It Is the Front Part of the Brain-?he Latest Investigation Seems to Favor

This conclusion.

The exact seat in the brain of the highest intellectual faculties has been a moot point in science since the functions of the organ of mind began to be investigated with accuracy, says a writer in the London Chronicle. The general consensus of opinion localizes what we term "mind" in the prefrontal lobes of the brain, but by another school of thinkers the hinder lobes have been credited with performing our highest cerebral duties. The balance of evidence, I should say, is decidedly in favor of the former view, and recent researches and observations by Dr. Phelps, an American in estigator, would appear to assist in strengthening the opinion that the most important portion of the brain is its anterior region. In the course of the investigations in question some 295 cases of brain injury and disease were ex-In all save two it was noticed that interference of extensive nature with the prefrontal region resulted in serious disturbances of the mental faculties. Less severe injury produced less marked effects. These facts parallel the researches of other investigators, and they are further substantiated by what is observed in cases of idiocy connected with a want of development of the frontal lobes of the brain.

As to the relative importance of the two lobes or halves of the cerebrum or chief brain mass most of us know that each half governs the opposite side of the body and that, as we are right handed, so we may be called left brained. The superiority in functional importance of our left brain is not questioned, and it is therefore interesting to find Dr Phelps insisting from the results of his investigations that our left brain slobe is really the intellectual half. The right half, it is added, is capable of sustaining se vere injury without marked mental effects supervening, and cases are quoted in support of this fact. In deed, such cases have frequently puzzled physiologists, seeing that the disturabance of the intellect has in no sense been commensurate with

the injury to the brain. On the notion of the greater importance of our left brain and on the theory that severe injuries which do not produce utter mental breakdown involve the right lobe, the puzzling constitution of the brain may be explained in part at least. But the last word has not yet been said concerning the brain's ways and work. Injuries of the left half do not always produce serious effects as reguards the mental life, while we have had some physiologists insisting that we have really two brains and that, while the left lobe is the Jekyll of the intellect, the right, on occasion at least, is apt to play the part of Hyde. A fascinating theory this, but one to which soher science is not likely to append its impri-

No Mistakes in the Bible

The printing of the Bible is the most strictly guarded work in existence-a fact which appears strange until we reflect on the mischief an inaccurate Bible might bring about. The King's printers and the two universities of Oxford and Cambridge give to the world all the Bibles printed in the United Kingdom, except some printed by special license. A few years ago the question arose whether the word "spirit" in Matthew iv. 1 and Mark i. 12 should have a capital "S," it having previously been printed with a small one, and, although the word was obvious ly wrongly printed, it was not until after the ruling powers at the universities and the King's printers had met in solemn council that leave was given to use a capital letter. Nothing sanctioned by authority in 1611 may be changed without creating something akin to revolution in the places where Bibles are print-

No matter what the grief of the bystanders may be, the stricken person will show no signs of overpowering emotion. Thousands of Pagoda Bells Ring at the Setting of the Sun.

TALKING RIVERS.

Game by Which You May Keep Posted on Geography. Some of our boys and girls perhaps would rather have a big game of romps outdoors than stay indoors and

play. On the other hand, some of them would rather stay indoors than play outside.

That is natural, of course, for we cannot expect them all to feel alike. So here is a game which you can play either in the house or out of doors and which is instructive and amusing at the same time. It will entertain a parlor full of young people in the evening just as much as it will a group of boys or girls who want to play in the

open air. First, appoint a leader, who starts the game by assigning to each player a country. To No. 1, we'll say, he assigns the United States; to No. 2, England: to No. 3, Scotland; to No. 4, Ireland; to No. 5, Germany; to No. 6, Russia, and so on until every player

has a country. When that has been done, the players should refrain from talking for awhile, so that they may do a little thinking, and you know very well that if you keep on talking to each other there will be no chance to think. But when the thinking is over you may

talk as much as you please. The thinking is to be a little test of your knowledge of geography, for the leader is going to call on you, skipping about from one to another, and when you are called you have to rise and give the name of a river in the country that you represent.

For example, the leader says, "Let us hear from Germany," and the player to whom Germany has been assigned rises and says, "My name is Rhine, and I am a river of Germany." Now, as you cannot tell when you may be called on, you must think of your rivers as soon after you get your country as possible, and that is why you must not talk for a little while.

The game may be made a little more interesting if the leader will assign to the players countries that are not so well known as those we have mentioned. It may be varied by using the states of the Union instead of countries and towns instead of rivers .- New York Herald.

