WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, passed in the Twenty-fifth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled "An Act to change the constitution of the Legislative Council by rendering the same elective," IT WAS ENACTED, That the Lieutenant Governor in Council immediately on receiving official notice of Her Majesty's assent thereto, should declare, by Proclamation, the said Act to be in force. AND WHEREAS by a despatch from His Grace, the Duke of Newcastle, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated Downing Street, the Thirteenth day of November last past, addressed to me as such Lieutenant Governor, I have received

official notice that the said recited Act of the General Assembly was specially confirmed by Her Majesty in Council, at Osborne, on the first day of November last past :

FIRST SESSION OF THE TWENTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Tuesday, March 3, 1863.

In virtue of a Commission from his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to the Honorables *Thomas Heath Haviland, the elder, George R. Goodman and John Aldous,* a copy of which is as follows:—

Prince Edward Island.

VICTORIA, *by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and of the L. S. United Church of England and Ireland, on earth the Supreme Head:*

GEORGE DUNDAS, *Lt. Governor*

To our trusty and well beloved the Honorables Thomas Heath Haviland, George Richard Goodman, and John Aldous, or any two of them, Greeting.

WHEREAS we have by our Writs commanded our High Sheriffs to assemble the several Inhabitants, Electors of this our Island of Prince Edward, and thereout to cause them to choose and elect Thirty fit and proper persons to serve us in a General Assembly, to be held for our service at Charlottetown in our said Island: And whereas our said High Sheriffs, as commanded, held the said Elections and returned to our Secretary of our said Island the names of Thirty fit and proper persons, duly elected and qualified to serve us in our said Assembly; These are therefore to command you, or any two of you, that at such certain day and place as our said Lieutenant Governor of our said Island shall appoint and direct, you go to such place, and on such day as aforesaid, and then and there administer unto each and every of the said Thirty persons who are returned as aforesaid the Oaths appointed by law to be by them taken; and when you shall have so administered the said Oaths, you shall send the same unto our said Secretary, certifying, under your seals what you shall have done in the premises, together with this Writ.

Witness our trusty and well beloved George Dundas, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over our said Island, this Third day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Sixty-three.

The said Commissioners came, at a quarter to two o'clock, into the place where the Assembly sit, and John W. Morrison, Esquire, Deputy Colonial Secretary, attending, delivered to the said Commissioners the several Sheriffs' returns to the Writs of Election of the Members returned to serve in this present General Assembly; the Commissioners did then administer to the Members present the Oaths required by law.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:

Gentlemen;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of the Members of this Honorable House, at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, the Members went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber, where being—

Mr Cooper, the Clerk of the Council, said:—

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor does not see fit to declare the causes of his summoning the present Colonial Parliament until a President of the Legislative Council and a Speaker of the House of Assembly shall have been chosen, according to law.

The Members having returned—

The Hon *Roderick Macaulay*, addressing Mr Macneill, the Clerk, proposed the Hon. *T. Heath Haviland*, a Member for the Town and Royalty of Georgetown, to be their Speaker, which was seconded by the Hon. *James C. Pope*.

There being no other Member proposed, and no objection made—

The Hon. *T. Heath Haviland* was taken from his seat by the Hon. *R. Macaulay* and the Hon. *James C. Pope*, and standing on the upper step, he returned his humble acknowledgments to the House for the great honor they had been pleased to confer on him, by choosing him to be their Speaker.

The Hon. *T. Heath Haviland* then took the chair;

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:

Gentlemen;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr Speaker elect, with the House, then went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber; when Mr Speaker elect addressed His Excellency as follows:

May it please your Excellency;

I have to acquaint your Excellency that the House of Assembly, in the exercise of their undoubted right and privilege, have chosen me to be their Speaker, and I humbly trust their election will meet your Excellency's approbation.

Whereupon, the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said—

Hon. Mr Haviland;

I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to acquaint you that he hath so good an opinion of your integrity, diligence and sufficiency for executing the important office to which you have been elected, that His Excellency is perfectly satisfied with the choice which the House of Assembly have made, and doth allow and confirm you to be their Speaker.

And hereupon, Mr Speaker addressed His Excellency to the following effect:

May it please your Excellency:

As you have been pleased to approve of the choice of the House of Assembly, in appointing me to be their Speaker, it now becomes my duty humbly to request of your Excellency, that all the usual rights, immunities and privileges accorded to previous Houses of Assembly, may be granted to this House, amongst which are freedom from arrest, freedom of speech in their debates, and free access to your Excellency on all suitable occasions, in matters connected with the business of the House of Assembly and the welfare of the Colony.

The President of the Council then replied:

Mr Speaker;

I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to say, that His Excellency being fully assured of the prudence, loyalty and good affection of the House of Assembly, most willingly grants to them all their privileges, conformably to ancient usage, the laws of the land and Her Majesty's instructions.

The House being returned—

Mr Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy,

obtained a copy, which he read to the House, and is as follows :—

Mr President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council.

Mr Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

Her Gracious Majesty the Queen has been pleased to announce to Her Parliament, that she has given Her consent to a Marriage between His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra of Denmark.

I am confident that you will receive this announcement with the greatest pleasure, and that you will heartily unite in expressing to Her Majesty your congratulations on an event so conducive to Her own happiness, that of Her family, and the welfare of the Nation.

The remembrance of the visit of His Royal Highness to this Island, gives additional interest to this Marriage.

The Secretary of State for the Colonies, has laid before the Queen the Petition passed by the Legislature last Session, praying Her Majesty to use Her influence to obtain for this Island privileges in respect of Shipping, similar to those which have been conceded by the French Government to the Province of Canada.

I am requested to inform you that the question of extending these privileges to Vessels built in any of Her Majesty's North American Provinces, is under the consideration of the Government of France.

The Colonial Minister has intimated to me that the Commissioners appointed by the Queen, to inquire into the differences existing between Landowners and their Tenants, have exceeded their Powers in the Report which they have made.

His Grace is consequently unable to advise Her Majesty to assent to two Acts, passed during last Session, and intended to give validity to that Report.

Papers on the subject will be laid before you.

I am confident, that you will deliberate on a question of such interest to your constituents, and the Colony, with a determination to use your utmost endeavours to obtain a solution of those differences, which have so long retarded the prosperity of this Island.

Mr Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I have directed the Estimates of the present year, and the Public Accounts for the past, to be laid before you.

I observe with regret that the Expenditure for the year 1862 has largely exceeded the Revenue.

The Revenue has fallen short of that of the preceding twelvemonth. This without doubt is in a great measure owing to the derangement of our Commerce, the result of the continuance of the unhappy struggle in the neighboring Republic.

I would direct your attention to the sum which is annually expended on Education. This item alone absorbs nearly one half of the Revenue, and it is, moreover, an expenditure ever increasing with the Population.

The proceeds of the Assessment on Lands, specially

devoted to this service, are altogether disproportionate to the Expenditure which it entails.

The necessity for reducing that item of Public Expenditure, or of raising an additional Revenue to meet it, is imperative.

You will, I am confident, bestow a careful consideration on the Financial condition of the Colony generally, with a view to adopting such measures, as may be deemed necessary to equalize Revenue and Expenditure, and to maintain, unimpaired, the Public Credit.

Mr President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I have been desired by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle to invite you to give your earliest consideration to the system by which Money Votes are initiated in the House of Assembly.

In the Mother Country, and in several of the Colonies under Constitutions similar to your own, the Executive Government is directly responsible for the Financial condition of the country.

It is for you to consider the propriety of introducing this system.

A measure will therefore be proposed to you for vesting in the Lieutenant Governor and His Responsible Advisers the exclusive power of introducing measures for the appropriation of the Revenue.

Correspondence on the subject will be laid before you.

The Act changing the Constitution of the Legislative Council, by rendering it Elective, has received the sanction of Her Majesty, and has been carried into operation.

The Constitutional position and functions of the Council remain exactly what they were : Its deliberations will be strengthened by a consciousness of popular support, while its construction is such as to reflect the settled wishes, rather than the transitory impulses of the People.

The qualification of Electors under the present Law renders it advisable that the Electors should be registered, and a measure to that effect will be brought before you.

I with confidence commit to you the important business which will come under your consideration in the course of the Session now opened.

John Hamilton Gray rose in his place, and stated to the House that he deemed it but right and proper to announce to Mr Speaker and to the House that His Excellency's late Ministers having tendered their resignation on the 23d ultimo, and he having received the commands of His Excellency to undertake the task of arranging a new administration, which instructions having fulfilled, His Excellency's responsible advisers now comprise—

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired or are near expiring, with leave to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise.

THE Hon. the Colonial Secretary laid on the table the Writ of Election for the Third Electoral District of Prince County; and thereupon

Mr Sinclair, returned as one of the

Members for the said Third Electoral District of Prince County, but who was not present in the House yesterday, appeared at the Bar, and having been led into the body of the House, and introduced to Mr Speaker, by Mr Muirhead and Mr Howlan, two of the Members, took the oaths and his seat.

Then the House adjourned until three o'clock.

And being met—

On motion of the Hon. J. Longworth,

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of Privileges.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr John Yeo took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the chair.

And Mr John Yeo reported that the Committee had come to a Resolution, which he was directed to report to the House.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was then read by the Clerk, and, on the question being put thereon, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

WHEREAS it appears from the evidence given before this Committee, that two Members of this House—the Hon. Daniel

Davies and James Duncan, Esq.—while entering the House of Assembly this day, and when within the purlieus of the House, for the purpose of discharging their public duties as Members of the Legislature, were grossly insulted, and one of the said Members, James Duncan, Esquire, violently knocked down and assaulted, by Doctor John T. Jenkins, without any just cause, and solely in consequence of, or retaliation for the discharge of a public duty, on the part of the said two Members, namely, a vote given by them in this House, on the previous day; and by reason of such outrage and offence so committed by the said John T. Jenkins, in reference to the said two Members, he, the said John T. Jenkins has been guilty of a high breach and invasion of the privileges and rights of this House: **RESOLVED** therefore, that the Honorable the Speaker of this House do forthwith issue his Warrant for the apprehension of the said John T. Jenkins, in order that the said offender may be brought to the Bar of this House to answer for the offence and breach of privilege aforesaid.

Then the House adjourned until tomorrow at ten o'clock.

PRAYERS.

A PETITION of Daniel Green, Charles Green, Jesse Green, Stephen Wright and others, was presented to the House by the Hon. J. C. Pope, and the same was received and read, setting forth: That the petitioner, Daniel Green, together with John Haszard, Colin MacLennan and James Muirhead, Esquires, was a Candidate for the representation of the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, in the House of Assembly, at the General Election held on the Twenty-first day of January last; That at the close of the Poll on the day of the said Election,

according to the Poll-books kept by the said Candidates' Clerks, the said Colin MacLennan appeared to be returned at the head of the poll, for the said District, while the said James Muirhead and the petitioner Daniel Green appeared to have polled about an equal number of votes; but as the petitioner Daniel Green had received a far greater number of special votes which were not then heard from, the petitioner Daniel Green was considered to have polled a majority of votes over the said James Muirhead, and was consequently deemed duly elected as Member of the House of Assembly, for the said District, with the said Colin MacLennan;

That the Sheriff at his Court held at Saint Eleanor's, on the twenty-sixth day of January last, for the purpose of declaring the state of the polls, and proclaiming what Members were duly elected, to the great surprise of the petitioner Daniel Green, and of the Electors of the said District generally, declared the said James Muirhead elected as Member for the said District, by a majority of four votes over the petitioner Daniel Green, and returned him as such, accordingly; That by the said Sheriff's poll book, as kept by his Clerk, Mr Charles Pope, there appeared to have been polled for the said James Muirhead, two hundred and seven votes, besides five special votes, making in all two hundred and twelve votes; That according to the last mentioned poll-book, there were one hundred and ninety-six votes polled for the petitioner Daniel Green, which with twelve special votes allowed by the Sheriff for the said petitioner, made the total number of votes polled for him, two hundred and eight;—thus showing a majority of four votes for the said James Muirhead over the petitioner Daniel Green; That the said apparent majority of votes for the said James Muirhead over the petitioner Daniel Green, results from various gross errors and omissions committed by the said Sheriff's Poll-clerk in keeping his poll-book, and from the said Sheriff omitting to add to the petitioner's number of votes, one special vote, polled for him at Lyon, by Mr John Macwilliam; That by the said Sheriff's Clerk's poll-book, Charles Peters of Summerside, Rigger, Nathaniel Pearson of Cascumpec, Shipwright, George Doull of Wilmot Creek, Cabinet-maker, and Charles Pope, the said Poll Clerk of the said Sheriff, who are all duly qualified electors for the said District and did poll their votes for the petitioner, Daniel Green, are nevertheless set down in the said Clerk's poll-book as not having voted for him the petitioner, whereas the poll-books of the sworn Clerks of the said petitioner, and of the said other three Candidates, all show that the said Charles Peters, Nathaniel Pear-

son, George Doull and Charles Pope polled their votes for the petitioner, Daniel Green, and should have been recorded for him by the said Sheriff's clerk accordingly; That the said special vote of the said John Macwilliam, and the said four other votes should have been added to those polled for the petitioner, Daniel Green; That on the other hand, several votes are recorded in the poll-book of the said sheriff's clerk, as having been polled for the said James Muirhead, which were not in fact, at all, polled for him,—namely, the votes of the said Nathaniel Pearson and George Doull, and of John Macfadyen of Saint Eleanor's, Innkeeper, Albert Anderson of Saint Eleanor's, Merchant's Clerk, and Benjamin S. Mills of Saint Eleanor's, Farmer; That the poll-books kept by the sworn Clerks of the petitioner Daniel Green, and the said other three Candidates, all show that the said last mentioned five votes were not polled for the said James Muirhead, as erroneously recorded in the poll-book of the said Sheriff's Clerk; That adding the said omitted Special vote and the said omitted four other votes to the said number of two hundred and eight votes, shown by the Sheriff's Clerk's poll-book as polled for the petitioner Daniel Green, makes the number of votes polled for the said petitioner, two hundred and thirteen; and deducting from the said two hundred and twelve votes represented by the last mentioned poll-book as polled for the said James Muirhead, the said five votes which were not polled for him, there remains a total number of two hundred and seven votes,—thus showing a majority of six votes for the petitioner Daniel Green, according to the poll-book of the said Sheriff's Clerk, upon rectifying the errors and omissions above particularly referred to and will also more explicitly appear from the statement hereto annexed, marked (A). That according to the poll-book kept by the (petitioner) Daniel Green's sworn Clerk, there were two hundred and two votes polled for him the said petitioner over and above the Special votes, which

with the said thirteen Special votes make a total number of two hundred and fifteen votes for the said petitioner Daniel Green; That the same poll-book shows two hundred and three votes as polled for the said James Muirhead, which, together with the said five Special votes, make a total number of two hundred and eight votes for him—showing a majority of seven votes in favor of the petitioner Daniel Green; That the poll-books of the sworn Clerks of the other three Candidates, as also two other poll-books kept by two gentlemen who volunteered to keep a record of the voting of the said District, all show a majority of about six votes in favor of the petitioner, Daniel Green, over the said James Muirhead.

That the petitioner, Daniel Green, on the day of the said Court when the Sheriff proclaimed the said James Muirhead elected, entered his protest against the return of the said James Muirhead, and then and there stated his objections to his being returned; That the petitioner, Daniel Green, is prepared to produce to the House the most convincing proofs of the said errors and omissions committed by the said Sheriff and his said Poll-clerk, and of the illegality and irregularity of the return of the said James Muirhead, as Member for the said District.

That the petitioner, Daniel Green, is prepared with any security that may be by law required of him, for the payment of all expenses and damages attending his present demand, in case he be unsuccessful in his application, and praying the House to take the premises into consideration and take such steps for correcting the errors and omissions above specified, as in such case is meet, and cause such proceedings to be instituted concerning the premises, as will enable the petitioner Daniel Green to obtain a seat in the House, as Member of the said District, as by law he is entitled to, by reason of his having polled a clear majority of votes over the said James Muirhead.

Mr John Yeo took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the chair.

And Mr John Yeo reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the petition to them referred, and had

come to a Resolution thereon, which resolution being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

RESOLVED, That the allegations set forth in the petition of Daniel Green, Esquire, Charles Green, Jesse Green, Stephen Wright and others, against the return of James Muirhead, Esquire, as a Member of this House, for the Fifth District of Prince County, are sufficient to authorize the House to enter into an investigation as to the legality of the said Return.

On motion of the Hon. *J. Longworth*,

Resolved, That this House will, on Wednesday the Eleventh day of March instant, resolve itself into a Committee of Privileges and Elections, to consider the petition of Daniel Green, Esquire, complaining of an undue Election and Return of James Muirhead, Esquire, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County in the present House of Assembly.

On motion of the Hon. *J. C. Pope*,

Resolved, That the Colonial Secretary be desired to lay before this House, instantler, the Writ of Election for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, and also the Poll-books for all the Districts of the said County.

The Hon. the *Colonial Secretary*, pursuant to the said Resolution, laid before the House the Writ of Election for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, and also the Poll-books for all the Districts of the said County.

On motion of the Hon. *J. C. Pope*,

Resolved, That Daniel Green, Esquire, the petitioner, complaining of the undue Election and Return of James Muirhead, Esquire, as a Member of this House, do place in the hands of the Clerk of the House before the hour of twelve o'clock

to-morrow, a list of the witnesses whom he intends to call in support of the allegations of his petition, and that the said James Muirhead within the same time also place in the hands of the Clerk of this House, a list of the witnesses to be called by him.

Mr *Haslam* from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, presented to the House the draft of an Address as prepared by the Committee; and he read the same in his place, and delivered it in at the Clerk's table, where it was again read.

Ordered, That the said draft Address be committed to a Committee of the whole House, to-morrow.

Pursuant to the order of the House of yesterday, Doctor John T. Jenkins was brought to the Bar in custody of the Sergeant-at-Arms to answer for his offence and breach of privilege, and the resolution reported from the Committee of Privileges and adopted by the House yesterday having been read to him, he made the following statement:—

I was walking up the side entrance of the portico of the Colonial Building. Mr Davies was walking up at the front; we met at the door—yesterday afternoon. I said to Mr Davies, "I hope, or suppose you are proud of yourself." He then made some angry reply—I cannot recollect what it was. I made use of some expressions,—I don't know what, exactly; they were intended to express contempt. We were engaged in an altercation, when Mr Duncan came to me and addressed me in a very overbearing manner, and asked me if I would apply those terms to him, or to that purport.—I don't recollect the words I made use of to him, but I think I intended to express a greater share of contempt for him than I had already expressed for Mr Davies. He then came close to me, and said I was a liar and a blackguard; upon which, I had my whip raised, and I struck him on the hat. I think it was more with the intention

of knocking his hat off than for anything else. I addressed no words to him or applied no epithets to him as a Member of this House. I said nothing whatever to Mr Duncan until he first addressed me, and addressed me in a very overbearing manner. After I struck Mr Duncan, he rushed upon me and I threw him down on his back; after that, nothing material passed that I am aware of. I am prepared to prove every material point in my statement. The whip I now produce is the one I allude to as having in my hand yesterday—the one I constantly carry. I wish the hat may be produced. I have to add, that to neither of the Members did I apply any expressions as Members of the House, nor did I use any language that could convey to them that I spoke to them as Members of the House.

The Hon. *Daniel Davies*, in his place, made the following statement:—

I was coming in to the House yesterday afternoon, and met Dr Jenkins at the door; he was at the side. I was going to enter. I bowed to him. He said, "you are a very pretty fellow,—I hope you feel proud of yourself." I said, "what do you mean, Dr Jenkins? Do you allude to my vote of yesterday?" I was quite cool at that time. "Yes," he said; "you acted like a blackguard or a set of blackguards,"—one or the other, I am not quite certain which. I said, "Dr Jenkins, I voted from a sense of duty," or independence, or something of that kind. I said, "I am not going to bandy words with you," and passed into the lobby. Mr Duncan was entering with me, and I said, "Come along, Duncan." I stepped a half-dozen paces forward, expecting Mr Duncan would follow me. I heard him say to Dr Jenkins, "Do you intend that expression for me?" I cannot swear to the words Dr Jenkins said in reply, but I understood him to say he did. I don't remember the words then used, as I stepped forward a little. I do not at this moment remember the exact words Dr Jenkins made use of. Mr Duncan spoke in a much louder tone than Dr Jenkins. I suppose I heard the words, but I do not now remember them. I became excited, expecting that a disgraceful row would take place there. Mr Duncan then said to him a second time, "if you do, you are a blackguard yourself," and I think Dr Jenkins retorted, and they used these expressions two or three times. Dr Jenkins had a hunting whip; there appeared to be brass on the end of it; he drew himself back, and with the whip struck Mr Duncan over the head. I presume

this is the whip here. Mr Duncan was stunned for an instant, but, as soon as he recovered himself, he made a rush at Dr Jenkins. Several people were present; the only one I recognized was Mr William Longworth, who caught hold of Mr Duncan by one arm, and another individual by the other arm. I was at this time between Dr Jenkins and Mr Duncan. Dr Jenkins then rushed at him, while two or three were holding him back. Dr Jenkins put his foot behind Mr Duncan; the parties holding him drew back that he might not fall on them, and he fell down with great force on the pavement. This is the substance of what I have to state. I made use of several angry expressions after what occurred. I don't think Dr Jenkins, in the first instance, intended to assault Mr Duncan. I think it was intended for me.

The prisoner then said, "I believe Mr Davies's statement is correct in the main," and he craved leave to put questions to Mr Davies, which the House having granted, the following questions were accordingly put through the chair:—

1. When you said, "Duncan, come along; don't mind him," had you any reason to suppose that Mr Duncan was speaking to me?—I am not certain that up to that time Mr Duncan had spoken. Mr Duncan, at that time, as far as my memory serves me, had not addressed Dr Jenkins. I did not think, up to that time that he had addressed Mr Duncan; I thought his remarks were intended for me.

2. You admit that Mr Duncan addressed me before I spoke to him?—I make no admission; I stated that I walked into the House. I don't wish to make any statement to his prejudice. I wish to state the simple truth. Up to that time I did not conceive that Dr Jenkins had addressed Mr Duncan; I thought his remarks were intended for me. I said, "Mr Duncan, come along." I might have said "don't mind him," or something to that effect.

3. Did Mr Duncan not make use of the words *liar* and *blackguard*?—Not the word "liar." I don't remember the word "liar;" "blackguard" he certainly used several times.

4. Did the blow appear to be aimed at the head or the hat of Mr Duncan?—The blow was aimed more at Mr Duncan's hat (hat here produced). The blow speaks for itself. You see how the hat has been shattered. Mr Duncan moved himself backwards or forwards, I don't know which. My impression was that the blow was aimed for the upper part of the hat.

5. What do you mean by the term stunned? did he fall?—He was knocked back, because the handle of the whip came over his forehead. It was a hard blow. He fell back stunned slightly. He recoiled from the blow—recoiled is the proper term.

6. Did Mr Duncan not rush at me?—I have already stated that in the first part of my statement. After the blow he rushed at you, not before.

7. Did my conduct evince any intention of assaulting you?—No, it did not; because I taunted you afterwards, saying, "you had better apply that whip to me."

8. Did I distinctly answer "yes" to the question "do you mean my vote?"—I cannot state positively whether he made use of the word "yes." He said "you acted like a blackguard, or a set of blackguards." I don't think he used the word "yes." He may or may not have used the word "yes."

The prisoner says he is perfectly satisfied with Mr Davies's evidence.

He was then withdrawn in custody.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

On motion of the Hon. J. Longworth,

Ordered, That Dr John T. Jenkins be produced at the Bar in custody.

Which being done—

Mr Duncan, in his place, made the following statement:—

Coming in yesterday, about 3 o'clock, with Mr Davies, and behind him, I saw Dr Jenkins standing on the step at the outside door. Mr Davies was in front of me. When he [Mr D.] went up, Dr Jenkins said, "you ought to be proud of yourself," or some such words. I cannot tell exactly. Mr Davies said, "What do you mean, Dr Jenkins? is it for my vote yesterday?" Dr Jenkins said "yes." "I voted on principle," said Mr Davies. I don't know which said it first, and he (Mr Davies) said "I don't want to bandy words with you—Come on, Duncan; never mind him." I am not sure whether Mr Davies said that first, before Dr Jenkins said "you are a

pair of blackguards," or "a d—d pair of blackguards." I said to him, "Dr Jenkins, do you mean that for me?" He said, "yes." I asked him if it was for voting against his father yesterday. He said "Yes; you are a d—d pack of blackguards, the whole of you." In reply, I said, "if you say so, you are a blackguard for saying so," and I walked in. He followed me inside, and said "Say that again, if you dare." I repeated two or three times, "you are a blackguard;" but I am not sure that I qualified it by saying every time "if you say so,"—I rather think I did not. And he was standing with his back towards the wall on the right hand side of the door as you come in. He had a whip in his hand. I did not observe it until it came down on my head, and before I had time to put up my hand the blow was struck;—it stunned me a good deal, and I rather staggered back. I was stupefied for a little time. When I recovered—I had a walking-stick in my hand, and my first impulse was to make a drive at him with it; but recollecting it had a pike in the end, I thought if I stabbed him, it might do him a fatal injury; and I was changing the position of the stick, when I was taken hold of by two or three persons, and Mr Davies came also between me and him. I recognized Mr William Longworth, but none of the others who had hold of me; and they were hauling him back, and I saw Dr Jenkins standing, and felt him put his feet behind my feet as they were hauling me back. I do not know whether he struck me or not; but I feel my shoulder sore to-day, and I think he must have struck me, otherwise I do not know what caused the pain; and when I lost my balance they let me go, and I had no way of recovering myself, and I fell on my right elbow. When I got up, I did not recognize any person but the Hon. Mr Dingwell, and William Longworth, and Mr Davies. Several were standing there, and he was standing behind them, and those present insisted on my keeping the peace. I do not know anything particular that occurred, and we came up stairs. Some words were made use of. When he said "all of you," I understood him to say, all who voted against his father; that was the only construction I put on his words. The pike is about an inch and a-half long in my stick. [The stick was here produced, and shown to the prisoner at the Bar at his request.]

The following questions were then put to the Witness, through the chair:—

By the prisoner—

9. Did I say distinctly "yes" to Mr Davies, when he asked me if it was to his vote I alluded?—Yes, distinctly; I could not misunderstand it.

10. Did I say to Mr Davies "you are a blackguard," or did I say "Mr Davies, you are a pair of blackguards?"—I think he said "you are a pair of blackguards." Whatever the word was, whether he said "two" or "a pair," it implied the plural, or I should not have asked him if it was me he meant.

11. Did I address you when I said a pair of blackguards, or Mr Davies alone?—He was looking towards me, but his words were I understood addressed more to Mr Davies. I was going in behind Mr Davies at the time. I stood behind him until he went out of the way.

12. Did I say "say that if you dare," and for what reason did I say it?—He said it. I understood him to mean if I dare say it—in a threatening way.

13. Did the whip strike your hat or your head first?—It struck my hat, I believe, first. From the way in which the blow came down, it struck my hat first; if it had not struck the hat first, it would have done me a greater injury; and I further believe that the intention was to injure me—to hit me; I believed it then, and believe it now.

14. Could I not have hit behind the ear without touching the hat, if I had pleased?—I am not certain whether he could. He may possibly be more accustomed to hit than I am. I believe his intention was to injure.

15. Did you not rush at me?—After he hit me I did, but not before I was leaving him, and he was following me. It began outside and ended inside, consequently I could not have been following him; and I came in first, so that he was following me.

16. Did you rush before you changed your intentions about the pike, or afterwards?—It was so momentary that I could not tell which. It was after he struck me that I both went towards him and changed my intention about the pike, for I had no intention whatever of striking him until he struck me; nor yet did I think he would have struck, or I would have been more on my guard.

17. Did you not ask me if I would apply the same words to you, before I said anything to you whatever?—No, I did not; I never spoke to him until I understood he was alluding to both of us in his conversation.

18. Did you not fall with great force on your back?—No; I fell partly on my back, but my elbow caught first. I fell with great force; it was partly on my

back. When the two holding me let me go, I lost my balance; he at the same time tripped me, and I fell back.

19. Did I address you personally, or give you in particular any reason to suppose I was speaking of you?—I have already stated that when he spoke of the two, and only two there, that I was one of them; and then when I asked him, he told me distinctly it was me he meant, and that we are all a pack of d—d blackguards. I understood the whole of the party who voted against his father; and he told me distinctly it was. I could not misunderstand him.

20. Were you the only person there besides Mr Davies?—I saw no other there at the time, that is immediately near us; there might be some at a distance, but none close to us that I saw.

21. Did I say anything whatever to induce you to think I meant your vote against my father influenced me? and do you distinctly affirm that I said "a pack of blackguards?"—He told me distinctly that it was the vote he meant; for I asked the question, and he answered in the affirmative. Yes, I believe these were the words he made use of, or words of that import; "a pack of d—d blackguards," he said. He made it stronger than blackguards.

Hon. D. Davies, in his place, made a further statement, as followeth:—

I will state what my impression was. Dr Jenkins threw himself on him so quickly; I just glanced at Dr Jenkins when he had the whip up. He seemed to aim sideways and high. My impression was, that he intended to knock the hat off, and not to injure him; in other words, he struck more at the hat than the head, although the blow did take effect on the head.

By the Hon. J. H. Gray—

22. You have stated that when you met Dr Jenkins, it was outside the door; you moreover state, that Mr Duncan fell down with great force on the pavement. Will you say to what pavement you allude—was it the pavement of the vestibule, or outside on the steps?—Inside, certainly; between the folding doors within the walls of the building.

By the Hon. J. Longworth—

23. When you asked Dr Jenkins if he referred to his [Mr Davies's] vote in the House of Assembly relative to his [the Doctor's] father, or made allusion

to that subject, did you understand from Dr Jenkins's reply that his attack upon you was made in connection with that matter?—I did not refer to any particular vote. I asked if it was in consequence of the way in which I voted. Certainly I understood it was because of the way in which I voted. I did not state when I spoke to Dr Jenkins, in reply to what he said to me, I did not particularize the vote.

24. Did you understand from the Doctor's reply to your question, that it was in consequence of any vote given by you in the House of Assembly?—There was nothing said about the way in which I voted; but I did infer, when he addressed me, that it was in consequence of a vote I had given that he addressed me as he did. I understood it so.

By Mr Brecken—

25. Was there any ill feeling existing between you and Dr Jenkins previous to the alleged assault having taken place?—None whatever that I am aware of.

26. The same question was put to Mr Duncan in his place, who answers: I have no knowledge of any, nor of any cause why there should be. We had no quarrel, nor any bad feeling that I am aware of. I believe it was solely on account of the business in the House.

By the Hon. J. Hensley—

27. Did Dr Jenkins's conduct and demeanor, when you first met, lead you to think that he intended to assault you or Mr Duncan, before the words detailed by you had been spoken?—I don't think Dr Jenkins intended to assault me. I have already stated that, as his remarks in the first instance were addressed to me, I do not think he came there with the intention of assaulting Mr Duncan.

On motion of Mr Duncan,

Ordered, That Mr Daniel J. Roberts be called to the Bar, to give evidence in this matter.

Mr Daniel J. Roberts was then called in and examined.

By the Chair—

28. Will you state what you know relative to the alleged assault on a Member of this House, said to

have taken place yesterday?—I saw nothing of it; it was all over before I got to the House. I saw Mr Duncan fronting the doorway, over the heads of several other people, some of whom, I imagined, from the noise and the words used, were endeavouring to keep him back; and I heard, I think, Mr Davies say words to the effect that Members of the House of Assembly should not be insulted or abused this way; there was a great crowd at the door, and I could not get in; so I left.

By a Member—

29. Did Dr Jenkins in your hearing yesterday use any threatening language towards any Member of this House?—Not out of his own house, I think.

By Mr Duncan—

30. Did you tell Dr Jenkins before coming to this House yesterday to be on his guard and not to do anything that he might be sorry for?—No.

By Mr Brecken—

31. Did Dr Jenkins in your hearing yesterday use any threatening language towards any Member of this House? and did you then caution him in any manner not to commit himself in his conduct towards any Member of this House?

The question having been objected to, the Witness was directed to withdraw.

And the question being put "Can the question be put to the Witness," it was carried in the affirmative, and

Resolved, accordingly.

The witness was then again called in, and the said question having been again put to him, he answers—

No conversation of any kind passed between Dr Jenkins and myself relating to any Member of this House, outside of his own house.

The question was again put from the Chair, the witness answers—

Nothing occurred except in Dr Jenkins's house, and I cannot repeat any conversation that took place there without Dr Jenkins's consent. It would involve

a breach of confidence. I cannot justify repeating any conversation that occurred in the house of a private gentleman, except I have his consent. I decline to answer the question.

By the Chair—

Do you still persist in refusing to answer the question asked? I must still respectfully persist in refusing to answer the question. I cannot repeat a conversation that takes place in a private house.

By the Chair—

Then you are prepared to take the consequences?

On motion of the Hon. *J. H. Gray*, the House came to a Resolution as followeth:

Whereas the Witness at the Bar, Daniel Jackson Roberts, being called to the Bar of this House to give evidence respecting a question of Privilege, and having declined in positive terms to answer a question put to him, the said Daniel Jackson Roberts, by the Honorable the Speaker of this House, relative to the subject matter of the said question of privilege, is guilty of a contempt and breach of the Privileges of this House:

Resolved, therefore, that the said Daniel Jackson Roberts, for the said offence, be now committed to the custody of the Sergeant-at-Arms until the further pleasure of this House.

The witness was then withdrawn from the Bar in custody.

