His period of service with the colors having been completed and he being transferred to the reserves, he returned to Canada in 1911 and located in Prince Rupert, B. C. Upon the outbreak of the great war in August. 1914, he immediately crossed to England and joined with his old regiment, which was made up of all trained men, and was therefore im-mediately dispatched to the front. He was wounded three times in the great conflict. His first wound received was wounded again at Hill 60 near Zille-beke in the early part of 1915, but nowever, remained on duty all night after being wounded and displayed great valor and courage, and for this be was mentioned in despatches by General Sir John French. Several weeks afterwards he was wounded and gassed at the battle of Ypres, in 1915, after which he was in Kitchener's army until his release, and donned this meture to Canada. Immediately after his return he was not contented with what he had done, and donned the uniform again and greatly assisted recruiting until he joined the 115th Battation under Lieu-tonat-Colonel F. V. Wedderburn, and proceeded overseas with that unit as regimental sergeant-major. neconnel F. V.
