HUNS AFTER MONROVIA AS SUBMARINE BASE

London, June 14.—An eyewitness of the bombardment of Monrovia, capital of the African Republic of Liberia, by a German submarine, has arrived in London and says that the submarine was of a large type, with two large and two small guns. The hour and a half bombardment of the city resulted in four women being killed and three persons being injured. Most of the shells fired appeared to have been shrapnel. The damage was slight, except for the destruction of the French wireless station.

The U-boat commander told the mayor that he intended to take over Monrovia as a submarine base.

"Protect the Girl and Boy Will Be Protected"-Want Common Sitting-Room and Registry For Boarding-Houses.

Brantford, June 14.—At this morning's meeting of the National Council of Women. Mrs. L. A. 

American Headquarters, on the British Front, June 14.—Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig, commander-in-chief of the British army in France, on Wednesday reviewed American troops on a wide plain in this area. The Americans filed past with an easy swinging step that bore out the opinion of many British experts that they are as fit physically as training can make them. Parading is not supposed to be their strong point, but after a long march to the reviewing ground and a long wait with their heavy packs on their backs, their alignment, step and carriage were excellent.

Crown Prince's Grand Sweep Towards Paris Appears Definitely Halted After Five Days Struggle-Only Local Operations On Western Fronts-German Divisions Terribly Cut Up Thursday.

Paris, June 14.—Fighting on the front of the German attack has died down, there being only local operations last night, according to the statement issued by the war office today.

Between the Forest of Villers-Cotterets and Chateau Thierry (which includes the sector held by American troops) there was artillery fighting during the night. A German attack near Antheuil, west of the Oise, was completely broken up.

The text of the statement reads:

"During the night there were local actions along the front of the German attack. The French made many successful incursions into the enemy line north of Grivesnes and in the region of Courcelles Wood. They took 30 prisoners. Near the Loge Farm they also captured prisoners. A German attack in the region of Antheuil was completely broken up. Between the Forest of Villers-Cotterets and Chateau Thierry heavy artillery fighting continued during the night.

The French patrols took prisoners in the region of Bussaires and west of Rheims in the Champagne battle area."

BRITISH OUTPOSTS ATTACKED

After nearly four years of munitions buying the board must be able, if it is willing, to estimate correctly the producing cost of every shell. 



HOUSEKEEPING IS A BUSINESS. ECONOMICAL COOKING IS A SCIENCE.

Our Consumers' League

"Dear Editor,—You are always talking in your page, you and the people who contribute to it, about conserving food to release it for the soldiers, Britain and the Alles. Why don't you say more about the way we housewives may make ends meet at home, in view of the high prices? Even if salaries are a little better, they are entirely out of proportion to the big advance in cost of practically everything, food, clothing and household necessities. I am just appalled the way things are jumping in price, stockings, woolen goods, table linen, bedding, paint, varnish, seap. It has been necessary to get some painting done round our house this year to preserve the wood. That means a stitch in time to save nine. It hasn't been unthrifty, but terribly expensive. The thing I grudged most, though, was what I had to pay for a new broom. The last broom I beight cost me 75 cents. The only really good broom I could find at my grocer's (the best he had), was ONE DOLLAR AND FIFTEEN CENTS. The other brooms were thin, broken and irregular, and looked as if the straw had been allowed to become too ripe. I knew they would break right off in no time, and with the exception of its use in getting into corners, I don't know anything more pitiful than a down-at-the-heel broom. Do tell us, or get some of the other housekeeper readers to tell in your page, about the way they manage to spread out their allowances to cover the absolute necessities.

Dear "Worn Out Trying," no wonder you are worn out, just at the end of the housecleaning season. And probably you also have been gardening. Perhaps we haven't been giving enough attention to the helping of housewives to solve their problems in a practical way. We had an idea, however, that in talking greater production, caring for the health, saving strength, eliminating waste and conserving the foods that are needed overseas by substitution of more vegetables for home consumption, etc., that we really were talking home

Saving strength and conserving the health means a saving of bills for rugs and medical attendance, perhaps bills for hospitals and nurses, not to cention lost time. (Of course, this kind of propaganda doesn't pay the oills of the doctor's family).

Another feature to which we have been giving attention in the interests of the housekeeper and the one who earns the money to pay the family bills, is that of the cost of delivering goods.

is that of the cost of delivering goods.

During the course of a recent series of lectures in the city on business efficiency, it developed as a result of a question asked that it costs an average London grocer about five-eighteenths of the expense of operating his business to maintain his delivery system. Eighteen per cent of the turnover was estimated as the cost of running the business. The finding of the United States food administration in this respect has been practically the same. An analysis of "Cash and Carry" prices, and "Credit and Delivery Prices" has revealed the fact that the "Credit and Delivery" prices are higher by 5 per cent or more on the majority of commodities in regard to which investigation has been made.

been made.

Who pays for this? The consumer, the "Worn Out Trying" housekeepers. To be sure, there are many articles that it would be far from convenient to carry home, or even possible to do so. But, why not systematize city deliveries, why not pool them, to do away with overlapping? Why not give one big order a week, instead of putting your dealer to the expense of dropping in driblets of grocery supplies perhaps two or three times a day? As long as the public insists upon being careless in that respect, just so long will the grocers and others be obliged to keep up delivery systems, which involve 5 per cent of the turnover of their business. Reference at considerable length was made to this subject some weeks ago in relation to milk deliveries. Why have three, four, half a dozen milk delivery wagons calling on the same short block? Why not apply some military afficiency, some common-sense business efficiency to the solution of problems.

THE NEW BROOM.

THE NEW BROOM.