On motion, the Hon. *D. Beaton* was examined in his place, and made the following statement:

I was coming to the Colonial Building yesterday, between three and four o'clock, in company with the Hon. *J. Dingwell*. I heard some angry words between *Dr. Jenkins* and *Mr Duncan*. I was not there when the altercation first took place, but I distinctly heard *Mr Duncan* say that "*Dr. Jenkins* was a liar and a blackguard." I did not hear what *Dr. Jenkins* said to call forth the expression from *Mr Duncan*. Immediately *Dr. Jenkins* struck him with the whip

handle or cane a severe blow. He knocked his hat off. He struck him on the forehead, I think. The blow appeared to stun *Mr Duncan* a little. He closed in with *Dr. Jenkins*, and *Mr William Longworth* went between them for the purpose, as I understood, of separating them. Before they were separated, *Dr. Jenkins* knocked *Mr Duncan* down. *Mr Dingwell* and myself prevented any further collision. We endeavoured to keep the peace.

At the request of the prisoner, *W. A. Johnston, Esquire*, was then called in and examined, and stated—

I was at the Surrogate's office yesterday, a little after three o'clock, on business. Coming out I passed the first folding door. I saw *Dr Jenkins*, *Mr Duncan* and *Mr Davies* and some others. *Dr. Jenkins* was standing at the southeast corner of the Hall. *Mr Davies* was a little in advance of him, and *Mr Duncan* was more nearly opposite to *Dr. Jenkins*. From the appearance of all the parties, which was excited and irritated, I assumed that an altercation had taken place; but I heard no opprobrious or insulting epithets until I heard *Mr Duncan* say to *Dr Jenkins* "you are a blackguard," and I believe he added the term "liar." That conviction is strongly forced on my mind, although I do not wish to speak so positively to that as to the word "blackguard." After giving this matter serious reflection since then, my firm and conscientious conviction is, that he used the word "liar;" thereupon *Dr Jenkins* elevated his stick and made a blow at, and struck *Mr Duncan*, but, from the manner in which the blow was struck, at the time I thought *Dr Jenkins* aimed entirely at the hat. The hat was knocked off some considerable distance into the other corner. *Mr Duncan* picked up his hat, put it on his head, and then closed in upon *Dr Jenkins*; and I supposed, from the appearance of the parties, that it simply would end in a fight between *Dr. Jenkins* and *Mr Duncan*. A very short time after, *Dr. Jenkins* threw *Mr Duncan* in the manner which has been described, and *Mr Duncan* rose, and no other acts of violence that I saw, took place. In fact, the only two acts of violence I saw were those I have described, and almost immediately afterwards, parties present separated them and kept the peace, and the two Members of the House referred to, went up stairs. The three parties mentioned, from the time I saw them until I lost sight of them, appeared very much excited; angry feelings appeared to be aroused between them.

By the Hon. J. H. Gray—

32. Was it not upon your immediate entry into the Hall that you heard Mr Duncan first using the language you speak of? Within a very short time of it.

33. Was not Mr Duncan's hat covering his head at the time you say "Dr Jenkins aimed entirely at his hat?" His hat was on his head, of course; but to explain further, I conceive it is quite competent for a man to knock off another man's hat without aiming at his head, and from the effect which the blow had on the hat on sending it reeling, and seeing no effect of the blow on Mr Duncan's head, I formed an opinion that Dr Jenkins had aimed entirely at his hat with the view of knocking off his hat, and seeing the angry state of feelings existing between them at the time I was rather surprised at that. I give the opinion now which I formed at the time.

34. Did it appear to you that the blow aimed at Mr Duncan's hat had the effect of seriously injuring his head? No, it did not at the time. When I heard that a lump was raised on Mr Duncan's head I was very much surprised at it, and expressed my surprise. I do not know it to be a fact that there is a lump raised. I merely heard so.

By the Hon. J. Longworth—

35. Were you present when the altercation took place between Dr Jenkins and the Hon. Daniel Davies? or do you know what had passed between Dr Jenkins and Mr Duncan previously to the occurrence you have detailed? I know of nothing that

took place between them previously to my coming in to the lobby or the Hall,—that is of my own knowledge.

By Mr Duncan—

36. Did you see Mr Jenkins lay hold of Mr Duncan? I saw him put his hand on him when he tripped him up and threw him down. That was the first time I saw him put his hands on him.

37. Did you see any person other than Mr Jenkins lay hold of Mr Duncan? No, I did not. I saw persons attempting to part them.

38. At what time? After the blow was struck. My impression at the time was, that Mr Duncan intended to show fight, and that the parties present tried to keep peace.

39. Was it when Jenkins had hold of Mr Duncan that others laid hold of him? My impression is that after the hat had been knocked off, and Mr Duncan picked his hat up and put it on his head, that he intended to—(a part of the answer here not taken down by the Clerk; Witness continues.) I can't positively say the precise moment when the first hand was put on Mr Duncan. The parties interfered before he was knocked down, and I think it very likely they put their hands on him.

Witness withdraws.

Then the House adjourned until tomorrow at ten o'clock.

Friday, March 6, 1863.

PRAYERS.

Dr John T. Jenkins, charged with contempt and breach of the privileges of the House, was again placed at the Bar in custody, and questioned as follows:—

By the Chair—

Have you any other evidence to bring before this House? As it appears there is an impression on the part of Members of this House, that Mr Roberts is able to give some evidence, I beg that he may be called. I think there are other witnesses, but I do not think they can prove anything further.

He was then withdrawn in custody.

A petition of Daniel J. Roberts, at pre-

sent in custody of the Sergeant-at-Arms for contempt, was presented to the House by Mr Duncan, and the same was received and read, setting forth that Dr John T. Jenkins has requested the petitioner to answer the question, or any other questions put by the House concerning the subject matter of any conversation had by the petitioner with him relating to any or all of the Members of the House; and praying that the House will take into consideration the fact that the petitioner's offence was committed through an erroneous idea of his obligations to the House, and that the House will be pleased to absolve him from his offence.

An objection being made to receiving the petition—

On motion,

Ordered, That the petition be withdrawn by Mr Duncan.

Dr John T. Jenkins was, by order of the House, again produced at the Bar, in custody.

By the Chair—

As there are no further witnesses to be produced, you can make a statement.

The prisoner at the Bar then addressed the House.

After which, he was withdrawn in custody.

The Hon. J. Hensley, in his place, stated that Daniel J. Roberts, now in custody for contempt, is now prepared unconditionally to apologize to the House, and moved that Daniel J. Roberts be produced at the Bar to make an unconditional apology, and answer the question refused by him yesterday; which being ordered,

Daniel J. Roberts was produced at the Bar in custody; and said—

I wish to make an apology to this Honorable House for being guilty of contempt in refusing to answer a question put to me by the Speaker yesterday.

On motion of the Hon. J. H. Gray,

Ordered, That the apology be received.

The question referred to was then again put through the Chair, as follows :

Did Dr Jenkins in your hearing, on the 4th day of March instant, use any threatening language towards any member of this House, and did you then caution him in any manner not to commit himself in his conduct towards any member of this House? He did not use any threatening language to any member individually, nor any threatening language at all. I

went to Dr Jenkins' house on some business of my own; after that was discussed I said I was very sorry to hear that the Rev. Dr Jenkins was not re-appointed Chaplain to the House of Assembly. Dr Jenkins answered that he thought it was contemptible conduct to appoint the gentleman the House had appointed, and overlook the gentleman who had read prayers to this Honorable House for so many years. He said he did not speak of this because Dr Jenkins was his father, but he would have had the same feeling whoever the person had been. He then stated he thought it would be a very good thing if all the members were—(I cannot say whether he said) well licked or well whipped, and he should not mind if he had the pleasure of inflicting the punishment on them on the Market Square. He was rather excited and angry when he spoke, and I laughed and answered him it would be very little use to do that, as that would not have the effect of altering the position of affairs. After a minute or so, Dr Jenkins laughed too, and said he supposed not. The conversation continued for a little time and afterwards was turned to other matters.

By the prisoner—

Did not the conversation end in a joke, and did I not part from you laughing? Yes he did.

Witness appearing deaf, the written question was put in his hands and read by him; and he answers :

We parted shaking hands and laughing, but I forget what was said when we parted. It had no reference to this House, it was relating to other conversation we had.

On motion of the Hon. J. H. Gray,

Ordered, That Mr Daniel J. Roberts be discharged.

And he withdrew.

The prisoner was then withdrawn in custody.

Resolved, That the House do now again resolve itself into a Committee of Privileges.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr *John Yeo* took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the chair.

And the chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

The Hon. *J. H. Gray*, from the Committee appointed to prepare Standing Rules and Orders for the governance of this House, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk's table.

Ordered, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr *Ramsay* took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the chair.

And Mr *Ramsay* reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, had amended and then adopted the same; and the report so amended, being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

FIRST—That Twelve Members and the Speaker make a *Quorum*, to act as if all the Members were present, and to proceed to any business.

SECOND—That Six Members and the Speaker be a *Quorum*, to meet and adjourn as they see convenient, and to send for absent Members.

THIRD—When the Speaker assumes the Chair, every Member to take his place, privileged to keep his head covered when seated, only.

FOURTH—No Member upon coming into the House or in removing from his place, is to pass between the Speaker and any other Member then speaking.

FIFTH—When any Member intends to speak, he is to stand up with his head uncovered, and address himself to the Speaker.

SIXTH—If two or more Members stand up and address the Chair, the Speaker is to determine the prior right of speech in favour of him who stood up first.

SEVENTH—No Member to interrupt another while speaking—to the end that regularity and good order may prevail.

EIGHTH—That no Bill shall pass this House until the same shall have been three times audibly and distinctly read.

NINTH—Upon any material question or business being agitated in the House, and it is deemed necessary that a Committee of the whole House shall be formed, and the same being made by motion, and agreed to by a majority, the Speaker shall leave the Chair, and a Chairman shall be chosen, who is to report the proceedings of such Grand Committee in the body of the House.

TENTH—That no Bill shall have more than one reading on the same day; and that every Bill shall be introduced by a motion for leave, specifying the object of the Bill; or by a motion to appoint a Committee to prepare and bring it in; or by an order of the House on the report of a Committee; and when any Bill shall be brought down to this House from the Council, or when any Bill sent up from this House to the Council shall be returned with amendments, such Bill so brought down, or the amendments,

shall undergo the same readings and formal consideration, and the same shall be committed, and be subjected to the same order, forms and stages, as are observed upon Bills originating in this House—unless upon special motion and order to the contrary.

ELEVENTH—That during the proceedings of this House, upon the decision of any question, a division may be called for, and the names of the Members voting thereon shall be taken down, at the request of any one Member.

TWELFTH—That all Orders of the day, which by reason of any adjournment, shall not have been proceeded upon, shall be considered as postponed until the next day on which the House shall sit, and shall then stand first on the order of the day.

THIRTEENTH—That an Order Book be kept by the Clerk, in which Members desirous of introducing any subject to the consideration of the House, unconnected with any measure actually in progress, shall be required to enter notice thereof, specifying the day on which the same shall be brought forward, giving at least twenty-four hours notice—not to extend to questions of privilege.

FOURTEENTH—That no resolution on the State of the Colony, or upon which it is proposed to found any Address to Her Majesty, shall be received by the House, unless such Resolution, or a copy thereof, be laid on the Table of this House, at least Twenty-four hours before the question be put on the same.

FIFTEENTH—That when a Call of the House is ordered, such Members as shall not attend at the time appointed (unless a sufficient excuse is made when their names are called over, and their absence for some special reason expressed,) shall be taken into custody.

SIXTEENTH—That the papers and accounts presented to this House be carefully preserved by the Clerk, to whose custody they are entrusted; and that no person be permitted without leave of the House, to take the same from the House under any pretence whatever; and if any person shall presume to take any accounts or papers from the House, that the said Clerk do forthwith acquaint Mr. Speaker, that the House may be informed thereof.

SEVENTEENTH—That at the end of each Session, the principal clerk do see that the Journal of the Session is properly made out and fairly transcribed from the Minute Book, the printed Votes, and the original papers that have been laid before the House; and that he shall prepare a suitable Index to the printed Journal to be attached thereto.

EIGHTEENTH—That no person whatever shall be entitled to enter the Clerk's copying Room, except the Members of the Legislature, and the Law Clerk and Printer to this House, and the Clerk of the Legislative Council, and the official Reporters of the House of Assembly.

NINETEENTH—That every day, immediately after the Speaker shall have taken the Chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, to the end that any mistake therein, may be corrected by the House; and that during the reading of the minutes, the doors shall be closed.

TWENTIETH—That the Clerk shall have the direction and control over all the Clerks and servants employed in his office, subject to such orders as he may from time to time receive from Mr. Speaker and the House.

TWENTY-FIRST—That no member of this House shall speak twice to any Bill at any one time of reading, nor to any

report, motion, or other matter, unless it be to explain some material point of his speech (but not to bring forward new argument,) and that, not without leave of the House first obtained, except the member bringing forward such Bill report motion, or other matter, who at the close of the debate, shall be privileged to reply.

TWENTY-SECOND—That during any debate in this House, the Speaker do, as often as explanation shall seem to require, upon any point of order or practice, inform the House every thing he knows upon the subject from the Journals of this House or the History of Parliament; but that the said Speaker shall on no account, argue or draw any conclusions from such information, nor, in any matter of doubt, attempt to sway this House; and that the Rule of the House of Commons of Great Britain, passed the 27th April, 1604, be strictly conformed to in the several matters before mentioned.

TWENTY-THIRD—That in order to expedite the business of the Legislature, the House should not insist on the privilege claimed and exercised by them, of laying aside Bills sent from the Legislative Council, because they impose pecuniary penalties; nor of laying aside Amendments made by the Legislative Council, because they introduce into or alter pecuniary penalties in Bills sent to them by this House; provided, that all such penalties thereby imposed, are only to punish or prevent crimes and offences, and do not tend to lay a burthen on the subject, either as aid and supply to Her Majesty, or for any general or special purposes, by Rates, Tolls, Assessments, or otherwise.

TWENTY-FOURTH—That in future no Petition for a grant to a Public work, in aid of which the inhabitants of the District may have subscribed, be received, until there shall have been

produced along with such Petition, a certificate by the Road Commissioner of the District, that there has been deposited with him a duplicate of the subscription list.

TWENTY-FIFTH—In all unprovided cases, the Rules, Usages and Forms of the British House of Commons shall be followed.

TWENTY-SIXTH—That the Sergeant-at-Arms shall be entitled to take and receive the following Fees:—

For taking a Member of the House or any other person into custody,	£0 3 9
For every day in custody,	0 6 0
For bringing a Member of the House or any other person to the Bar, to be reprimanded,	0 5 0
For travelling charges, when ordered by the House, for every mile travelled,	0 0 6

Standing Orders relative to Private Bills:

FIRST—That all petitions for Private Bills be presented within Fourteen Days, after the commencement of every Session.

SECOND—That no Private Bills be brought into this House, but upon a petition, first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the parties preferring the same; and that such petition be signed by the parties who are suitors for such Bill.

THIRD—That a Committee be appointed at the commencement of every Session, consisting of Five Members, of whom three shall be a Quorum, to be denominated "The Private Bill Committee," to whom shall be referred every Private Bill; and that no proceedings be had upon any such Bill until such Committee have reported thereupon in the House.

FOURTH—That as soon as the Committee have reported any Bill, such Bill, together with the amendments, if any, suggested by the Committee, be printed at the expense of the parties

who are suitors for such Bill; and printed copies thereof delivered to the Members before the second reading, if deemed necessary by the Committee.

FIFTH—That no Bill for the particular interest of any Person or Persons, Corporation or Corporations, or Body or Bodies of People, be read a second time, until all Fees be paid for the same, into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

Two Messages from the Council, by Mr Cooper, their Clerk:

Mr Speaker;

The Legislative Council have appointed the Hon. Mr Beer and the Hon. Mr Lord a Committee to join the Committee of the House of Assembly to take charge of the Government House and Public Furniture. Legislative Council Chamber, Thursday, March 5, 1863.

Also:

Mr Speaker;

The Legislative Council have appointed the Hon. Mr Ramsay, the Hon. Mr Walker, and the Hon. Mr Palmer a Committee to keep up a Good Correspondence between the two Branches of the Legislature, and to report their proceedings from time to time, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Legislative Council Chamber, Thursday, March 5, 1863.

And then he withdrew.

The Hon. *D. Davies* from the Committee appointed to receive Tenders for the printing of the Journals of this House, for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk's table.

Ordered, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr *Montgomery* took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the chair.

And Mr *Montgomery* reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, without making any amendment thereto; and the report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

The Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of the House during the present Session, have to report that they have received six tenders, viz:—

First—from Daniel Bethune, proposing to bind the Journals in the usual way, for three shillings and eight pence per copy, and to stitch the same for one shilling and two pence per copy.

Second—from James C. Doyle, undertaking to print the Journals for the Session, at the rate of twenty-two shillings for each sheet, and to half-bind the same in the usual style, at three shillings and six pence, per volume; for the stitched copies, one shilling per copy.

Third—from George T. Haszard, proposing to print the Journals on superior British paper, the same as sample marked (A.) at twenty-four shillings per sheet; on thinner paper, the same as sample marked (B.) at twenty-two shillings per sheet; on American paper, the same as sample marked (C.) at twenty shillings and three pence per sheet; and on American straw paper, the same as sample marked (D.) at nineteen shillings and nine pence per sheet; for half binding the same, three shillings and nine pence; for stitching, one shilling and three pence.

Fourth—from F. W. Hughes, agreeing to print each copy of the Journals, at nineteen shillings and sixpence per sheet; for binding the same, four shillings and sixpence; stitching, one shilling and six pence per volume.

Fifth—From John Ings, undertaking to print the Journals for twenty-five shillings per sheet, on paper the same as samples marked (No. 1); at twenty-four shillings per sheet, on paper the same as sample marked (No. 2.); at twenty-three shillings per sheet, on paper the same as sample marked (No. 3); for binding each copy, four shillings and sixpence; for stitching each copy, one shilling and three pence.

Sixth—from George Bremner, tendering to print the Journals, for twenty-four shillings per sheet; to half-bind the same, four shillings per volume; for stitching, one shilling per volume.

From an examination of the several tenders, the Committee find that the tender of George T. Hazard for printing, on paper marked (No. D), and binding and stitching, is the lowest; and though the specimen of paper submitted, is not of as good quality as could be desired, the Committee are of opinion that the said tender should be accepted.

The Hon. J. Hensley moved that Dr John T. Jenkins be produced at the Bar in custody, in order to make some additional statement to the House.

The motion having been objected to, and a debate ensuing thereon,

Ordered, That the motion be withdrawn by the Hon. J. Hensley.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of Privileges.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr John Yeo took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the chair.

And Mr John Yeo reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the matter to them referred, and had come to a resolution thereon, which resolution was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

Whereas it appears, by evidence adduced before this Committee, that

Doctor John T. Jenkins did on the Fourth day of March, instant, assail two of the Members of this House, namely, the Hon. Daniel Davies and James Duncan, Esquire, while those Members were in the act of entering this House for the purpose of discharging their public duties therein, and did then and there use and apply towards those two Members most abusive, opprobrious and contemptuous terms in regard to their conduct in this House as Members thereof; and did also upon the same occasion, and when the said two Members were within the purlieus of this House, violently assault and strike one of the said Members,—and by reason of such acts and conduct has been guilty of a high contempt and breach of the privileges of this House:

RESOLVED, therefore, that for the said contempt and breach of the privileges of this House so committed by the said John T. Jenkins, he, the said John T. Jenkins be committed to the Jail of the County of Queen's County, there to remain during the pleasure of the House, and that the Hon. the Speaker do forthwith issue his Warrant accordingly.

The Hon. Joseph Hensley moved in amendment to the motion, that all after the word "committed" in the latter part of the said resolution be struck out and the following substituted, "during the pleasure of the House to the custody of the Sergeant at Arms."

The House divided on the motion of amendment:

So it was carried in the affirmative.

The Hon. *E. Whelan* then moved to amend the said resolution, by striking out all after the words "John T. Jenkins," in the latter part of the said resolution, and substituting the following: "be forthwith brought to the Bar of this House, and there make an ample apology, to be dictated by this House, for the outrage and breach of Privilege so committed by him."

The Hon. *J. C. Pope* moved that the words proposed to be struck out do stand part of the question.

The House divided on the question.

On referring to the "Parliamentary Reporter" of the last Session, it will be found that it comprised 122 pages, or 30½ sheets; and making a comparison between the tenders of Mr *Hughes* and Mr *Ings* upon that basis, or even upon the assumption that the "Reporter" of the present Session will be double the size of that of the last Session (which it is not likely to be), it will be found that the Two-pence per copy on the binding of 100 copies, to be gained by the acceptance of Mr *Ings*'s tender, will be greater than the Three-pence per sheet of which his tender is in excess of Mr *Hughes*'s; independently of which, as the paper upon which Mr *Ings* proposes to print the work is greatly superior to the specimen exhibited by Mr *Hughes*, and as Mr *Ings* also agrees to publish the debates in the "Islander" Newspaper, free of charge, your Committee unhesitatingly recommend that the tender of Mr *Ings* be received.

To His Excellency GEORGE DUNDAS, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

1. We, Her Majesty's faithful subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, beg respectfully to tender our thanks for the Speech with which your Excellency was pleased to open the present Session.

2. It is with pleasure that we receive the intelligence that Her gracious Majesty the Queen has been pleased to announce to the Imperial Parliament that she has given her consent to a marriage between His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra of Denmark; and we heartily unite in expressing to Her Majesty our congratulations on an event so conducive to her own happiness, that of her august family, and the welfare of the nation at large.

3. To the inhabitants of this Colony, the recollection of the visit of His Royal Highness to our shores, invests this great event with additional interest.

4. It is with satisfaction we learn that the Secretary of State for the Colonies has laid before the Queen the petition passed by the Legislature last Session, praying Her Majesty to use her influence to obtain for this Island, privileges in respect of shipping, similar to those which have been conceded by the French Government to the Province of Canada, and also that the question of extending those privileges to vessels built in any of Her Majesty's North American Provinces is under the consideration of the Government of France.

5. We regret that the Colonial Minister should have taken such a view of the Report of the Commissioners appointed by the Queen to inquire into the differences between landlord and tenant, as to lead him to intimate that they have exceeded their powers, and that His Grace cannot, in consequence, recommend

that the Royal assent should be given to the two Acts passed during the last Session of this Legislature, which had for their object the confirmation and carrying into effect the provisions of the Award of Her Majesty's Royal Commissioners.

6. When the papers relating to this subject are laid before us, they will receive that grave consideration which their importance demands; and we assure your Excellency that our most serious and earnest deliberations will be devoted to a question fraught, as this is, with such interest to our constituents and the Colony at large; and that we will be actuated by a determination to obtain a solution of a question the unsettled state of which has so long retarded the prosperity of this Colony.

7. We thank your Excellency for having directed the Estimates for the present year, and the Public Accounts for the past, to be laid before us.

8. We regret to learn that the expenditure for the year that has just expired, has largely exceeded the revenue, and also that the revenue has fallen short of that of the preceding twelve months,—which is no doubt mainly to be attributed to the derangement of our commerce, the result of that fratricidal and devastating war which is now raging in the neighboring Republic.

9. The important subject of Education, with the large and increasing expenditure which the maintenance of this department of the public service entails on the Colony, shall receive our deliberate attention.

10. The financial condition of this Island will receive our most serious attention; and we will also take into our consideration the adoption of such measures as will tend to the equalization of the revenue and expenditure, and the due maintenance of the public credit.

11. When the correspondence on the subject of the initiation of money votes in the House of Assembly is laid before us, this matter will receive the consideration that its importance requires.

12. We are glad that Her Majesty has been pleased to grant the Royal allowance to the Act for changing the constitution of the Legislative Council by rendering the same elective, and we are of opinion the country will have more confidence in their deliberations, now that they are elected by the voice of the people.

13. The measure for the registration of votes, when submitted to us, will receive our attentive consideration.

And the said report being again read,

The Hon. G. Coles moved, to amend the said report, by striking out the whole of the fifth paragraph of the said Address, and substituting the following:—

“We regret that the labors of the Land Commissioners appointed by the Queen to inquire into the difficulties between Landlord and Tenant, should not as yet have been followed by any beneficial result.”

Mills polled his vote for Haszard and Macleannan, which said vote was erroneously entered for Macleannan and Muirhead; and also that Charles Peters polled his vote for the said petitioning Candidate, which vote was not so returned by the Sheriff; and further, that John MacWilliams, Inspector for Cornelius Howat, Esquire, a Candidate at said Election for the Fourth Electoral District of Prince County, at the Polling Division held on Township No. 28, on said Fourth District, polled his vote for the petitioning Candidate, Daniel Green, and that such vote was specially entered upon the Poll book for said Polling Division, at Township No. 28, and duly returned to the Sheriff, but omitted by him when casting up the total number of votes on the declaration day; and WHEREAS it appears that on the said declaration day, the Sheriff of Prince County at his Court held at Saint Eleanor's on the Twenty-fourth day of January last past, for the purpose of declaring the Candidates duly elected for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, did declare James Muirhead Esquire, to have polled 212 votes, and Daniel Green Esquire to have polled 208 votes; and whereas it appears that by deducting from the number so returned for the said James Muirhead, the votes of the said Nathaniel Pearson, George Daull, John Macfadyen, Albert Anderson and Benjamin S. Mills, the number of votes remaining for the said James Muirhead would be 207; and by adding to the number returned for Daniel Green, the votes

of the said Nathaniel Pearson, George Doull, Charles Peters, Charles Pope and John Macwilliams, the number of votes for the said Daniel Green would be 213, thus giving to the said Daniel Green a clear majority of six votes over the said James Muirhead :

THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the said Daniel Green is entitled by law to take his seat in this House as a Member for the said Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, and that the said Sheriff of the said County be directed forthwith to appear at the Bar of this House, and amend his return to the Writ of Election for the said District by striking out the name of the said James Muirhead, and inserting that of the said Daniel Green as a Member returned for the said District.

And the said report being again read,

The Hon. *J. Longworth* moved to amend the same by striking out of the said report all that relates to the vote of John Macwilliams, and inserting the following in lieu thereof :

“The vote of John Macwilliams polled at Township No. 28, at the late General Election of Members for the House of Assembly, and duly returned to the Sheriff as a special vote for Daniel Green, should have been added to the votes polled for said Daniel Green, by the Sheriff at his Court held at Saint Eleanor's on the 24th day of January last ; but inasmuch as there is not sufficient evidence that the said Sheriff called the said vote to the notice of James Muirhead Esquire, at the said Court, the same can not be taken into consideration by this House.”

The Hon. *J. C. Pope* moved that the words proposed to be struck out of the report do stand part of the question.

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon;

Pursuant to order, the Sheriff of Prince County attended at the Bar, and amended his return to the Writ of Election for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County by expunging the name of James Muirhead, Esquire, and inserting in lieu thereof the name of Daniel Green, Esquire, as a Member for the said Fifth Electoral District of Prince County.

Mr Green, having been so returned, then appeared at the Bar, and having been led into the body of the House and introduced to the Speaker, by Mr Maclellan and the Hon. *J. C. Pope*, two of the Members, took the Oaths and his seat.

On motion of the Hon. J. H. Gray, the House came to a Resolution as followeth:

made by him to the Writ of Election for the said Fifth Electoral District by substituting the name of Daniel Green for that of James Muirhead: *Resolved*, That this House, when in Committee of Supply, will vote a sufficient sum to pay the Costs necessarily incurred by the said Daniel Green in making good his claim to his seat as a Member of this House.

Ordered, That Mr Green have leave to absent himself from this House until Tuesday next,

And then the House adjourned until tomorrow, at ten o'clock.

WHEREAS it appears by a Despatch from His Grace the Secretary of State, addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Colony, dated the 9th day of August, 1862, that His Grace has deemed it his duty not to submit the Act passed by the Legislature of this Colony in its last Session, for confirming the Award of the Royal Commissioners who were appointed to settle the Land

Question; and WHEREAS this House is of opinion that the said Award, if acted upon and carried out in accordance with its declared intention and spirit, is calculated to advance the best interests of this Colony; and the said Award having been made in pursuance of a Commission issued by Her Majesty the Queen, and based upon certain known terms and agreements entered into between Her Majesty's Imperial Government, the Tenantry of this Island (through the medium of the House of Assembly), and certain Proprietors of Land in this Colony.—And the question having been raised on the part of the said tenantry, as to whether the said Award in its present shape and form does not operate in Law as an Instrument or adjudication binding in Law upon the Proprietors of lands who have agreed to the submission upon which the said Award is based, it becomes essentially necessary to the well being of the Colony that constitutional means be taken by which a legal and authoritative Judicial decision may be obtained under the sanction of Her Majesty's Imperial Government, upon the question of the legality of the said Award:

RESOLVED, therefore, that an humble Address be prepared and forwarded to Her Majesty the Queen, praying that Her Majesty would be graciously pleased to give Her Royal sanction to the Act so passed by the Legislature of this Island, for confirming the said Award, unless the Proprietors intended to be affected thereby shall prove before some judicial tribunal to be named or empowered by the Imperial Government, for that purpose, that the said Award of the said Royal Commissioners for the settlement of the Land Question is not binding on them as an authoritative award or decision.

And the said report being again read,

The Hon. G. *Coles* moved to amend the same, by striking out all after the word "Question," in the Eleventh line of the said reported Resolution, and substituting the following:

“Resolved, as the opinion of this House, That the only apparent means of relieving the Tenantry from the proprietary bondage in this Island, is by the provisions of the Land Purchase Act, and a loan guaranteed by the Imperial Government as recommended by the Royal Commissioners.”

The Hon. *J. C. Pope* moved that the words proposed to be struck out, do stand part of the question.

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on Private Bills, having under their consideration a Bill to incorporate the Marine Insurance Company of Prince Edward Island, submit—That the Bill is of a private nature; but inasmuch as the fees upon Private Bills, more especially those for the Incorporation of Joint Stock or other business Companies, have not heretofore been uniformly exacted by the House, your Committee recommend that the said Bill be exempt from such Fees.

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on Private Bills, having under their consideration the Bill to incorporate King Hiram Lodge, No. 1123, of Free and Accepted Masons, of Saint Eleanor's in Prince Edward Island, submit—That the Bill is of a private nature; but inasmuch as the fees upon Bills for the incorporation of Societies or Companies formed for the promotion of moral or charitable objects, have not heretofore been uniformly exacted by the House, they recommend that this Bill be exempt from said fees.

By Mr *John Yeo*—A petition of divers inhabitants of Townships Nos. 13, 14 and part of 15, praying for a grant to repair Sheep River road.

A petition of George Burleigh, Township No. 12, praying for a grant to complete a road across certain farms to his residence.

Ordered, That the three last preceding petitions do lie on the table.

Resolved, That the House will, on Thursday next, take into consideration the several private petitions before the House.

The Hon. J. H. Gray, from the Committee appointed to join a Committee of the Council, to prepare an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, praying that Her Majesty will be graciously pleased to give Her Royal Assent to the Act passed by the Legislature of this Island in the Session of 1862, for confirming the Award of the Royal Commissioners appointed to settle the Land Question, unless cause to the contrary be shown before a judicial tribunal, by the Proprietors to be affected by the said Award, presented to the House the draft of an Address as prepared by the Joint Committee, which Address being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT
MAJESTY.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN;

We, your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach your Majesty and most humbly to submit to your Royal consideration, that in the year 1859, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island submitted to your Majesty an humble Address, in which it was represented that—

“In certain despatches from one of your Majesty's ministers, the Right Honourable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Baronet, Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated Downing Street, 20th October and 3d December, 1858, the Right Honourable Baronet therein states, that the whole question of the land tenures in this Island is engaging his most anxious attention, and that it would give him unfeigned pleasure to receive such suggestions for

their amicable settlement as could be accepted by Your Majesty's Government.

