Extremely heavy infantry fighting has taken place northwest of Verdun, and on the outskirts of the Bois Des Buttes, to the north of the Aisne, with the Germans in both regions the aggressors. Elsewhere along the line artillery duels of great proportions are under way.

In the sector between Bethancourt and Cumieres, northwest of Verdun, the intense artillery bombardment of the Germans was followed by an infantry attack, but over the entire front of three miles it was repulsed by the French with serious losses, except between Bethancourt and Le Mort Homme, where the Germans gained a footing at two points in the French trenches.





ports of January, 1915, but as compared with those of December there was a decided falling off in the value of agricultural products exported.

Exports of manufactures in January were valued at \$46.600,731, more than double the value of the December exports, which were valued at \$21,803.7807. For ten months of the current fiscal year the exports of all domestic products amounted to \$595,265,000, and the imports to \$334,003,000.

Industrial Conditions.

As may be gathered from the figures respecting the exports of manufactures, industrial plants are exceptionally busy in practically every part of the Dominion, Orders for ammunition and other war supplies are largely accountable for this, but a very satisfactory domestic trade is also a factor.

The advance in prices of lumber in British Columbia, caused by an irrease in the cost of production as well as by the demand from the prairie provinces, has put new life and hope into the lumber industry in that province, and conditions in the Martitime Provinces are similar. In British Columbia there is, also, continued mining activity, and the production of copper is being stimulated by the present level of prices.

Textle mills are fully employed and furniture and other wood-working plants are now obtaining more busiligation. The agriculture and other wood-working plants are now obtaining more busilights. isfactory domestic trade is also a factor.

Deposits by the public at the close of January showed a decrease of \$43.

413,239, and those of the Dominion and Provincial Governments an increase of \$41,692,228. In the first month of the year large payments were made on the war loan. The amount paid to date is estimated at splott \$75,000,000, out of a total crib. were made on the war loan. The amount paid to date is estimated at about \$75,000,000 out of a total subscription of \$100,000,000, and this accounts for the transfer of funds from public to government deposits. Not withstanding this, however, public deposits are now \$104,390,200 greater than at the end of January, 1915. Provincial Government balances are high as the result of payments of statutory subsidies by the Dominion. Current loans at the end of January showed the unusually large contraction of \$17,077,000, due chiefly to government disbursements on account of war supplies. Circulation outstanding at the close of January was less by \$11,170,010 than that of the previous month, a normal decline for this period of the year.

a normal decline for this period of the year.

A decidedly liquid position is being maintained by the banks, so that they are well equipped to facilitate moving the balance of the crop and to finance the industrial activity of the country. Payments of interest and principal on mortgages, and of insurance premiums are reported as being normal.

The foreign exchanges, owing to the difficulty of securing ocean tonnage and the consequent inability to export produce freely, have tended to move against the Dominion. The upward move has amounted to about ½ of 1 p. c, during the past month, but it is hoped that this feature will be rectified from now on.

After the Boer War, in 1903, there were 250,000 emit grants, of whom 123,000 went to the United States. He wished to keep such emigrants within the Empire in future. He looked upon the honorary mission which he had gladly undertaken, as his war work, and hoped that would result in a benefit to England and to the Empire.

A London Sournal gives an account.

A London Journal sives an account of a new disinfecting process in most successful use on a hospital ship: "The apparatus consists of an electrolytic cell, a reversing switch capable of carrying 100 amperes, and some ordinary insulated electric cable. The cost is about £50. The cell stands upon a rubber mat to, insulate it, and is raised upon a table to enable its contents to be poured out easily. It is filled with cold sea water, and if a current of 60-75 amperes at 110 volts be then turned on a solution containing two parts of sodium hypochlorite or available chiorine to 1,000 parts will be obtained in five minutes. The cost of this solution works out at 3d. per 100 gallons. The solution is also excellent as a sterilizer of drinking water, (one part chlorine to one million parts) and as an antiseptic for wounds (used undiluted as produced by the cused undiluted as produced by the electrolyzer, i. e., two parts hypochlorite of soda to 1,000 parts.) Further, in the butcher's department its value was soon evident, and also in the laundry for soaking undyed cotton and linen goods."

Speaking at the London Guildhall meeting, which called for the creation of a Ministry of Commerce, Sir George Presnell said that British technical and commercial education must be remodelled if the English race was to keep its position. They wanted the world, and especially their enemies, to know that above everything else they placed the smashing of Germany, both as a maritime Power, and as a commercial competitor. 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




