The contracton to forward the Mails to Boston in small steam-ers, and to run a steambast between Ficton and Quebec. Contract for seven years at 2.55,000 sig, per annum. [The Montreal correspondent of the Quebec Gazette says that when this arrangement is carried into effect, the mail will be carried over land in twelve hours to Picton, and from thence to Quebec, by a steamer, in forty-eight hours; so that we may have news in Quebec in fifteen or sixteen days in summer, and eighteen or twenty in winter.]