“Having taken these despatches into consideration, after mature deliberation, and with an earnest design to terminate the disputes which have so long disturbed the peace and harmony of the Colony, the House have adopted the following resolutions:

“Whereas certain questions arising out of the original grants of the lands in this Island, severally called the Escheat question, the Fishery Reserve question, and the Quit Rent question, have for many years caused much discussion, and differences of opinion amongst the people of this Island, and many delusive projects and impracticable measures have been and are from time to time enunciated respecting such questions, whereby the tenantry have been and are greatly imposed upon and induced to support the propounders of such measures, under the delusive hope that by doing so they will be relieved of the payment of rent; and the attention both of the people and Legislature being occupied with such deceptive schemes, measures intended to develop the resources of the Colony are not only neglected, but a state of society, equally opposed to the moral, social and political welfare of the people, and their true interests, is produced: And whereas various despatches have for a great number of years declared that Her Majesty's Government will not consent to any compulsory interference with the lands and rights of the proprietors, and which has been strongly reiterated in the despatch of Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, now Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated 20th October, 1858, and 3d December, 1858, from which it is clear that any measures for the benefit of the tenantry must result from an amicable arrangement with the proprietors: And whereas the agitation of hostile measures, such as escheat, fishery reserves, and quitrents, must not only result, as they always have done, in leading the tenantry into costs and trouble, without in any way ameliorating their condition, but will also engender a feeling in the proprietors rendering them disinclined to listen to proposals, which, if such agitation were at an end, they would be likely to entertain: And whereas Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, in his despatches above referred to, while refusing to sanction measures which in England are considered inconsistent with the rights of property, has expressed the readiness of Her Majesty's Government, to co-operate with the Legislature in furthering measures for the settlement of the land tenures,

if conceived in a spirit of fairness and conciliation to all parties :

- "Therefore Resolved, 1st. That an humble address be presented to Her Majesty, praying that Her Majesty will be pleased to direct a Commission to some discreet and impartial person, not connected with the Island or its affairs, to inquire into the existing relations between landlord and tenant, and to negotiate with the proprietors for such abatement of present liabilities, and for such terms for enabling the tenantry to convert their leaseholds into freeholds, as, without infringing on the rights of the landlords, may be fairly and reasonably asked for to ameliorate the condition of the tenantry.
- "2d. Resolved, That in the opinion of this House the basis of any such arrangement should be a large remission of arrears of rents now due; and secondly, the giving every tenant holding under a long lease an option of purchasing his land at a certain rate, at any time he might find it convenient to do so.
- "3d. Resolved, That a remission of arrears of rent may be reasonably asked, inasmuch as the existence of these arrears, although it is due partly to an unwillingness of the tenants to pay rent, under the idea that cheat or some other delusive scheme would enable them to evade; yet it is also due in part to the laches and remissness of the landlords and their agents in not enforcing it; and because, in many cases, the arrears, however incurred, amount to so large a sum that the exacting them would prove ruinous to a large number of loyal and industrious people, and would further entirely put it out of their power to avail themselves of the plan suggested in subsequent resolutions for purchasing their farms
- "4th. Resolved, That as the circumstances of the tenantry would not, in general, enable them to pay down any large portion of the purchase money, the best and only means for converting the tenures into freeholds, lies in the adoption of the plan which would practically constitute every farm a savings bank for its owner, in which he could from time to time invest his savings, at interest, towards the purchase of his farm,—an arrangement which could be effected by the following means, viz.: that the landlords should agree to permit the tenants to purchase their farms for such sum per acre as shall be fixed upon; and providing further, that when any tenant (whose rent was paid up) should be desirous of paying any
- sum, not being less than ten pounds, towards the purchase of his land, he should have the option of doing so; and that the interest on the ten pounds, or other amount so paid, should thenceforth go in reduction of his yearly rent, and so on for every payment on account of purchase until the whole was paid, when he should receive his deed, and that similar covenants should be inserted in all future leases for terms over 40 years; such an arrangement would not only give the tenant the advantage of paying an instalment of his purchase money, and at the same time reducing his rent whenever he chose, without subjecting himself to the vexation and costs incident to cases of inability to meet instalments agreed to be paid at a particular day, but would, in the opinion of this House, gradually, but certainly, change the tenures into freeholds, without the aid of loans and the expensive subsistence of public offices, by which heavy liabilities have already been, and would, if persevered in to a much greater extent, be imposed on the public finances.
- "We do therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be pleased to take the foregoing matters into Your Royal consideration, and to appoint some fit and proper person or persons, Commissioner or Commissioners to inquire into the relations of landlord and tenant in this Island, and negotiate with the proprietors of township lands for the fixing some certain rate of price at which every tenant may at any time, have the option of purchasing his land, or of paying instalments of such purchase, and thereby gradually reducing the yearly rent until the whole price thereof is paid; and also to negotiate with the proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent, in such cases, and on such townships as the said Commissioner or Commissioners, from the circumstances of the tenantry or otherwise, may deem reasonable and expedient; and also to make such report respecting the Fishery Reserve question, and other questions relating to the township lands of this Island, as we confidently hope will effect a final settlement thereof, and prevent all agitation regarding the same in future.

That subsequently to the transmission of this address, to Your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, the following correspondence took place, and was duly transmitted by His Grace the

Duke of Newcastle, to the Lieutenant Governor of this Island:—

"No 11.

"Downing Street, 6th Sept., 1859.

"SIR;

"I have to acknowledge Sir D. Daly's despatch, No. 29, of the 13th May last, addressed to Sir E. B. Lytton, transmitting an address to Her Majesty from the House of Assembly, in pursuance of certain resolutions of the House, praying that Her Majesty would direct a Commission to inquire into the existing relations of landlord and tenant in the Island, with a view to the passing of remedial measures. The House of Assembly also propose that this Commission should direct its attention to the Fishery Reserve question.

"The resignation of Her Majesty's late Government has prevented an earlier answer to your despatch.

"The Assembly, in their address, not only pray for the appointment of a Commission, but they likewise indicate, in detail, the measures which, in their opinion, should form the basis of that arrangement between landlord and tenant which the Commission should endeavor to bring about. Now, without expressing any opinion adverse to the appointment of such a Commission, I am convinced that any prospect of a beneficial result from its labours, would be nullified if its action were fettered by such conditions as the Assembly would thus impose.

"I cannot advise Her Majesty to entertain the question, unless it is fully understood that the Commission are at liberty to propose any measure which they may themselves deem desirable.

"I have communicated this correspondence to Sir S. Cunard, as representing the landowners in this country, with a letter of which I enclose a copy.

"I am directed by the Duke of Newcastle to transmit to you a copy of a correspondence between the Government of Prince Edward Island and this Department, upon the subject of the appointment of a Commission to propose measures of arrangement between landlords and tenants in Prince Edward Island.

"With reference to this communication, I am to suggest that you will call a private meeting of such

landowners as may be in this country, and ascertain whether there are any concessions which they are ready to make, with a view of bringing these questions to an amicable issue.

"With reference to my despatch No. 11, of the 6th Sept. last, in which I informed you that I had communicated to Sir Samuel Cunard the correspondence which had taken place upon the subject of the appointment of a Commission to propose measures of arrangement between landlords and tenants in Prince Edward Island, I transmit to you the copy of a letter which has been addressed to me by Sir Samuel Cunard, and several other proprietors of land in the Island.

"The proprietors, it will be seen, do not think that the appointment of a Commission in the manner proposed by the House of Assembly in their Address of the 9th of May last, would be the most desirable mode of proceeding, as the labours of such a Commission could only terminate in a report, the conclusions of which would not be binding on any of the parties interested. They suggest, therefore, instead, that three Commissioners or Referees should be appointed,—one by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and the third by the proprietors,—and that they should be invested with power to hear and determine all the questions in dispute. It is further suggested that the expense of the Commission should be divided equally between the Crown, the tenants and the proprietors.

"If the consent of all the parties can be obtained to this proposal, I believe that it may offer the means of bringing these long-pending disputes to a determination. But it will be necessary, before going further into the matter, to be assured that the tenants will accept, as binding, the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of them; and, as far as possible, that the Legislature of the Colony would concur in any measures which might be required to give validity to that decision. It would be very desirable also that any Commissioner who might be named by the House of Assembly, on behalf of the tenants, should go into the inquiry unfettered by any conditions, such as were proposed in the Assembly last year. I have therefore to request that you will ascertain and report to me whether the tenants of Prince Edward Island,

or the House of Assembly, on their behalf, are prepared to agree to the proposed reference.

"My LORD DUKE;

"We have been furnished with a copy of a memorial addressed to Her Majesty by the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, on the subject of the questions which have arisen in connexion with the original grants of land in that Island, and the rights of proprietors in respect thereof.

"We observe that the House of Assembly have suggested that Her Majesty should appoint one or more Commissioners to inquire into the relations of landlord and tenant in the Island, and to negotiate with the proprietors of township lands for fixing a certain rate of price at which every tenant might have the option of purchasing his lands; and also to negotiate with the proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent in such cases as the Commissioners might deem reasonable, and proposing that the Commissioners should report the result to Her Majesty.

"As large proprietors of land in this Island, we beg to state that we shall readily acquiesce in any arrangement that may be practicable, for the purpose of settling the various questions alluded to in the memorial from the House of Assembly; but we do not think that the appointment of Commissioners in the manner proposed by them, would be the most desirable mode of procedure, as the labours of such Commission would only terminate in a report, which would not be binding on any of the parties interested.

"We, therefore, beg to suggest, that instead of the mode proposed by the House of Assembly, three Commissioners or Referees be appointed,—one to be named by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and one by the proprietors of land,—and that these Commissioners should have power to enter into all the inquiries that may be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which may be brought before them, giving, of course, to the parties interested an opportunity of being heard.

"We should propose that the expense of the Commission should be borne by the three parties to the reference, that is to say, in equal thirds; and we feel assured that there will be no difficulty in secur-

ing the adhesion of all the landed proprietors to a settlement on this footing.

"The precise mode of carrying it into execution, if adopted, would require consideration, and upon that subject we trust that your Grace would lend your valuable assistance.

The foregoing correspondence having been received in the Island,—on the 14th April, the following Resolutions were passed by the Assembly:

"Prince Edward Island, House of Assembly,
"Saturday, 11th April, 1860.

"Resolved, That this House deems it expedient to concur in the suggestions offered for the consideration of the House of Assembly, as set forth in the despatch from his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, dated 'Downing Street, 21st March, 1860,' on the subject of the proposed appointment of a Commission of inquiry for the arrangement of the long-pending disputes between landlords and tenants of this Island.

"The House of Assembly therefore agree to the appointment of three Commissioners,—one by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and the third by the proprietors,—the expense of the Commission to be equally divided between the Imperial Government, the general revenue of the Colony, and the proprietors.

"The House of Assembly also agree on the part of the tenantry, to abide by the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of them, and pledge themselves to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision.

"Resolved, That in order to carry into effect the suggestions of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, as set forth in his despatch to his Excellency Lieutenant Governor Dundas, of the 21st March last, for settling the long-pending questions between landlords and tenants in this Island, this House do hereby name the Honorable Joseph Howe, of Nova Scotia, as referee or arbitrator on behalf of the tenantry of this Island, to act under the Commission to be issued by Her Majesty's Government, as set forth in the despatch referred to, the other two referees or arbitrators under the said Commission to be named, as intimated in the said des-

patch; one by Her Majesty's Imperial Government, and the other, by the proprietors.

That the receipt of the said resolutions was acknowledged by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, in the following despatch:

"No. 23. Downing Street, 16th June, 1860."

"Sir;

"I have had under my consideration your despatches, No. 15, of the 16th of April, and No. 22, of the 30th April. In the former despatch you enclose a resolution, in which the Assembly agrees to the proposed appointment of Commissioners on the subject of tenures of lands, binds itself to abide by the decision of those Commissioners, or the majority of them, and pledges itself to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision. In the second despatch you inform me, that a short Act has since passed through both Houses, giving effect to the foregoing resolution.

"I cannot do otherwise than express my sense of the promptitude and completeness with which the House of Assembly has thus given its support to the plan devised, in the hope of putting an end to the differences which have prevailed in Prince Edward Island.

"In Mr. Howe, the Assembly, acting on behalf of the tenantry, have selected a Commissioner whose known ability, and prominent public position must well qualify him for the proposed inquiry.

"From Sir Samuel Cunard I have received a letter, of which a copy is enclosed, naming as the Commissioner selected by the proprietors, Mr. John William Ritchie of Halifax, who, I doubt not, will honorably discharge his functions.

"I have written, in exercise of the choice belonging to Her Majesty's Government, to request Mr. John Hamilton Gray, of New Brunswick, to undertake the remaining office of Commissioner. Mr. Gray has recently conducted another public inquiry, with a degree of ability, carefulness and justice, which entitles him to the confidence of all concerned in the intended investigation.

"Although the privilege of selecting each Commissioner has been conferred on a separate authority, so as the better to ensure satisfaction with the composition of the Commission, yet it is my view, and I doubt not will be that of the Commissioners themselves, that none of them ought to be regarded as the special advocate of one interest, but rather

that the whole should devote their efforts to framing such recommendations, as shall be demanded by the equity of the case, and be conducive to the general good of all classes of the community. Their conclusions, whatever they may be, will possess double weight, if happily they should be unanimous.

"The time of meeting in Prince Edward Island will be best determined by the Commissioners themselves, who will be able to communicate with you upon any points which they may wish to ascertain, as bearing on the subject of the most convenient period for the purpose.

"It will be desirable that previous arrangements should be made as far as practicable, for having at hand all the witnesses and all documentary evidence, which the Commission is likely to require, so that the time needed for their actual sitting in the Island may be reduced within the most moderate compass, consistent with the due and complete accomplishment of the inquiry.

"I shall take an early opportunity of forwarding to you a Commission under the Royal Sign Manual, containing the appointment of the several gentlemen named to serve on the Commission.

"VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the faith. To all to whom these presents shall come, greeting.

"Whereas we have been moved by the Assembly of Our Island of Prince Edward, to appoint Commissioners to inquire into the differences now prevailing in Our said Island, relating to the rights of landowners and tenants, in our said Island, with a view to the settlement of the same on just and equitable principles. And whereas the said Assembly has further, by a resolution dated the 14th day of April last, set forth its agreement to abide by the decision of any such Commissioners, or the majority of them, and to concur in whatever measures may be requisite for giving validity to their decision: And whereas it is highly desirable that the said differences should be adjusted

"Now know ye, that We, taking the premises into Our Royal consideration, are graciously pleased to

nominate and appoint, and do by these presents nominate and appoint Our trusty and well-beloved John Hamilton Gray, Esquire, Our trusty and well-beloved Joseph Howe, Esquire, and our trusty and well-beloved John William Ritchie, Esquire, to be Our Commissioners for enquiring into the said differences, and for adjusting the same on fair and equitable principles.

“ Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this 25th day of June, 1860, in the 24th year of Our Reign.

By Her Majesty's command,
(Signed) NEWCASTLE.

That the said Commissioners duly executed your Majesty's said Commission, and on the 18th day of July, 1861, transmitted to His Grace the Duke of Newcastle their report and Award. That therein the said Commissioners, among other matters, reported and awarded as follows :

- “ 1st. That tenants who tender 20 years' purchase to their landlords *in cash*, shall be entitled to a discount of 10 per cent., and a deed conveying the fee simple of their farms. Where the tenant prefers to pay by instalments, he shall have the privilege, but the landlord shall not be bound to accept a less sum than £10 at any one time ; nor shall the tenant have a longer term than 10 years to liquidate the debt.
- “ 2nd. That tenants whose lands are not worth 20 years purchase, and who therefore decline to pay that amount, may tender to their landlords what they consider the value of their farms. If the landlord declines to accept the amount offered, the value shall be adjusted by arbitration. If the sum tendered is increased by the award, the tenant shall pay the expenses; if it is not, they shall be paid by the landlord. If the sum awarded is tendered in cash, a discount of five per cent. to be allowed ; if not, payment to be made by yearly instalments of not less than £10, the term of payment in no case to exceed 10 years.
- “ 3dly. That the rent shall be reduced in proportion to the instalments paid, but no credit shall be allowed for any such instalments, until the three years' arrears allowed by this award have been paid, nor while any rent accruing after the adjustment of the value of the farm remains due.
- “ 4thly. That proprietors who hold not more than 1,500 acres, or those who desire to retain particular lands to that extent, shall not be compelled to part with such under this award.

“ 5thly. That leases under a term of less than 40 years shall not be affected by this award.

“ 6thly. That all arrears of rent due by the tenants previous to the 1st of May, 1858, be remitted.”

The award having been thus duly transmitted to your Majesty, His Grace the Duke of Newcastle forwarded a despatch, bearing date, Downing Street, April 5th, 1862, to the Lieutenant Governor of this Island, covering a draft bill, from certain proprietors who were parties to the said Commission, as a substitute to be taken in lieu of the Award; the said Proprietors objecting to be bound by the decision of the Commissioners.

That the Legislature of this Island passed, during the session of 1862, two Acts, intituled respectively, “ An Act to give to effect to the report of the Commissioners on the Land Question,” and “ An Act to facilitate the operation in certain particulars of the Award or Report made by certain Commissioners, to settle and adjust differences, respecting some of the Township Lands in this Colony; and a minute of the Executive Council of this Island, dated July 22d, 1862, was forwarded to His Grace, the Secretary of State, of which the following is a copy :

[Extract from Minutes of the Executive Council.]

COUNCIL CHAMBER, 22nd July, 1862.

AT A MEETING OF COUNCIL—PRESENT :

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Hon. Mr Palmer, The Hon. Mr Laird,
“ Mr Gray, “ Mr Pope,
“ Mr Yeo, “ Mr Simpson
“ Mr Haviland.

“ The Board having taken into consideration the proposed Bill, intituled ‘ A Bill for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the reversion of their Farms,’ submitted by Sir Samuel Cunard, on behalf of himself and certain other Proprietors of Lands in this Island, and transmitted to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in a despatch from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, bearing date the 5th day of April, 1862, have to report that they cannot consistently recommend His Excellency to hold out any expectations by which Sir Samuel Cunard, and his associate Proprietors, or His Grace the Duke of Newcastle might be induced to believe that the Legislature of this Colony would sanction any measure respecting the Land Question reported upon by the Land Commissioners, which might differ essentially from the principles embodied in their report.

"The House of Assembly at its last Session, deeming the faith of Her Majesty's Government pledged to this Colony to maintain and carry out the Award of the Commissioners in its true meaning and spirit, have, by an overwhelming majority, passed a Bill for its confirmation. The Legislature at the same time passed a Bill to facilitate the execution of the Award in that part which provides for ascertaining, by the medium of an Arbitration, the price of Land, in cases where the Proprietor and Tenant cannot mutually agree between themselves; a provision of this nature appearing indispensable to give full effect to the method of valuation, in this respect, awarded by the Commissioners.

"In the Bill proposed by Sir Samuel Cunard, above referred to, it is recited that the said Commissioners "exceeded the authority intended to be given them by the Assembly and the said Proprietors." This assumption on the part of the Proprietors appears to be founded upon rules of construction merely applicable to instruments of a certain and well-defined legal character, but which rules would appear to be totally inapplicable to a report or adjudication proceeding from a Commission acting under the extraordinary powers conferred upon the Land Commissioners. These powers were never intended to be restrained or limited by any formal or arbitrary legal rules. By reference to the words of the Commission it will appear that the Commissioners were empowered to enquire into the existing differences between Landowners and Tenants, and to adjust "the same on fair and equitable principles." From the language here employed the powers conferred upon the Commissioners were of an unlimited description; and, in the opinion of the Board, amply sufficient to enable them to define any mode of settlement, even one of a purely equitable character. The Board know of no more equitable principle than that of an impartial valuation of each Tenant's farm.

"For the Commissioners to have attempted this, by their own personal labours, would have been a work of almost endless duration, and incalculable expense. Having, then, established clearly the principle of valuation, they found that the object could be accomplished in shorter time, and at much less expense, by the intervention of Valuers, in whose judgment, also, more confidence would likely be reposed, from the circumstance of their being Judges chosen by the parties themselves. In order that this, the principal element in the Award, might not in any instance be rendered in-

effective by the obstinacy of either party in the issue, refusing to nominate his Arbitrator, the Legislature provided a means as simple and just as could be devised, by which the intentions of the Commissioners might be carried out.

"These enactments on the part of the local Legislature, it will be observed, do not in any manner vary or trench upon the principles of the Award; and they have been passed, not only for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Award in fuller detail, but as being essentially necessary, in view of the Despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, of the date of the 21st March, 1860.

"By a passage contained in the Despatch of the Duke of Newcastle to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, dated the 7th of February, 1862, His Grace appears to apprehend that the arbitration system prescribed by the Commissioners, would necessitate a multiplicity of separate local arbitrations, which, in the estimation of His Grace, would constitute insuperable objections against this mode of adjustment. The Board, however, see no reason to apprehend that in the practical working of the measure, many of these arbitrations would be called for. On the contrary, they are of opinion, that should arbitrations be resorted to, two or three cases on a Township would have the effect of establishing a price or prices that would become the respective standards of value on that Township.

"The Board feel impelled to express their hope, that His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, in considering the Bills which have been passed by the Legislature of this Colony for the purpose of giving effect to the Award of the Commissioners, will bear in mind, that the differences which the Commissioners were appointed to finally determine, have, for upwards of half a century, exercised a most baneful influence upon this Colony, and that the people generally hailed with much satisfaction the prospect of having these differences adjusted by a mode to be pointed out by the very talented Commissioners to whom they were referred, — and that should anything occur to prevent such adjustment, and the confirmation of their unanimous, able and impartial Report, to which the Legislature, by these Bills, seeks to give effect, the consequences will be of a very serious nature, and result in causing much anxiety to Her Majesty's Ministers, and also to those to whom may be intrusted the Government of the Colony.

"A true extract, which I certify:

"CHARLES DESBRIAY, C.E.C."

That the said Bills were not submitted by your Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies for your Royal allowance, for the reasons set forth in the following despatch :

"No. 120 Downing Street, 9th August, 1862

"SIR;

"I have received your Despatch No. 45, of the 25th of June, enclosing two Bills, passed with suspending clauses by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, intituled Cap. IV, An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners on the Land Question; and Cap. XII, An Act to facilitate the operation in certain particulars of the Award or Report made by certain Commissioners to settle and adjust differences respecting some of the Township Lands in this Colony.

"In forwarding these Acts, you informed me that you would shortly communicate to me a minute of your responsible advisers, explaining the reason for framing these measures; and this you have since done in your Despatch No. 52, of the 23d of July; I am therefore now in a position to communicate to you the conclusion to which I have been led.

"It appears from the minute of your Ministers, that they consider the so-called Award of the Land Commissioners to be binding upon the Proprietors, and the Legislature; and on this ground they state that they are unable to entertain Sir Samuel Cunard's proposal for enabling the Tenants in Prince Edward Island to acquire freehold interest in their holdings, which was transmitted to you in my Despatch of the 5th of April last, No. 103.

"I very much regret that it is not in my power to concur in the views by which your Government have been led to prepare those Bills: or to advise Her Majesty to bring them into operation by giving her assent to them.

"Your advisers appear to consider that H. M. Government had proposed to the Proprietors of land, and that those Proprietors had consented to place themselves and their interests absolutely in the hands of the Commissioners. This, however, was far from being the case.

"The Proprietors consented that Commissioners should be appointed 'to enter into all the enquiries that might be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which might be brought before them, giving, of course to the parties interested, an opportunity of being heard.'

"The main questions thus to be decided upon were: First, at what rate Tenants ought to be allowed to

acquire freehold interests in their property; and next, what amount of arrears of Rent should be remitted by the Landlords.

"On the first and most important of these questions, the Commissioners professed themselves unable to come to any conclusion; and instead of deciding it, they recommended, virtually, that it should be decided by other Arbitrators, to be hereafter nominated. This, however, is not what they were charged to do. They were authorized by the Proprietors to make an Award themselves; but they were not authorized to transfer the duty of making that Award to others. The trust confided to them was evidently a personal one. The Proprietors relied on the skill, knowledge, and fairness of the three gentlemen appointed in 1860; but they could not, therefore, be called upon, in deference to these gentlemen's opinion, to confide their interests even to Arbitrators specially designated in the Award, much less to persons whose very mode of appointment is undetermined by it.

"This objection might, of course, be waived by the Proprietors; but it is not waived; and, being insisted upon, I am obliged to admit that it is conclusive;—and I am bound further to say, that, in my opinion, an objection founded not on any technical rule of law, but on a sound and indisputable principle of justice—the principle, namely, that a person who has voluntarily submitted his case to the decision of one man, cannot, therefore, be compelled, without his consent, to transfer it to the decision of another.

"It is, therefore, impossible for me to advise Her Majesty to sanction the two Acts which you have forwarded, and which, of course, are intended to render the Award obligatory on all who consented to the reference.

"I must instruct you, therefore, however unwillingly, to treat the Commissioners' Award only as an expression of opinion, which, however valuable as such, cannot be made legally binding on the parties concerned; and which, therefore, ought not to be allowed to stand in the way of any other proposal which promises an amicable settlement of the question.

"It was under these circumstances, and with these impressions, that I forwarded to you the proposal made by Sir Samuel Cunard, in hopes that it might be found to furnish a basis of agreement in lieu of the recommendations of the Commissioners.

"Your Government refuse to consider this proposal, not, as I understand, because they think it in itself inadmissible, but because they consider themselves

as bound to give effect to the Commissioners' Award.

"This Award being now out of the way, I have to request that you will bring Sir Samuel Cunard's proposal under their re-consideration. I do not think it desirable that I should myself express any opinion upon its merits. I will only observe, that it is in some respects more favorable to the Tenants than the Commissioners' Award; and that it will give me great pleasure to learn that it is likely to furnish a solution of these difficulties, which, so long as they are unsolved, must continue to obstruct the progress of the Colony.

"This conclusion which I have adopted respecting these Acts, renders it unnecessary that I should do more than acknowledge your Despatch No 46, of the 25th of June, enclosing a memorial from Mr Haythorne against the Act (Cap. XII.) to facilitate the operation of the Award.

"I have, &c. &c.,

That from the foregoing Despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, we conclude that the inability of His Grace to submit for your Majesty's Royal allowance the Act of the Legislature passed to give effect to the Award of the Commissioners on the Land Question, is grounded solely on the objection set forth in His Grace's Despatch, as being urged against the said Award by the Proprietors who had agreed to be bound thereby; and also, that the said objection is one which, in the opinion of His Grace, might be waived by the said Proprietors.

Under these circumstances, the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly beg respectfully to submit to your Majesty, that in the negotiation, conducted by your Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Lieut. Governor of this Island, respecting the Land Commission, it was expressly stipulated by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, in his Despatch of the 6th September, 1850, already referred to, that it should be "fully understood that the Commissioners are at liberty to propose any measure which they may themselves deem desirable." And that in the letter of Sir Samuel Cunard, and other Proprietors, addressed, on the 18th of February, 1860, to His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, it was expressly agreed to by the said Proprietors, that they would "readily acquiesce in any arrangement that may be practicable for the purpose of settling the various questions alluded to in the memorial of

the House of Assembly. That viewing these declarations in connection with the authority conferred by your Majesty's Commission, wherein the Commissioners were empowered to enquire into the said differences, and to adjust the same on fair and equitable principles, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly most humbly conceive that no competent legal tribunal would decide that the equitable principles agreed to and determined upon by the Commissioners, as above recited, were not within the fair scope of the authority conferred upon them.

That your Majesty's loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, most humbly submit to your Majesty—That the Award of the said Commissioners, who were appointed by warrant under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, was made under a reference solemnly agreed to by your Majesty, by the Proprietors, and by the House of Assembly of this Island; and that, therefore, according to the well-known legal maxim, "*Omnia præsumuntur rite et solemniter esse acta donec probetur in contrarium,*" the said Award should be considered to be good and valid in law.

That we do not seek by the passing of a law to compel compliance on the part of the Proprietors, to an Award which is in itself liable to an objection founded on any principle of justice or equity; but we most humbly submit that the question, as to whether the Award of the Commissioners can or can not be made legally binding on the parties concerned, is one proper for the consideration of your Majesty's Judicial Tribunals.

We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will cause it to be notified to the Proprietors, to be affected by the said Award, that unless cause to the contrary be shewn, before a judicial tribunal, to be provided by your Majesty, your Majesty's allowance will be given to a Bill to give effect to the said Award of your Majesty's Royal Commissioners.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to join a Committee of the Council, to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the said Address to Her Majesty, with His Excellency's favorable recommendation.

Ordered, That the same Committee

who prepared the Address to Her Majesty, be a Committee, on the part of this House, to prepare the said Address to His Excellency

Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated by Message to the Council

Ordered, That the Hon. J. H. Gray do carry the said Message to the Council.

Then the House adjourned until Monday next, at ten o'clock.

A petition of James Wood and others, Trustees of the Minor School, Back Settlement, Tryon, was presented to the House by Mr Howat, and the same was received and read, praying for an allowance to an unlicensed teacher, Henry Lec-ky, for his services as such for one year:

To the Hon. the Speaker of the House of Assembly.

Sir,—Referring to the debate of yesterday evening, in reference to an article which appeared in the *Examiner* of that day, touching the Orange Bill, I beg distinctly to say, for the information of the House, that in the article referred to, which has been attributed to me, the word "infamous" was not used with the view of conveying any reflection whatever upon the proceedings of the Honorable House, but simply in reference to the institution or system of Orangeism. And even in that sense, should the word "infamous" be deemed derogatory to the dignity of the House, I readily withdraw it, and hereby apologize to the House for having allowed it to appear in a newspaper which is considered to be in some measure under my control. As for the other expressions in the article referred to, there was no word used intended particularly for any honorable member of this House; but should the House deem the article, in any part, a breach of its privileges, I beg to apologize for the same

Edward Whelan is the acknowledged Editor of the said Newspaper and writer of the said article, and is guilty of a high contempt and breach of the privileges of this House: **RESOLVED**, THEREFORE, that the said Hon. Edward Whelan be brought to the Bar of this House in custody of the Sergeant-at-Arms and there receive a reprimand from the Speaker of this House, for the contempt aforesaid, and be required to apologize to this House for the same, and that the Speaker do issue his Warrant accordingly.

I addressed a letter to you this morning, Mr. Speaker, and I ask this letter to be returned. I do not wish to make a second apology, and I wish to withdraw that letter.

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Which request not being complied with—

The Hon. E. Whelan then offered an apology in various terms; which being objected to :

Mr Speaker declined receiving the apology proffered, on the grounds that it is not in accordance with the Resolution of the House, and therefore insufficient.

The Hon. J. C. Pope moved that the prisoner be withdrawn.

Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the petition of Angus Stewart and Donald Stewart, of Township No. 47, praying for the alteration of a road which now runs diagonally across their farms.

Your Committee are satisfied that a road opened, as prayed for by a number of the inhabitants of Lot 17, from Capt. Mackinlay's, on the Linkletter road, across the different farms to James Darby's, as is well shown on the plan annexed to the said petition, would be a great public advantage, more particularly to the inhabitants of Linkletter Settlement and Summerside; but in consequence of the very numerous signed petition against the said proposed road, your Committee cannot recommend the opening of it at the present time.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

And Mr Green reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee without making any amendment thereto; which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:

Your Committee appointed to inquire and report on the working of the Worrell Estate and other Public Lands on this Island, having examined the statement of the annual receipts from, and expenditure on account of the several Estates appended to the Accounts of the Commissioner of Public Lands, for the Financial Year just ended; as also the reports of the various Committees on Public Accounts, since the lands came into the hands of the Government, have to report—That the total receipts from the Worrell Estate, for the above period, amount to £14,409 7s 3½d. The expenditure, including interest and loss of land tax, £14,191 1s 6½d,—shewing a surplus of £218 5s 9d in favor of the Estate. £11,969 16s 0d. bearing interest, is due on Bonds, Deeds, &c., and 23,726½ acres remain unsold on said Estate.

The total receipts from Lot 11, for the same period, amount to £1905 15s 1d; and the expenditure, including interest and loss of land tax, £1694 10s 1d,—shewing a surplus of £211 5s 0d in favor of the Estate. £207 17s 11d is due on Bonds, Deeds, &c. and 4110 acres remain on hand unsold.

The total receipts from the Selkirk Estate, for the same period, amount to £6026 9s 8d; and the expenditure, including loss of land tax and interest, £1898 18s 10d,—shewing a surplus of £4127 10s 10d. The amount due on Bonds, Deeds, &c., bearing interest, is £14,931 10s 6d, and 8451½ acres of land remain unsold.

The total receipts from the Winchester Estate, to date, amount to £1104 14s 7d; and the expenditure, including loss of land tax and interest, £767 11s 1d,—shewing a surplus of £337 3s 6d. The amount due on Bonds, Deeds, &c., and bearing interest, is £3214 4s 5d, and 2508 acres of land remain unsold.

Your Committee observe, that no annual interest

statement has been made for the Worrell Estate and Lot 11 As the average annual expenditure, since the said Estates were purchased, is nearly equal to the receipts, and in some years exceed the receipts, your Committee are of opinion that if such statement were made, the balance of interest (if any) to be carried to the credit of said Estates, would be small.

Your Committee have also to remark, that the business connected with Crown Lands has been performed by the Commissioner and his Assistant, and that consequently some small part of the expenses might fairly be charged to Crown Lands,—which has not been done

Your Committee cannot conclude their labors, without remarking that the purchase of Estates on Public account, on which large portions of the land are unsettled, and of little value, cannot but result in heavy loss to the public, unless such lands are purchased at a very low figure; as the annual loss of interest and land tax would soon swallow up the principal invested in such purchases.

And the report being again read, and

A motion being made to resolve that the report be agreed to—

The Hon. *G. Coles* moved, in amendment to the motion, to leave out all after the word “that,” and substitute the following :

Mr Speaker;

The Legislative Council have passed the following Bills without any amendment, viz.:

"An Act to incorporate the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island."

“An Act to alter and amend the Act for the preservation of the Alewives’ Fisheries in this Island.”

And then he withdrew.

The Hon. *J. Longworth*, from the Committee appointed to draw up reasons to be offered to the Council, at a Conference, for disagreeing to their amendment to the Bill intituled “An Act to incorporate the Grand Orange Lodge of Prince Edward Island, and the Subordinate Lodges in connection therewith,” presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk’s table, and is as followeth.—

The Committee appointed to draw up reasons to be offered at a Conference, for disagreeing to the amendment made by the Legislative Council to the Bill intituled “An Act to incorporate the Grand Orange Lodge of Prince Edward Island, and the Subordinate Lodges in connection therewith,” have to submit the following reasons:

First. Because the Act as passed by this House, with a suspending clause, was in accordance with the wishes of the parties upon whose petition it was introduced, and for whose benefit it is intended,—the Bill having been prepared at the instance of the petitioners, and presented to the House with the said clause appended to it.

Secondly. Because it is admitted that the Act in question is the first Act introduced into this Colony, in connection with the Society intended to be incorporated by it; and, without anticipating any objection to the Bill on the part of Her Majesty’s Imperial Government,—there being nothing, in the opinion of the House, objectionable or improper in the Bill,—the House still deems it a wise and expedient course to adopt, considering the interests of the Society itself, and in order to obviate any objections which might possibly be raised against the passing of the Bill on the part of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the ground of its being the first of the kind in this Colony.

Thirdly. Because, although the Bill may not strictly come within the class of Bills which by the Royal Instructions, the Lieutenant Governor is required to

reserve for Her Majesty’s special approval; as the House has no desire to interfere with the legitimate right of the Lieutenant Governor to construe the Instructions intended for his guidance in all such matters, the House therefore conceives that the adoption of the amendment of the Legislative Council may have a tendency to imperil the Bill,

Fourthly. Because the Legislature of this Colony has in many instances (and a case of the kind has occurred during the present Session, in regard to the incorporation of a Bank) passed Acts with suspending clauses, entirely irrespective of the Royal Instructions, and in cases where the Royal Instructions did not require such Acts to be so suspended in their operation; and this course it has deemed it right to take in view of the practical inconvenience which would necessarily arise, if such Acts had been left to their operation, and afterwards disallowed.

