OTTAWA, May 4.—A large number of petitions were presented to-day, many of them from Methodist and Presbyterian churches overthe Dominion, praying for a prohibitory law.

Black Knot.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

I have for some time past read the speeches of different members of horticulsural societies at their gatherings where they spoke on the treatment of black knot. They almost invariably recommended the cutting off and burning of the knot, and besmearing the wound with raw linseed oil, and stated it was dangerous to use coal oil for fear of killing the trees. If they had reference to refined oil probably they were correct, but if they had reference to crude petroleum I beg leave to differ with them materially. For the last eight or ten years I have used crude petroleum liberally on the knot and have yet to learn of its injuring the most tender twig or even a leaf. I, with a fine saw, cut off the knot, shave it smoothe with a sharp knife; then with a swab apply the crude oil liberally. Some time ago a horticulturist asked me how I kept my trees so free from the black knot. I told him. He then examined them and said "I have seen a great deal-of the treatment of black knot but never anything so successful." Yours, etc. J. W. 

THE AFRICAN EL DORADO. Renewed interest will be taken in the future of South Africa in consequence of Transvaal. The president of the Boer Republic has informed the British Government that he is unable to prevent the 20,000 Boers from "treking" into Mashona-20,000 Boers from taking 20,000 Boers from tak pioneers and African-Dutch adventurers

are entertained.

Upon this remarkable country of Mashonaland the eyes of the civilized world now rest for more reasons than territory is situated in the lofty region between the Limpopo and Zambesi rivers. This country is really a new discovery, as it scarcely began to attract attention until Selons came home two years ago, bringing glowing accounts of the value and salubrity of Mashonaland. These led to the formation of the British South Africa Company. Its first expedition recently reached its destination after passing for several hundred miles through regions south and east of Mashonaland that have never been visited before by white men. It was feared that the fierce Matebele under the rule of King Lobengula would annihilate the expedition, under the impression that the Europeans would finally overrun their land, but at no time during the long march was a drop of blood spilled. The expedition was preceded by a force of road builders cutting a way for the wagons. This road is to be maintained permanently, and it has now been com-pleted for a distance of 350 miles. A chain of forts about 75 miles apart was built and garrisoned, and other forts are to be estab-

lished along the route.

The natives of Mashonaland, so far from seing at enmity with the whites, have hailed their advent as the dawn of a blessed era. They are spoken of as an intelligent and enterprising African people, who have suffered greatly from the raids of the terrible Matebele warriors west of them. One of the most gratifying features of this great project to conquer a large region of Africa for the uses of civilized man is the fact that the Matebele nation is now nearly sur-rounded by white men, and the fearful raids which have for so many years been the scourge of an enormous part of South Africa will now have to cease.

Mashonaland, besides being probably destined to become the greatest gold region of South Africa, is said to be finely adapted both for grazing and agriculture, and may become the happy home This of thousands of European farmers. is a prospect which can be held out with regard to scarcely any other of the interior regions of the Dark Continent. One of the most strikingly significant comments upon the progress this part of Africa is making is the journey of Lord Randolph Churchili, who has just left England to penetrate Africa for 1,000 miles, bound for Mashonaland. Only five or six years ago this part of Africa was completely uncivilized. Today one of the best known of England's public men is on an excursion to this same land, with a determination to make a profitable investment in African - real estate.

There seems every prospect that the advent of the whites in this new region will parts of Africa. Stringent rules have been adopted by the British South Africa Company for preventing the whites from interfering with the native men and women, or subjecting them to any ill-treatment. The company has also forbidden the sale of intoxicating liquors and firearms to the Africans. With intall. prove a blessing to the aborigines, instead firearms to the Africans. With intelligence, enterprise and morality marking the outset of this great project it ought to have a bright career. It is to be hoped that the apprehended trouble between the Boers and the British will not mar a future so full of promise. There should be room and a living for the people of both nationalities in a land of so great possibilities.

Indeed it may, with fatal propriety, be said that Canada serves as a breeding ground of men for the United States, so that that country is now almost as much a colony of Canada as it is of Great Britain. ing it is \$642,170. The effect of subsidising a line to run through Maine to the Atlantic seaboard, at the expense of the Canadian taxpayer, is seen in the decreased receipts from the Government-controlled Interccionial line. The country ran the railway at a loss of \$258,546 in 1889. In 1890, the loss was more than double that, or \$553,392.

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
