MUST BE VACCINATED OR KEEP OUT OF UNITED STATES; ORDER ISSUE INCLUDES RAILROADERS

Canadians Must Present Certificate Proving Operation Has Been Performed Within Last Thirty Days—Law is Effective 7 o'Clock Wednesday Morning.

Either there will be an epidemic of vaccination in Canada or very few residents of the Dominion will enter the United States, as the result of an order issued by the American Government and received here today. It states that all persons desiring to cross the border must produce a certificate showing that they have been vaccinated within the last 30 days. There are to be no exceptions to the rule, even railroad men being forced to comply with the order.

GOVERNMENT ROAD IS NOT INTENDED TO BE A MOTOR SPEEDWAY

Hon. F. C. Biggs, Minister of Public Works, Inspects Provincial Highways.

OUTLINES HIS PLANS
Good Surface Road, Easily Maintained, To Be Constructed.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works, who has been inspecting the roads in Ontario, says that his idea is not to build a speedway from one end of the province to the other, but to give a good surface road, with absolutely perfect and continuous maintenance, whereby the roads at no time become impassable, but are always in a reasonable condition for the traveling public. The new Government, he said, has no intention of making a speedway, but will give the people and tourists a road that is fit and adequate for the traffic that flows over it. Mr. Biggs announced himself as being pleased with the work that had been done on the Niagara roads from Hamilton to Lewiston. There was some short, age of labor, and some of the contractors were thereby tied up. Grades will be eliminated, curves straightened, and roads widened, in some places. The minister's car had a slight accident near Paris during the trip, but no one was hurt.

CAPTAIN THINKS HE IS SOLE SURVIVOR FROM LAST VOYAGE

Master of Steamer Myron in State of Collapse.
GIVES FEW DETAILS

Ship Encountered Storm That Soon Battered Her to Pieces.

Port William, Nov. 25.—Capt. C. Neale of the steamer Myron was rescued yesterday in a state of complete collapse from the floating wreckage of the pilot house of the steamer Myron by the crew of the freighter W. C. Frank, bound light for Port William for grain. Blue with the cold and his clothing torn and ripped by the elements, he was unable to move until he had been taken aboard and revived with stimulants, when he said he believed himself to be the sole survivor of the Myron, which ran into a tremendous gale near Whitefish Point, while towing the barge Miztec, bound up the lakes for Duluth. It was early on Saturday that the storm was encountered, and two hours later the Myron began to sink. Pumps were worked to their fullest capacity, but in vain, and the battered wreck broke to pieces, leaving the master floating alone on the pilot house, the sole survivor of the Myron's crew of sixteen, and also, he believed, of the sixteen men aboard the barge Miztec. Capt. Neale was unable to give more than a few details of the wreck, being almost dead from the exposure to the cold water of Lake Superior and from the shock of the wreck.

I hope you will convey to them my thanks, and wish them an revoir and the fullest measure of prosperity."

BISHOP OF LONDON APPEALS FOR HIGHER STANDARD IN ALL PLAYS

London, Nov. 12.—Correspondence of the Associated Press.—The Bishop of London, who says he enjoys a good play as much as anybody, presided at a conference the other day of representatives of theatrical managers, authors, actors and critics. It was held at the instigation of the London council for the promotion of public morality to consider the best means for preventing improper public performances. The bishop said the council was not in the slightest degree opposed to theatres or music halls. The people needed entertainment and a good laugh was good for everybody.

"But what we will not tolerate," he added, "is filth. We are not going to have people go to theatres to hear things which will degrade them. The Christian people of London intend to put a stop to that sort of thing. We fully believe the great majority of managers, authors and actor-managers are also anxious to stop it, and it is not the wish of the great acting profession that filthy performances should be given in London."

Sidney Valentine, president of the Actors' Association, said the tendency of the theatres lately had been downward.

Jugo-Slavs Threatening War on Italians; Only Immediate Move by Allies Can Stop It

Geneva, Monday, Nov. 24.—Telegrams received by the Serbian bureau at Berne from Belgrade, Zara and Spalato, convey the impression that only prompt interference by the Allies can prevent war over the Adriatic situation, as the Jugo-Slavs are said to have lost patience and to be ready to fight the Italians.

APPEALS TO BIG NATIONS.