Fifthly. Because, whether the Bill in question comes within the purview of the Royal Instructions or not, the power exercised in this instance by the House of Assembly, of suspending its operation until Her Majesty’s pleasure be known, does not in any manner impair the rights or privileges of the Legislature.

And the said report being again read—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts for the year 1862, have to report: That after examining the various matters to

them referred, they find that the Revenue for the Financial year ending 31st January, 1863, amounts to £88,702 10s 1d. The Expenditure for the same period, was £51,677 12s 7½d;—thereby shewing an excess of Expenditure over Revenue of £12,885 2s 6½d. This excess, added to the balance standing against the Colony on 31st January, 1862, exhibits a debt due on the 31st January, 1863, of £82,205 7s 11½d. This balance, includes all Treasury Notes, Warrants and Debentures issued up to that date, as will more fully appear by a reference to the annexed tabular statement, marked (A.) In this statement, no credit has been given to the Colony for the estimated value of unsold Public Lands, or for any balances due thereon.

The Revenue for the last year, when compared with the preceding one, shews a decrease of £8216 19s 2d; which decrease has occurred principally on manufactured tobacco imported, spirituous liquors, and on roads subject to *ad valorem* duty,—as will appear by the annexed statement, marked (B.)

The usual tables have been prepared by your Committee, and are annexed hereto, numbered from (A) to (F), inclusive; which tables contain particulars of the Revenue and Expenditure of the last year, and other information.

Your Committee are of opinion, that a portion of the papers and accounts usually printed in the Appendix to the Journals of the past years, might be omitted without detriment to the Public Service.

The total receipts on account of Public Lands, for the past year, amount to £3883 19s 7d; and from Crown Lands, £91 1s 2d. The expenses during the same period, including loss of Interest and estimated loss of Land Tax, amount to £2653 19s 8d,—shewing a surplus of £1321 1s 1d over and above expenses.

During the past year, on the Worrell Estate and Lot 11, 3224 acres have been sold, at an average price of 7s 6d per acre. The balances still due on Bonds, Deeds, &c., amount to £15,579 9s 2d bearing interest, and 27,836½ acres remain on hand unsold.

On the Selkirk Estate, 4374½ acres have been sold, at an average price of 6s 6d per acre; and the balances due on Bonds, Deeds, &c., and bearing interest, amount to £14,931 10s 6d,—and 8451½ acres remain on hand unsold.

On the Winchester Estate or Lot 51, 1397 acres

have been sold, at an average price of 6s 9d per acre. The balances due on Bonds, Deeds, &c., and bearing interest, amount to £3214 4s 5d,—and 2503 acres remain on hand unsold.

The sum total of the balances due on Public Lands, Deeds, &c., and bearing interest, amount to £33,146 7s 1d; and exceeds the amount due at the corresponding period of the previous year, by £222 18s 4d.

through that part of his premises, on which for a long time was a road to the Saint Peter's Road, wherein he keeps gates; that thereupon the sale of the said Wharf was, and had to be suspended

That upon the petition of the inhabitants to the late House of Assembly, in its last Session, a Special Committee was appointed, and an Address by them moved, which was adopted by the said House of Assembly, praying your Excellency to appoint a Commission to ascertain the damage accruing to said Mr Hayden, and that the said road might be opened under the Road Compensation Act; but that on the petition of said Mr Hayden to your Excellency in Council (a copy of which is hereto attached) further action therein was delayed.

That the site of the road prayed for is opened and given to the public free for a distance of fourteen chains from the Saint Peter's Road to a certain Church, as marked on a plan hereto attached; and that the site of the said Wharf and about four chains distance therefrom, through the Shipyard, is also given freely, as we are informed, by the proprietor, John Archibald Macdonald, Esq; the residue, about 19 chains, from the edge of the Shipyard to the said Church, being the portion thereof passing over Mr Hayden's premises, and on which the said Commission is prayed for.

That the continuation of the road from the said Church to the river, as proposed by Mr Hayden, would pass through five or six chains of a deep salt-water marsh, over which a good road for that purpose could not be made, and that the site for the proposed Wharf at the place prayed for, being in a direct line with the Wharf on the South side of the river, besides being on the most solid and suitable position for said Wharf, would be of infinite convenience for transit, backward and forward, across the river,—having a complete Scow for that purpose,—and the public highway leading to Fort Augustus, Pisquid and Vernon River therefrom

May it therefore please your Excellency to order a Commission to be appointed, to ascertain the damage (if any) accruing to the said Alexander Hayden in the premises aforesaid, in order that the road in question may be opened out.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, in Council convened.

May it please your Excellency;

The petition of the undersigned humbly sheweth:

That a petition has been laid before the House of Assembly, to open a road crossing your petitioner's farm, and throwing your petitioner's Shipyard open to the public,—which would, if granted, ruin your petitioner's farm, or be over five hundred pounds damages to your petitioner. Your petitioner also shews, in a plan accompanied with the said Petition, a public road opened from the Main Post Road to the River, running alongside his farm, for a Wharf. Petitions to that effect have been laid before the House of Assembly, signed by over three hundred persons, and also a plan of the said Wharf.

Your petitioner humbly prayeth that your Excellency in Council will take the matter into your gracious consideration, and not open a road through your petitioner's farm; and, in duty bound, your petitioner will ever pray.

Gray*, from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the joint Address praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the joint congratulatory Address of both Houses to Her Majesty the Queen, upon the auspicious event of the Marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales with Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra of Denmark; and also

With the joint Address praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the joint congratulatory Address of both Houses to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on the same auspicious occasion, reported the delivery of the said Addresses, and that His Excellency was pleased to say he would transmit the same at the earliest opportunity.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Robert Hyndman, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod :

Mr Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber, instanter.

Accordingly Mr *Speaker* and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber; when His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to assent to the several Bills following, viz.:

An Act to incorporate sundry persons by the name of the President, Directors

and Company of the Farmers' Bank of Rustico.

An Act to incorporate the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island.

An Act to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Church of St. Peter's Bay.

An Act to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Church of Bay Fortune.

An Act to authorize the Government to sell the Military Barracks in Charlottetown.

An Act for the naturalization of Aliens.

An Act authorizing the Legislative Council and House of Assembly to commit prisoners in contempt, to the Common Jail of Queen's County.

An Act to incorporate King Hiram Lodge, number One thousand one hundred and twenty-three, of Free and Accepted Masons, of Saint Eleanor's, in Prince Edward Island.

An Act to incorporate the Grand Orange Lodge of Prince Edward Island, and the Subordinate Lodges in connection therewith.

An Act to continue certain Acts therein mentioned.

An Act to authorize His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island to sell certain Pews in Saint Paul's Church, Charlottetown, now held by the Government.

An Act to alter and amend the Act for the preservation of the Alewives Fisheries in this Island.

After which, Mr *Speaker* spake as followeth :

May it please your Excellency;

On behalf of Her Majesty's faithful Commons of Prince Edward Island, I have now to present the following Bills of Aid and Supply, voted to Her Majesty during the present Session, to which I have humbly to request your Excellency's assent, viz.:

An Act to amend the Law relating to Statute Labour, and to authorize the establishment of certain additional Road Districts, and the appointment of Road Commissioners therefor.

Mr *Speaker* here having observed that the said Bill was received from his hand by a Messenger of the Legislative Council, objected and refused to deliver the remaining Bills in the same way; whereupon they were received from the hand of Mr *Speaker* by the Clerk of the Council coming to the Bar for that purpose, as follows, viz.:—

An Act to alter and amend the Act intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the several Laws relating to Education."

An Act for appropriating certain Moneys therein mentioned, for the service of the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Sixty-three.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:

Mr President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The auspicious occasion of the marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, has afforded

you an opportunity of again expressing the deep interest which you feel in all that affects the happiness of our most gracious Sovereign, and that of her family.

I shall not fail to forward to the Secretary of State for the Colonies your hearty and loyal congratulations.

After a due consideration of the Educational System, and the expenditure which it involved, you have determined upon a measure, by which you have partly relieved the public Revenue from the burden which that system entailed.

You have given your attention to the long-agitated Land Question, and you have adopted an Address to your Sovereign, praying that her assent may be given to an Act to render binding the Award of the Land Commissioners, unless the illegality of that Award be proved before a judicial Tribunal.

In accordance with your request, I have forwarded that Address to the Colonial Minister, in order that it may be laid before Her Majesty.

At the opening of the present Session, I adverted to the expediency of providing for the Registration of persons qualified to vote at the Election for Members of the Legislative Council. It has, however, been deemed advisable to postpone a measure to that effect, in order that its details may be perfected during the recess.

Mr Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

In Her Majesty's name, I thank you for the Supplies which you have granted for the Public Service. Care shall be taken to expend them in accordance with your wishes.

I trust that the measures which you have adopted, after deliberation on the financial condition of the Colony, may suffice to maintain the public credit.

The Resolution by which you have determined to yield for the future, to the Executive, the exclusive privilege of initiating Money Votes, commands my entire approval.

Mr President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

It affords me much satisfaction, to observe the zeal with which the young men of this Province devote themselves to the Volunteer Service.

The number of Volunteers now enrolled exceeds the number of arms and accoutrements which I have for their use.

While I thank you for the grant which you have placed at my disposal for this service, I regret that it

is not sufficient to warrant me in applying to Her Majesty's Government for a further supply of arms.

I am, therefore, with extreme reluctance compelled for the present, to refuse my sanction to the formation of any new Companies.

You have completed the consideration of such measures as you deem necessary for this Province; I therefore release you from your Legislative duties, by proroguing this General Assembly.

After which, the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said :

Gentlemen;

It is the will and pleasure of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that this General Assembly be prorogued until Thursday the Twenty-eighth day of May next; and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until Thursday the Twenty-eighth day of May next, to be here then holden.

Remarks referred to in the preceding Page:—

The Title to this property is the same as to the other portions of the East moiety of Lot 20 up to the year 1814, when the half Township was divided among the several owners by Deed of Partition. This part containing at that time 1447 acres, was bequeathed to me by Will, but there being a Debt of £450 upon it at the time of the death of the Testator, it was sold at Sheriff's sale and bought in by my father, (William Cundall) at the before mentioned price, and duly conveyed to him by Deed, dated 9th January, 1850. He afterwards conveyed to me by Deed, dated 14th October, 1856.

By the circumstance of the property changing hands the Tenants escaped all Arrears due at the time of sale.

The Farms are in all cases valuable, and the Tenants with two or three exceptions are well able to pay all arrears, but political agitation has had effect here as elsewhere.

For further particulars, I beg to refer to the abstract of Title furnished by my father, also to his Memorial, in which I fully concur.

MEMORANDUM.—Mr William Cooper succeeded Mr Edward Abell, in the Agency of Township, No. 56, in or about the year 1819, and continued to act as the Agent of the Proprietor Lord James Townshend until 1829, when he was superseded by the appointment of the present proprietor for having misappropriated the Rents received by him during the foregoing period. Mr Cooper granted upwards of 50 Leases to as many Tenants settled on the Township. He, after his dismissal, became a strong advocate for escheating the Lands of the Proprietors upon the ground that they had neglected to settle their lands with foreign Protestants, as required by one of the conditions of the original grants from the Crown, and he has since continued to exercise a baneful influence upon the interests of both Proprietors and Tenants by encouraging the latter to withhold the payment of their Rents, alleging that the Proprietors had forfeited their Titles to their Estates; this influence has proved particularly prejudicial to this Township, (in which he still resides,) as will be seen by an inspection of the amount of Rent due, when Mr Cooper ceased to be Agent, and of the arrears which have since accrued.

No. 13.—Letter from George Wightman, Esq.

ST. JOHN, NEW BRUNSWICK, June 20, 1861.

GENTLEMEN;

In obedience to your commands, I went to Prince Edward Island on the 29th October last, and remained there till the 3d of May, when I returned for further instructions. I went back to the Island on the 28th May, and returned on the 15th June, and have since been engaged in making up the statements and tables, which I have now the honor to enclose.

Bearing in mind the objects of my mission, and the importance of collecting information from all sources on which reliance could be placed, I mixed freely with the people in all parts of the Island, — and in order to obtain it as impartially as possible, I did so without permitting it to be known that I had any special object in view; though I have discussed the various topics touched by the papers I submit, with parties in different positions, I have endeavored, independently, to draw my own conclusions. The Census Returns of the present year confirm them. Those Returns having been made by sworn enumerators, are of great value. Trusting that the information supplied may be of service,

APPENDIX (A.)

No. 14.—GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

In the following description, the land is divided into three classes :

- First, That which brings the greatest number of crops upon being cleared.
- Second, Such as new settlers will take, if they can get no better; and
- Third, That which a new settler will not venture upon at all, and is passed over, —although at a future day it may be improved by manuring.

It is obvious that these classes cannot have any very distinct boundaries, as they run into each other by imperceptible degrees. Besides, it was only by partial inquiries, and observing the forest trees, that a general estimate could be arrived at.

In the new settlements, the number of crops after the first clearing, or after stumping, without manure, is a good test of the fertility of the soil. The kinds of forest trees is the usual criterion, but it sometimes fails; it is, however, the best we have. Chemical analysis is the only sure test, but that is out of the question.

The classification may not be very correct, but it is the best average that, under the circumstances, could be obtained.

Taking a general view of the land, the greater part of the eastern side of the peninsula, from Tignish to the bottom of Richmond Bay, opposite to Summerside, was formerly covered with soft wood, intermixed with pine, the latter wood, in some parts, very abundant.

The soil is light, easily cultivated, and has but little strength. In the interior of the peninsula, and on the western coast, the timber is chiefly hardwood, and the soil ranks with the best in the Island.

From West Point, easterly and southerly, to near Summerside, there is a belt of poor land along the sea coast, varying in width, nearly the whole distance.

From Summerside to Tryon, good land extends from the interior quite down to the coast.

On the shore of Richmond Bay, from Platt River, opposite Summerside, quite round to Princetown, the light poor land follows the coast pretty generally.

Upon Lot 18, poor land extends inland for more than half the breadth of the Lot.

There are, in the interior of the peninsula, several tracts of what may be termed bad land, as shewn by the shading upon the map. That these shadings represent accurately the forms of these tracts, is not pretended; that at present would be impossible. The outlines may be, and probably are, quite irregular, and there may be some good pieces of land within the shaded area. There may be also patches of bad land in other parts of the Lot, of which no account has been taken; but in the judgment of persons well acquainted with the ground, the shadings represent the principal tracts, and about the quantity in the whole Lot. I do not think it represents too much of such land. If I were purchasing, I should rather fear it was under estimated.

The greater part of this land is not absolutely barren, but it is covered with a growth of spruce, upon which a new settler would not attempt to make a living. A good deal has been burned over, and the remainder may be expected to be burnt, as the adjoining land becomes cleared, and when so treated may not be expected to recover in less than a century.

APPENDIX (A.)

Instances of the effects of fires on such lands are numerous in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. As one instance in the former Province, a tract upon the Stewiacke River, and upon both sides of the Main Truro Road (nearly 100 square miles in extent), was burnt over in the early part of the present century; the soil there is not so light as on the bad land of the Island, and it is eligibly situated with respect to market, but it has remained uncultivated, except in some very partial instances, ever since; probably in another forty years the fall of leaves upon it will have replaced the vegetable matter that was dissipated by the fire, so far as to make it fit for settlement. Similar instances in Nova Scotia are numerous.

In New Brunswick the same thing may be observed. The country burnt over by the Miramichi fire, in 1825, has not recovered, and probably will remain uncultivated for the greater part of another century, and there are many other places in a similar situation. It is true the soft wooded land on the Island is not yet all burnt over, but it will be almost sure to happen as the country around becomes cleared. When a soft-wooded country takes fire, the heat becomes so great as to dissipate the vegetable matter in the soil. This might be restored by manuring, but the manure must be obtained from some extraneous source. The land itself does not afford the means of obtaining it. In some cases, plowing in green crops might effect the object, as is often done in warmer climates; but here the summer is so short, that it would require several years, and more means than new settlers generally possess; besides it is doubtful how far the improvement would repay the outlay.

It has been supposed that when the better lands become occupied, people will betake themselves to these; but with the modern facilities for moving elsewhere, this is not to be expected for at least another century. The owners of better lands adjoining may, perhaps, gradually take them into cultivation at a future time, but that time is remote, for they can have all the benefit from them as a common, that would result from owning them; and being of no use to others, there will be no necessity of haste in purchasing.

By laying out the land adjoining to these tracts, so as to take a part of them in,—say 20 or 30 acres with each 100 acre lot,—a good deal of this land might be sold with that which is better, it would be useful for fencing and small timber. But this would require a degree of skill and expense in surveying, that is not likely to be employed.

Under the present rates of taxation, this land would require twenty-five cents an acre as an investment, at six per cent., to meet that demand in about twenty-four years. This, at compound interest, would amount to one dollar an acre, at which time it is not probable that it could be sold for so much; and if not, it would result in loss to the holder. It is not uncommon for parties to purchase tracts of this land at Sheriffs' sales, for tax, strip them of poles or other useful wood, and then abandon them; shewing that when so stripped, the land is not considered an investment worth the tax.

FERTILITY OF THE LAND.

In point of general fertility, the land of the Island will compare fairly with that on the opposite main land. It is inferior to the lands of Pictou and Merigonishe, and to those along the St. John, above Woodstock; but will compare favorably with the land of Pictou and Colchester, between the Earltown and New Annan mountains, the Gulf Shore, and between the Petitcodiac and Gulf Shore in New Brunswick.

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This appears from the number of the crops that can be taken after the first clearing. There is however, one difference proper to be noticed: a large portion of the land on the Island is upon a loose gravelly subsoil, which allows the manure to leak through it. It may be as good, perhaps, as any for the first crop, but will not hold out well when under the plow, although the evil may, by proper management, be mitigated. In the Provinces this kind of land is comparatively rare.

The common plan of cropping is to take 1, 2, or 3 crops off land newly cleared, or newly stumped, and leave it to recover, repeating the operation after a few years. This plan will certainly run out the land; it has done so in more fertile countries.— By comparing the quantity of hay and of live stock with the grain and potatoes raised, as shewn by the census of 1855, it appears that a process of deterioration must be going forward. The manure from the cattle is not sufficient to replace the elements carried off by the grain. One farmer who had been settled nearly 30 years, and had 40 acres of cleared land, said he could only properly manure about one acre from his cattle, and that this was a fair sample of the state of the settlement.

The deterioration is not greatly felt at present, because there is still a large quantity of fresh land, portions of which are being taken in by cropping yearly; but this process must have an end, and then it will be more difficult to make a living than at present.

The seaweed may keep up one half of the farms upon the coast, and much may be done near the estuaries by means of mussel mud, but the large body of interior lands will be, in a great measure, without the means of recovery, except by importing manures, or by ploughing in green crops, a process that, in the short summers of this climate, would be very tedious and expensive.

There is no alluvial to depend upon for hay, as is the case in the Provinces, unless a small quantity of salt marsh be considered such.

It is, however, rather a mass of roots, and of comparatively little value.

MARSH.

There are salt marshes at various points along the coast, and upon several of the rivers and creeks, from West Point to Tryon; also on Ellis River and some other places on the eastern side of the peninsula. This land produces coarse hay, from half a ton to a ton per acre, value four or five dollars per ton.

The marsh is composed almost entirely of turfy roots, and is not improvable.— Dyking has been tried, but the ground is too light and porous to keep out the water, and even if it could be done, the natural grass would die, and cultivated grasses could hardly be made to take its place. Besides, at distant intervals, storms happen that raise the water greatly above the ordinary tide level, and to provide against which the dykes would have to be made of great strength.

The common valuation of this land as freehold is twenty-five to fifty dollars per acre. The largest body together is at Percival River, 60 or 70 acres. The next largest is at Tryon, and there is a considerable number of small pieces in coves of the coast, and on creeks in the intermediate space.

There is also a growth of inferior grass upon a range of sand Islands, extending from Lennox Island to Conway Inlet; 367 acres is owned by 22 individuals, in Lots varying from 4 to 50 acres; from Conway Inlet to Cascumpec, 500 acres is owned by Mr Edward Cunard, at least he pays tax for it. It is of very little, if of any value, as land, but may serve to give control over fishing stations at a future time.

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CLEARING UP A FARM.

When a new settler begins without capital, it is as much as he usually can do to clear two acres per year; at the end of four years, when his rent is sixpence an acre, he may have eight acres cleared, say two in potatoes and turnips, two in wheat and two in indifferent hay.

The rent goes on increasing from threepence an acre, at the end of two years, to a shilling; at the end of eight years, when it becomes eighteen dollars and fifty-six cents per hundred acres, at that time there may be an addition to the above crop of about two or three tons of hay, and no pasture,—the rent being about one dollar and eighty cents per acre for the useful land. The tenant may leave out the oat crop and get better hay, or continue the oats until the land will not bear hay,—the value taken off the ground will, in either case, be about the same.

Where money has to be raised, oats seem to be the only resource, although the exhaustion makes it unprofitable in the long run. At the end of eight or ten years, he may have twenty acres cleared, and about the same area of ground in crop as before; the remainder of clearing being in pasture, then stumping comes on, and a second course of cropping at the rate of about two acres a year (the clearing being continued), till, at the end of twenty years, there are, perhaps, thirty or forty acres of cleared land, with from fifteen to twenty under the plow, and one half of that pretty well worn out by cropping.

Sometimes clearing is carried on at a more rapid rate; circumstances may be peculiarly favorable, or there may be grown up sons in the family, which is equivalent to capital; but in the majority of cases this is a pretty fair account of a new settlement. Except in very favorable circumstances, it is impossible to pay the rent, and support a family by what is raised upon such a farm. If fifty or sixty acres were cleared, and in good heart, the demand might be easily met; this, however, requires either capital or time. The few persons who have capital, do not lay it out in this way; the demand for rent comes on too soon, and even if not paid, remains an incubus upon the energies of the farmer, and prevents improvements.

It is the opinion of several persons with whom I have conversed on the subject, that at least one half of the new settlers lose their farms, or hold them only until the landlord can get a tenant who will pay a part of the back rent. One of my informants divided them into three classes: one who paid and kept independent; another who got into arrears and who did not try to pay; and another who was totally unable to pay! This was with regard to land in the rear of Bedeque, one of the best districts in the Island.

The natural consequence of all this is, that the tenant in arrears finds it to his interest to improve no more than he can help; improvement would only invite purchasers; it is rather for his interest to take all he can get out of the land while the opportunities continue; in fact, it is Ireland on a small scale!

The question has been asked, Why do people take so much land? The answer is, that they know that less than one hundred acres in a farm is not sufficient for arable, pasture, and wood land. This is the opinion of every farmer settled upon an upland farm, either here or in the Provinces. On rich alluvial land, the case is different; but there is little if any of it on this Island.

In the same Township there are a great many lots of fifty acres, which have been taken mostly by Acadian French, and many of them are pretty nearly worn out. It is the opinion of every person with whom I have conversed, that when the farms become generally enclosed, and the soil upon these small lots so far exhausted that it will have to be kept up with manure obtained upon the same land, they will not

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afford a maintenance for a family; that either the reserve of fuel will be insufficient, or the pasturage inadequate to the keeping up of the arable land; that two or three of these small lots will be joined together, and the occupants have to leave them; but before this takes place, the soil will have been pretty much exhausted, and will be of less value than at present.

This has already taken place at Tignish. The first settlers came there sixty years ago, cleared the land, wore it out, and removed to fresh land in the rear. Much of this land has remained uncultivated ever since, and although close to a good fishery and to the seaweed, would not now command as high a price as the woodland in the interior of the Lot.

SEA WEED.

Sea weed is of three kinds: Eel Grass, Rockweed, and Kelp.

Eel Grass has but little strength as manure. It is used as an absorbent under dunghills, or in a summer cattle yard, and sometimes put immediately into the ground. If, when used in the latter way, it be first dried, it decays but slowly, which is not the case if plowed in green. This, however, can only be done advantageously when not interfering with the cultivation of the crops.

Rockweed has more strength as manure than Eel Grass, bulk for bulk; but perhaps not much better, taken equal in weight; but it decays more readily, and, so far, is superior. It is quite abundant on some parts of the coast.

Kelp has more power, as manure, than either of the others, but does not bear many repetitions without intervening doses of stable manure. On some parts of the coast it predominates.

Sea weed is very abundant only in certain localities, and a few individuals make good use of it. But there are other ranges of coast where it is in small quantities.

On most parts of the coast, places favorable for roads on to the upland are at a considerable distance apart. The weed, when gathered, must be carried coastwise to these places, and then it would often be necessary to carry it over the ground of different persons, leave for which may not always be obtained.

It is also brought ashore by storms, and if not taken up immediately is apt to be carried off again by a change of wind, and requires constant attention. The summer season is the time at which it is brought ashore in the greatest quantities, and the small farmer cannot leave his crop to attend to it. He would lose more on the one hand than gain on the other.

Sometimes the weed is piled upon the beach until it is convenient to haul it away, but that answers only in a few places. Whenever the bank is high, particularly where it is rocky, there is not room above the surf. Besides, on many parts of the shore, such piles would be covered with a fine drifting sand that is found on many parts of the coast. This sand acts much like drifting snow, and covers every small obstacle in its course.

For example, at Tignish a fence was built some years ago to protect a grass field. The sand was soon to the top of it. The fence was raised, and the process repeated until a ridge was formed some fifteen feet high. The raising of the fence was not carried any further.

It is very difficult to obtain an estimate of the expense of getting this manure. Few keep an account of it. Mr Linkletter, however, gives an account which appears a pretty fair estimate. His farm is about two miles westerly of Summerside. He takes up 150 to 200 horse loads of eel grass in the summer; which he leaves piled

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over winter, and in the spring it has shrunk up to about two-thirds of that quantity. This is manure for about three acres of ground. It produces one crop of potatoes, one of wheat, and three of hay (a ton and half to the acre). He employs a boy and horse in collecting this from the first of July to the first of November. The distance hauled is about half a mile. There is no drifting sand here; but, as before stated, the weed, if not gathered at once, is liable to be carried away by the first change of wind.

The expense of this is—boy, four months' wages and board for time employed about the weed, say forty dollars. The horse is required in the spring and autumn in working the farm. In the middle of the summer he would be idle. The charge against this service is, therefore, only the extra feed, say thirty bushels of oats, ten dollars—making 50 dollars outlay for the manure of three acres, equal to \$13 33c. per acre; interest \$2, makes \$15 33c. per acre for five crops,—about \$5 for the manure of each crop, or \$15 for three acres of wheat, three of potatoes, and nine of hay.

If these crops are valued at the usual selling price that is being raised for sale, without connection with the general work of the farm, the manure must be collected independently of the farm work, and would cost double the above sum. But if the crops be consumed on the farm (which is the legitimate use of them) the profit is to be estimated upon the wheat at current price, and the growth of the stock kept upon the potatoes and hay. Taken either way, there is but a fair profit.

This is a very fair case of manuring with sea weed, but it requires an independent position, and matters to be in good train. A poor man, struggling for a living for his family, and without proper means, cannot avail himself of the advantage.

Mr Linkletter has easy access to the shore, and only half a mile to haul. Some others have three times this distance, over bad roads, and have great difficulty in getting off the beach. Add to this the want of capital, and it is not wonderful that the weed is not all used. Some individuals make money by it, but to others the cost nearly equals the income. Similar observations may be applied to manuring with kelp.

Along the western coast, and from the North Point to Tignish, it is in considerable quantities. It requires less to the acre than other sea weeds, but does not last so long, and in the end is not perhaps more profitable.

An objection often made to the use of sea weed as a manure is, that it promotes the growth of couch grass. This seems difficult to account for. Possibly the weed may possess some material peculiarity favorable to the growth of that grass, or, by loosening the soil, the ground may become more favorable to the spread of its roots, and less so for those of other grasses, or, what is quite as likely, the land is kept up in crops by the weed, until elements of fertility, not replaced by it, are so far exhausted as to starve the cultivated grass and allow the couch to take its place.

As regards the quantity of sea weed on the shore, generally, it is exceedingly difficult to make any tolerable estimate. It varies in different places. Mr Linkletter has a front of eight chains, which furnished the quantity used by him; and he thinks it is a fair average of that part of the coast. Mr Bell, of Cape Traverse, is in a very favorable situation, and he thinks there is enough to manure from two to four acres yearly upon each farm of twelve to fifteen chains front upon that part of the coast, and that one manuring will produce two crops of grain and two of indifferent hay. But the weed, however, is not evenly divided. A few farms that are favorably situated get a large quantity, and the remainder very little; and probably one-half of that which comes on shore is either carried off by the tide or buried by the sand. On the

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shore at Rustico, also, it has been estimated that the proportionate quantity is about the same.

In many other places, the common opinion is, that if evenly divided there would be but a small quantity to each of the front farms. Around Richmond Bay the supply is very light, and that principally eel grass, and but few persons use it in considerable quantity.

From Cascumpec to the North Point the supply is considerable; but a great deal goes to waste, owing to difficulties in getting it; and on the west coast the supply is light, and only a small portion of that is secured. In addition to the want of time to attend to it, the coast is generally bold, with a footing of rock, and with but few openings to the land within. The opinion of the people on that coast is, that there is not enough for one-fourth of the front tier of farms.

MUSSEL MUD.

This is called a very valuable manure, but difficult to obtain except in a few places. It occurs in most, if not in all, the estuaries of rivers on both sides of the Island. It can only be taken up in the summer, and in favorable localities. The beds come but very little above low water, and the mud is obtained by grounding a scow, loading it at low water and floating it to the landing place by the next tide. On the north side of the Island, the rise of tide is generally too small to admit of this plan being available; in which case a box, without a bottom, about ten feet square, is put down, forming a temporary coffer dam, and the mud in the inside dug out to the depth of several feet below the surface of the water. In other cases, it is raised with oyster tongs; but in general it is taken only from the tops of the beds, which are bare at low water.

On the south side of the Island, there is a greater rise and fall of tide, the beds are bare for a longer time at each tide, and the mud more easily obtained.

The rise of tide on the north side is at springs from 3 to 4 feet, and at neaps 1 to 2 feet—average 2 feet 9 inches. On the south side it is, springs 4 to 6 feet, neaps 1 foot—average about 5 feet 3 inches; difference two and a half feet. This gives a greater advantage for digging the mud on the south side.

The mud is put on shore in heaps, where it is left till the proper time for putting on the land. About forty single cart loads to the acre are sufficient. It lasts several years, and the benefit is, in a certain degree, permanent, probably from the decomposition of the shells contained in it.

As much of this work is in the water, the only season of leisure from attendance upon the crops, in which mud can be raised, is between planting and haying time (and this interferes in a degree with the other work). Spring and autumn are too cold. Getting mud, therefore, in summer can only be profitably done by persons possessed of means sufficient to hire labor at a busy season; and the labor and difficulty, not to say the disagreeableness of the work, is so great that, comparatively speaking, but very little mud is raised.

A great deal of this difficulty might be obviated by the employment of a dredge to raise the mud, from which it might be landed at proper points, and distributed in winter, when men and teams would otherwise be idle.

A dredge, to be worked with horses (with scows and other appliances), might probably be built for one thousand dollars, and the mud might be put on shore for from 10 to 50 cents per cubic yard. Ten to twelve cubic yards are called a fair allowance for an acre. A joint stock company, composed of landowners along the

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estuaries, would find it but a small matter to get up such a machine, and even if it paid no dividend it would be indirectly a very profitable investment.

The expense, at present, of getting out the mud varies with circumstances. A case occurred last year at Cascumpec, that probably may be taken as a very fair specimen. Mr ——— manured three acres with about thirty single horse loads to the acre, at a cost for wages and horse hire, exclusive of board, £10. Add board and horse keep, would make about £14, — equal to \$46 66c., or \$15 50c. per acre. There has been one crop taken since, and he thinks the first two crops will return the outlay, and then the general improvement of the land will remain a profit.

If the mud could be put on shore in the summer at forty cents per cubic yard, the farmer could distribute it in winter with his teams and men, the outlay for which would be hardly felt, and the probable outlay would not exceed \$6 per acre.

The size and depth of the mussel mud beds have not been ascertained, but all agree that the mud is abundant. Allowing twenty cubic yards to an acre (double the usual complement), each acre of mud, at six feet deep, would manure 480 acres, which would make a strip of land two miles long and thirty chains deep. There are about sixty miles of shore at the estuaries, and thirty acres of this mud bed, at six feet deep, would manure the whole to thirty chains deep, being 14,400 acres. This would only be an acre of mud to each mile in length of the estuaries; but there is as much more of this as would allow the process to be repeated several times. It is, however, to be borne in mind, that these beds, when exhausted, will not be renewed, and it may be expected that the land will ultimately fall back to its original state, except in so far as it may be benefited by the lime of the shells. If the mud were only used for raising food for cattle, and the manure from that used upon arable crops, it might lay the foundation of permanent fertility; but that is not likely to be generally done.

SAND HILLS AND ISLANDS.

The islands are all apparently owned by individuals, who pay tax for them. Some are good land, and cultivated; others worthless sandbanks. The spit of sandhills from Hog Island to Conway Inlet, is held by some twenty persons, who cut some indifferent hay upon it. All the range of sandhills from Conway Inlet to Cascumpec light (twelve miles), is held by Mr Edward Cunard. I do not know whether these claims are legitimate. Mr Stewart may, perhaps, claim Lenox Island, because it is opposite to his Lot 12; but the grant confines the ownership to a line 500 feet back from the shore, and makes no mention of islands outside of this limit; at least, this is the case with the grant of Lot 35, which I have seen.

Besides, the sandhill in front of Lot 11 is claimed by Mr Edward Cunard, although that Lot is public property. Also, Mr Yeo claims the sand island off Brae Harbor, opposite Lot 9, owned by Mr Sullivan. Savage Island, at Cascumpec, is in the same category. The sandbanks produce a small quantity of inferior hay; but the principal use that can be made of them seems to be the control of the fishery.

