This was my first experience. My next was to use it as bedding for hogs, cows and horses, and as an ausorbent in the barnyard. In September of the bride's father, by the Rev. Walter Ross, M. for the stables. The result was a splended pile of manure, and I found that the much made the very best basis for manure that could procure. It was better than straw and enabled me to feed all my straw and enab and enabled me to feed all my straw and largely increase my stock. But I could not in this way use as much muck as I wanted to, and there were meadows near the swamp for which I could not spare a load of manure from the barnyard. Besides, it cost too much to hall the muck to the barn 3 years. and back again. I tried the following plan, which I found answered all my expectations:

As the muck was dug, I mixed with every As the muck was dug, I mixed with every five loads one barrel of fresh lime. This was spread evenly in layers between layers of muck a foot thick. In 24 hours the heaps were smoking hot and I feared they would burn. I threw more muck over the top and beat the surface closely with the shovel to exclude the air, and in a few days the heat went down. When I came to draw the muck it had become a black, rich mass that exhaled a very pungent odor much like barnyard manure; and although it was in October when it was spread upon the like barnyard manure; and although it was in October when it was spread upon the grass, the color of the field became at once a deeper green and a rapid growth started. I have spread guano upon fields in Spring without seeing a more marked difference in the growth and color of the grass. Since then I have used wood asbes instead of lime with muck; and although there was no fermentation and not such a rapid decomposition as with the lime, yet the effects upon the grass were about the same. In this case I used a barrel (three bushels) of leached ashes to about five loads of muck. In those cases where muck cannot be used in the cases where muck cannot be used in the stables I would recommend the mixture with the lime of ashes, but in any ease use it. The muck I refer to is not the bottoms of poads or ditches, which are three-fourths sand, but the soil of deep swamps. which consists of vegetable matter altogether. I should value this from what I have seen of its use at at least \$1 a load and it is a very small swamp that will not contain several thousand loads.—[A Pennsylvannis Farmer.]