Paris, Monday, Nov. 24.—Dispatches confirming reports from Geneva that the situation along the eastern shore of the Adriatic is critical, are issued by the Jugo-Slav bureau here. The bureau says the Jugo-Slav Government has asked its ministers at Paris, London and Washington to draw the attention of these governments to the dangerous situation arising from d'Annunzio's raids and those he is reported about to make.

SOLDIER SAVES WOMAN'S LIFE; IS LEFT FORGOTTEN

Youngstown, Nov. 24.—Elmer Flickington of Columbiana, Ohio, today is \$10,000 richer because he saved the life of a Montgomeri, Alabama, woman two years ago. Flickington, while a private in the 37th Ohio National Guard Division in training at Camp Sheridan, rescued the woman in a runaway accident. Today he was notified by an agent of the Coburn Iron and Mining Company that, by the woman's will, leases of mining rights on lands near Montgomery had been given to him.

MEX CO FAILS TO SEND REPLY TO U. S. NOTE

American Cabinet To Fully Discuss Unpleasant Situation That Has Arisen.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Secretary of State Lansing went into the cabinet meeting today without a reply to the American note demanding the immediate release of W. O. Jenkins, United States consular agent at Puebla, and warning the Mexican Government that further molestation of the agent would seriously affect the relations between the United States and Mexico. Mexico's failure to make a prompt reply apparently has created an unfavorable impression in official circles, and the cabinet was expected to go over the whole Mexican situation.

RUMANIA AND SERBIA ARE TO GET ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY TO SIGN

Time Limit Is Placed For Signatures to Austrian Treaty.

Paris, Nov. 25.—Rumania is to be given another chance to sign the Austrian peace treaty, a limited period being named within which she may attach her signature. Permission to sign is also to be given Serbia. The supreme council made this decision this morning, at the same time deciding that a protocol be opened on November 27, permitting Rumania to sign the peace treaty with Bulgaria within eight days, this period to apply also to her signature to the treaty of St. Germain with Austria. A declaration was likewise decided upon to permit Serbia to sign the St. Germain treaty, together with the financial annexes and clause for the protection of racial minorities.

QUEBEC PARLIAMENT MEMBER IS CHARGED WITH IMPEDING ACT

Dr. Ernest Poulin Is Committed For Voluntary Statement.

Montreal, Nov. 25.—Dr. Ernest Poulin, who represents Laurier division in the Quebec Legislature, was committed for voluntary statement yesterday in the hearing of the charge against him of having "impeded the military service act." The case will be further continued on Thursday, for which day voluntary statement was fixed. The action is taken by the federal authorities. The evidence during the hearing was chiefly from Louis Philippe Mercier of Sherbrooke, a young man in medical class E, who, according to his evidence, was ordered to go to the front by Dr. Poulin to meet Stanislas Poulin, lawyer of St. John, and Amable Leopold Benoit, also of St. John, Quebec, who were aware that he was classed as "category E" and ask him to impersonate the name of Amable Leopold Benoit at the Guy street barracks in this city. He consented to do so for the consideration of \$500. Dr. Poulin, father of Amable Leopold Benoit, testified that he had given his son \$500 to secure his exemption from the military service. He stated he had met Dr. Poulin only once; it was at d'Annunzio's, St. Lawrence Boulevard, Montreal.

MENSHEVIKI TO TAKE PART IN AFFAIRS OF NEW RUSSIAN GOVT.

Peace Offer Will Be To Kolchak and Denekine.

London, Nov. 25.—A German wireless dispatch received here says the Russian Bolshevik paper Pravda of Moscow announces that a new Russian Government is projected in which the Mensheviks (Moderates), will participate, and a peace offer is to be sent to Admiral Kolchak and General Denekine, and that Nikolai Genina, the Bolshevik premier, intends to convene a national assembly in Moscow.

EGYPTIAN MINISTER OF FINANCE TO FORM A NEW GOVERNMENT

GERMANY TO BE RESPONSIBLE IF PEACE TREATY IS NOT PUT INTO EFFECT ON DECEMBER 1

Supreme Council in Note To Head of German Peace Delegation Requests That Berlin Government Definitely State Its Intentions Regarding Protocol.

Paris, Nov. 25.—Surprise at the departure of Dr. Simson, head of the plenipotentiaries sent by Germany to this city in connection with the protocol relative to the carrying out of the terms of the armistice, was expressed in a note delivered to Kurt von Lersner, head of the German delegation at Versailles, by the supreme council last night.