Mr Cunard, by the possession of Cascumpec Point and Savage Island, already controls that harbor, so far as business is concerned, and this notwithstanding the reserve upon the peninsula. But a title to the outer sandbars will not be subject to reserves, and will give one person full control of fourteen miles of one of the best fishing grounds of the Island.

The Conway and Cavendish Inlets are good harbors for crafts of light draft, and they are close to good fishing ground; but the owner of the ground may refuse

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building room, or charge what rent he may please for the use of a worthless sankbank.

It is true the main coast may be used for this purpose, but it would require the outer bank in connection.

There may be, before a great while, a fishing village opposite Conway Inlet; but there must be proper buildings at the Inlet for taking care of the fish, and for shelter in stormy weather. These observations will apply to Cavendish Inlet also; but, as a harbor, it is inferior to Conway. In fact, wherever there is a break through these outer sand reefs, there is a boat harbor that, by and by, will come into requisition, and it might be well to provide that they are not monopolized.

Brae Island is a place I do not know much about; but there is reason to believe that, before long, the harbor will become a point of communication with Shediac and Nova Scotia, for a considerable range of country in the rear, as well as being a good site for fishing establishments; and it is not unlikely that a foresight is exercised with reference to a control of that business at a future day.

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No. 15—Description of Townships, giving a fair average of the characteristics and capabilities of the soil throughout the Island.

TOWNSHIP No. 2

Contains in small Lots 8,880 acres of Land, leased, for which taxes have been paid by the Occupants, besides 1500 acres paid for by the Proprietors, the greater part, no doubt for defaulting Tenants, making in the whole, 10,380 acres. There are only 180 acres of freehold.

The Eastern end of the Township is well cleared off. The land from the east coast to the Western Road is mainly all occupied, as is also a tier of Lots, on the western side of that Road. There are also a few settlers on the Western Coast, and six or seven on the Palmer Road—about sixteen in all. The interior containing about 10,000 acres, is uninhabited. Of this about 4,000 acres are bad, or third class land.

The soil across the Eastern end, is light and rather poor, and can only rate as second class, say about 4,000 acres—then take 4,000 acres at Palmer's road, as third class, the remaining 12,000 acres, may be termed first class; but a large part of this is uninhabited.

The clearings are principally upon land of the second class. Three fourths of the land between the Eastern Coast and the Western Road is cleared; on the western side of that road, the average width of clearing, is about forty to fifty rods, making about seven hundred acres. There are also small clearings on the western end, near Miminegash road, say 300 acres. From the above, we have in round numbers

Should the area of the Township exceed 20,000 acres, the excess will be of first quality land.

TOWNSHIP No. 3

Some years ago Mr. Hill sold the Lot to Mr Branscomb, who divided it into blocks of two or three thousand acres each. His heirs are scattered, and the land has been squatted upon. A part of this Lot fell into the hands of the Traverse family, consisting of five daughters. Three are married, and reside on the

Lot, or in the neighbourhood; the other two are in possession of a farm near the Episcopal Church.

The land leased consists of 27 tracts, averaging about 80 acres each, the whole being 2,144 acres. The rent is at the usual rate, viz. 1 1-9 shilling per acre, and amounts to £119 2s currency per year.

Some years ago Messrs. Palmer and Yeo bought a tract on this Lot from some of Mr. Branscomb's heirs, some of the occupants of which have been served with writs, and the matter is now in a state of litigation.

Mr. Hunt of Saint Eleanor's, claims some land on this Lot by heirship, but the claim is not acknowledged.

A considerable quantity of land has been sold for Taxes, bid off by speculators and resold in small Lots (generally about 100 acres each,) to actual settlers: this has been confined to that part of the Lot between the Western Road and the Western Coast.

TOWNSHIP No. 4

Contains in small lots 6,890 acres of land, leasehold; and 208 acres of freehold, for which taxes have been paid by the occupants, besides 1,420 acres paid for as cultivated land by the Proprietor, (the greater part of it no doubt for defaulting tenants,) making in the whole 8,302 acres of leasehold, and 208 acres of freehold

There are also (supposing the Township to contain 20,000 acres,) 11,500 acres of unlocated land.

The quantity of cleared land accounted for, is 2,122 acres. That upon the western end of Campbelltown, is not accounted for; but allowing it to bear the same proportion, to the located land as upon the other parts of the Township, it will be about 90 acres, making in the whole 2,210 acres, equal to about one third of the whole.

The quality of the land on the Eastern end is sandy and light. It has originally been a pine grove. This kind of land runs back about two and a half miles, giving about 5,000 acres of second rate land, thence to the Western end of the Lot, with the exception of a tract partly barren and partly inferior, which crosses the Township near its Western end, as shewn on the plan. The area of this is about 6,000 acres, the remaining 9,000 acres are of first class land, and of this there are yet 5,500 acres not yet located for settlement. This tract is on, and to the westward of the Western Road.

This is assuming that the Township contains 20,000 acres, but if the map is correct, the area is over that quantity, and the excess will be of the first class land.

TOWNSHIP No. 5.

The quantity of cultivated land, for which taxes have been paid by the occupants, is 7,337 acres, of which 1,838 are returned as cleared. There are, however, 350 acres of which I find no account. Therefore, taking the per centage of clearing allowed in the former case, it will give a total of 1,920 acres of cleared land, or about 27½ per cent of the whole.

The settlement is principally along the river or estuary, that runs up the middle of the Lot, from the Eastern Coast to the Western Road. There are seven or eight families on the Western and Halloran's Road, mostly new settlers.

The quality of land on the Eastern part of the Township is light and sandy. It has formerly been clothed with pine and other soft woods. From about a mile east of the Western Road, to the west end of the Township, is (with the exception of the bad land shewn upon the Plan,) said to be of the first quality. The quantities of the various qualities will stand nearly as follows:

Besides the 7,337 acres for which Tax was paid as above, 3,000 acres have been paid for by the proprietor, a considerable portion of which, was no doubt, on behalf of the land of defaulting tenants, which are newly settled. There are no means of ascertaining how much really was paid for this purpose.

Assuming the occupied land at 7,500 acres, we have unoccupied land, mostly of the first class, 8,500 acres, and 4,000 acres of bad land.

Besides the above, there are seven house lots, of

one to three acres, at a rent of twenty shillings currency per acre. Leases for twenty years.

TOWNSHIP No. 6.

In this Township, the quantity of cultivated land upon the Tax list is 5587 acres, upon 484 acres of which the amount of clearing cannot be obtained, leaving 5103 acres upon which the clearing amounts to 1710 acres, equal to about one third of the whole. Besides this, 1500 acres of cultivated land have been paid for by the proprietor, probably for new settlers.

The settlement is along the margin of Foxley and Trout Rivers. There are a few recent settlers along the Mill Road, also, three or four new settlers, on the Leary Road, at the West end of the Township. With this exception, the whole block west of the Western Road, is uninhabited.

The quality of the land east of the Western Road is as in the former Township, light and sandy, except a strip along Mill Road, which is of a better quality. On the west end of the Township, the land is of the first class. The Township contains two tracts of bad land, as shewn upon the plan.

The various classes may be taken in round numbers as follows:

Taking the located land at 6,000 acres, the cultivable land remaining, is about 9,000 acres, nearly all of which is west of the Western Road.

TOWNSHIP No 7.

The quantity of land for which taxes have been paid by small freeholders, amounts to 4,513 acres. The quantity paid for by leaseholders is 5,274 acres. The number of freehold lots is 39, and the average quantity in each is 114 acres. The number of leasehold lots is 50, and the average quantity 105 acres.

The clearing upon the leasehold land, is about 1,070 acres, equal to an average of 20 per cent. upon the whole; the clearing upon the freehold has not been obtained, but they are old settlements, and it may be presumed, that the clearing is between one third and one half of the whole.

Besides this, there are 1,100 acres taxed to McKinley, and some 200 acres of which, are known to be freehold; of the remainder, the tenures are unknown. There are also 3,000 acres of occupied land, which

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have been paid for by the proprietor of the Lot, and which is no doubt for tenements of new or poor settlers.

Adding these quantities we get 9,174 acres for the land under lease, and the whole quantity of occupied land, 13,687 acres, which takes nearly all the land fit for settlement that is upon the Lot.

The settlement of this Lot, was commenced 38 years ago, at Campbelton, and extended gradually southwardly along the coast.

The land was sold by the former proprietor for £15 to £25 currency per 100 acres; and it is along the coast the greater number of freeholders are.

The leaseholds are nearly all upon the Leary Road, and upon a back road shewn upon the Map, running from the Roman Catholic Church to the Leary Road. This Road was impassable at the time I was there, and I have not seen the place; but the clearings are represented as new and small, and the settlers poor.

TOWNSHIP No. 9.

In this Township the land occupied is 3,243 acres, of which 3078 acres are under lease, and upon which the clearings amount to 695 acres, equal to 22½ per cent. of the whole.

There are on the Lot thirty-six families, the greater number of which are within three miles of Brae Harbour, mostly upon the roads, a few being upon the shore of the Bay. The remainder of the Lot is nearly, if not quite uninhabited.

In quality, the Northern end of the Township is called good land; a tract along the shore, and up the Brae River may be classed as second quality. There is a large tract of bad land along the eastern side, as shewn upon the map, and several insulated patches of the same westward of Brae Harbor. The various qualities may be set down in round numbers as follows:

TOWNSHIP No. 10.

The quantity of land for which taxes have been paid is 3,035 acres, of which 475 acres are cleared, equal to about 16½ per cent. There are 500 acres for which the tax is in the name of the agent, and 2,652 acres in that of the proprietor, which are left out of the calculation.

The settlement is along the Western Road, and on the shore of Trout River, with a few families on the southern end of the Lot at Enmore River.

The settled land is of second quality; on the Peninsula between Enmore and Percival Rivers, there is said to be some patches of pretty good land, amounting to about one half the area; the remainder is bad. If the second class land be put up at 6,500 acres, and third class at 11,000, making 17,500 acres in the Township, it will probably not be far from the truth.

There are large marshes along the Percival River, which produce annually sixty or seventy tons of course hay, worth from three to five dollars per ton. It is cut by various persons for one half the hay for their labor. There is no settlement on the banks of the River.

The land fit for settlement may be put at about 3,500 acres, second class.

TOWNSHIP No. 12.

In this Township the whole quantity of land for which taxes have been paid by occupants, is 6,027 acres, of which 1,505 acres are cleared, equal to about one quarter of the whole.

The quantity under lease is 4,041 acres; and of freehold 1,986 acres. Tax has been paid by the proprietor for 1,000 acres of occupied land, in addition to the above.

The principal settlement is along Goodwood River; a few families on the coast of Richmond Bay, some half a dozen on Barlow Road, and nine on the Western Road, northwards of Robinson's. The latter have been settled from two to seven years; all the others are old settlers.

The soil across the front is light and sandy, second quality—upon the rear it is heavier and better. The bad land is in irregular tracts, somewhat as shewn on the map. The qualities of each kind are about as follows:—

The located land is all of the second class in the front, except the settlement on the Western Road, which is upon first class land, and contains in round numbers about 1,000 acres. The unlocated land fit for settlement is about as follows:

TOWNSHIP No. 13.

The whole quantity of land for which taxes were paid by occupants, is 9,877 acres, of which 3,766 acres are cleared, equal to about 38 per cent. of the whole.

The land under lease is 6,420 acres, and Freehold 3,457. Besides this, there are 2,000 acres of cultivated land paid for by the proprietor.

The principal part of the population is east of Barlow Road. There are about half a dozen families near Robinson's, and perhaps as many on the shores of Egmont Bay, or on the streams falling into it.

The soil across the eastern end is light, but this belt does not extend far inland. The interior is good land. About Egmont Bay it is also inferior, and there is a large strip of bad land in the middle of the Lot, as shewn in the plan, containing about 7,000 acres. The division of the land by its qualities may be put down as follows:

The located land is upon first and second class, about one half each. There are yet between 3,000 and 4,000 acres of these classes to be located—provided the Township contain 20,000 acres. If it does not, the quantity of unlocated lands fit for settlement will be so much the less.

TOWNSHIP No. 14.

On Lot 14 the quantity of land for which taxes are paid by the occupants is 12,035 acres, of which 5,355 acres are cleared—about 44½ per cent. of the whole. The quantity under lease is 5,000 acres, besides 7,035 acres of freehold. There are also 1000 acres of occupied land, for which tax was paid by the proprietor.

There is as in the former Lot, a belt of second rate

land along the front, also a tract of bad land, of about 1,500 acres on the Western Road, as shewn on the map, with a few insulated patches of the same in other parts, making about 3000 acres in all. The remainder is first class.

The settlement is principally across the east end, and across Ellis River. The farms are large and well cleared off, mostly freehold, having been purchased from the proprietors 40 years ago. The land in the rear was subsequently leased.

On the Western Road northwardly of Kent's, there are sixteen families holding 1,200 acres of land on lease, 200 acres of which are cleared, and there are three other farms at the northwest angle of the Lot.

The large block of land westward of the Western Road, has been recently divided into 50 and 64 acre lots, and a considerable part of it taken up and settled on, mostly by Acadian French from the adjoining Lots.

The unlocated land is along the northern side of Lot, taking in the bad land upon the Western Road; and with this exception is described as first class.

The whole Township may be classed as follows:

This leaves about half the first class land for future settlement, although it is proper to observe, that a large portion of that which has recently been located on the western end of the Township has very little improvement upon it.

TOWNSHIP No. 16.

In this Township the quantity of land on which taxes have been paid is 11,625 acres of cultivated land and 675 acres of uncultivated land. 410 acres of the cultivated land are unaccounted for, leaving therefore 11,215 acres. Of this 9,536 are leasehold, upon which the clearing is 3,274 acres, equal to about 34.3 per cent of the whole; and 1,679 acres are freehold upon which the clearing is 315 acres, equal to 17½ per cent.

Assuming the Township to contain 20,000 acres, the unlocated land will be 7,875 acres.

The bad land marked upon the map contains 6,800 acres, but as this is only an approximate estimate it is doubtful whether the Township contains so much as 20,000 acres; and moreover, as the population from 1848 to 1855 appears by the census to be stationary,

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there is little doubt, but that all the land fit for settlement is occupied.

As regards quality of soil, the principal part of the eastern end of the Township has been a pine country, land light and sandy. It contains considerable quantities of land covered with useless bushes, shewing it to be not worth clearing.

I think the first quality of land on this section, cannot be taken at more than 1500 acres. Then there are about 2500 acres of first class, westward of "Kent's,"—making 4000 acres in all; leaving of second rate land 8000 acres. The quantities may be taken in round numbers as follows:

The first quality is nearly all leasehold.

TOWNSHIP NO. 17

In this Township the quantity of Freehold is 17,168 acres, the state of which is not known.

The proportion of clearing on the Freehold is nearly 56 per cent., and of the Leasehold 68 per cent. The best land is on the eastern half of the Township. The western part, from about a mile west of Miscouche to the western end, with a broad strip along the shore westward from Summerside, is inferior land,—much of which would not be occupied under lease at the usual rates, or, at the present time, purchased, except, it may be, upon the shore, for the sake of sea weed, or some strips of marsh.

Of this section, 5000 acres were set off, in 1784, for the Loyalists,—probably it was supposed to be the most eligible part of the Lot. It was cut into small lots, and transferred, often at nominal prices, but remained as freehold: subsequently the Proprietor bartered off a large quantity of land at about a Dollar an acre, for Pine Timber, at four Dollars a ton.

The heirs of the family occupy at present about 700 acres in farms, and get rents for some 1500 acres more which may be expected to become freehold as time goes on. Several of these leases are for one hundred years, having about 80 years to run; others for 999 years,—both 1 l-9th shilling per acre. There are also some Leases at Seven-pence and Nine-pence per acre, for the longer term.

About half the Township is first class land; the remainder second and third class.

The classes would stand as follows:

TOWNSHIP NO. 18.

On this Lot, taxes have been paid on 16,989 acres of cultivated land; of which 9891 acres are freehold and 6372 leasehold. The clearing on the former is 4573 acres (equal to 46 per cent.), and upon the latter 3644 acres,—equal to 50½ per cent. upon the whole.

The oldest settlement is on the end facing Richmond Bay; the land has been covered with Pine and soft wood, and the soil is inferior. The best land in the Township is along the eastern side, or rather in the south-eastern corner,—and the Leasehold land is principally in that direction. This large quantity of Freehold land was paid for from the sale of the Timber growing upon it, as in the case of Lot 17, and is mostly inferior land.

Persons acquainted with the Lot, estimate the first class land at about one-fourth of the whole; a considerable part of the remainder is of the third class.

There are 2764 acres proclaimed for non-payment of Taxes, that being the quantity required to make up 20,000 acres; but it is believed the Lot contains so much less than the estimated quantity, that such deficiency exists: if so, the whole Lot is appropriated;—this is apparent from the nearly stationary state of the population between 1848 and 1855; in the former year it was 934, and in the latter 934,—about 37 to the square mile.

TOWNSHIP NO. 19.

On this Township the quantity of Land on the Tax List is 18,830 acres. 1080 acres of which the tenures are not ascertained,—leaving 17,750 acres accounted for. Of this, 14,143 acres are Leasehold, and 3607 Freehold. Of the former, the clearing is 6619 acres,—equal to about 47 per cent. of the whole. Of the latter, the clearing is 2175 acres,—equal to 60 per cent.

There is a strip on the northern side, of 5000 acres which was granted to the Loyalists in 1784, and which remains as freehold, or perhaps some part as Leasehold under small proprietors,—the land leased by the Proprietor of the Township does not exceed 14,000 acres.

The best land is on the southern side, and across the eastern end of the Township; along the shore of

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Richmond Bay there is a great deal of second-rate land.

It has been estimated by persons acquainted with the Lot, that about three-fourths of the land is first-class, and one-fourth second class.

The Township is fully populated, as appears by the comparison of the census of 1848 with that of 1855. It is 90 to the square mile of cleared land

TOWNSHIP No. 25.

This Township is nearly all freehold. There are 15,753 acres of freehold, to 510 acres of leasehold; exclusive of 1288 acres, the tenures of which are not ascertained.

The proportion of cleared land is about 54 per cent. of the whole

The whole quantity of land for which tax has been paid, is 17,754 acres, which is probably the area of the Township

The quality of the land is said to be about the same as that of Township No. 19.

There are 2500 acres of Loyalist land in the Township, as shewn in the plan

TOWNSHIP No. 26.

The leasehold land in this Township is 7411 acres, and freehold 6137 acres,—making 13,548 acres, exclusive of 2721 acres, the tenures of which are not mentioned. Assuming that this latter is divided in the same proportion as the former, the whole leasehold would be 8900, and freehold 7370 acres. There are 2500 acres of Loyalist land, shewn by the plan. It was granted in 1784. The remainder of the freehold land has been mostly sold in the early part of the present century. Some of the first leases are at nine-pence currency per acre.

The clearing amounts to 40 per cent of the whole.

The soil is much the same as on Lot 25,—say three-fourths first quality, and one-fourth second quality

GENERAL REMARKS ON EAST PARISH.

The face of the country is generally undulating, but does not rise to a great height, probably not more than 200 feet above the sea level in any part. On the south side, near the coast, it is cut in several places with deep ravines, running across the course of the road, which is consequently hilly. The northern side is remarkably smooth and level, and rises inland from the sea coast with a very gentle slope.

The road is very level, only a few small pitches, which may be easily turned or reduced.

As regards fertility, the northern side, for about three miles inward from the coast, is poor, covered with small spruce. There is a continuous settlement along the shore, dating some forty to sixty years back, nearly all freeholders. They get advantages from the sea, which induced them to settle here; but the land in rear of their holdings, which are about a mile deep, remains for the most part unoccupied. On Lot 46 there are about thirteen families on those back lands, on the Baltic Road, and on a new road through the middle of the Lot, shewn by the dotted lines. The boundary of this poor land is shewn by the dotted line on the map.

The southern side of the parish is generally of a good quality, and is well settled for some distance inland from the coast. The central parts are mostly unsettled, and there is a good deal of very fair land yet unoccupied. The leasehold farms are of good quality, and have the advantage of sea manure and fishery, although the latter does not seem to be very flourishing. It is confined to herring and codfish. Mackerel comes only partially upon the coast.

The roads are so laid out as to open the various Lots for settlement, but without much reference to commercial purposes. The port for all this region is Souris; the access to it is to cross the Island from the northern to the southern shore road, and pass along it to Souris. To the eastward of Souris this road is, as before remarked, hilly and inconvenient, and, owing to the length of the ravines which it crosses, not easily improved. Besides, extensive alterations would disarrange the farms through which it passes.

The better plan is to run a road from the Portage road, on Lot 47, direct to Souris, at about two miles back from the south coast, as shewn by the pencil line. It is likely that the ground will be pretty level; if not, the road should be so laid as to leave no hill at a greater rise going towards Souris than one in twenty or twenty-five; this would give easy access to the port for four Townships. The length of the road would be about ten miles. To the westward of Souris very little alteration of roads is required.

TOWNSHIP No. 47.

This Lot is fully settled all round the coast—old farms, the oldest about 60 years. From the western side line of the Lot on the northern coast, round to North River on the southern, distance about thirteen

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miles, the farms are, with some trifling exceptions, freehold. From North River to the western boundary on the south side, they are leasehold. On the Portage Road, which has been opened twenty-five or thirty years, there are a good many settlers, who are holding by adverse possession. The land in the interior is nearly, if not quite, all freehold, having been sold lately by the Proprietor at about \$1 25c. per acre.

The number of freehold farms is 111; of leasehold, 20; and held by adverse possession, 20,—making together, 151. By the tax list, the whole number of holdings, occupied and unoccupied, are 163; and the average quantity in each, 97 acres.

The average crop of the leaseholders in 1860, was—wheat, 28 bushels; barley, 31; oats, 337; potatoes, 236; and turnips, 15 bushels. Also, hay, 53 tons.

This will enable them to provision their families, and leave a small surplus. There are, also, some fish caught off this coast.

Reduced to money value, the produce raised by the 20 leaseholders was, in 1860:—

By two families, below £30, average £20 17s.

By eighteen families, between £30 and £64, average £56 13s 4d.

TOWNSHIP No. 46.

The inhabitants on this Lot are mostly ranged along the coasts, with a few on the Baltic Road. The number of leaseholds is 31, and comprise 2087 acres. Of land in the occupation of others, there is 7410 acres, and of unsettled lands in the hands of large proprietors and others, about ten thousand acres.

The land upon the southern half of the Lot is considered first quality as far inland as the frontier of farms extend, and probably it continues the same to about the middle. From that to the north shore it is inferior; the land on that side is returned as second quality, but there is probably a good deal in the interior of the Lot that is of very little value: 4400 acres has tax paid for it by Sir Samuel Cunard, of which 1400 acres are cultivated, and is probably for defaulting tenants. The remainder, 3000 acres, is unlocated wilderness.

The leaseholders are located, 11 at or near Priest Pond, on the north shore; 8 at Red Point, on the south shore; and 12 on the Baltic Road. The farms on the coast are of long standing; those upon the Baltic Road are but recently cleared, the road having

been opened through only about 8 years. The land is represented as poor.

The number of tenants is 31. The value of produce raised by these in 1860, was—

By 4 families, between £30 and £40,

By 12 families, between £40 and £75,

By 2 families, over £100, average 119 17 6

Here there are fourteen in fair circumstances. Four, very little, if anything, to spare; and thirteen with about half the year's provisions. There are 60 tons of hay, of which the thirteen families under £35 raise about 5 tons; the greatest crop by one person is 10 tons.

TOWNSHIP No. 45.

The southern part of this Lot is mostly in small freeholds. The division line between this and the proprietary lands runs across the Lot nearly in the position D E on the map. Northwards of this, with the exception of some of the farms on the north shore, the located land is held under lease.

Upon the line road, north of B, for about a mile and a half, the land appears to be good; and upon this part there are seven or eight settlers, who have been on it 16 or 17 years.

Thence, to near the north shore, the ground is covered with small spruce, with a few patches of white birch. There are seven or eight settlers on this part of the road, who have been there from two to six years. The land is poor. The remainder of the leaseholders are scattered over the Lot, mostly about the north shore.

It appears by the tax lists that 15,000 acres are in small lots of about 50 to 200 acres, and that 4850 acres have had taxes paid for by the proprietor, the greater part of which is unfit for settlement.

The number of tenants of Mr Cunard, the principal proprietor, on the return of the census of 1861, is fourteen. The terms of their leases, which have expired, were, for nine of them, from twenty to fourteen years, and for the remaining five, from six to two years. Putting these into two classes, the average quantity of produce raised on each farm is, in round numbers, as follows:

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Strike off one tenth of this for seed and the remainder of the first class will about provision an average family of six and a half persons; and feed a horse while doing the farm work—nothing to spare. The second class must get provision from some other quarter or starve.

TOWNSHIP No. 44.

This Lot is thickly settled across both ends and along Souris River. The number of occupants of land is by Tax lists 155, and the quantity of land held by them 11,000 acres. Of these the number of leaseholders are 62, and the quantity of land held by them 3487 acres. Of the leaseholders a considerable number is along Bear River Road, and the remainder at Rollo Bay, and on the Northern coast.

The Northern end of the Lot for about three miles inland is about the same as Lots 45 and 46, poor land, covered with a small growth of spruce.—The remainder is of a fair quality. The land of one fourth of the number of leaseholds, is represented by the census as of first quality, and three fourths second quality. There are six thousand acres for which taxes have been paid by the Proprietors; probably one half of which is unfit for settlement.

Of the 62 tenants on this Township, 57 are on the land of Mr Cunard. Classifying these we have for the average of

There is one who has a large crop, 300 bushels of Wheat and Barley; 900 bus. Oats; 500 bus. Potatoes; 1000 bus. Turnips, and 28 tons of Hay.

Here are 52 out of 57 persons who have barely a sufficiency of grain and vegetable food, without the means of getting meat, or wool for clothing, not to say foreign luxuries, or payment of rent. Even the means of wintering cows is no more than about two tons of straw, and a ton and a half of hay.

TOWNSHIP No. 43.

The settlements on this Lot are upon both shores, and along Bear River Road. The interior is but thinly settled. For three miles inward from the northern shore, the land is generally poor, covered with small spruce. The southern part is of fair medium quality, and along the shores sea weed may be obtained. The enumerator returns three-fourths of the leased land as first, and one-fourth as second qua-

lity. This is not in accordance with the judgment of the enumerators of the contiguous Townships on the same kind of land. He is not a farmer, and has been a resident but a short time.

Lot 44, adjoining, is quite as good, if not better land than Lot 43, the enumerator for which is an experienced farmer, and he puts the leased land at one-fourth first, and three-fourths second quality,—which, if applied to the present case, will be nearly correct.

The number of acres of land taxed in small lots is in round numbers 11,400 acres, and the Proprietors have paid for 4500 acres of wilderness, which represents nearly the amount of unlocated land on two-thirds of the Township,—one-third being owned by the Crown. This land is in the interior of the Township, and not accessible by roads; but there is no reason to think it very different from the land along Bear River Road, which is in the main rather below the medium quality.

The number of Tenants is 64. The value of the crop raised by them in 1860 is—

There were 165 tons of hay, averaging 2.6 tons to each family, but the 27 families below £30 worth of produce, had only half a ton a piece.

Here we have about one half the number of tenants who do not raise a sufficiency of food, and can have but a very small provision for clothing.

The above values are taken—wheat, 7s 6d; barley, 3s 6d; oats and potatoes, 1s 6d per bushel.

TOWNSHIP No. 51.

This Lot lies wholly inland, about one half on each side of Georgetown Road, and is pretty thickly settled. The surface is moderately hilly. The land is by common report of fair quality. The return of the Census shows 45 per cent. of first, 34 of second, and 21 of third class. The leased land is in round numbers about 10,000 acres; freehold, 4,600 acres, and there is 1300 acres for which tax was paid by the proprietor, making 15,800 acres in all which is probably the extent of the Township.

The whole number of tenants is 115. Value of produce raised in 1860 was

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The hay amounts to 211 tons, of which the 53 families, whose produce was under £30, have 47 tons. The three over £100, 23 tons, and the remaining 35, 109 tons.

TOWNSHIP No. 56.

The best land on this Lot is upon the coast, from its western boundary to Little Pond. The land is called very good, and the facility of getting sea manure, is a further advantage to many farms. The fishery upon the coast is also an advantage to those immediately upon the shore. About two thirds of the Lot—the northern part—contains a great deal of inferior land. Seven tenths of the leaseholds are returned as second, and three tenths as first quality. The located land amounts to 11,467 acres, about 9,350 of which is leasehold. Tax has been paid by the proprietor for 8,000 acres, two thirds of which is probably unfit for settlement. The parts remote from roads upon the Map shew the unsettled part.

The number of tenants is 87. Value of produce raised in 1860 was

REMARKS UPON ST. ANDREW'S PARISH.

This parish contains Townships 59, 61, 63, and 64. The general aspect is that of an easy slope, falling from moderately high table land at its western boundary, with a gently undulating surface to the eastern coast, which is quite flat, probably no part of the parish more than 200 feet above the sea level.

Around the coast the ground has been covered with spruce, pine, hemlock, &c., for a distance inland of from one to three miles. The western part is covered with hard wood, mostly beech. The soil is generally dry and gravelly, and in many parts very poor; the best is on the northern part of Township 59; from that it goes on getting worse to Murray River. Lot 64 is somewhat better, but yet far from

meriting the character of good land, except perhaps in a few spots. This range of dry poor ground extends quite across St. John's parish to the south coast.

TOWNSHIP No. 59.

This Lot has a coast of about nine miles in length upon Montague River and St. Mary's Bay. The best settlements are upon Douse's Road, at the western end of the Lot, and upon the coast,—the former being the best land, and the latter having the advantage of sea manure.

"The Whim Road" is, for the first two miles from the coast, unsettled, the land being bad. Westwardly of this is a continuous settlement, and the country cleared off. There is a fair share of sea weed upon the coast of St. Mary's Bay, and some persons make good use of it; but, as in other places, it is not all collected. The largest crops appear by the census to be raised by persons upon the coast, probably owing to the sea manure. The land occupied as farms is returned by the enumerator, who resides upon it, as all of middling or second class quality. The unoccupied land is probably too poor for settlement. There is a large tract of such land on the eastern end of the Whim Road.

By the tax list 16,637 acres are in small lots, and by the return of the census 9100 acres are under lease, leaving 7537 acres, mostly in the hands of small proprietors, or of Government, who purchased one-third of the Township, as part of the Selkirk Estate. The quantity returned as not having paid tax, is 1600 acres of crown land, and 1763 belonging to proprietors; but, in the absence of a survey, it is not known whether there be so much vacant land, probably there is not.

The number of tenants is 109. The value of crop raised by them in 1860 was

TOWNSHIP No. 61.

The principal settlement of this Township is upon the coast of St. Mary's Bay, and for about five miles up the St. Mary's Road. Further up that road, and across the western end of the Township, are some 20 or 30 families of immigrants from the Highlands of Scotland, who arrived about two years ago.

The part of the Township from Mink River Road to the east coast, and for a mile inland, from Stur-

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geon Bay, has been covered with spruce, hemlock, pine, &c. The soil is light and rather sandy. From that to the western end the wood is principally beech, the soil poor and gravelly. I passed over a part of it last winter. The following is a copy of my journal, written at the time:—

“Tuesday, January 8th

“Went up St. Mary’s Road; snow deep,—land covered with hardwood, but poor and dry. Very small quantities of produce in proportion to ground cleared. People apparently poor. Settlers mostly Irish for five miles up the road. Age of the settlement, 13 years, and downwards to three or four years. The next two miles no settlement; then about ten families of Highlanders, who came two years ago, spread over the remainder up to Wood Island Road. Land hard wood, but dry and poor.”

The next day I crossed the head of the Lot upon the Wood Island Road, and remarked land about the same as on the St. Mary’s Road.

Mr Frazer, who took the last census, remarks—“The land on this Lot is generally poor. That which is not swampy is sand and flint stones. I did not see more than four or five good farms on the whole Lot. The west end is well wooded, but bad land. It is about the last place I should care to make a living in; the land is worth nothing except for the lumber.”

Mr Frazer is an experienced farmer, and the above is his opinion, given on oath. In the classification of the quality of the land which is occupied by tenants, Mr Frazer puts the second class at 30 per cent, and the third class at 70 per cent. It is probable that the greater part of the unoccupied land would be rated third class.

By the tax list, the quantity of land in small lots for which tax has been paid, is 11,500 acres; and 8000 acres is paid for by the proprietor. By the census, the quantity of leasehold land is 7100 acres, and of land under agreement for lease 2400 acres, making 9500 acres. The leasehold land is held by 90 tenants, of which 24 are recent settlers; leaving 68, the time of whose leases which has expired ranging from 10 to 40 years,—the greater number from 15 to 20 years. The value of produce raised in 1860 by these 68 tenants, was—

Of eighteen of the recent settlers, the value of the produce raised ranged from about three to ten pounds—average, £6 8s. 9d.; and of four of them the average was £17 4s. 3d.

The hay raised by these 68 tenants amounts to 77 tons. The largest crop raised by one person was five tons. Of sheep, the number on the Township is 809. Of inhabitants, 910, giving an average of about six sheep to each family, but probably the poorer class will not have more than two or three each.

Thus it appears that of 90 tenants, 16 are in fair circumstances. Twelve may have a sufficiency of food, but very little to spare,—nothing for luxuries. 44 with little over half the year’s provision, and 18 less than one-fourth provision. As for clothing, I cannot even guess at the mode of obtaining it.

TOWNSHIP No. 63.

The principal settlement on this Lot is around the eastern coast, and on Murray Harbor as far as Mink River. Up Murray River the settlers are very few. There are a good many on Peter’s Road, and about the western end of the Township. The whole number of families on the Lot is about 100; of which 36 are freeholders, and 64 are leaseholders. The freeholders are mostly on the coast.

