Address on Reciprocity.

OTTAWA, May 4.—A large number of
petitions were presented to-day many of
them from Methodist and Presbyterian
churches over the Dominion, praying for a
constitutional law.

Mr. Charlton's speech on the resumption
of the debate on the address in reply was

Italian Stevedores To Be Tabooed in
New Orleans.

Chicago Cigarmakers' Claims
Conceded.

Prospects of a General Embargo on the
Cleveland Lumber Trade.

BRUSSELS, May 6.—The number of Bel-
gian miners on strike has reached 62,000.
The strike movement has extended to
Namur.

NOTES.
The lumber shovels on the docks at
Cleveland, Ohio, are still idle, and the
wholesale lumber dealers refuse to treat
with them as an organized body. The
2,500 carpenters in this city may be ordered
to strike Wednesday, and the brakemen on
the railroads promise to go out at the same
time, thus paralyzing the wholesale trade.
If the Lumber Shovelers' Union is not re-
cognized by that time.

At Chicago 400 of the striking union
cigarmakers have returned to work, their
demands for an increase of wages having
been conceded to them.

The laborers on the Island of Navassa
are on strike again, and the United States
steamer Kearsarge has landed a force for
the protection of the people who are
menaced.

The bricklayers in many English cities
have gone on strike for higher wages.

One thousand union cigarmakers struck
at Chicago on Monday for an increase of
wages.

The keepers and guards of St. Vincent de
Paul Penitentiary are petitioning the Gov-
ernment for an increase in their wages.

All the iron molders in New York are
on account of the housemills' strike, and
a number of carpenters and bricklayers
have been forced to stop work for the same
reason.

The chairman of the Southern Division
Grievance Committee, G. T. R., says that
there is no truth whatever in the reports
published concerning a strike on the G.T.R.
The rumor is without foundation.

The miners and iron workers' strike in
the Liege and Charleroi districts, Belgium,
continues, and is spreading to the districts
between the two great families on this con-
tinent of the Anglo-Saxon race, and that
object was to be accomplished by using
the chamber ring with their applause when
the member for North Norfolk resumed
his seat.

There was a pause of a few moments. It
was expected someone from the Govern-
ment side would follow. At a nodded
signal from the Premier the Speaker read
the motion moved by Mr. Haen, and it
was carried.

NOTES.
The most youthful member of the House
of Commons is Mr. Leveson, who is only
24 years old, but he does not look more
than 20. Mr. Leveson is not only the
youngest member of the House, but is the
first Liberal ever returned for the county
of Norfolk.

paid a case for my own family at that price.
By speaking to friends of the price paid by
me, they asked me to get some cases for
them, and I got four or five more cases at 7
cents per dozen."

LONDON, May 5.—Lord James Edward
Douglas, brother of the Marquis of
Queensberry, committed suicide to-day by
cutting his throat with a razor. Poverty
was the cause. Lord Douglas was born in
1855 and married in 1888 Mrs. Hennessey,
of Kensington Court, London.

REVENUES OF ILLINOIS.
LONDON, May 5.—The most Rev. Wm.
Conner Magee, D.D., bishop of Cork,
has died from pneumonia. He was re-
tired and had been suffering from the re-
turn of the disease since 1888. He was
born in 1818 and was 70 years of age.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 6.—A cablegram
received in the city states that Admiral
Watson has received orders from the Im-
perial authorities to hold himself in readi-
ness to proceed to Newfoundland if neces-
sary.

It is rumored that the Newfoundland
Government intends making American fish-
ing vessels deposit \$1,000 cash instead of
bonds, to prevent exportation of bait to St.
Pierre.
