Montreal, Nov. 25 .- Dr. Ernest Poulin who represents Laurier division in the Quebec Legislature, was committed for voluntary statement yesterday by Judge Leet after several sittings of the court hearing the charge against him of having "impeded the military service act." Canadian Farmers Will Then Have Market Across the Boundary Line.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Nov. 24 .- The announce ment that the United States will lift the embargo against the importation of Canadian wheat on December 15 has All Hand or Brain Workers created deep interest at the capital, and the general impression is that the action of the Washington authorities will work to the advantage not only of the Canadian farmer, but of

Cost Increase.

Canadian farmer will secure the spread which now exists between the Canadian initial price and the price in the United States market. In the second place, the wheat will be sold for cash and not for credit as at present, and in the third place, the exchange situation may be adjusted and established.

The United States guaranteed a price of \$2.25 per bushel for the 1919 crop. But United States millers have been paying as high as \$2.80 for certain grades of hard wheat for mixing purposes. Canadian farmers near the boundary have been teaming their wheat across the boundary and realizing a difference of from 20 to 60 cents per bushel over the initial fixed Canadian price. Against the importation in wagon loads the United States has all offered no particular objection, but has placed an embargo against shipping by train or vessel, in spite of the fact that there is reciprocity in wheat and its products between the two countries. The embargo is to be lifted on December 15.







It will also be charged that even before the war he sought an alliance with Germany and after hostilities had opened still held to the belief that this policy was right.

Caillaux has been under arrest new for nearly two years, during which time the case against him has been in the course of preparation. He will be tried by the Senate of France, which for the time being will be turned into a supreme court of justice, as the House of Lords n England or the Senate of the United States in certain circumstances might be turned into public work, as exemplified in the building of the a high court. The long delay between arrest and trial, which would be unusual in Great Britain with its habeas corpus, is not at all unusual in France, where in criminal cases a special magistrate prepares the case for the jury and may take his own time in doing it.