The number of acres on the tax list is 20,000, of which 3000 of cultivated, and 8000 of uncultivated, was paid for by the proprietor; the greater part of the latter being unfit for settlement. The number of acres under lease is, by the census, 5100 acres, held by 64 persons, being an average of nearly 80 each. There are also 246 acres occupied by agreements with the proprietors, and 2385 by freeholders and squatters.

The face of the country, from Mink River Road out to the eastern coast, is flat, or slightly undulating, and has originally been covered with soft wood, with a pretty large proportion of pine. The land is light and sandy, and much of it on the coast kept up with sea weed. From Mink River Road to the western end of the Township, and for near half the breadth, the ground has been soft-wooded and burnt over, some of it several times. It is destitute of inhabitants, and likely to remain so for a long time. The northern boundary of the burnt land is tolerably well designated by the dotted pencil line on the map. Peter’s Road runs upon a hardwood ridge, and is pretty well settled; but the land is said to be dry, and gravelly, to produce very little in dry seasons, and withal to be easily exhausted after clearing. I have not been on the upper part of this road, but this is the

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No. 16.—Account of one hundred and thirty-six Sales of Land, mostly within the last five or six years, with observations thereon.

TOWNSHIP No. 1.

About 1855, a leasehold of one hundred acres at the northern end of the Western Road, at about A on the Map, forty to fifty acres of it cleared; buildings of but little value; Fences mostly down; quality of land pretty good, was sold for \$166 cash.

This is \$.33 or \$1.15 per acre upon the cleared part according as it may be forty or fifty acres, allowing the wood part to be worth just the capital of the rent upon it.

Any buildings that would shelter people and cattle, could hardly be estimated at less than \$66, leaving \$100 for the improvement on the the land equal to \$2, or \$2.50 per acre upon the clearing according as it is taken at 40 or 50 acres, or \$1 per acre, if calculated over the whole Lot.

This was not considered as a sacrifice of property, but doubtless it went lower than it otherwise would on account of the cash payment. Not, however, very much lower than the nominal price, because the smallness of the sum required would admit of a greater number of competitors than if it were larger.

2—On the shore at Nail Pond was sold seventy acres leasehold, thirty acres cleared, land good in quality and in good order. Abundance of kelp in the front. Price \$333. Deduct house worth \$33.33 leaves for land about \$299, equal to \$6.66 per acre upon the clearing, or \$2.85 per acre calculated on the whole.

TOWNSHIP NO. 2

3—At about a mile S. E. of the Mill upon the Big Tignish River, and one and a half miles from the sea shore at a meeting of Roads, marked on the plan B, was sold in 1858 a leasehold of seventy acres; fifty cleared. The remainder hard wood; fences in bad order; sea weed on the shore $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile off. Half the clear land pretty well worn out, the other half stumps well rotted and not yet ploughed; land of good quality. Buildings at a low estimate, \$100, sold for \$140 Cash, leaving \$40 for the improvement upon 50 acres, equal to 80 cents an acre. This was not considered a fair price, but the sale was not forced. Doubtless it would have brought more upon a credit. The reason given why the price was so small was the want of fencing poles, the wood upon

it being all hard wood, there was however plenty of poles within five or six miles, and a good cedar fence, that would last half a century, could be built for less than \$100 per mile.

4—Near to the above is a leasehold of 100 acres. 70 cleared. Land and fences in fair order. Buildings worth \$333. It is offered for \$666, which is \$333 for the improvement upon 70 acres, equal to \$4.76 per acre, allowing the wood land to be just worth the rent. It has not been sold owing to the increasing scarcity of fuel, the woodland would be valued by a purchaser as fully equal in value to the cleared land, and taken in this light the price as red is \$3.33 per acre.

5—On the coast a little to southward of Round Pond, a leasehold of $43\frac{1}{2}$ acres—20 acres cleared, and under plough, no buildings, was lately sold, price \$150, equal to \$7.50 per acre for the clearing alone; plenty of seaweed upon it.

6—At Round Pond was lately sold a tract of 150 acres, 60 cleared, house and barn worth \$600, cleared land good, back land inferior, covered with soft wood; a good fishery in Round Pond adjoining the land. Seaweed upon the shore in the front.—Price \$1066. Deduct buildings \$600, leaves for land \$466, equal to \$7.76 per acre upon the clearing, allowing the remainder to be just worth the rent.

7—At Little Tignish has been sold a farm of 80 acres, 20 cleared, a good fishery. Mussel mud in Tignish Creek, and seaweed (kelp) upon the coast at a small distance, buildings \$400, price \$833.—Deduct buildings, leaves \$433 for the land, equal to \$21.65 per acre for the improvement upon the cleared part of the land.

8—At the Cross Roads at the head of the estuary of Little Tignish, near St. Felix on the Map, is offered for sale 58 acres leasehold, 25 acres cleared, the remainder hardwood, land good quality, plenty of mussel mud, buildings worth \$433, price asked \$833, deduct buildings, leaves for the land \$400, equal to \$16 per acre for the clearing. This is a good stand for business, but not sold.

TOWNSHIP NO. 3.

9—At Cape Kildare on the coast 200 acres leasehold, 70 acres cleared, good quality of land, unlimited quantity of kelp on the front, buildings worth

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\$350 sold last summer for \$750. Deduct buildings, leaves \$400 for the land, equal to \$5.71 per acre upon the clearing. The remainder being considered only just equal in value to the rent, or \$2 per acre upon the whole lot.

10—Near the last, 100 acres held by possession, and considered as freehold. 30 acres cleared, the remainder covered with spruce wood, rather poor land, plenty of kelp on the front, middling house and barn, worth \$100; sold for \$333, deduct buildings, leaves \$233, equal to \$2.33 per acre upon the whole. This is seventy-five cents less than the capital of the ordinary rent, throwing the improvement of the thirty acres into the bargain. Payment cash down. This was considered rather a low price, but the sale was not forced.

11—Upon the cross roads leading from Neill's Portage, to the Great Western Road, Mr Yeo sold several 200 acre lots, five to eight years ago, wilderness, title in fee simple, price \$3.33 per acre; twenty-five cents over the capital of the ordinary rent. Time given for payment. Land good.

12—Also, on the same road, a lot of 170 acres, 40 cleared; buildings worth \$200, price \$783, deduct buildings leaves the land \$583, equal to \$3.25 per acre, upon the average of the whole, or allowing \$6.20 per acre for the improvement upon the 40 acres, the price of the wood land will be \$2 per acre. Payment cash.

13—Another Lot on the same Road, corner next to Neill's Portage Road, 150 acres, 60 acres cleared, buildings worth \$466, price \$833; deducting buildings leaves for land, \$366, equal to \$2.44 per acre on the average, or \$1 upon the whole, and \$3.60 upon the clearing for improvement.

This was sold upon a credit payable by instalments. Neglected to enquire as to the tenure, but presume, from the price, that it was either leasehold, or land that Mr Yeo had an unacknowledged claim upon. There is a good deal of land on that part of the Township in that situation.

14—On the same side of Kildare River there is a Road leading across, from Neill's Portage, to the Great Western Road, distant about two miles. Upon this Road a Lot of 100 acres, 30 cleared, buildings worth \$166, land fair quality, sold last autumn for \$500; deduct buildings, leaves for the land \$333, equal to \$3.33 per acre, throwing the clearing in, or allowing \$4.44 an acre for improvement upon the clearing, leaves for the whole land \$2 per acre. Long credit without interest.

15—Also, another 100 acres, 20 cleared, price \$333c. per acre. Same terms as the last.

16—On Western Road, at the head of Kildare River, 150 acres, 20 cleared, log house, barn, and a saw mill, shewn on the map, sold last November, price \$966; value of buildings, with saw mill, about \$500, leaves for the land \$466; deduct again, \$830c. per acre for the improvement upon the 20 acres cleared, leaves \$300, equal to \$2 per acre for the land in its original state. This land is enhanced in value by the mill site, and by a large lot of wilderness in the rear which will supply logs.

The last three lots are held by adverse possession, and considered equal in title to freehold.

17—On the Western Road, one and a half mile south of the above mill, 150 acres of freehold, 20 acres cleared, house and barn worth \$166, was sold at auction 7th of November, for \$966—\$500 down, the remainder on credit. Land, deducting buildings, \$533c. per acre; or, allowing \$8 per acre for improvement on the 20 acres, \$420c. per acre. Land first quality.

18—The block between the Western Road and West Coast, containing about 10,000 acres, is, with the exception of a row of farms on the Western Road, and another on the coast, entirely unsettled. The greater part of this land has been bought up at Sheriff's Sales for taxes, partly by speculators, some six or seven years ago. It was held for some time at about \$1.50c per acre, but did not sell. At length a road has been laid out through it, and the land sold last summer at \$1 to \$1.16c. per acre, at two to three years' credit. The land is of good quality.

TOWNSHIP No. 4.

19—About a mile and a quarter from Bell's Corner, at Casquette, on the road northerly, up the shore, 100 acres leasehold, covered with hardwood, 15 acres cleared, no buildings, saw manure 1 1/2 miles off, sold two years ago for \$333, equal to \$3.33c. per acre, including the clearing, or allowing \$2 an acre for the whole, \$885c. per acre for clearing.

20—On the Kildare Road, three miles northerly of Bell's Corner, 100 acres freehold. It has been covered with hardwood killed by fire, and grown up with a mixed growth, in which hard wood predominates. Land, average quality. Sold for \$333c. per acre, payable by instalments—long credit.

There are several lots in the same place offered at the same price, but not sold.

21—A mile N.E. of Bell's, at the mouth of Kildare River, is 88 acres leasehold, 20 acres cleared,

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8 acres marsh, buildings worth \$133, abundance of kelp within a mile. Offered for sale for \$333. The marsh, at a low rate, is worth \$20 per acre; buildings and marsh \$299, leaves \$40 to add to capital of rent \$271, makes \$311; say \$2 per acre for the whole, and \$6 75c. per acre for improvement upon the cleared part. Considered as freehold. The land is light, second quality. It is not sold.

22—On the Dock Road, about 2 miles from Bell's, at "C," 50 acres of leasehold was sold two years ago for \$150, payable, by instalments, in three years, without interest; inferior house, and 15 acres cleared; present worth, \$134; deduct \$34 for house, leaves \$4 per acre for the clearing, or add capital of rent \$154, and deduct \$34 for the house, and we have the freehold value, \$254. That is, \$2 per acre for the land, and \$6 16c. per acre for clearing the 25 acres.

23—Another lot, 50 acres, near the above, 15 acres cleared, small log house, leasehold, price \$116 66c., payment by instalments same as No. 22. Present worth \$105; deduct for house \$40, leaves \$65 for improvement upon the land. Add capital of rent \$154, makes for the freehold \$219; that is, \$2 an acre for the land, and \$7 93c. per acre for clearing the 15 acres.

24—Mr Canon, three years ago, sold 50 acres leasehold, on the Kildare Road, 2½ miles from Bell's, at "C," on the map, 18 acres cleared, no buildings, fenced, good tillage land, no firewood. It had been partially burnt over. Price \$60; equal to \$3 33c. per acre upon the clearing for the improvement. This was considered a fair price.

WESTERN END OF TOWNSHIP No. 4.

25—On Halloran's Road, half a mile from Campbellton Corner, Mr McKendrick bought 50 acres leasehold, last autumn, 12 acres cleared. House worth \$100; price \$200; land alone \$100,—equal to \$8 33c. upon the clearing. Land good quality.

This is called a high price, but he pays rent for only 50 acres, while he has the opportunity of taking more land in the rear when required. Besides, he has four or five children, and the move brings him within easy reach of a good school. Also, there is a large quantity of burnt land in the vicinity, that he thinks will remain a common pasture for a long time to come. These advantages induced him to give a higher price than the farm would be otherwise considered worth.

TOWNSHIP NO. 5.

26—At the "Village," Holland Bay, a lot of 168 acres leasehold, 60 to 70 acres cleared, good house and barn, keeps 4 horses, 6 cows, besides young cattle, and 60 sheep.

It fronts on the shore at Lewis' Ferry (d), plenty of mussel mud and sea weed; sold last year for \$1166; buildings worth \$500, leaves for land \$666, equal to \$9 50c. per acre for the improvement on the clearing, allowing the other part to be just worth the rent.

If this farm were deprived of sea manure, its value would be reduced to two-thirds of the above, bringing the improvement to about \$4 per acre.

27—Near the same place, was bought last year 150 acres leasehold, 75 acres cleared, the remainder covered with hardwood, buildings worth \$300, abundance of mussel mud and sea manure. Price \$966, and, deducting buildings, \$666 for the improvement on 75 acres, \$8 88c. per acre, considering the woodland as just equal to the rent, but being hardwood, in a place where fuel is becoming scarce, it is worth more than that, and the excess would go to reduce the price of the clearing.

28—A lot of 57 acres, running across the Peninsula, from Dock River to Cascumpec Harbor, southerly of Bell's, fronting upon both. 40 acres cleared, house worth about \$133, sold two years ago for \$500 cash. It is leasehold, at 2s 2-9 per acre.

Deducting the building, the whole land sold for \$6 40c. per acre, or for clearing \$8 15c., and the present worth of the rent is \$6 16c., making \$12 56c. per acre for the whole, considered as freehold. There is plenty of sea manure, and in a good situation for business. It was bought upon speculation, and is offered at \$833, which, at the same calculation, would bring the price as freehold to \$18 44c. per acre, but at that price no purchaser has offered.

The last three farms are somewhat peculiarly situated; there is abundance of manure upon their borders, they are in a densely peopled country, and are immediately upon the best harbor for business on the north side of the Island. The prices cannot be taken as a rule for most other places.

29—At the crossing of Halloran's Road and the Great Western Road, is offered for sale 100 acres leasehold, 20 acres cleared. House and barn nearly new, built for a tavern stand, cost of building \$320. Price asked \$500, buildings deducted leaves \$180 for the land, or \$9 per acre for the improvements. This lot is best quality of hardwood land,

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and clearing has not been severely cropped. It has been advertised all summer, and has not been sold.

The situation of this land is eligible; it is at the crossing of two great roads, is within a mile of a mill and within 8 miles of Cascumpec, the principal place of business on the peninsula.

TOWNSHIP NO. 6.

30—About three years ago, Mr Donald Ramsay bought 103 acres at the junction of Oyster and Foxley Rivers, half a mile above Sage's Ferry. Leasehold, 80 acres cleared, fences indifferent, no buildings, mussel mud contiguous; price \$333, equal to \$3 22c per acre for the whole. Cash down. The 23 acres uncleared had a young growth of hardwood upon it, and was called equally as valuable as the cleared land.

He kept this land three years, built a barn upon it, and some fence. Reduced the value by cropping as much as the barn and fencing was worth, leaving it intrinsically of about the same value as when he bought it. Sold it lately for \$500, cash down, equal to \$4 85c per acre.

TOWNSHIP NO. 7.

31—Mr McKendrick, last year, bought a leasehold of 93 acres, on the coast road, about three miles westwardly of Campbellton Corner; twenty acres cleared, buildings \$173, price \$286; deduct buildings, leaves \$93 for improvement upon the clearing, equal to \$4 65c per acre, the remainder being supposed just equal in value to the rent. Payment, \$200 down, the remainder in one and two years.

32—Another lot was bought upon the coast road, about 1½ miles northerly of the front of Leary Road, 100 acres, leasehold, 40 acres cleared, buildings worth \$100, land good quality, rent 27c per acre. Price, \$266. Deduct buildings, \$100, leaves \$166 for improvement upon 40 acres, equal to \$4 15c per acre; or, allowing the freehold of the land to be worth \$3 per acre, the clearing of the 40 acres will come to \$7 90c per acre.

33—About three months ago, Mr Donald Ramsay bought 92 acres freehold, at the corner of the Coast Road, the western end of Leary Road, and bounded on the coast, about half of it cleared; no buildings, land of best quality, and fenced with cedar. Price, \$866 cash down, equal to \$9 42c per acre for the whole.

This is intended for a farm and trading stand, for

which the situation is well adapted. Here the wood land is considered to be equal in value to the cleared land.

33½—About six years ago, Mr Ellis and Mr England bought 100 acres each, on the north side of Leary Road, from the proprietor, price \$250 for 100 acres, or \$2 50c per acre. Land first quality.

This was paid in preference to paying the interest on \$308 as rent. All the rest of the land on the same side of the road is under lease.

TOWNSHIP No. 8.

34—On the coast road, at about a quarter of a mile south of the front of Leary Road, 100 acres freehold, 30 to 40 cleared. Buildings worth \$50, land first quality, price \$850. Deduct buildings, leaves \$800, equal to \$8 per acre for the whole. Payment cash down.

This farm is about equal in quality of soil, improvement, and situation to that described in article 32, and the payment for each cash down. The freehold therefore rates at \$1 84c per acre more than the leasehold, other things being equal.

Lot 8 was settled along the west coast, and about two miles up Leary Road, near 20 years ago. The back lands, and some on the south coast, have been sold in moderate-sized blocks for payment of taxes, and bought up by speculators, who sell again at the best price they can obtain. Of this land, the following was purchased:—

35—Five years ago, Mr Gay bought on the Leary Road, five miles from the west coast, from the Hon. Mr Yeo, 200 acres of hard wooded land, best quality, for \$1 16c per acre, payable by instalments, in one, two and three years.

Mr Rayner and Mr Harris bought 100 acres each alongside of it, at the same time and on the same terms.

35½—About the same time Mr Silliker bought 600 acres at the N.E. corner of Lot 8, upon which he has now a large clearing. Mr Gay thinks the price was \$1 33c per acre, since confirmed by Mr Anderson.

He also says that there is land of the same quality in the rear of these lots, but thinks will not sell till road is run through it.

This land is not in an ineligible situation. The Leary Road is as good as the average of roads on the Island, and is settled between these lands and the coast, at an average of five families to the mile.

36—A lot of 500 acres freehold, lying on the west side of Pierre Jacques River, extending from the road

to the sea shore (see map) and including a pretty broad strip of marsh, covered with hardwood at the road and softwood near the sea coast. Land fair average quality. Was sold in 1855 at auction, for \$103 33c, about 20.6c per acre. There were a great many bidders

36½—The next year 269 acres of the same land, including 20 acres of marsh, was sold by private sale for \$150, 55 cents per acre, payable by instalments.

TOWNSHIP No. 9.

37—In 1848, Mr Macknight purchased near the mouth of Brae River, four separate farms, leasehold, making together 350 acres, clearing 60 acres, buildings worth \$80, price \$200, leaves for the improvement on the land \$120, about \$2 per acre. At the end of six years he threw up the leases of three of them to the landlord, and sold the improvement in the remaining one, for \$100. He was a trader and ship builder, and found farming by hired labor unprofitable.

38—In 1850, Alexander Macdonald sold a leasehold to Peter Macisaac, 100 acres, 30 cleared, buildings worth \$133, price \$3 33c; land alone \$200, equal to \$6 66c per acre upon the clearing. Payment by instalments, mostly by barter.

39—About the same time, John Beaton, jun, sold 50 acres leasehold, 10 acres cleared, buildings \$33; price \$100, leaves for improvement \$66, equal to \$6 66c per acre for the improvement.

40—Last November, John Macdonald sold a leasehold of 85 acres, 20 cleared, well fenced with cedar and a good part stumped; buildings \$83, price \$200, land alone \$116, improvement on the 20 acres \$5 80 per acre Cash in six months.

All the above lands are of the first quality of soil.

TOWNSHIP No. 13.

43—Mr Ramsay of Port Hill, four years ago bought 35 acres, leasehold, all cleared with a house upon it; price \$500, house \$200, leaving for the land \$8 57c per acre. This land was in grand order for a crop, and he got \$150 out of it the first year, which reduced the cost of the land \$4 57c per acre Payment cash. It is now let for \$50 per year, including the house.

TOWNSHIP No. 14.

44—Mr Edwards 2½ years ago, bought 105 acres,

freehold, about a mile southwardly of the Presbyterian Church, fronting upon Richmond Bay, 80 acres in ploughed fields, woodland equally valuable as the clearings, buildings \$500; price \$1,100, land alone \$600, equal to \$5 71c per acre. Payment cash.

45—About two miles southwardly of Port Hill, 100 acres freehold, was sold two years ago, all cleared, sea weed upon the front, and mud upon the land; land considerably run out by cropping, buildings worth about \$340; price \$1200, deduct buildings, leaves \$860 for the land, \$8 60c per acre.

46—Mr Monkley bought a freehold of 75 acres, three years ago, at Presbyterian Meeting House, fronting upon Richmond Bay, all cleared and well fenced. Buildings worth \$333, price \$733, land alone \$400, \$5 33c per acre. Payment cash.

47—Mr Carr has 100 acres freehold, on the western side of the road nearly opposite Mr Edwards, (No 44) which he offers for sale. It is in grand order as a farm, 50 acres cleared, woodland equally valuable as the clearing, and is well watered. Buildings worth \$466, asks \$1166, deduct buildings, leaves for land \$700, equal to \$7 per acre. It is not sold, the owner is not under the necessity of selling, but wishes to shift his situation as a matter of speculation.

48—A farm of 50 acres of freehold was lately sold near Cross River, at *h* on the map, 12 acres cleared, not stumped, good land, covered with hardwood, mills within a mile; thickly settled country. House worth \$80. Price \$250, land alone \$170, equal to \$3 40c per acre, including the clearing, or allowing the 12 acres of clearing to be worth \$6 an acre, the fee simple of the land, in its primitive state, would be \$2 per acre.

TOWNSHIP No. 16.

49—About two years ago, Mr Macgregor bought at the lower bridge of Ellis River, 50 acres, leasehold, all cleared and in ploughed fields. Buildings worth \$333; price \$600, leaves for land \$266, equal to \$5 33c per acre. Payment cash down.

50—Shortly after the above purchase, he bought another tract of 50 acres, leasehold, adjoining the former, all clear, no buildings, price \$600, payable by instalments, \$12 per acre. This was bought for special reasons at a price considered far above its real value. There is plenty of mussel mud on the front of these lots I do not know whether any of it has been used upon them.

51—About four years ago, Mr Coles bought a leasehold of 80 acres, at Kent's crossing of Great Western and Egmont Bay roads (see map), 30 acres

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cleared, house ten or twelve years old, 35 x 24 feet. Barn and shed, each 30 x 20 feet; value of buildings \$500, price \$866, land alone \$366, equal to \$12 20c per acre for the clearing.

52—About a year and a half ago, the above property was sold at auction, by the owner for \$500, about the value of the buildings. The cleared land is all in ploughed fields, and run poor by cropping.

53—About four years ago, Mr. Allan bought 50 acres, leasehold, on the corner opposite the above; 12 acres cleared, house 24 x 30, new barn 27 x 35; buildings worth \$783. Price \$850, price of land alone \$116, equal to \$9 66c upon the clearing, or \$2 33c upon the whole.

It was bought for a tavern stand, and as the principal part of the value was in buildings, the sale can hardly be taken as a criterion of the value of the land.

54—Last autumn, Mr. Larrisy bought 100 acres leasehold, about 40 rods eastward from Kent's Corner, fronting on the road, 25 acres cleared; no buildings. Price \$206; paid by instalments in one year, equal to \$8 24c per acre upon the clearing.

55—About four years ago, Mr. Porry sold 50 acres leasehold, on the road from Kent's to Egmont Bay, about 2½ miles from Kent's, 20 acres cleared, no buildings, good fences. Price \$80, payable in three years by instalments. Present worth \$72; \$3 60c per acre on the clearing.

56—Same person bought 30 acres in rear of the above, on Lot 16, leasehold, 15 acres cleared, no buildings, partly fenced. Price \$80; \$5 32c per acre for the clearing.

This land was fresher than that which he sold. By this time it is equally reduced, and he proposes to sell again.

57—On the main road, leading from St. Eleanor's to the Ferry on Ellis's River at γ on the map, three years ago, Mr. Lyle bought 50 acres leasehold, 25 acres cleared, no buildings. Price \$166, equal to \$6 66c per acre on the clearing. This was considered an extra price, and bought for special reasons, on account of its position with respect to other lands already owned by him. He thinks \$8 36c per acre is about a fair price for cleared rented land in his neighborhood, nothing being allowed for that which is uncleared. The land is of second quality.

58—About 1½ mile southward from the above was sold last autumn, 120 acres leasehold, nearly all cleared, fronting on Richmond Bay. Buildings included for \$900, sold at auction for \$933; cash down. Price of land, \$133; 88c per acre, land second

quality. This was a sacrifice, and cannot be taken as a guide to price.

59—About 1½ mile northward of St. Eleanor's at λ on the map, was sold lately, 150 acres freehold, mostly cleared, the woodland being the more valuable part, buildings worth \$1,166. Price \$2,333, being for the land alone, \$1,166; \$7 77c per acre.

60—Adjoining the above was sold last summer, same tenure and price, and same value of buildings and quality of soil, \$7 77c per acre, or, assuming the land in an unimproved state to be worth \$2 per acre, \$5 77c for the improvement.

These lots are in a thickly settled country, good soil, within a mile of Richmond Bay on one side, and 2½ miles of Summerside on the other.

61—At three quarters of a mile eastward of St. Eleanor's, was sold 50 acres of freehold, and 50 acres of leasehold, rent \$13 88c per year, land good, buildings nearly new, worth \$1,000; \$1,566, capital of rent \$231 38c, added to price paid, makes \$1,798, the equivalent price as freehold. Deduct buildings, leaves \$798; \$7 98c per acre for the land.

62—At about 1½ mile from St. Eleanor's, was sold last summer, 100 acres freehold, nearly all clear, land good, price \$3 33c per acre, cash down.

63—One and a quarter mile westerly of St. Eleanor's, on the road leading to Linkletters shore, a freehold lot of 55 acres between the road and Bedeque Harbour, good land, all cleared, sea weed in the vicinity. Buildings \$1166; price asked \$1066, price of land about \$500; equal to \$9 09 per acre, not sold.

64—About half a mile westwardly of Summerside, between the road and the shore, and near the above 53 acres are offered for sale; land good, contiguous to sea weed, and fenced with cedar. Buildings cost about \$1200; price asked \$2000; land \$800, about \$15 per acre, not sold.

65—At two miles eastward of Summerside, on the shore of Bedeque Harbour, with the main road crossing it; 75 acres of freehold, all clear, no buildings, sold last year for \$18 50c per acre. It is said that before the New Brunswick railroad was built, this would not have brought \$12 per acre.

66—At two and a half miles eastwardly of Summerside, a lot of 150 acres of freehold, and 40 acres of leasehold, at \$2 20c an acre rent. Dwelling house, two barns, outhouses, well, &c., supposed worth \$1000, sold last year for \$1666; land alone \$666—add \$240 for capital of rent, makes \$906 for 190 acres, including the leasehold, equal to \$4 77 per acre. It is not in a high state of cultivation.

The above was sold in 1850, for \$1133, when

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buildings and land were in a better state than at present.

Nos. 63, 64 and 65 have been run up to speculative prices since the building of the New Brunswick Railway.

67—A lot of 65 acres leasehold, on the main road, two miles eastward of St Eleanor's, nearly all cleared, not very good land, had been severely cropped. Barn worth \$46, sold last autumn at Sheriff's sale for cash; price \$213, equal to \$3.28c per acre, building included; or, deducting \$30 as a reduced price for the barn, leaves for the land \$183, equal to \$28.2c for the land. This, if \$3.08c be added for capital of the rent, the sum is \$5.90c per acre, considered as freehold.

74—Last autumn Mr Rogers, bought near the Roman Catholic Church, at Miscouche, 67 acres freehold, all cleared, good buildings, price \$300 cash down; \$4.48c per acre, buildings included.

TOWNSHIP NO. 18

68—About five years ago, Mr Henry sold a leasehold of 100 acres near the road from Barrett's to Princetown, 60 acres cleared and under good cultivation. Buildings worth \$233; price \$500, leaves for the land \$266, equal to \$4.44c per acre for the improvement upon the clearing, allowing the wood land to be just worth the rent; or \$2.66c per acre for the whole; adding \$3.08c for capital of rent, it makes \$5.74c per acre for the freehold. Payment part cash, the remainder by instalments in hay and cattle at a valuation.

TOWNSHIP No. 19.

69—A lot of 100 acres near Traveller's Rest, westward, between the main road and the shore of Richmond Bay, leasehold, sold last year for \$666, about half cleared, the wooded part equal in value to the cleared. Buildings worth \$166, leaves \$500, equal to \$5 per acre; adding \$3 for capital of rent, makes \$8 per acre considered as freehold.

70—About a year ago Mr Mackay bought a leasehold of 50 acres on the main road, about a mile from the Traveller's Rest, 40 acres cleared, land pretty good and well fenced. Buildings \$66; price \$350, land alone \$284, equal to \$7.10c per acre on the clearing. Payment half cash down, the remainder at three and nine months.

71—A leasehold farm of 83 acres on the main road, one and a half mile eastward of Traveller's Rest, 50 acres cleared, the rest in holes, &c., no buildings, land in fair order, sold last autumn by auction; price

\$660, equal to \$8 per acre; terms ten per cent, deposit the remainder at one and two years; present worth \$617; \$7.43c per acre on the whole.

72—About a year ago, Mr Waugh bought a freehold of 50 acres, a quarter of a mile north of Wilmet Creek Bridge, on the main road, all cleared, good land, fenced in good order, fronts upon the shore, plenty of sea weed and mussel mud, no buildings. Price \$333, equal to \$6.66c per acre, paid by instalments. First instalments at one year. It joins other land belonging to the purchaser, and on that account is worth more to him than to others.

73—Last autumn, Mr Sheshan bought 50 acres of freehold, at the crossing of the Blueshank and Princetown Roads, two and a half miles south east from Barrett's, first quality of land, 20 acres cleared, buildings \$33. Price \$216; deduct \$33, leaves \$183,—equal to \$3.66c for the land; or deduct \$4 an acre for the clearing and fencing, leaves about \$2 an acre for the land in its primitive state.

The payment was \$133 down, the remainder in one and two years, with interest. This was called a cheap purchase. It is a well settled country.

75—About four years ago, Mr Chisholm bought 40 acres freehold on Blueshank Road, 20 acres cleared, good land, no buildings. Price \$183, equal to \$3.86c per acre, or allowing \$4 an acre for the clearing, the land in its original state comes to \$1.32c per acre.

76—About three years ago, Macdonald bought 30 acres of freehold, about a mile above Wilmet Creek Bridge, 10 acres cleared, no buildings, marsh that cuts two tons of hay, \$2.50c per acre, or \$75 for the lot. At the common valuation of marsh, it, and \$4 an acre for the clearing would exceed the money paid. It went at this low price in consequence of ready cash payment.

77—About 5 years ago, Mr Donahoe bought 70 acres freehold, up Wilmet Creek, above the Bridge, 45 acres cleared, land of good quality, and in good order, buildings worth \$666. Price \$1200, deduct buildings, leaves \$533 for the land, equal to \$7.61c per acre for the whole. In this region of country, the wood land, if hardwood, is quite as valuable as the cleared land. Payment cash.

78—About three months ago, Mr Boners bought 117 acres freehold, alongside of the last, 70 acres cleared, good land, cuts 4 tons of marsh hay; marsh worth about \$166, buildings worth \$433, price \$1583, deduct buildings and marsh \$600, leaves \$983 for the land. Payment \$333 down, the remainder by instalments of \$250 per annum for five years, with interest.

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79—Last autumn, Mr Reeves bought 91 acres of freehold at Freetown, 40 acres cleared, no buildings, land of fair quality; price \$566, equal to \$6 22c per acre for the whole. Payment \$333 down, the remainder in one year. Present worth \$553, \$2 for wilderness, and \$9 10c per acre for improvement.

80—Two years ago Mr Stetson bought 90 acres freehold, on the west side of the main road near the Presbyterian Church, and abutting on Dunk River, including 8 acres of marsh, 50 acres cleared. Buildings worth \$66, marsh worth \$200; price \$1333; deduct marsh and buildings, leaves \$1066, equal to \$13 per acre for the land. Sold upon a long credit with interest, considered to be an extravagant price, mussel mud within reach.

81—About 3½ years ago, Mr Auld bought 149 acres freehold, in Freetown, 125 cleared. Buildings worth \$500; price \$1500. Deducting buildings, leaves for the land \$1000; \$6 71c per acre. Payment cash down.

103—1½ year ago, Mr Brown sold 50 acres freehold, on the Princetown Road, at the Presbyterian Church, near Haslam's, (Lot 67,) 25 acres were cleared, no buildings, price \$203; \$4 07c per acre for the whole, or allowing \$1 50c per acre for the land, it gives \$5 12c per acre for improvement upon the 25 acres clearing.

104—Mr Ayers, of Lot 14, offers for sale at about a quarter of a mile below the Saw Mill, on Wilmot Creek, 30 acres of freehold, all cleared, and fenced, and in pretty good order. Barn worth \$66, asks \$166; deducting barn, the land is \$100—\$3 33c. Not sold.

TOWNSHIP No. 26.

82—About three years ago, Mr Inman bought 150 acres leasehold, nine-pence currency per acre, at the Baptist Meeting House on the Main Road, near Dunk River, 100 acres cleared, 8 acres marsh, worth \$333. Buildings valued at \$1666. Price \$2500; deduct \$2000 for buildings and marsh, leaves \$500 for the land, \$5 per acre on the clearing; add to this \$312, capital of the rent, makes \$812; supposing \$2 the value as wilderness, it gives \$5 12c per acre as the value of the clearings.

This land was sold for the purpose of making a division among heirs, and was considered to be a very cheap bargain. The buildings had cost as much as the whole sold for. It is not a good example from which to determine the value of land.

83—Mr McFarlane, at Salutation Point, about 4 years ago, bought 50 acres of woodland on the shore:

Price \$166—\$3 33c per acre, cash down. It was alongside of his farm, and he bought it for the fuel. For farming purposes, he thinks he would not be willing to give more than half of that price.

