#### PORT BURWELL TROUBLE

Investigation into the Church Affairs

Opened by Crown. Port Burwell, Oct. 13.-At the police court, Port Burwell, yesterday morning, the charge of causing an affray in the Otter Valley Church, was taken up before County Police Magistrate Hunt. County Crown Attorney McCrimmon represented the crown, Messrs, Dowler, K.C., and Stephens represented the accused. Court opened at 9:30, and although the hour was early the courtroom was well filled with residents for miles around, who have become greatly interested in the outcome of the church difficulty. Messrs. Dowler and Stephens, as counsel for those interested, decided that case be tried by Police Magistrate Hunt, and the witnesses were accordingly sworn. The first witness called upon was Rev. William Walker, pastor of the three churches in the circuit. He was examined by Magistrate Hunt and related all the circumstances leading up to the unfortunate affair. He was then cross-examined by Messrs. Stephens and Dowler. Mr. Dowler put Mr. Walker through a most rigid examination in an effort to show that he was not in close sympathy with the congregations over which he presides. and was still cross-examining witness when court adjourned for lunch.