If the treaty of Versailles is not put into force by December 1, the note adds, the responsibility will lie with the German Government, as the departure of Dr. Simson inevitably delays further conferences which must be held. Dr. von Lersner is asked, in conclusion, to state what are the intentions of the German Government.

It was learned today that von Lersner sent a letter to Secretary Duta of the peace conference, last Friday, to the effect that the head of the plenipotentiaries had become convinced, after the consultations he had held in Paris, that he must consult the German Government regarding the protocol, especially as the national assembly would have to approve the decisions reached. The von Lersner letter protested against the question of the repatriation of prisoners again being bound up with that of putting the treaty into effect, it being pointed out that the allied governments should have separated these issues. If the promise of France was not kept, the letter declared, German public opinion would not have confidence in any further promise France might make. The letter, in this connection, drew attention to an article published recently in the Presse De Paris on the surrender of war criminals. Premier Clemenceau, as president of the peace conference, replied on Saturday, saying that von Lersner's letter

Shock at Honor to Son Caused Death of Hermann Raney

Father of Attorney-General of Ontario Dies At Age of Eighty-Four.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—To the shock at the honor of the elevation of his son to the post of attorney-general of the province of Ontario is attributed the death of Hermann Raney, aged 84, father of the Hon. W. E. Raney, who was recently appointed to that position in the Drury provincial cabinet. The death of Mr. Raney, who had been interred today in the little village of Aultsville, in Dundas County. He died in Rochester last Sunday night at the home of his daughter there. The late Mr. Raney was of United Empire Loyalist stock and farmed in Dundas County for many years. Hon. W. E. Raney, Rev. W. H. Raney of Renfrew, Ont., who is another surviving son, and three sisters from Rochester are the chief mourners at the funeral today.

GOAL SHORTAGE IS FORCING REDUCTION IN TRAIN SERVICE

Cut in Passenger and Freight Trains Becomes Effective On Saturday.

Montreal, Nov. 25.—Drastic reduction in passenger and, possibly, freight service on the Canadian railways, on account of the shortage of bituminous coal were announced today as a result of meetings of the railway officials to consider conditions following the strike in the United States. These reductions, so far as announced by the Canadian Railway War Board, will affect the Grand Trunk Railway, which chiefly affect the C. N. R. and the Grand Trunk for the Huron and Bruce trains, possibly the other railways may later on be affected. The reductions will go into effect Saturday next.

SEVERAL TRAINS ON BOTH RAILWAYS TO BE CUT OFF HERE

Rumor Says One Huron and Bruce Among Them.

Definite information that several trains on both the C. P. R. and C. T. R. are to be cut off has been received here, but only rumors as to which trains are to be stopped in local divisions of the two roads have been received. On the Grand Trunk, No. 115, which leaves here for Detroit at 11:50 a.m., one of the trains on the Stratford line, and one of the Huron and Bruce trains, possibly the morning one, will not run, it is said. On the C. P. R., there is not even a rumor of the possible cancellations in the division. Shortage of fuel for the engines is given as the cause.

NEW POLITICAL PARTY IN U.S. NOW ORGANIZED
Avowed Purpose Is To Unite To Support Principles of Democracy.
KNOWN AS LABOR PARTY
All Hand or Brain Workers Who Subscribe to Principles Eligible.

CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—A new national political party, known as the Labor Party of the United States, was created today by the representatives of organized labor in the country. The object of the movement, as set forth in its constitution, will be "to organize all hand and brain workers of the country to support the principles of a political, social and industrial democracy."

Messages Are Exchanged by Prince and U.S.
Lansing Sends Farewell Note, to Which H. R. H. Replies in Warm Terms.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Replying to a farewell message from Secretary Lansing, the Prince of Wales today sent a dispatch from his ship today saying he could not thank the Government enough for its kindness and hospitality. "I am greatly touched," the prince said, "by the kindness of your farewell note and the warm wishes of the Government of the United States. This visit has been for me a delightful experience which I will never forget. I cannot thank the American nation and the American Government enough for the kindness and hospitality which has been shown me in such generous measure wherever I have gone. I shall now always think of the people of this country as my friends and I shall look forward keenly to an opportunity of meeting my visit."

LONDON, Nov. 24.—(Canadian Associated Press.)—A war office return shows that war honors conferred, exclusive of the air force, number nearly a quarter of a million, including: the Victoria Cross, 376; Companion of St. Michael and St. George, 2,052; Distinguished Service Order, 8,862; Order of the British Empire (military division), 3,019; Military Cross, 35,757; Military Medal, 114,000.