84—On the Bedeque Road, at about one mile south of Hooper's Corner, Mr Murphy offers for sale 100 acres leasehold, 30 acres cleared. Buildings worth \$133, he asks \$666, which is \$533 for the land. The highest offer he has had is \$433, which, deducting buildings, leaves \$300 for the land, or \$3 per acre, and adding the capital of the rent, makes \$6 per acre for the whole, considered as freehold. The woodland is perhaps not quite the value of cleared land.

84½—Mr Wilkinson, of Mimisigash, about a year ago, sold a farm 10 miles from Summerside, 100 acres leasehold, 60 acres cleared; house worth \$200. Price \$683, half down, the remainder in one and two years, equal to \$655, present worth for land alone \$455—\$4 55c per acre. He thought it rather a low price.

TOWNSHIP No. 27.

85—Mr Dobson, innkeeper, about 8 years ago, bought the place on which he resides, at Searletown (situated on the Bedeque Road), two miles east from the north line of Lot 27, 50 acres freehold, 25 acres cleared, buildings worth \$533. Price \$850; deduct buildings, leaves \$300 for the land—\$6 33c per acre for the whole. Payment cash down.

86—About half a mile from the above, Mr Allen, two years ago, bought 100 acres freehold, 50 acres cleared. Buildings worth \$500. Price \$1200, payable by instalments in two years, without interest. Present worth \$1102; deduct buildings, leaves \$602—equal to \$6 2c per acre upon the whole.

There is a mill site upon the land, with half of a saw mill in operation. Allowing for this, the land is at a very low price, say \$3 for improvements, and \$1 50c for the land.

87—Near the same place, Mr Clarke, about a year ago, bought 80 acres freehold, 20 acres cleared, no buildings. Price \$366. \$4 55c per acre, payable in two years without interest. Present value \$336. Allowing the land in its original state to be worth \$2 per acre, the price paid for the improvement upon the 20 acres would be \$8 50c per acre, which was probably about the calculation of the value in the purchase.

This lot was bought the previous year for \$200 cash—\$2 50c per acre, including the clearing.

88—About a year ago, Mr Hall bought 120 acres in Searletown, on the Bedeque Road, freehold, thirty

acres cleared; buildings worth \$66, price \$1000, land alone \$933—\$7 77c per acre, payable by instalments in six years, without interest.

The present worth of these payments is \$833, from which deducting \$66, leaves \$766 for the land,—\$6 39c per acre, considered as present payment.

89—About a year ago, Mr Maccormack sold 40 acres of freehold, two miles east of Dobson's on the same road, 25 acres cleared, barn worth \$16. Price \$150, land \$133,—\$3 33c per acre. Cash payable in one year. Present worth \$3 13c per acre on the whole.

90—Near the same time, Mr Cameron sold 100 acres leasehold, three-quarters of a mile westward of the last, 50 acres cleared, buildings \$166; price \$400. Land alone \$233,—\$2 33c per acre, or \$4 66c per acre for improvement on the clearing. Terms \$66 down, the remainder in one and two years. Or, the present worth of the whole payment is \$378; from which, deducting \$166 for buildings, leaves \$2 12c per acre for the whole, or \$1 24c per acre upon the clearing only.

91—In October, 1859, Mr Warren sold 100 acres leasehold, close to the last, 80 acres cleared. Buildings worth \$166. Price \$433, land \$266—\$3 33c per acre upon the clearing. Terms, \$100 in six months, and \$333 in payment of back rent.

92—About twelve years ago, Mr Donnelly bought on the same road, two miles east of Dobson's, 100 acres, 40 acres cleared, but none stumped. Buildings \$50. Price \$200; from which deducting buildings, we have \$150 for the land,—\$1 50c per acre for the whole.

This title was disputed with the proprietor of the Lot; but if rent had to be paid, it would have increased this to \$4 50c per acre; or allowing nothing for the woodland, the \$150 would be for the clearing of the 40 acres, \$3 75 per acre; but price of produce was then less by one-third than at present, so that the equivalent sum at present would be about \$5, which is nearly the calculation for such work at the present time.

93—Two years ago, Mr Sobey sold 80 acres of freehold, and 50 of leasehold, on the Bedoque Road, on the south side line of Lot 27. Cleared, 40 acres. 94—Mr Macdonald, last winter, sold at auction 100 acres freehold, on the shore of Seven-mile Bay, at the Roman Catholic Church; 60 acres cleared, no buildings, good land, plenty of sea weed and marsh mud, fishery on the coast. Price \$1190,—\$11 90c per acre. It was bought by the owner of the adjoining farm, was particularly of value to the purchaser, on account of its situation with respect to the adjoining land, and was bid up to a price considerably higher than it was intrinsically worth.

95—A lot of 100 acres freehold, adjoining the above, was sold by Mr Macinnis. 60 acres cleared. Buildings, and a piece of marsh together, worth \$433. Price \$1566, land alone \$1133,—\$11 33c per acre. Land first quality; fronts upon the shore, with great abundance of sea manure.

TOWNSHIP NO. 28.

96—Last summer was sold near the Wesleyan Church at Amherst Cove, 27 acres of leasehold; rent at 16d currency per acre. No improvement. Price £57 10s; \$191 66c; to which add \$100 as capital of rent, the sum is equal to \$291 66c, or \$10 66c per acre.

This lot is about half a mile back from the shore upon the stream shewn on the map, and contains a good mill site, with no mill near it. The land is of a good quality; persons in the neighborhood say that for farming purposes it would be worth about \$2 per acre.

97—Last summer Mr Bell bought a leasehold of 100 acres, about a mile back from the shore, and near the above; 45 acres cleared, no buildings, no sea manure, land of good quality. Price \$6 66c per acre.

The purchaser says that this lot is of more value to him than it would be to others, on account of connection with other lands. He thinks it would not be worth, for the mere purpose of settling upon, above \$3 33c. If to this he added 16½ years' purchase of the rent, it makes \$6 41c per acre of freehold.

The last two tracts are in one of the most productive and wealthy parts of the Island, and persons sometimes purchase land for the enlargement of their domains, or for other reasons, at prices quite beyond what it would be proper to give merely as an investment of capital, or even for the purpose of improvement as a farm.

98—About three years ago, Mr Gamble purchased a freehold of 130 acres, situated about 1½ mile N. by

rom the Cloth Mill, at the Bedeque Road, near Tryon, (see map), and abutting on the county line, on the verge of a good settlement. Land good, well timbered with hardwood, no clearing. Price \$200; \$1 54c per acre.

99—At the same time, Mr Rogerson bought 130 acres alongside of the above, in the same state, and at the same price.

These lots were sold by Mr Holland, the owner of large property at Tryon, who was under no necessity of selling. The price was considered the full value. They are on the outer edge of a flourishing settlement, and within five or six miles of Cra-paud Harbor.

100—Last year, Mr Macdonald sold 100 acres freehold, near Southward Road, at m, on the map. No clearing, good land and timber. Price \$76 66c, —76c an acre.

101—About 3 years ago, Mr Edward Brennan bought 85 acres leasehold on Anderson Road, near the Saw Mill, 12 acres cleared. No buildings; sold at auction, price \$130,—\$1 53c per acre, including the improvements on the 12 acres. Terms, \$33 down, the remainder in two yearly instalments, without interest; equal to \$1 22c. Present worth \$1 43c per acre.

102—In the autumn of 1829, Mr Hamil sold 100 acres of leasehold on the Anderson Road, at the crossing of the line between Lots 26 and 27. Fifty acres were cleared, no buildings, price \$433. Terms, in three instalments, at one, two and three years, without interest. Present worth, \$387,—\$3 87c per acre for the whole, or \$7 74c per acre for improvements upon the 50 acres of clearing.

This was an old farm, in a public situation, at a crossing of the roads, and the price was considered pretty high.

102½—This winter Mr McDonald sold to Mr Wright a leasehold of 100 acres, 50 acres cleared, buildings worth very little. Lies on Anderson's Road, west of the Saw Mill, very public place, land of the first quality, the price \$900,—\$9 per acre. It was bought by the owner of land on both sides of it, and the price was considered to be \$233 more than would have been given in the ordinary way of purchasing a farm. Terms, \$500 down, the remainder at one and two years.

Taking the \$2 33c off, the price would be \$6 66c per acre, besides the rent, which, capitalized, makes \$9 74c per acre; or allowing \$6 per acre for improvement on the clearing, the land in the uncleared

state, comes to \$3 66c, or, with capital of rent, to \$6 74c per acre.

TOWNSHIP NO. 29.

103—Mr Harrington, five years ago, sold 50 acres of leasehold, three miles from the sea shore at Cra-paud, six acres cleared, no buildings, very little good wood. Price \$166,—\$3 33c per acre, besides rent. Mr Harrington thinks this was a fair price at that time.

104—Some years ago, Mr Macnaughton sold 50 acres leasehold, all clear fields. Buildings worth \$333, price \$666, land \$3 33c,—\$6 66c per acre. Terms, cash down.

105—Six years ago, Mr Enman sold 50 acres leasehold, within 1½ mile of Cra-paud Harbor; plenty of sea weed; all clear fields, buildings \$500. Price \$1500, land \$1000,—\$20 per acre.

106—John Harrington sold 45 acres leasehold about a mile from the shore. All cleared; Buildings \$166; price \$666. Land \$500,—\$11 11c per acre.

TOWNSHIP No. 28.

107—At North Rustico, about a mile inward from Orby Head, was bought last summer, 25 acres, 16 cleared and fenced. Buildings \$500. Plenty kelp manure within a mile. Price to the tenant \$83, and to the proprietor for the freehold \$166, making together \$250. Deducting \$50 for building, leaves for land \$200,—\$8 per acre. The wood land is worth more than the cleared land. The selling price of the wood is \$6 66c per acre, which, when taken off, leaves the land clear.

TOWNSHIP No. 33.

108—At the south side of Harris', (Rustico) Bay, was sold last year, 100 acres freehold, 70 acres cleared. Buildings \$200; price \$1000; land \$800, \$8 per acre. Plenty of mussel mud and eel grass on the front.

TOWNSHIP No. 32.

109—Eight years ago, Mr Halloran sold 75 acres leasehold on York River, five miles from Charlotte-town. Plenty of mussel mud; all cleared; buildings \$333, price \$1333, land \$1000,—\$13 33c per acre.

TOWNSHIP No. 51.

110—On the Georgetown Road, at four miles west of Finlay's, New Perth, 50 acres of leasehold were

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offered for sale, 20 acres cleared, buildings worth \$66, good land and well wooded. Price asked \$233—being \$166 for the land, \$3 33c per acre, including the clearing—or allowing the wood land to be just worth the rent, \$8 30c per acre for the improvement upon the clearing. It was not sold, but considered to be a fair price.

111—On the same road, about 2½ miles west of Finlay's, was sold last April, 50 acres leasehold, 20 cleared. Buildings \$66, land first quality, and well wooded. Price \$500; land \$433,—\$8 66c per acre. Paid in two years by instalments. Present worth, \$7 86c per acre. This was called an extremely high price.

112—On the same road, 3½ miles west of Finlay's, last spring, 50 acres leasehold, 30 cleared, pretty good land, hardly as good as the last. Buildings, \$133; price \$366, for the land \$233,—\$7 76c per acre for the improvement, paid by instalments.

This was bought by the owner of the adjoining farm—suppose others would not have given so much.

113—Another 50 acres leasehold alongside of the last, and of about the same quality, was sold about the same rate, 30 acres cleared, \$7 76c per acre for the improvement.

TOWNSHIP NO. 52.

114—About a mile west of Finlay's, New Perth, on the Georgetown Road, 100 acres of freehold land, 30 acres cleared, the remainder covered with beech, birch and fir,—land of good quality, no buildings. Offers have been made by the owner of the adjoining farm up to \$1000,—10 an acre. He wants to settle his son upon it, and is willing to pay a high price for that object. Mr Finlay thinks that the real value of it is about \$5 per acre.

115—Eight years ago, at about a mile east of Finlay's, at the Cross Roads, was sold at Sheriff's sale, 120 acres, 90 cleared, no buildings, mixed wood, fair quality of land. Price \$233 cash down,—\$1 94c per acre for the whole. No rent, considered as freehold.

116—The above land has been again sold, about three years ago, clearing 40 acres, buildings worth \$133; price \$800, land alone \$666,—\$5 55c per acre for the whole, allowing \$10 65c per acre for the improvement, the land will come to \$2 per acre in its natural state.

117—A quarter mile east from Finlay's, 100 acres freehold, 25 acres cleared, no buildings, was offered by the owner five years ago, for \$1 per acre, including the clearing. It was considered a fair price, but

not sold. Allowing \$100 for the improvement upon the 25 acres, there remains for the land in its natural state, \$3 per acre

TOWNSHIP No. 53.

118—At five miles from Georgetown, or two and a half miles from Finlay's on the main Georgetown Road, and abutting upon Brudenell River, Mr Rivett lately bought a farm of 120 acres freehold, about 50 cleared. The wood on the remainder has been heavy hemlock and pine, burnt down about twenty years ago, and now covered with bushes. Buildings worth \$233; price \$433. 122—Another lot about half a mile W of the last, second quality of land, burnt and young growth wood. The same as last. 50 acres, 15 cleared. Price \$166; \$3 33c per acre. Allowing \$6 per acre for clearing, leaves \$1 52c per acre for the land in uncleared state. Payment by instalments.

TOWNSHIP No. 45.

126—One mile back from the village of Souris was lately sold 70 acres freehold, 25 cleared, and half of it stumped. No buildings, good land, and covered with hardwood. Price \$466; \$6 66c per acre, cash down.

This land was bought on account of the wood

which sells at \$8 per acre. The lot has risen 20 per cent in value since last year.

127—On the line road, three miles from Souris, 50 acres freehold, 15 acres cleared, half of it stumped; no buildings; price \$166; \$3 33c per acre clearing included, or allowing an average of \$6 for the improvement, brings the land to \$1 50c per acre.

128—Last autumn was sold about a mile E from Macgowan's mill, Souris River, 75 acres good hardwood land, 20 acres partially cleared; no buildings. Title by a possession of 14 years; price \$106; \$1.40 per acre, including the clearing. Payment cash down.

TOWNSHIP NO. 55.

123—A person from Nova Scotia, last year, bought a freehold of 160 acres at Narrow's Creek, Cardigan River. About 18 acres cleared, well wooded with hardwood. Price \$1066, buildings worth about \$100, land \$966,—\$6 per acre.

It is on a good harbour, and was built for a ship-building and trading station. The lot contains a great quantity of ship timber and cordwood. The price is not a guide to the price of farming land.

124—Five years ago, Mr Harrington bought 75 acres of good hardwood land, no clearing, at 1½ mile from Souris, on the road leading up Souris River. Freehold; price \$150,—\$2 per acre.

125—Eight years ago, Mr Halloran bought 75 acres freehold, half of it cleared. Buildings worth \$333; price \$1000; land alone \$666,—\$8 89c per acre upon the whole. The woodland is equally valuable as the clearing. Payment cash down.

129—John A. Morrow bought, this spring, near Surveyor's Inlet, Lot 47, 90 acres of freehold, 35 under plough, price £230. Buildings, at a very low estimate, £100; leaves for land £130—\$433; equal to \$4 81c per acre on the average, or, allowing \$2 per acre for land, gives \$4 37c for the improvement. Cash down.

This was bought by a man who had a farm alongside, and to whom it was a particular convenience. It was thought in the neighborhood that others would not have given so much.

130—At about a mile from Souris, on the road near the Roman Catholic Church, was sold this spring 60 acres of freehold, first quality hardwood, 30 acres clear. Price £150, buildings £10, land alone £140

—\$466,—\$7 77c per acre. Payment by instalments in three years. The wood land equally valuable as that which is cleared.

131—On the west side of Souris Harbor, about a quarter of a mile northward of the Main Road, was sold 100 acres of freehold, 35 acres cleared. Price £250, buildings £25, land £225—\$750; \$7 50c per acre. Payment cash down.

132—Head of Rollo Bay, on the main road, was sold this spring 75 acres freehold, 10 acres under plough, land good, well watered, on main road, and in a public place. Price £95 10s, houses and barn £20, land £75—\$250; equal to \$3 33c per acre on the average, or, allowing, \$8 per acre for the improvement, it would give \$2 25c per acre for the land. Payment cash, part down, and part in six months.

133—Near the same place, head of Rollo Bay, 100 acres freehold, running across westwardly from main road, at head of Rollo Bay, to Fortune River, on south east side of the Cross Road. A shipyard on it at Fortune River bridge; land second quality, no clearing, nor buildings. Price \$3 33c per acre.

134—About two miles eastwardly of Wood Islands, John King sold 50 acres leasehold this spring, nearly all cleared. Price \$200. Required by Government to convert it to freehold, \$1 50c per acre, equal to \$75,—making together \$275. Buildings worth \$266, nearly the price of the land. This sale was not forced.

135—Near the same place Roderick Fraser sold 100 acres, 80 cleared. Leasehold to be purchased out at \$1 50c per acre; price of lease £50, for purchase from Government £45; making for the freehold £95—\$316; buildings \$100, leaves for land \$216, equal to \$2 16c per acre, including clearing, or, allowing the improvement at \$4 per acre, the wilderness comes to 96c per acre. Poor land.

136—Another 100 acres near the last, was sold at the same price, 40 acres cleared. Buildings worth £20—\$66; freehold when purchased will come to \$250. Allowing the improvement on the cleared land to be worth \$4 per acre, the wilderness will come to 90c, about the same as the last.

Most, if not all, the vacant land on Lot 47 has been sold within the last two or three years, at \$1 25c per acre, payable by instalments.

PRICE OF LAND IN FORMER TIMES.

Mr Carr, of Lot 14, says that about forty years ago his father bought the lot he lives upon, 100 acres (Art. 47), for \$200—\$2 per acre. It was sold

sidered an extravagant price. Several others in the same neighborhood bought at \$100 to \$166 per 100 acres—\$1 to \$1 66c per acre.

About the same time Governor Fanning sold to Strong Silliker 100 acres on Lot 19, on the road leading from Traveller's Rest to Wilmot Creek, two or three acres cleared, a small log house, and a marsh to cut half a ton of hay upon. Price \$333, cash down. Taking the house at \$30, clearing at \$16 and marsh at \$14, there will be left for the land \$2 73c per acre.

About 1835, Miss Fanning sold several lots on Township No 67, for \$33 per 100 acres, or 83c an acre. This was in the interior of the country, the roads new and access difficult. The price was afterwards raised.

Mr Schurman says that Governor Fanning granted Lot 67 to disbanded soldiers, after the peace of 1815, and bought from them for a trifle.

Twenty-three years ago, Mr Foley, of Lot 3, bought a leasehold of 105 acres, 45 cleared, buildings worth \$333; price \$516. Improvement of the land, \$183—\$4 8c per acre on the clearing.

Mr Macdonald, Lot 27, says, that 20 years ago wild land sold at about £25 per 100 acres—82½c an acre.

OPINIONS EXPRESSED BY DIFFERENT PARTIES AS TO THE VALUE OF THE LAND.

LOT 1.

At a meeting of people at Palmer Road, opposite the southern end of Nail Pond, it was said that the generally understood valuation of leasehold farms, about two-thirds clear land, and including ordinary buildings, is about 20s—\$3 33c per acre upon the whole. Special circumstances, as good buildings, or facilities for getting sea manure, cause an increase. One old gentleman present said he had 100 acres leasehold, about 70 acres cleared, with a house and barn worth \$200, and that he would not take less than £200—\$666, or \$4 66c per acre, exclusive of the buildings. But he did not wish to sell.

This was considered an extreme price, and named by a person in independent circumstances, who, if he sold at all, would only do so as a speculation.

LOT 4.

The reason given why the land on the Western Head, at Campbell's Corner, does not sell, is the

rents; around the sea coasts there are privileges that do not exist in the interior, and which are not compensated by the goodness of the land. A poor man, at the end of seven years, cannot usually have more than twelve or fourteen acres cleared, and a good deal of that producing but little. Eighteen dollars a year is, under such circumstances, a weight, that few who can avoid it are willing to encounter.

Mr Ramsay, Port Hill, says he estimates land beyond the reach of sea manure at about one half of what it is worth on the shore, quality being equal.

Same authority says that more than one half, in some cases two thirds, of the original lessees, lose their lands by falling into arrears in the payment of rents.

Some persons in Bedeque gave as their opinion, that new settlers may be classed in three parts:

One third who pay;

One third who are unable to pay; and

One third who might pay, but do not exert themselves sufficiently.

Benjamin Haywood, Esq., of Lot 1, says he estimates the fair value of leasehold farms, including ordinary buildings, and under the usual terms of payment, part cash and part credit, to be about \$4 per acre; but very little changes hands.

Mr Lyle, Lot 16, thinks 20s (\$3 33c) is about a fair price for clear leased land, nothing being allowed for that which is not cleared.

At a small party at Mr Anderson's, Bedeque, it was agreed that the general value of improvements upon leased land, was about \$3 per acre, if back land; and about double that if on the sea shore. Also, that marsh was worth from \$25 to \$50 per acre, according to quality, for the freehold.

Mr Dingwell, Fortune River, says that he thinks the improvements on leased land in the vicinity would sell for 20s to 40s (\$3 33c to \$6 66c) per acre, according to the situation and opportunity of getting sea manure, but that very little changes hands.

Mr Finlay, of New Perth, says he thinks that for 100 acres of freehold, partly cleared, middling quality, a fair average price would be about \$500, exclusive of buildings. Special advantages, such as sea manure, &c., might bring it up to nearly double this sum.

The general price of stumping land in this settlement is \$5 to \$8 33c per acre, the contractor finding himself.

There is but little first clearing done.

Land beyond the reach of sea manure is valued at about two-thirds.

To keep up this course of Cropping, it is necessary to Manure about 30,000 acres each year. To furnish manure for this ground, there are—

Horses	-	-	-	-	-	14,500

Hogs	-	-	-	-	-	32,200

This gives for two acres about the manure made from one horse, 4 neat cattle, 6 sheep and 2 pigs. To this may be added, Sea weed, Bog manure, and a small quantity of Mussel mud; but these cannot be very great. It is manifest that this quantity is not adequate to keeping up the fertility of the land.

No 18.—Tables deduced from the Census of 1861, shewing character of the Leases, the quality and produce of the Lands leased in twenty-two Townships indiscriminately selected, and the means derivable therefrom for paying the stipulated Rent.

The following Tables are extracted from the Returns of the Enumerators of the Census of 1861, and the value of the produce computed so as to give a proper idea of the means derivable from the soil at command of the Tenants for the payment of Rent and for the maintenance of families:—

1st. The first column contains the names of the tenants.
2d. The second, the number of acres in the holding.
3d. The third, the arable land on the farm. This is the quantity that is or has been under the plough, omitting those parts of the clearing from which the wood has been taken off, but not yet cleared from stumps, a process that takes place six to twelve years after chopping down the timber. This land yields two or three crops when first cleared of the wood, which is the reason that in some cases considerable crops are returned when there is little or no arable land. An example may be found in the return for Lot 61, where there are twenty-three holdings, with more or less produce, but no arable land. The quantities of arable land given by the enumerators are seldom from measurement; they have to depend upon enquiring of the family, and often upon their own judgment from the appearance of the fields,—hence the returns may not in this particular be absolutely correct, but they are sufficient to give a good general idea of the state of the farms. In some instances, the given number of acres of arable exceed the quantity of leasehold in the preceding column. The reason of the discrepancy is, that sometimes the same person occupies both leasehold and freehold, and the arable land and crop may be partly upon the latter. These elements having been taken without distinction as to tenure of the land, errors from this source cannot be corrected; they go to make the production of the leased land appear greater than it really is; but the instances do not seem to be very numerous.

4th. The fourth column shews the quality of the soil. This requires some explanation. The enumerators were generally farmers of experience, and residents either in their Township or in the vicinity, and were well calculated to give a just comparison. But different minds often disagree on such matters; and, besides, the standard of reference may not in every case be the same. The best land in the range of country between Georgetown and Murray Harbor does not equal the best in the rear of Souris, in Bedeque, or in the Western part of Prince County. This classification may be taken as a good general guide—perfect uniformity can hardly be expected. A remark may not be out of place here with respect to the classification given in a former paper (No. 2) of the land in Prince County. In that classification, the third quality was such as it was supposed a new settler could not make a living upon, and which could only be brought into cultivation by gradual enrichment from the better lands, or by imported manures or other expensive means. In the enumeration of the census, such land is not taken into account at all, it is only the land in cultivation that is classified; the unsettled land did not lie within the scope of the enquiry. Hence, the three classes of the census fall within the first and second of that classification; the qualities are designated by the figures, 1, 2, or 3.

5th. The fifth column—the “term” explains itself.

6th. The time expired does not in every case give a true account of the length of time of occupation of the farm. Sometimes new settlers do not take leases for several years, being unable or unwilling to pay the fees. In many Lots, leases were taken by settlers of long standing, who attorned, and it is only the time elapsed since which is entered in the sixth column,—hence there appears sometimes a large quantity of arable, when but a few years of the lease have expired. It sometimes also happens that the earlier settlers abandon their farms after making improvements, and the existing leases date from the incoming of the new tenant.

7th. The seventh column. "Present rent," per acre, is generally sixpence, or one shilling per acre, as the case may be; but that originally represented British sterling, and was paid in "Halifax currency," which was one-ninth added to sterling—making one shilling sterling equal to 1s. and one-ninth Halifax currency. But by an Act subsequently passed by the Legislature in —, called the "One-ninth Act," the one shilling sterling of rent is paid by one and one-ninth of the Island currency, which is fifty per cent. added to sterling. Thus, when by the original lease, in cases of leases made previous to the passing of that Act, the rent of one hundred acres, at one shilling, would be Five Pounds sterling; the payment under the Act would be only £3 14s 2d sterling, or 8½ per acre; and the rents having since been paid at the latter rate, they are so calculated in the columns. Some enumerators have put down one shilling and a penny half-penny; and others one shilling only; both meaning the same thing, one shilling and one-ninth. The money column of rent is calculated upon this plan.

8th. The value of the crops is calculated from the returns of the quantities of produce, in 1860, upon each farm. It is based upon the present cash prices, viz.: wheat, seven shillings and six-pence; barley, three shillings and six-pence; oats, two shillings; potatoes, one shilling; buckwheat, two shillings and six-pence, and turnips nine-pence per bushel, Island currency. One-tenth of the gross produce is deducted for seed.

9th. The Rent is given in currency.

10th. The "net proceeds, currency," is the sum remaining after deducting the rent from the value of the produce.

11th. The hay is not valued, but is given in the eleventh column in tons.

12th. Owing to want of time for revision, a few errors may be found in the calculations, but none that will materially affect the general results.

13th. The most striking feature of these tables is the small value of produce upon many of the farms. For instance, on nine Lots in King's County, the produce of four-sevenths of the tenantry is below thirty pounds in value; the average being about £15 6s currency, or £10 4s sterling.

Another seventh have produce between thirty and forty pounds. Average thirty-five pounds. The remaining two-sevenths run between forty and one hundred pounds—average sixty pounds. But eighteen families out of the nine Lots average one hundred and seventy-nine pounds, and four others two hundred and seventy-six pounds.

The food of one person for a year, at the prices calculated, will hardly be less than four pounds; say two pounds for bread and potatoes, and two pounds for meat and fish; and taking the average family at six and a half persons, the amount will be twenty-seven pounds; to which add thirty bushels of oats for feeding a horse while at work,—say thirty pounds in the whole, besides milk and vegetables in the summer. But considering the small quantity of fodder for seven months' feed of cattle, and the poorness of the pastures in summer, the relief from milk cannot be very great. Taking the provisions of the family at twenty-seven pounds a year, it is only 10s 4½d

currency, or 6s 11d sterling, per week; there is no surplus for the payment of rent or purchase of foreign articles. But of four-sevenths of the tenants this is the maximum income,—the average is only about one-half of this sum. There is also another seventh but slightly raised above this. Nor is this the state of things occasioned, except partially, by the newness of the settlement; an examination of the tables shews that the new farms are not numerous, and that in the greater number of instances small crops are drawn from farms long settled upon.

It may be surmised that these persons get a good deal of their living by fishing; but this can hardly be the case, as the greater part of the poor tenantry are in the interior of the Townships, out of reach of the fishery. As regards clothing, those people can make for themselves, if they had materials, but the source from which they are to be drawn is not obvious. By the tables of 1855 all the sheep in these Townships averaged but eight to a family; and as the more wealthy have a large share, the number owned by the poorer class can hardly be put at more than three or four to each family. How clothing and shoes are obtained by those people, to meet the rigors of winter, is a question difficult to solve. It has been said that there is a great deal of suffering among them at times, and the statistics prove that it must be true.

The eight Townships of Prince County to which the tables refer, are all northward of St. Eleanor's, and may be taken as a fair average of the production of that part of the country. The number of the smaller crops stands in nearly the same proportion to the whole as in King's County, viz., under £30, 50.3 per cent.; between £30 and £40, 13.4 per cent.; but the larger crops are somewhat larger, both in proportional number and in average value. The aggregate value of the crops, over £100, is also somewhat larger; but still there is one half of the population in these Townships whose average crop is only £16 18s, currency. It should, however, be remarked, that many of the inhabitants of the peninsula are in a better position with respect to fishing than those of King's County. For six Townships in Queen's County, taken promiscuously with Township No. 27, at Bedeque, which is fully as good as the others, the proportion of small crops is less than in King's or Prince Counties. The whole number of tenants on the seven Townships is 770; the number of these having crops of less value than £30, is three hundred and nineteen, about forty-one per cent. of the whole; and the average value of these crops is £18 11s. The number of crops of value between £30 and £40, is one hundred and five, about thirteen and a half per cent. of the whole; average value £31 13s. The number of crops over £100 in value is eighty-three, about eight per cent. of the whole number, and their average value £143 8s. This shews a lower percentage of the smaller crops, with a somewhat larger average value, and a greater proportion of large crops, than King's or Prince Counties. But still, there are forty per cent. of the tenantry who do not raise a sufficiency of food, and thirteen per cent. who can have little if any to spare. It may properly here be observed, that the freeholders and large leaseholders contribute mainly to the exports of the Island.

Remarks on Lot 3:—

The land on Lot 3 in general is very good. At the west end of Miminegash the land is very good indeed, but the people complain of the roads, for which I think they have good reason. The roads are almost impassible for carriages at present.— The people of Miminegash are very anxious to have a road through the centre line of Lot 3, which then would be very little more than half the distance to Cascumpec, which is now the chief market place. On the east end of the Lot the roads are pretty good, but the land is not so good as at the west end; there is water communication at both ends of the Lot, and the Kildare River runs up into the middle of it, which is navigable only for small boats, the mouth of which is filled up by a mussel bed which would be a great benefit to us all if cleared out to allow schooners to come up it.

APPENDIX (A.)

General Remarks appended to Lot 4:—

The potatoe crop the last year has been a failure compared with that of the previous year.

Clover seed has also been a failure—on account of the scarcity of hay, there was very little saved; last summer being very dry.

The whole of the Township may be classed as second quality land, there only being a few small spots of first quality; there are about 1000 acres of barrens, and a small quantity of swamp. With regard to the quantity of butter made, there was not one farmer who knew the quantity consumed by his family, and could only give account of the sales. The same remark will apply to the quantity of cheese.

The road from the western road to Campbelton, from the head of New Langholm to the Dock settlement, which was formerly opened by the Proprietor, is now almost impassable, even for a person on foot. Having walked through that way to the back settlers, I can safely testify to this from actual experience.

The Lot 7 road, by Campbell's Cross, is in a bad state for wheel carriages, being much cut up by frost, &c.

The road from Campbelton to the head of Dock settlement, would be a great convenience to the inhabitants of the West shore, including the rear of the Lots 3, 4, 5, 7 and 8, as a short road to Cascumpec Harbor would consequently open a Port to them for either sale or shipment. At present, they have to run the risk of shipping in the open straits with scows, &c., or take their produce, fish, &c. in open boats to Richibucto, N. B., which they barter for other necessaries.

Remarks on Lot 14: --

As regards the quality of land on this Township, it is second quality, but when it is well cultivated it yields good crops. Freeholders are mostly independent; but the inconveniency of obtaining a market for their surplus produce tends to retard their prosperity. Tenants complain loudly of the rented system; some few among them are independent; but too many of them are needy, particularly the French settlers located on the western section of the Lot.

Roads and Bridges on this Lot are generally kept in pretty good order; but I regret to have to state that we have no wharves for shipping purposes, as the eastern section, especially, commands water privileges. The markets most resorted to are St. Eleanor's and Summerside, which are at a distance of from twelve to eighteen miles.

Remarks on Lot 16:—

The eastern part of this Lot is about eight miles from Summerside, where the inhabitants generally take their grain to market. The main road leads through the Lot to that place, and is generally in a good state of repair. The Lot is also bounded eastwardly and northwardly by Richmond Bay where produce is occasionally shipped off. The western part of the Lot is from twelve to four miles from Summerside, and the people have to cart their produce through by the main western road. Richmond Bay extends some distance up, which affords the inhabitants an opportunity of water communication occasionally. The land is in general low, swampy, and barren, and a good many people there are poor.

APPENDIX (A.)

Remarks on Lot 21:—

The quality of land on this Township will compare favorably with the soil of the Island in general, while in other parts it is inferior. In some settlements, particularly in and around Mill Vale Road, many of the settlers are in very destitute circumstances, living on rented farms; and being poor when they came here, having scarcely any clearance, and many of them no other way of subsistence than by planting a little with the hoe, they scarcely gain a livelihood, although the people seem industrious. In general, the land is also very hilly, &c.

This Lot is pretty well intersected with roads, and which are in a very fair state of repair. The greatest inconvenience to the travelling public, is the want of a bridge over South-west river, at or near Cole's Ferry. The water communication is good—harbor well buoyed, and about ten feet of water on the bar at half tide.