Riel was educated in the college at St. Boniface. His father was called the "Miller of the Seine. A paper called The New Nation was Riel's organ. Some copies are still extant, and in the possession of the Provincial Library of Manitoba. This mission was established in 1818. This being done, the Hon. J. W. Taylor, the United States Consul at Winnipeg, wrote informing Whittier of the fact. The aged poet, on recovering from an illthe time, wrote to Archbishop Tache at St. Boniface, acknowledging the thoughtful courtesy of the act, and in his letter the following sentences of great heauty occur: "I have reached an age when literary success and manifestations of popular favor have ceased to satisfy one upon whom the solemnity of life's sunset is resting; but such a delicate and beautiful tribute has moved me. I shall never forget it. I shall hear the bells of St. Boniface sounding across the continent, and awakening a feeling of gratitude for they generous act. -Jennie Barltrop, in Toronto Mail.



GULF STREAM MARKS.

the Course of the Flow Through the Ocean Plainly Indicated. The color of the stream is perceptibly deeper blue than that of the neighboring sea, this blueness forming one of the standard references of the nautical novelists. The depth of color is due to the high percentage of salt contained as compared with the cold green water of higher latitudes, observation having shown that the more salt held in solution by sea water the more intensely blue is its color. Thus even in extratropical latitudes we sometimes observe water of a beautiful blue color, as for instance, in the Mediterranean and in other nearly landlocked basins, where the influx of fresher water, being more or less impeded, the percentage of salt contained is raised by evaporation above the average, says

the National Geographic Magazine. Another important fact in connection with the stream is its almost tropical temperature, due to the fact that its high velocity enables it to reach the middle latitudes with very little loss of heat. Upon entering its limits the temperature of the sea water frequently shows a rise of ten degrees and even fifteen degrees. It was this fact that gave to the stream in the later years of the eighteenth century and the earlier years of the nineteenth an importance in the minds of navigators that it no longer possesses. In those days the chronometer, invented by Harrison in 1765, was still an experiment. Instruments were crude and nautical

tables often at fault. The result was that the determination of the longitude was largely a matter of guesswork, a vessel after a voyage from the channel to America often being out of her reckoning by degrees instead of by minutes. The idea, first suggested by Benjamin Franklin, that the master of a vessel, by observing the temperature of the surface water, could tell the moment of his entry into the gulf stream and could hence fix his position to within a few miles

was hailed with delight. The method was published in 1790 by Jonathan Williams in a work lengthily entitled "Thermometrical Navigation: Being a series of experiments and observations tending to prove that by ascertaining the relative heat of the sea water from time to time the passage of a ship through the gulf stream and from deep water into soundings may be discovered in time to avoid danger." In this work he makes a patriotic comparison of the gulf scream to a streak of red, white and blue, painted upon the surface of the sea for the guidance of American navigators.

Don't Be a Second Class Man.

Second class things are only wanted when first class can't be had. You wear first class clothes if you can pay for them, eat first class butter, first class meat and first class bread, or, if you don't, you wish you could. For work that really amounts to anything first class men are wanted.

The Home of England's Wealth. The Bank of England generally contains sufficient gold in sixteen pound bars to make 20,000,000 sovereigns. The bank, which stands in three parishes, covers three acres of ground, and, as the current price of land in the vicinity works out at £1,000,000 an acre, it is easy to form an idea of the money value of England's wealth. The ratable value is about £1,000 a week. The bank employs about 1,000 people, pays a quarter of a million a year in wages and £35,000 a year in pensions There are £25,000,000 worth of notes in circulation which have been handed over the bank's counter. - London



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

PRECOCIOUS AUTHORS.

Successful Plays That Were Written by Boys In Their Teens.

Was a successful play ever written by a boy of fourteen? asks a correspondent. Yes. This seeming miracle has happened at least three times. The best known example of the precocious playwright is the celebrated Lope de Vega the most prolific dramatist known to history. He produced his first play, a comedy, entitled "La Pastoral de Jacinto," before he had completed his fourteenth year, and this was considered such a marvelous performance that he is known to this day in Spanish literature as "the Prodigy of Nature." Another Spaniard and contemporary of La Vega, Pedro Calderon, wrote his first play when he was thirteen. Metastasio wrote his tragedy "Giustino" and had it produced when he was fourteen on the stage at Bo-

Of English playwrights Douglas Jerrold, the famous author of "Black Eyed Susan," also furnishes an answer to the question. In 1818, before he had completed his fifteenth year, he wrote a very well known farce entitled "More Frightened Than Hurt." It was very successful on the English stage, and the French considered it good enough to steal. Curiously enough, this French translation was retranslated into English and again produced on the English boards under the title of "Fighting by Proxy." Another very remarkable instance of a different sort of precocity was that of William Henry Ireland, who when he was about fifteen actually produced some plays which he attributed to Shakespeare and which, although afterward proved to be forgeries, were accepted by the experts of the time as genuine.