Canadian Express Company Makes a Compromise Offer
MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—A compromise offer has been made by the Canadian Express Company to its employees regarding their demand for a new schedule. The offer includes an agreement as to the two weeks' vacation clause and provides for a general increase of 10 per cent, those receiving less than \$100 a month would receive a fifteen per cent increase, those getting \$100 to \$110 a twelve per cent increase, and all getting more than \$110 a month a ten per cent increase. It is understood that the employees will accept the offer. Their schedule had asked a reduction of mileage basis to 5,000 miles per month, with one-quarter cent for extra mileage, and an increase of 25 per cent on the present wage scale.

U.S. Railroaders Secure Agreement for Higher Wages
WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—A new wage and working agreement was signed today between the railway administration and officials of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Track Laborers. While demands of the union were not fully met, the eight-hour basic day was established for track laborers and others of that classification, and time and a half pay after that hour was provided. Most of the other employees included under the agreement will receive time and a half overtime pay after ten hours.

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LIFTING OF EMBARGO IS LIKELY TO FORCE UP PRICE OF WHEAT

Canadian Farmers Will Then Have Market Across the Boundary Line.
[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—The announcement that the United States will lift the embargo against the importation of Canadian wheat on December 15 has created deep interest at the capital, and the general impression is that the action of the Washington authorities will work to the advantage not only of the Canadian farmer, but of Canada at large. In the first place the Canadian farmer will secure the spread which now exists between the Canadian initial price and the price in the United States market. In the second place, the wheat will be sold for cash and not for adjusted credit as at present, and in the third place, the exchange situation may be adjusted.

BEGIN TRIAL OF WILHELM EARLY IN NEW YEAR
Allies Will Unite in Demand For Surrender When Treaty Ratified.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The British Government expects the trial of former Emperor William of Germany, to begin in London early in the new year, and is completing necessary arrangements, says the Mail, which adds that as soon as the Allies have ratified the peace treaty a united request for the surrender of the erstwhile emperor will be presented to Holland.

DRURY AND MEMBERS OF HIS CABINET WILL VISIT NORTH ONTARIO
COBALT, Nov. 24.—Premier E. C. Drury, Hon. H. Mills and Hon. Beniah Bowman will speak at the annual meeting of the board of trade here next week. Secretary Way has sent out invitations to the minister of lands and forests and the minister of mines to be present at the session, and he has been notified that the premier also will attend the meeting.

U. S. CABINET WILL DEAL WITH COAL SITUATION
In Case of Disagreement Question May Be Referred to the President.

DR. GARFIELD'S VIEW
Increase in Wages Must Be Proportionate To Living Cost Increase.
WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 24.—Settlement of the controversy over a new wage agreement in the bituminous coal industry awaited action by President Wilson's cabinet. Fuel Administrator Garfield, speaking to the joint wage scale committees of operators and miners today, laid down principles which had "governed" him and his associates, but different interpretations were placed upon its various provisions by the workers and the mine-owners in informal discussions after the meeting.

Dr. Garfield called the miners and operators together after a lengthy conference with Attorney-General Palmer, Director-General Hines and Assistant Attorney-General Ames. At the meeting of the cabinet tomorrow a definite decision of policy regarding all phases of the strike situation is expected, and if the cabinet is in disagreement the whole question may be put before the president.

PRINCE OF WALES TAKES OFFICIAL FAREWELL OF CANADA AT STATE DINNER

Says He Is Determined To Return As Soon and As Often As Possible to the Dominion—Renown Will Sail This Evening.

HALIFAX, Nov. 24.—Promising to return to Canada soon and to return often His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales took official leave of the Dominion tonight, in a speech which overflowed with the royal appreciation of all that had been done for him during his tour.

FIVE DENOMINATIONS CO-OPERATE IN MOVE FOR INCREASED ZEAL

Premier E. C. Drury One of the Chief Speakers.

CONVENE IN TORONTO

Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists Foregather.

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—A convention of unusual interest was opened in Massey Hall here tonight when five religious denominations, Anglicans, Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists, began an ambitious plan for increased membership, increased zeal and increased financial resources. These five denominations are also acting in co-operation to set before the Canadian people the relation of religion to patriotism.

Principal Gandler of Knox College, presided. He declared at the outset that the movement was not one for church union. "It is not a merger of any kind," he said. "It is an inter-church move to arouse the nation by united efforts and to fulfill the mission of Jesus Christ on earth."

