the great plague at athens. The first krown instance of the appearance of the plague in Earops was at Athens, the
Capital of Attica, in Greece, 430 years before Che Christian era. Tue city was years before enclosed within vast massive fortincations, exending in circuinference, to about twenty milis. Athens contained more than $\mathbf{1 0 , 0 0 0}$ houses, and more than 150,000 inhabitants and one of the consequances of the war, and the policy of Pericles was, that, at the time when the disorter began its ravages, the eity and ports, with an area not exceeding three from the enimy were sheitered witant their walls hourhned by fire an' sword, number of citizens, but all the people of thal country of Attica, which had a sufface of about 700 square miles, and about 500,000 inhabitants. Hence, the cily was cranmed to suffocation with a far greater multitude of human beings than the hoses could po-sibly contain. Athens was at all times a suffocating place, notwithstanding all its elegant temples and poricoes, its grover and garaens; besides, it had no puitie draing under the streets, and the ru-
ral population thus crowded together with cattle and moveaibles, suffereng so with their want of i ir and eleanlia sss, that the moitality by the plarue was enormous. The enenyy also, encamped around the walls, wcre thenconstantly kerping the citizens in a state of disraction and terror, and united with the pestiTence in driving then to utter despair.

In gencrad, however, duing the enjoyment of high health, and witho t any apparent cause, the complaint suddenly began with great heat in the head, causing inflammation and rec.ess
in th. eyes, tongue, and throat. The breath was tainted, and the skin became marked with black livid spots. zits of sneezing oceasione great uneasiness, there were also violent fits of coughing, with great pain. When it fixed itself in the stomach, other symptons still more distressing appearet, as vomiting and spasms,
or convalsions. The afflicted generaily died or convalsions. The afficted generaily died on the seventh or ninth day, by which time the fever had spent its force, or if they escaped the crisis on these days, they were very soon
afterwarls canied off, either by internal uleeration and other shocking concomitants, or by mere weakness. The disorder having, in the less maliznant cases, passed through the whole body, occasioning excruciating torments, finalfy settled in the extremities. And it alway eft upon them marks of its ravages, so that some whe had supported all the veicemence of the attack upon the vital parts, survived with were totally deprived of their sight, others lost their memory for a time, and on their recovery they did not remember their nearest relations, nor know even themselves. So burned up were the internal parts of the body with fever, that the sufferers could not bear the slightest clothing to be put upon them. They were seized with a vehement desire to plange for relief into celd water; this longing and the lesire for Water to drink, were so interase, that
many who were not closely attended to, ram off, and, on a momentary impulse for alleviation of pain, precipitated themselves into wells. Corpses but half dead were sean tumbling vet earh other in great heaps, not only in the emples and streets, but ahout every fountain whither their eagerness for water had hurried them.
So unusual and virulent be yond description Was the disorder, that, although there were coryses, in such positions as death unburied corpses, in such positions as death had lef venture to approach them. Birils of prey, such as the slu grish and ferocions vulture, totally disappeared from Athens, being destroyed by having tuached the corpses.
While the dreadful mortality was such as to exeite the fears that the living might not be sufficient to bury the dead, the only alleviation of the general misery wis, that those who attack, and their most happy case was wistful ly looked to by all, as warranting the cheerful hope that their city would not be entirely diepeopled. The safety in which they considerd themselves gave them courage in their at tendance on those who needed it, and, from nowing by experience what the malady was they were the mure compassionate and useful afflicted
