These nations will naturally be included in the agreement, but upon what basis they will come in is still a matter of conjecture. The report that France's demands will include a capital ship ratio equal to Japan's with a submarine allowance of 70,000 tons, was revived today, but no authoritative statement on the subject vas obtainable.

It is known that the British are pre-pared to accept the ratio as outlined in the United States proposals, and it is believed that Great Britain would not have reacted this decision with-out some definite assurance that France's demands will not be excessive. It seems altogether likely that some understanding on the point was reached understanding on the point was reached before the British experts declared the 5-5-3 plan satisfactory. As for Italy, there appears little doubt she will demand equality with France.





DEFINES MEANING OF WORD 'REALTOR

President of London Real **Estate Board Outlines** Origin of Expression.

"The word 'Realtor' has come into cut, the 22nd house was soid. This left twenty on the commission's hands, and those twenty are standing empty. The commission has as yet taken no action in regard to the correct meaning of the word and action in regard to the correct meaning of the word and its origin," said Bert Weir, president of the London Real Estate Board, today. He said, "Realtor is defined on page 88 of the addenda of Webster's Internageneral use. There seems, however, to 88 of the addenda of Webster's Interna-tional Dictionary: 'A real estate broker who is a member of a local board having membership in the National Asso-ciation of Real Estate Boards, an organization incorporated in 1908, for the advancement of the interests of real estate brokers, and the protection o the public from unprincipled agents or okers.'

"The exclusive right of members of ocal boards affiliated with the National Association to use this title was con-firmed by judicial decision in a case in which the National Association and the Minneapolis Real Estate Board brought joint action against the N. W. Telephone Exchange Company and thirty-six individual defendants in the dis-trict court of Hennepin County, Minn. The telephone company was enjoined from designating anyone as a realtor in its telephone book who was not a member of the Minneapolis Real Estate Board. All the defendants submitted to that decision. The word is not opyrighted.

"It was coined by Charles N. Chadbourn, former president of the Minne-apolis Real Estate Board, and former vice-president of the National Asso-ciation of Real Estate Boards, and was adopted by the National Association in

"The word 'Realtor' signifies more "The word Realtor signifies more than merely board and National Asso-ciation membership. The true real-tor, as defined by a former National Association president, is a man of high Association president, is a man of high ideals. He is one who has made the code of ethics of the National Association a part of his personal code of honor, and who would rather lose a record-breaking commission than violate his own conscience. He appre-ciates the heavy obligations which he crates the neavy obligations which he owes his community, his clients, his profession and himself. He realizes, as few laymen do, the intimate nature of the confidential relationship which exists between the realtor and his client, who may be obliged at times to reveal family differences and financial distress.

Police Battle Striking Packing Plant Employees With Rifles.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8 .- Chicago's stockyards district today was the scene of another series of outbreaks, which at hed the riot stage, as the result of the strike of packing plant employees, which has been in effect in all of the country's chief packing cen-

ters for four days.

One man was shot, scores were injured, police engaged in pistol and rifle fights with strike sympathizers and dozens of men and women were arrested as a result of today's disorders, which occurred as the workers were leaving the local plants.



WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(By Ben Deacon, staff correspondent Canadian Freas).—The question relating to China which are now under consideration at the Washington conference should be of particular interest to the people of Canadian and for their satisfactory settlement and for their satisfactory settlement fray be of great importance in connecting the consider an infringement of their rights before a fair and sympathetic tribunal. ada for their satisfactory settlement may be of great importance in connec-tion with the future development of the Dominion. This opinion was expressed by one of the advisers of the Chinese delegation in the course of an interview with the Canadian Press today.

"For both Canada and the United States, China offers greater trade possibilities than aimost any other portion of the globe," he said. "If China is given of the globe, he said. It changes as given an opportunity to develop, unhampered by the adverse conditions which have prevailed in the past, there will undoubtedly be opened up a great new market for the goods of the two great nations of this continent. Canada is in a particularly fortunate position for tak-ing advantage of this new field."
This spokesman, who requested that

his name be withheld, is considered one of the world's greatest authorities on matters relating to China. He has lived for thirty years in that country, and is very close touch with the members of the Chinese delegation. He is also familiar with conditions in Canada, hav-ing traveled extensively in the Domin-ion. In connection with his work in he has studied Canada's commercial possibilities in the Orient, and is convinced that, as a result, steps which will be taken by the nations rep-resented at the conference toward the

ests of the Dominion and in advertising the country there. A number of Cana-dian commercial houses also have rep-resentatives in China and they, too, have helped to spread a general knowl-edge of their country in Chinese business

circles.

WELCOME TO BE GIVEN PRINCE

Burmese Likely To Accord His Highness All Ovations Usually Given To Royalty.

BRITISH FLAGS WEAR

RANGOON, Dec. 10 .- The coming visit of the Prince of Wales to Burma has given rise to much speculation as to the nature of his reception. Unthe ovations usually accorded a traveling prince.

In Rangoon may be seen many people with British flags pinned on their breasts. "God Save the King" is a common expression. The Karens of Burma are especially loyal to British

On the other hand, the prince wil meet with a large element—no one can say just how large—of aloofness and ellent opposition. In Burma the national movement is still strong, and is continually fanned into flame by the multitude of nationalist journals which are sold on the streets. Bernard Houghton, writing in New Burma, expresses what is most likely to be the attitude assumed by the Burman na-tionalists toward the visit of the

prince. In part, he says:
"No one in Burma, any more than
in India, has any personal animus against the prince; on this we are all agreed. Were he only a distinguished visitor, as for instance, M. Clemenceau, there would be no question as to his welcome. But he is more than that. He is a definite integral part of the British system of government. His movements, as a prince, are decided and regulated by the cableet. In India he will be the symbol of the British government as a living entity.

"Now the British government has al-ways stood—and never less than today-for the domination of India and Burma by Britain. It enforces by armed men its will upon them in all big questions of policy and event in details of administration.

"This assumption of power, Indians and Burmans resent vehemently. They claim to manage their own affairs, to determine their own destiny, to follow their own ideals. Hence a violent clash of opinion between them and the British, in fact, to put the matter plainly, a crisis of the first magnitude. "What should be the attitude of Indians and Burmans? As free men, they would gladly have given the prince a hearty welcome, but they cannot greet him while in bondage, strug-gling to be free. They can see in him the symbol of that power which binds them, and which bars them on from any real liberty. Their attitude should then be one of silent and dignified pro-test. They should hold themselves aloof from the public functions. But at the same time they should make it clear that the prince will receive a very different welcome from a selfgoverning Burma."





Sir Vincent made it clear that it had been his consistent practice to avoid anything savoring of politics and if he did allude to the railway question it was only because it related intimately to public finances, to taxation and so to the daily business of the counto the daily business of the country, which was already bearing heavy imposts to sustain the public credit.

Conditions in Canada. In dealing with conditions in Can-

come. Sir Vincent said:

"In the most propitious circumstances of trade, prophecy is rash, and in the complicated conditions that now beset us. I will refrain from the risk of forecast. 