Hon. E. C. Drury, premier of Ontario, was one of the chief speakers. He said in part:

"This movement is fraught with very great possibilities. It is in the first place more or less an acknowledgment of failure to do their duty on the part of the churches. It is more or less an acknowledgment that we have not done everything that we might have done in the service of Christ."

Some justification.

"And when we look back over the years we find there has been some justification for that idea that the church has failed of her mission. As I see it, that failure has been due to the lack of organization, the lack of machinery, the lack of putting first things first, the lack of all putting Christ as the centre of all Christian service. We have perhaps looked too much for other things to work the world's salvation—political reform, social service, ethics and philosophy."

"This movement, I take it, is a movement to get together and sink un-

essential things out of sight and emphasize the one big thing. Take as an acknowledgment of our part that we are going to get back to the only thing that can save the world, and that is belief in Jesus Christ."

"I am, indeed, happy tonight to be here, not to make a speech, because a great many things forbid me making a speech. It would not be seemly for me to make a speech before this gathering tonight. I am here to express my thorough accord, my oneness with this movement, which promises to do such great things for Christianity and for Canada."

The Only Thing.

"I believe this movement must be fraught with blessing to the Christian church in Canada and to Canada. Because, after all, Christianity is the only thing to which we can look for any real good. And the Christians and the Christian church are the only forces that we can look to today for anything good or less accessories."

Principal E. Bruce Taylor of Queen's University, Kingston, recalled how in every generation there had been a desire to get back to the good old days "when everybody went to church." He added: "There never were any good old days. Every generation had thought that the days which had gone before were the good old days. But go back to the beginning of the Victorian period, read the records, and you will find there never was a time when the church was not struggling for its very existence," said Principal Taylor.

"I think we have certainly to admit that there is an increase of indifference to the activities of the organized Christian church." He recalled that his father had not missed a Sunday at church in 57 years. "The extraordinary thing to me," he said, "was his zeal and his love for his church."

"We want to get back some of that temper," he went on.

Not Enough Bibles.

Principal Taylor lamented the exit of the Bible from the churches. Because the members of the congregation did not take Bibles the minister was unable to take a chapter, read it over with them, and "get the meat out of it." The introduction of hymns in the churches, he believed, had something to do with the sparsity of Bibles among the congregations.

The present world situation was a moral challenge to Christianity on this continent, said G. Sherwood Eddy of New York. Speaking of Japan, he said that that country was at the crossroads, that it had to choose between autocracy or democracy, militarism or freedom. Today was the golden hour of Christianity. In Europe three countries were vying upon revolution, and two upon famine.

"It is a tragic Europe, and it is a tragic world, and all the world it calling tonight 'come over and help us,' and will we go and help them? Today the same call comes back from the same east that gave us the Gospel."

No Reply Yet From Mexico to U.S. Note

Texan Report, However, Says Mexican Govt. Has Declined To Reply.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—There was no word today from the Mexican Government in answer to the sharp note from the state department demanding the immediate release of William O. Jenkins, American consular agent at Puebla.

All day officials waited for a note which they thought might be handed to them by the Mexican embassy here, in view of the reports on Sunday night that a long dispatch relating to the Jenkins case had reached the embassy from Mexico City.

But there was no reply and not even an intimation that the Mexican Government had prepared its answer. So far as the state department was able to learn, Jenkins still was sick and in the Mexican penitentiary on charges that he had conspired with rebel bandits who kidnapped him and forced him to pay a ransom of approximately \$150,000.

President Carranza has found the situation to be so acute that he has returned to Mexico City from Queretaro to take part in the consideration of the Jenkins case, reports today said.

BOLSHEVIKI TO MAKE KOLCHAK A PEACE OFFER

New Russian Government Projected With Moderates Represented.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—A German wireless dispatch received here says that the Russian Bolshevik paper, Pravda of Moscow, announces that a new Russian government is projected in which the Menshevik (moderate) will participate; that a peace offer is to be sent to Admiral Kolchak and Gen. Denikin, and that Nikolai Lenin, the Bolshevik premier, intends to convene a national assembly in Moscow.

Wireless Telephones For North Manitoba To Be Recommended

WINNIPEG, Nov. 24.—The establishment of a wireless telephone system throughout the settlements in Northern Manitoba, at an estimated cost of from \$25,000 to \$30,000, will be recommended by Professor E. C. Wallace, commissioner for this territory. Hon. Edward Brown announced today that a new wireless system has been at work for some time on this proposition and will probably make his recommendations in the near future.