Worn Out Trying" herself offers a valuable thrift suggestion in her letter published today. The reason she bought the most expensive broom was because it promised to be the most durable. Isn't that careful buying which looks to the future? The good broom will last twice, and perhaps three times, as long as the thin, over-ripe one that would break off with every sweeping.

As everybody knows it is exceedingly poor economy to buy inferior articles for hard usage, just because they are cheap. Better make the old article do a week or two longer in order to get the new one of good value. It is enduring qualities which must receive first consideration in these days. At that, it is pretty exasperating to be obliged to pay out \$1.15 for a broom for which not a cent more was asked three years or so ago than 35 or 40 cents.

Having, selected the broom with an eye to its durability, the next thing is to give it proper care. At the present cost a broom deserves respectful treatment.

Before the broom is used initiate it to your household by placing it (the Before the broom is used initiate it to your nousehold by placing it to broom party, in hot soap-suds, and leaving there until the suds become cool. Then take out the broom, shake it, and stand it on its nead outdoors until it dries thoroughly. One London housekeeper who makes an art and science of her business, says: "I do this every two months or so, and it prolongs the life

The leg of an old stocking bound around the broom The leg of an old stocking bound around the broom to within three or four inches from the end of the straw helps wonderfully to keep it from spreading. Unlike human beings, the broom suffers neither inconvenience nor injury from standing on its head a length of time. Instead, it is much benefitted by such treatment, when it is a choice between that and standing day in and day out on its service feet. A method which has points to recommend it, even beyond standing the broom on its head, otherwise on its handle, is to screw a little ring into the end of the handle, and hang it up by that, safely out of the way on the wall.

Broom holders, it is stated by "Maria-Who-Knows," are to be found on the market. She has used one at her summer home. Made of tin, it was screwed to the wall, and when she had finished sweeping she put the broom the way on the wall.

With regard to that subject of delivery of goods, and the cost which ultimately comes out of the pocket of the consumer, it has been interesting to find that adequate organization, according to local needs, of a centralized delivery system, has been recommended to the Canada Food Board by a committee appointed some time ago to formulate regulations for the control of foodstuffs handled by the various trades of Canada, the aim of the members of the committee being "to utilize their special knowledge and experience in connection with trade matters to the best advantage of the country at large."

In connection with the "centralized delivery system," the committee has In connection with the "centralized delivery system." the committee has further recommended the restriction on the number of deliveries to retail customers, and the fixing of times of delivery in various zones for the distribution of goods during the day. LITTLE THRIFTS.

"SAVE THE BAGS."

Here is a word of advice for the country housewife reader to pass along to Here is a word of advice for the country housewife reader to pass along to her husband, provided he doesn't take a peep at this weekly page himself. "Save the bags" is the word sent out to the farmers of the United States by the soil improvement committee of the National Fertilizer Association. The reason for "saving the bags" which also applies in Canada, is given as follows: "This is a day of conservation. Waste in any and all forms must be eliminated and now it is the humble jute bag which must be saved to guard against threatened famine. With this, as with so many other things, war is teaching us that 'nothing is too small to be saved.' Formerly the cheapest of fibres, jute has increased in value so rapidly that the burlap necessary for bagging a ton of fertilizer now adds between three and four dollars to the cost of that fertilizer. Likewise, the used bags now have a value sufficiently high to make ton of fertilizer now adds between three and four dollars to the cost of that fertilizer. Likewise, the used bags now have a value sufficiently high to make it worth while for the farmer to practice conservation. Bags will be needed next fall for the harvesting of the farm crops. New bags will be obtainable in but small quantities. The Government is taking much of the available supply for war purposes. . . . It takes but little time and forethought now—it may mean the saving of much time and money this coming fall, and in the spring of 1919 Spread the word, "SAVE THE BAGS."

RICE-WATER STARCH.

"We haven't bought starch for ever so long at our house," said a well-known London woman a few days ago, and one with cons.derable means at her disposal. "I am fortunate," she says, "in having a woman to work for me who is a marvel of kitchen that her disposal. "I am fortunate," she says, "in having a woman to work for haven't asked me to order starch for ever so long. How have you been man-laging? She replied, 'I have been using the water that the rice is boiled in, saving it each time for the next washing.' It happens that we are very fond of rice at our house, as a cereal, as a vegetable, and for pudding, so we sometimes have it several times in the week. Last year, when potatoes were so scarce, we used a great deal as a substitute. We like it best boiled in salted water until the grains have swelled nicely. After that, we crain off the water and cover the rice with milk, and let it finish cooking slowly in the oven. We thus have the food value of the rice and milk, and in addition a good contribution towards our starch for next washing day."

Talking of potatoes reminded me that the homemaker in question last year passed along to Our Consumers' League a potato planting thrift hint. She had in her kitchen then the same woman that uses rice water for starching. The woman in the kitchen advised the cutting out of the eyes of the potatoes when paring them for cooking and saving the eyes to plant.

"How did the planting of the potato skins turn out last year?" asked the editor of this department. "Splendidly," said the homemaker enthusiastically. "The potatoes grown from them were smaller than our other potatoes, but they were otherwise the best quality we ever had. We were tole, they would all grow to tops with no roots; but this wasn't true at all. I don't know that it proved most satisfactory for one crop last year when seed potatogs were so scarce and such an exorbitant price." RICE-WATER STARCH.



The recommendation for the chlorinating plants will be sent again to the commission as a result. Protection for the collecting ponds at Springbank, through the construction of concrete walls to keep out surface wash, will also be asked for.

The appointment of Miss Blanche D. Friend as public health nurse at a salary of \$1,200 a year was recommended to the council.
