ON Grand Trunk Yesterday and Situation Will Become Serious in a Few Days--2,000 Millmen Out of Employment as Indirect Result.

Strikers and Company Officials Profess to be Satisfied With First Day's Developments---Only Report of Trouble at Island Pond, Me., Denied by Trainmen--Police Guard Stations.

Montreal, July 19.—The first day of the strike of the Grand Trunk conductors and trainmen has ended without any serious disorder being reported from any part of the system and with both sides professing satisfaction with the position occupied. The company has kept all of its through trains running practically on time and most of its local trains, but there has been an entire abandonment of the suburban business and freight traffic.

This record satisfies both parties, the company accepting it as evidence that progress is being made in breaking the strike while the men's representatives say that they never expected to tie up the company's passonger business, but point to the complete cessation of freight traffic as evidence that the strike order has been loyally observed by the members of the two orders concerned. Vice-President Fitzbugh, of the Grand Trunk, admits that no freight was moved today, the company's entire efforts being confined to moving the mails and passengers, but states that in a few days when this portion of the service has been provided for, the company will take up the freight situation



In Advance Report of Magazine Article Explorer Tells How He Determined He Had Reached Goal.

The Dash For The Pole.

With picked men and dogs Commidistance in five forced marches of a little more than twenty-five miles each day. He found conditions of ice and temperature better than he had expected. On the fifth day he felt he was close to the goal of three centuries of heroic effort. In this connection, under the caption "At the Pole at Last," he writes:—

About 10 o'clock in the forenoon of April 6 I called a halt. I had now made my five marches, and estimated that we were in the immediate neighborhood of our goal; and at local noon on the Columbia meridian, I made my first observation at our polar camp, named Morris K, Jesup Camp, which indicated our position as 89 degrees 57 minutes.

I had turned out to be in readiness for an observation at 6 p. m., Columbia meridian time, in case the sky should be clear. Unfortunately, it was overcast; but as there were indications that it would be clear before long I started out with my two men, E-ging-wah and Si-gloo, and a light sledge, carrying only my instruments, and a tin of permican, drawn by a double team of dogs, and went on—an estimated distance of ten miles. It had cleared while we were travelling, and at the end of the journey I was able to get a satisfactory series of observations at Columbia meridian midnight, which observations indicated our position as being beyond the pole.

French vital statistics recently issued for the year 1909 do not tend to encourage the popular belief that race suicide in that country is on the increase. It is evident on the contrary that the birth rate is well ahead of the mortality. During the year under notice there were 23,000 more births than deaths in the cities and