CAN. GOVERNMENT DELEGATES TO VOTE FOR EIGHT-HOUR DAY

N. W. Rowell States Position of the Government.

AT LABOR CONFERENCE

Representative of Canadian Employers Voices Their Opposit.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 24.—(By state correspondent Canadian Press, Limited.)—Canadian Government delegates will vote for the proposed convention on the eight-hour day. At the international labor conference this afternoon, Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell clearly and unequivocally stated the position of the Dominion Government.

S. R. Parsons, Canadian Government delegate, had read a statement giving the Canadian employers' view.

"Mr. Parsons," Mr. Rowell said, "has very properly presented the views of the employers, but in the last analysis the governments in the different countries of the world must determine the policy of the country, and my colleagues and I, representing the Government of Canada, intend voting for this convention."

Mr. Rowell's declaration was loudly applauded.

There are, however, Mr. Rowell went on, "some suggestions which we may wish to make with reference to the form of some of the sections, which we shall do when they come up for consideration."

Canada Independent.

"And I wish to say further that while we appreciate the difficulties of the United States possibly adopting the policy and Canada adopting the other, the action of the Government of Canada does not depend on the action of the Government of the United States in dealing with these matters. It has not in the past. It will not in the future. It will be a consideration only, which any government must take into account."

The Parliament of Canada has already approved the treaty containing the form of some of the sections, and the form of some of the sections, which we shall do when they come up for consideration.

Employers Opposed.

The eight-hour day convention was before the conference throughout the afternoon, Mr. Parsons declaring that he was speaking for Canadian employers, "many of whom have been consulted since this conference was in session," he said. "General application of the shorter working day would, in his opinion, lessen total production, and only by increased production could the cost of living be reduced to all classes."

It must be remembered, Mr. Parsons went on that Canada was a young and undeveloped country. "To attempt to put her on the same footing as old world countries was like 'placing a young, vigorous giant on the same footing as a man advanced in life.' Canada, he said, should have an opportunity to manage her own affairs to suit her own circumstances. An

unsuccessful attempt had been made. Mr. Parsons went on to include commercial undertakings in the eight-hour day convention, and some countries had included agriculture in proposed legislation of this class. "Evidently," Mr. Parsons declared, "what is aimed at ultimately is an attempt to drive all of the workers of the world, like a flock of sheep, into the eight-hour pen, regardless of requirements. Nor is it suggested for a moment that acceptance of the eight-hour day would permanently solve social and industrial problems, including the hours of work."

Get Into Politics.

Under the proposed legislation governments would be called upon to deal most and more with economic questions. It was quite conceivable that "influence" would be brought to bear upon politicians. This would not make for national soundness and prosperity. There was much truth in the statement "that government is best which governs least."

Mr. Parsons referred to the Ottawa industrial conference. There, he said, employers had asked for reference on the eight-hour question to a special committee. It could be determined that the eight-hour day for Canada was economically sound, he had no doubt, but it could be determined only by bringing it into being. But Mr. Parsons added, unless the United States accepted similar legislation, the application of the proposed convention would place an unfair burden on Canadian employers.

At the conclusion of the statement, Mr. Barnes, British Government delegate, "reminded" Mr. Parsons that all signatories of the peace treaty had agreed to nine principles, included among which were the eight-hour day and 45-hour week. In view of the general discussion by the conference of inland waters, he submitted should stand in the same relation as those engaged in ocean navigation. The amendment was carried.

Mr. Crawford, workers' delegate from South Africa, moved an amendment to make the convention apply to industrial work done in the home. The question of the amendment was referred to the convention, as it should be upon the conference. As it stood the convention was not applicable to work in which only members of the family were employed. The inclusion of these words in the convention, Mr. Crawford argued, was an amendment to shortening hours in the factories, he said. If the workers' delegate should be exhausted by working long hours in unhealthy abodes?

Mr. Crawford's amendment was lost. An amendment by Gino Baldesi, Italian workers' delegate, that "no decrease in wages by day or by week can be admitted by the workers," was declared out of order. The conference adjourned until tomorrow morning.

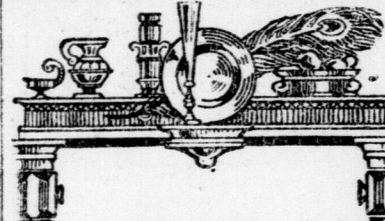