Markets most generally resorted to for the sale of produce, are Halifax, Miramichi, St. John New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Boston and New York.

APPENDIX (A.)

Remarks appended to Census of Lot 32:—

The Lands on the south end of Lot 32 are light and fertile, and not subject to mildew or early frosts, and the settlers there have access to mussel mud and other sea manure. All the farmers are freeholders and in easy circumstances. Those on the middle parts are poor; the lands being flat and swampy are subject to early frosts.

The north end of the Lot is light and sandy, and the farmers are chiefly tenants, and poor, as they have no access to sea manure, and their farms are very small.

The crops this year, were partially a failure. I met with many who had no seed, nor anything to support their families during the ensuing summer.

This Lot is well provided with roads and bridges, and is convenient to places for shipping off produce. Upon the whole, I am of opinion, that Lot 32 is very poor, and may be classed second or third class.

Remarks appended to Lot 46:—

Although the East end of the Island is almost surrounded by water, yet it is very inconvenient for the want of harbors, and being far from any markets causes a great deal of trouble to the inhabitants conveying their produce to market.

Baltic Road is principally very inferior land, with only a poor road, it being only lately opened. Greenvale, which is in the interior of the Island, is a very inconvenient place, on account of bad roads; the nearest market is Souris.

Glencordale, which is a new settlement, is only middling land, with very poor roads; it is very inconvenient for markets; the people have to bring their produce through to the north side, and from thence to Souris.

5. I have observed that there are not any words inserted in the Act, Cap. XXIV, "for the naturalization of Aliens," confirming the privileges granted to the limits of the Colony, as required by the Colonial Regulation, Cap. XIII, Sec. 114.

6. I have called the attention of the Attorney General to the omission, and I have the honor to enclose his Report on the subject.

7. From this it appears that this Act is a copy of an Act which has been for some time in force in New Brunswick.

In your Despatch, No. 54, of the 6th ultimo, you transmitted, together with other Acts passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, on the 17th of April, 1862, one containing a Suspending Clause, and intituled Cap. XXIV, "An Act for the Naturalization of Aliens."

Your objection to this Act was well founded; its operation should have been specifically confined within Prince Edward Island, which might have been effected by inserting the words "within the Island," after the word "entitled" in the 1st clause, and after the words "and shall," in the 4th clause.

In consequence of the omission of such a restriction, Her Majesty's assent will be withheld from the Act.

I have to add, that the error in the New Brunswick Act, did not escape my notice, and that the Lieut. Governor was instructed to procure its amendment.

With reference to the Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, on the 17th of April, intituled, Cap. xix, "An Act to authorize Grants on the Shores of this Island," I have the honor to acquaint you, that I purpose to recom-

mend this Act, which has a suspending clause, for Her Majesty's special confirmation, but I have to offer to you the following observations upon it :

The second clause, which requires the consent in writing of the owner of adjoining lands to a grant of any part of the sea shore in front would sufficiently protect the interest of the owners if the definition of the term "owner" in the 3rd clause had not included Leaseholders, who doubtless are, in the majority of cases, the tenants in possession. These would have a direct interest in consenting to the alienation to themselves of the shore in front of their holdings, and thus indirectly, and without compensation, prejudice the rights and inheritance of their lessors. This, it appears to me, would defeat one of the objects which I had in view in not recommending Her Majesty to assent to the similar law of 1860.

Until, therefore, the Act shall have been amended so as to make any disposition of the front shore (in cases where a Leaseholder in the sense of the Act is owner) contingent upon the joint consent of the owner of the inheritance and of the Leaseholder, I have to instruct you to use the discretionary power conferred upon you by the first clause in not granting away the front shore for a longer period than the unexpired term of the Lease. The 3rd section, as at present worded, does not seem to me to secure that joint consent which would be alike fair to both parties and best protect the interests of each.

Your Lordships having referred to us the annexed letter from Mr. Elliot, transmitting by desire of the Duke of Newcastle copy of an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, intituled, Cap. VII., "An Act for raising a Revenue," we report,—

That we have examined the said Act, and we observe that there is a slight variance in the 8th Section thereof, from the provisions of the Imperial Customs Act. For breach or violation of the latter Act, the ship is made liable to forfeiture in cases where the master, *whether he be owner or not*, shall be found privy or accessory to such breach or violation, but by the 8th Section of the Island Act en-

closed, the ship is not forfeited on account, or by reason of any breach or violation of the Act committed by the master *not being the owner*.

There may, however, be local necessity or reason for this enactment as regards Prince Edward Island, and as the same although less stringent than is not repugnant to the Imperial Custom Laws, we see no objection to the Act being left to its operation.

Sir Samuel Cunard expresses to me a confident hope that these terms will be found to satisfy the expectations of the Tenants, and will be well received by the Legislature.

I have not had time, since receiving this document, to examine the full bearings of the proposal; nor in any case should I pronounce a confident opinion on a matter depending so much on questions of local detail. But I need hardly say that it will give me great pleasure to find Sir Samuel Cunard's anticipations are well founded.

The Letter in which the Draft Bill was first communicated to me was signed by Sir Samuel Cunard, Mr. E. Cunard, Mr. L. Sullivan, and Sir Graham Montgomery, for himself and Mr. James Montgomery, who therefore may be taken as having unquestionably concurred in it. But the Schedule to the Bill—I don't know on what authority—contains various other names. I think that if the Bill was to be passed by the Legislature, the only Proprietors on whom it could be made at once compulsory, are the gentlemen whose names I have above given. I should have little doubt, however, that the other gentlemen named in the Schedule to the Bill, are in fact consenting parties, although it has not been practicable to forward their actual signatures to the Colonial Office.

A Bill for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the Reversion of their Farms.

WHEREAS, by a certain Address of the House of Assembly of this Island, pursuant to certain Resolutions passed by the said House, it was prayed that Her Majesty's Government would be pleased to direct a Commission to enquire

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into the existing relations between Landlord and Tenant, and to negotiate with the Proprietors for abatement of Arrears of Rent, and also for terms to enable the Tenants to purchase the reversion of their farms.

And whereas Sir Samuel Cunard, Baronet, Edward Cunard, Sir Graham Montgomery, James Montgomery, the Right Honorable Lawrence Sullivan, Daniel Hodgson, William Cundall, John Roach Bourke, the Honorable Thomas Heath Haviland, John A. McDonald, and the Honorable Edward Palmer and Henry Palmer, proprietors of the several Township Lands mentioned in the Schedule to this Act, marked A., did agree to the issuing of such Commission. And whereas a Royal Commission was thereupon issued, which is as follows:—

(L.S.) “ VICTORIA R.

“ VICTORIA, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith. To all to whom these Presents shall come, greeting.

“ Whereas We have been moved by the Assembly of our Island of Prince Edward, to appoint Commissioners to inquire into the differences now prevailing in Our said Island, relating to the rights of landowners and Tenants in Our said Island, with a view to the settlement of the same on just and equitable principles: And whereas the said Assembly has further, by a resolution dated the 14th day of April last, set forth its agreement to abide by the decision of any such Commissioners, or the majority of them, and to concur in whatever measures may be requisite for giving validity to their decision: And whereas it is highly desirable that the said differences should be adjusted:

“ Now know ye, that we, taking the premises into Our Royal consideration, are graciously pleased to nominate

and appoint, and do by these presents nominate and appoint, Our trusty and well-beloved John Hamilton Gray, Esquire, Our trusty and well-beloved Joseph Howe, Esquire, and our trusty and well-beloved John William Ritchie, Esquire, to be Our Commissioners for inquiring into the said differences, and for adjusting the same on fair and equitable principles.

“ Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this 25th day of June, 1860, in the 21th year of Our Reign.

“ By Her Majesty's command,
(Signed) NEWCASTLE.

And whereas the said Commissioners, by their Report, did find and declare that the said Township Lands were not liable to forfeiture in consequence of any omission to perform, or any non-performance of any of the conditions in the original grants thereof. And also that no arrears of the Quit Rents, by the said grants reserved, are now due or recoverable from the Proprietors, Tenants, or Occupiers of such lands; and also that the Proprietors, their Tenants, or Occupiers, should be quieted in their possession of certain parts of the said lands, called or known as “The Fishery Reserves,” and did also declare and award that all arrears of Rent which accrued due to the said Proprietors in respect of any of the said Lands, previous to the , 1858, should be remitted to the Tenants, and did also fix certain rates at which they should have a right to purchase the reversion of their farms. And whereas the said Commissioners did also, by their Report, direct and provide that, in certain cases, the value of the lands should be ascertained by Arbitrators, to be appointed by the Landlords and their Tenants, in making which last direction or provision, the said Commissioners exceeded the authority intended to be given them by the Assembly and the said Proprietors, and the same, if confirmed by Act, might give rise to many

APPENDIX (C.)

disputes and much litigation between Landlords and Tenants, and such direction or provision cannot be allowed or confirmed. And whereas it is, nevertheless, expedient for preventing the Tenants being deluded by the agitation of impracticable projects, based on certain questions called, in the said Resolutions, "The Escheat Question," "The Fishery Reserve Question," and "The Quit Rent Question," as well as for securing to them the benefit arising from the remission of Arrears of Rent, and the right to purchase the reversion of their farms, that the declarations, provisoes, or directions relative thereto should be confirmed in the manner and under the provisoes hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas the said Proprietors have agreed, during the several periods hereinafter mentioned, to adopt the rates of commutation fixed by Her Majesty's Government for the Commutation of the Quit Rents, as the rates at which they will permit their Tenants to purchase the reversion of their respective farms, and which rates are more advantageous to the Tenants, than the rates fixed in the said Award.

1. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council, and Assembly, that from and after the passing of this Act, every Tenant of any of the Proprietors in the said Schedule named, having, at the time of his desiring to exercise the right of purchase hereinafter given, an unexpired term of not less than 21 years, under written demise, in any of the Township lands of such Proprietors therein mentioned, shall have a right or option to purchase the reversionary interest of such proprietors, his heirs, or assigns therein, at the rates hereinafter mentioned, that is to say: during the first period of five years, from the 1st day of May, 1862, every such Tenant shall have a right or option to purchase such reversionary interest at 15 years purchase of the yearly reserved rent; during the next period of five years ensuing, such Tenant shall have a right or option to purchase such reversionary interest at 18 years purchase of the said

yearly reserved rent; and during all subsequent periods every such Tenant shall have a right or option to purchase such reversionary interest at twenty years' purchase of the said yearly reserved rent. Provided always, that in any case where the said yearly rent, during the first portion or years of the term, shall be less than the yearly rent reserved during the residue of such term, the amount of the purchase money shall be computed by multiplying the maximum or full rent reserved during such residue of such term by the number of years' purchase at which such Tenant may, under the provision aforesaid, be entitled to purchase.

2. Be it further enacted, that the heretofore recited Declarations or Award of the said Commissioners, respecting the Escheat or forfeiture of the Lands, and the Arrears of Quit Rents, and the Lands called or known as the Fishery Reserve; and also concerning the Remission to Tenants of Arrears of Rent, which have accrued due previous to the day of 1858, and which are now unpaid, be, and the same is hereby declared to be, valid and binding at law and in equity.

3. Be it further enacted, that in any action hereafter to be brought by any of the said Proprietors, their heirs, or assigns, against any such tenant, for the recovery of rent which may have accrued due previous to the day of 1858, under any such demise as aforesaid, this Act (as to so much of the demand as relates to rent accrued due previous to such last mentioned date) shall be a good defence under the general issue, without the same being specially pleaded in bar thereto.

4. That nothing in this Act shall be construed to entitle the Tenant of any farm or lands, comprising any mill site or water-power, capable of being used for the driving of any saw or grist mill, to retain any such remission of arrears of rent, or a right to purchase the reversion thereof, as aforesaid.

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5. That this Act shall not extend to any lease or demise where the unexpired term shall be less than twenty-one years; nor to any lease or demise of any farm or lands having, at the time of the granting thereof, any houses, buildings, or other improvements of that description thereon, unless such houses, buildings, or other improvements shall have been erected or placed thereon by such lessee, or some person from whom he may have received thereof before the granting of such lease.

6. That no Tenant shall be entitled to claim the right or option to purchase under this Act, unless all arrears of rent, and which may be recoverable by action, shall be first fully paid and satisfied.

7. That in case the Tenant shall desire to purchase between the periods or days on which the rent falls due, the same shall be apportioned, and the portion there found to be due, added to the purchase money, payable by such Tenant under the provisions of this Act.

8. That nothing in this Act shall extend to any lease made after the passing of this Act.

9. That no Landlord shall be compelled to sell under the provisions of this Act, unless the whole of the purchase money be tendered or offered to be paid.

The Board having taken into consideration the proposed Bill, intituled "A Bill for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the reversion of their Farms," submitted by Sir Samuel Cunard, on behalf of himself and certain other Proprietors of Lands in this Island, and transmitted to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in a despatch from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle bearing date the 5th day of April, 1862, have to report that they cannot consistently recommend His Excellency to hold out any expectations by which Sir Samuel Cunard, and his associate Proprietors, or His Grace the Duke of Newcastle might be induced to believe that the Legislature of this Colony would sanction any measure respecting the Land Question reported upon by the Land Commissioners, which might differ essentially from the principles embodied in their report.

The House of Assembly at its last session, deeming the faith of Her Majesty's Government pledged to this Colony to maintain and carry out the Award of the Commissioners in its true meaning and spirit, have, by an overwhelming majority, passed a Bill for its confirmation. The Legislature, at the same time, passed a Bill to facilitate the execution of the Award in that part which provides for ascertaining, by the medium of an Arbitration, the price of Land, in cases where

APPENDIX (C.)

the Proprietor and Tenant cannot mutually agree between themselves; a provision of this nature appearing indispensable to give full effect to the method of valuation, in this respect, awarded by the Commissioners.

In the Bill proposed by Sir Samuel Cunard, above referred to, it is recited that the said Commissioners "exceeded the authority intended to be given them by the Assembly and the said Proprietors." This assumption on the part of the Proprietors appears to be founded upon rules of construction merely applicable to instruments of a certain and well-defined legal character, but which rules would appear to be totally inapplicable to a Report or adjudication proceeding from a Commission acting under the extraordinary powers conferred upon the Land Commissioners. These powers were never intended to be restrained or limited by any formal or arbitrary legal rules. By reference to the words of the Commission it will appear that the Commissioners were empowered to enquire into the existing differences between Landowners and Tenants, and to adjust "the same on fair and equitable principles." From the language here employed, the powers conferred upon the Commissioners were of an unlimited description; and, in the opinion of the Board, amply sufficient to enable them to define any mode of settlement, even one of a purely equitable character. The Board know of no more equitable principle than that of an impartial valuation of each Tenant's farm.

For the Commissioners to have attempted this, by their own personal labors, would have been a work of almost endless duration, and incalculable expense. Having, then, established clearly the principle of valuation, they found that the object could be accomplished in shorter time, and at much less expense, by the intervention of Valuers, in whose judgment also, more confidence would likely be reposed, from the circumstance of their being Judges chosen by the parties themselves.

In order that this, the principal element in the Award, might not in any instance be rendered ineffective by the obstinacy of either party in the issue refusing to nominate his Arbitrator, the Legislature provided a means as simple and just as could be devised, by which the intentions of the Commissioners might be carried out.

These enactments on the part of the local Legislature, it will be observed, do not in any manner vary or trench upon the principles of the Award; and they have been passed, not only for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Award in fuller detail, but as being essentially necessary, in view of the Dispatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, of the date of the 21st March, 1860.

By a passage contained in the despatch of the Duke of Newcastle to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, dated the 7th February, 1862, His Grace appears to apprehend that the Arbitration system prescribed by the Commissioners, would necessitate a multiplicity of separate local arbitrations, which, in the estimation of His Grace, would constitute insuperable objections against this mode of adjustment. The Board, however, see no reason to apprehend that in the practical working of the measure, many of these arbitrations would be called for. On the contrary, they are of opinion that should arbitrations be resorted to, two or three cases on a Township would have the effect of establishing a price or prices that would become the respective standards of value on that Township.

The Board feel impelled to express their hope, that His Grace, the Duke of Newcastle, in considering the Bills which have been passed by the Legislature of this Colony, for the purpose of giving effect to the Award of the Commissioners, will bear in mind, that the differences which the Commissioners were appointed to finally determine, have, for upwards of a half Century, exercised a most baneful influence upon this Colony, and that the

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people generally, hailed with much satisfaction the prospect of having these differences adjusted by a mode to be pointed out by the very talented Commissioners, to whom they were referred,—and that should any thing occur to prevent such adjustment, and the confirmation of their unanimous, able, and impartial Report, to which the Legislature, by these Bills, seeks to give effect, the consequences will be of a very serious nature, and result in causing much anxiety to Her Majesty's Ministers, and also to those to whom may be trusted the Government of the Colony.

A true Extract, which I certify.

SIR ;

I have received your Despatch No. 45, of the 25th of June, enclosing two Bills, passed with suspending clauses, by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, intitled Cap. IV, An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners on the Land Question, and Cap. XII, An Act to facilitate the operation in certain particulars of the Award or Report made by certain Commissioners to settle and adjust differences respecting some of the Township Lands in this Colony.

In forwarding these Acts, you informed me that you would shortly communicate to me a minute of your responsible advisers, explaining the reason for framing these measures ; and this you have since done in your Despatch No. 52, of the 23rd of July ; I am therefore now in a position to communicate to you the conclusion to which I have been led.

It appears from the minute of your Ministers, that they consider the so-called

Award of the Land Commissioners to be binding on the Proprietors, and the Legislature, and on this ground they state that they are unable to entertain Sir Samuel Cunard's proposal for enabling the Tenants in Prince Edward Island to acquire freehold interest in their holdings, which was transmitted to you in my Despatch of the 5th of April last, No. 103.

I very much regret that it is not in my power to concur in the views by which your Government have been led to prepare those Bills ; or to advise Her Majesty to bring them into operation by giving her assent to them.

Your advisers appear to consider that H. M. Government had proposed to the Proprietors of land, and that those Proprietors had consented, to place themselves and their interests absolutely in the hands of the Commissioners. This, however, was far from being the case.

The Proprietors consented that Commissioners should be appointed "to enter into all the enquiries that might be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which might be brought before them, giving, of course, to the parties interested, an opportunity of being heard."

The main questions thus to be decided upon were: First, at what rate Tenants ought to be allowed to acquire freehold interests in their property ; and next, what amount of arrears of Rent should be remitted by the Landlords.

On the first and most important of these questions, the Commissioners professed themselves unable to come to any conclusion, and instead of deciding it, they recommended, virtually, that it should be decided by other Arbitrators, to be hereafter nominated. This, however, is not what they were charged to do ; they were authorized by the Proprietors to make an Award themselves, but they were not authorized to transfer the duty of making that Award to others. The trust confided to them was evidently a personal one. The Proprietors relied on the skill, knowledge, and fairness of the three gentlemen

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appointed in 1860; but they could not, therefore, be called upon, in deference to these gentlemen's opinion, to confide their interests even to Arbitrators specially designated in the Award, much less to persons whose very mode of appointment is undetermined by it.

This objection might, of course, be waived by the Proprietors, but it is not waived, and being insisted upon, I am obliged to admit that it is conclusive; and I am bound further to say, that it is, in my opinion, an objection founded not on any technical rule of law, but on a sound and indisputable principle of justice,—the principle, namely, that a person who has voluntarily submitted his case to the decision of one man, cannot, therefore, be compelled, without his consent, to transfer it to the decision of another.

It is, therefore, impossible for me to advise Her Majesty to sanction the two Acts which you have forwarded, and which, of course, are intended to render the Award obligatory on all who consented to the reference.

I must instruct you, therefore, however unwillingly, to treat the Commissioners Award only as an expression of opinion, which, however valuable as such, cannot be made legally binding on the parties concerned; and which, therefore, ought not to be allowed to stand in the way of any other proposal which promises an amicable settlement of the question.

It was under these circumstances, and with these impressions, that I forwarded to you the proposal made by Sir Samuel Cunard, in hopes that it might be found to furnish a basis of agreement in lieu of the recommendations of the Commissioners.

Your Government refuse to consider this proposal, not, as I understand, because they think it in itself inadmissible, but because they consider themselves as bound to give effect to the Commissioners' Award.

This Award being now out of the way, I have to request that you will bring Sir

S. Cunard's proposal under their reconsideration. I do not think it desirable that I should myself express any opinion upon its merits. I will only observe, that it is in some respects more favorable to the Tenants than the Commissioners' Award, and that it will give me great pleasure to learn that it is likely to furnish a solution of these difficulties, which, so long as they are unsolved, must continue to obstruct the progress of the Colony.

This conclusion which I have adopted respecting these Acts, renders it unnecessary that I should do more than acknowledge your Dispatch, No. 46, of the 25th of June, enclosing a memorial from Mr. Haythorne against the Act (Cap. xii) to facilitate the operation of the Award.

His Excellency directed the attention of the Board to a paragraph in the Despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, No. 120, of date 9th August, 1862, in which His Grace desires the Lieutenant Governor to bring under the reconsideration of the Government the proposal made by Sir Samuel Cunard, embodied in a draft Bill, previously transmitted by His Grace to the Lieutenant Governor, at Sir Samuel Cunard's request.

The Board having maturely reconsidered the same, are clearly of opinion that the said Bill is not sufficiently favorable to the Tenantry to warrant the Board in recommending its adoption.

4. *Initiation of Money Votes.*

Extract from Despatch No. 77, of 10th November, 1862, from Lieutenant Governor Dundas to His Grace the Duke of Newcastle.

The system which at present obtains in the House of Assembly, respecting the

initiation of Money Votes, appears to me to be objectionable. It is competent for any member to propose a Grant for any purpose. I cannot but think that it would be more satisfactory were the Legislature to yield to the Executive the initiation of all money Votes, and thus place the whole expenditure of the Colony directly within the responsibility of the Government.

The important question to which you refer in your Despatch No. 77, of the 10th of November, of conferring upon the Executive the exclusive right to initiate Money Votes in the House of Assembly, has not failed to engage my attention, and I cannot doubt the propriety of urging upon the Legislature of Prince Edward Island the adoption of a rule which already prevails in three of the British North American Provinces. The system at present existing in the Island under your Government, is open to obvious objections. Wherever individual members of a Colonial Legislature have the power to propose Grants of money for any purpose, the appropriation of the Revenue is placed beyond the direct control of those upon whom the responsibility of administering public devolves, and it becomes a difficult, if not an impossible duty, for the Executive to make due provision for the requirements of the Public Service. A state of things is thus produced, opposed to the well-being of the community and detrimental to the credit of the Colony. In most of the Colonial Possessions of the Crown,

where Responsible Government prevails, provision is made in the Constitutional Acts for securing to the Governor the right to introduce measures for the appropriation of public money; and I trust that the Legislature of Prince Edward Island will readily adopt a principle, the soundness of which has been so fully tested.

There may be reasons, of which I am not aware, which may render a discussion of the subject inexpedient, at the present moment, but I am very desirous that you should, at an early period, invite the Legislature to give their earnest consideration to it, with a view to the passing of some measure vesting in the Governor and his Responsible Advisers the exclusive power in question.

In your Despatch, No. 54, you transmitted, together with other Acts of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, one passed on the 17th of April, 1862, and intitled

Cap. xviii, "An Act to change the Constitution of the Legislative Council, by rendering the same Elective."

This Act has been reserved, by clause 34, for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, and I have the honor to apprise

you of my intention to advise Her Majesty specially to confirm it.

In this Act the similar measure of 1861 has been modified agreeably to the views expressed in my Despatch of the 4th of February last, No. 93, and the readiness with which the Legislature adopted my suggestions, has afforded me much satisfaction.

I have, however, to notice that the 7th clause confers the Elective Franchise upon every male person possessing the qualifications therein described. I am not aware under what limits an alien can hold leasehold property in Prince Edward Island, and I think it may be advisable that the Law Officers of your Government should be directed to consider whether the Franchise might not, in certain cases, accrue to aliens as the clause is at present worded.

I have the honor to acknowledge your Grace's Despatch, No. 125, of 20th ultimo, in which you apprise me of your intention of advising Her Majesty, specially to confirm an Act passed by the Legislature of this Island, "To change the Constitution of the Legislative Council—by rendering the same elective"—Cap. xviii.

Your Grace notices that the 7th clause of that Act confers the Elective Franchise

upon every male person possessing the qualification therein described, and you deem it advisable that the Law Officers of the Local Government should be directed to consider whether the Franchise might not, in certain cases, accrue to Aliens, as the clause is at present worded.

I have the honor, herein, to enclose the Report of the Attorney General of this Island on the subject. From this it appears that he is of opinion that the Act is open to the objection which your Grace has suggested.

The words "being a British subject," and further, "not subject to any legal incapacity," appear to have been omitted through inadvertency.

Copy of Report of Attorney General respecting 25 Vic. Cap. XVIII. §7.

Under an Act of this Colony, 21st Vic. Cap. 4, intituled "An Act to enable Aliens to hold Real Estate in this Island," Aliens may hold Real Estate to the extent of 200 acres, and as the 7th clause of the Act for changing the Constitution of the Legislative Council merely provides that every male person of the age of 21 years, or upwards, owning Freehold or Leasehold property to the value of £100, shall be entitled to vote for a member to serve in the Legislative Council, without

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requiring that such Elector shall be a British subject, it would appear that an alien, possessing such property qualification, might exercise the Franchise.

I think the clause should contain the words "being a British subject, and not subject to any legal incapacity."

Minutes of proceedings of the Committee of Privileges and Elections, on the consideration of the petition of Daniel Green, Charles Green, and other Electors, complaining of an undue election and return of James Muirhead, Esquire, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County.

WEDNESDAY, March, 11, 1863.

House in Committee of Privileges and Elections.

Mr. Montgomery in the Chair.

The following members of the Committee present, were sworn by the Clerk, pursuant to the Act 18 Vic., Cap. 17, Sec. 8 :—

Mr. Montgomery (Chairman), the Hon. the Speaker, Hon. J. H. Gray, Hon. J. C. Pope, Hon. G. Coles, Hon. D. Beaton, Hon. J. Warburton, Hon. J. Longworth, Hon. D. Davies, Hon. A. Laird, Hon. E. Thornton, Hon. J. Hensley, Hon. D. Kaye, Hon. R. McAulay, Hon. Col. Secretary, Hon. F. Kelly, William Haslam, Colin McLellan, David Ramsay, Ronald Walker, John Yeo, Nicholas Conroy, James Duncan, John Sutherland, Cornelius Howat, George Sinclair, and George Howlan, Esquires, who severally took the following oath, in pursuance of the above recited Act, viz :

“ I shall enquire diligently, and without favor or partiality into the facts relative to the order of reference, and make a true and faithful report of the inquest by me taken, and of my opinion thereon.”

The petition of Daniel Green, Charles Green, and other Electors, complaining of an undue election and return of James Muirhead, Esquire, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, was read.

Daniel Green, Esquire, the petitioning candidate, then appeared at the bar, and addressed the Committee, saying that he has nothing further to state than what is set forth in the allegations of the petition.

The following list of witnesses furnished to the Clerk of the House, pursuant to the order of the House of Thursday the fifth of March, instant, by Daniel Green, Esquire, the petitioning candidate, in support of the allegations of his petition, was then read, as follows :—

 trict of Prince County?—Yes.

2. Who was the Sheriff's Poll Clerk?
 —Charles Pope.

 Witness.

3. Who was Inspector at Lot 28 for
 Cornelius Howat, a Candidate at the late
 General Election?—The Name of John
 McWilliams appears on the book as In-
 spector.

4. Did John McWilliams, Inspector
 for Cornelius Howat, at Township 28,
 vote at the Polling division at which he
 acted as such Inspector, at the late Gen-
 eral Election for members to serve in the
 House of Assembly of this Island?—His
 name appears on the Book on the list of
 special voters for Green and McLennan.

5. Was the vote of the said John Mc-
 Williams duly entered by you on declara-
 tion day, for the Candidate for whom it
 was polled?—It is omitted; it does not
 appear on the Book.

6. What is the form of the entry on the
 Poll Books, of Mr. McWilliams's name
 as Inspector for Mr. Howat? Read it.
 In whose handwriting is the entry?—I

cannot tell in whose writing. (He reads
 the entry.) I would not pretend to say
 in whose writing it is; probably in the
 Clerk's; he was the proper person.

7. When did you first discover that the
 vote of John McWilliams had been omit-
 ted from the votes of the Candidates for
 whom the said vote was polled?—I heard
 of it the day before yesterday. I only
 discovered it to-day.

By Hon. J. Hensley.

8. Can you state why it was that you
 did not take account of Mr. McWilliams'
 vote, at the time of casting up the votes?
 was it the result of oversight, or how
 otherwise can you explain it?—I cannot
 explain it any other way except it was an
 omission of the Sheriff's Clerk. I must
 have reported that vote as I did other
 votes. I am not sensible how it could
 have been omitted in any other way. I
 must have reported it. I will not say
 positively I did. I was told by a person
 who heard me reporting it; it is my im-
 pression I did report it.

9. Do you recollect observing the
 name of Mr. McWilliams recorded in the
 Poll Book previous to your declaring the
 Poll?—I do not recollect. I have no
 doubt it was there, from the record I hold
 in my hand, namely, the Court Book. I
 could not have recollected his name
 among the hundreds on the declaration
 day.

The witness was then directed to with-
 draw.

John McWilliams was then called in,
 sworn and examined as followeth :

By the Hon. Col. Secretary.

10. were you qualified to vote for the
 Fifth Electoral District of Prince Coun-
 ty, at the late General Election?—I was.

11. Did you vote at the late General
 Election for Prince County, at Lot 28?
 and for whom?—Yes, for Mr. McLennan
 and Mr. Green.

12. Were you Inspector for a Candi-
 date at Lot 28, and for whom?—I was,
 for Cornelius Howat, I understood.

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13. Did you so vote at Lot 28?—I did.
By Hon. J. Hensley.

14. Was your authority to act, as Inspector for Mr. Howat, a written one, or not?—I had no written one. They told me they would mark me on the Poll Books, as Inspector.

By Hon. G. Coles

15. Did Mr. Howat request you to act as Inspector?—Mr. Alexander Howat did.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

16. Was your name as Inspector for Mr. Howat entered on the Poll Book?—They told me so. They laid it out for me, so that I would not have to go to Summersido.

By Mr. Howlan.

17. Did Mr. Alexander Howat give you a written authority, or who do you mean by "they told me so"?—I had no written authority. Mr. Alexander Howat told me it was for me; it was reserved for me.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

18. Was Mr. Alexander Howat, the person who appointed you as Inspector, the Agent for Cornelius Howat at Lot 28?—Yes.

The witness was then discharged.

Cornelius Howat, Esq., a member of the Committee was then examined in his place, as followeth:

By the Hon. Col. Secretary.

19. Did you authorize Mr. Alexander Howat, as your Agent, to nominate and appoint an Inspector for you at Lot 28, at the late General Election?—I did.

By Hon. J. Warburton.

20. Was your authority given in writing?—No.

By Hon. G. Coles.

21. Did you authorize him to appoint an Inspector?—I did. I answered that question before. I authorized Alexander to appoint an Inspector for me. I appointed Alexander first, as my Agent.

Adjourned one hour.
And being met again.

Edward Holland, called in, sworn and examined.

By the Hon. Col. Secretary.

22. Were you present at St. Eleanor's at the late General Election, for Members of the House of Assembly?—I was.

23. Did Nathaniel Pearson vote at said Election? and for whom did he vote?—Yes; he voted for Green and McLennan.

24. Were you present when he so voted? and did you hear him declare that he voted for Green and McLennan?—I was present, and heard him so declare.

By Hon. G. Coles.

25. Did you make any record of votes polled?—No.

The witness was then discharged.

John Green was then called in, sworn and examined as followeth:

By the Hon. Col. Secretary.

26. Were you present at St. Eleanor's at the late General Election for Members to serve in the House of Assembly, and did you hear Nathaniel Pearson poll a vote? if so, for whom did he vote?—Yes, I heard him vote for Green and McLennan.

By Hon. G. Coles.

27. Did you make any record of votes polled at that Election?—No.

By Hon. J. H. Gray.

28. Were there any circumstances attending the voter you have named which impresses his name upon your memory, and thus enables you to recollect clearly, for whom he voted?—I was right along side of him when he voted.

29. Nothing more? were you previously acquainted with the voter?—Yes, I have known him for a long time.

The witness was then discharged.

James Campbell, Esquire, Sheriff of Prince County was then recalled and examined.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

30. Can you state whether any or either of the following persons voted for Daniel

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Green, at St. Eleanor's, upon the occasion of the said Election, namely, Charles Peters, Nathaniel Pearson, George Doull, and Charles Pope?—I believe they all did—those named.

[The Poll Book was here placed in the witness's hands]

By a Member.

31. For what Candidates are the votes of the said voters entered in the Poll Book?—In the Poll Book, it appears that Nathaniel Pearson voted for Haszard and Muirhead. The next vote recorded was George Doull, the same for Haszard and Muirhead. Charles Peters; his vote was polled and knocked off; there was a dispute as to his being a foreigner. He afterwards came forward and said he would swear he was a British subject, before another vote was polled. I observed the Clerk knock his vote off. He then entered it in the same line and did not remove the erasure as it is entered in the Book. Charles Peters polled for Green and McLennan. It was struck out, and the erasure not removed. Charles Pope, as appears by the Poll Book, voted for Haszard. I am quite satisfied he voted for Green.

32. When Charles Peters returned and offered to swear he was a British subject, was his vote allowed, and was the Poll Clerk directed to enter it?—He was. It appears on the Poll Book his vote was not allowed. The Clerk was directed to poll his vote anew; he entered his name in the same line as the erasure.

By Hon. (J. H.) Gray.

33. Will you state any circumstance which enables you to be satisfied as to Charles Pope's voting for Green?—It was among the last votes polled. I have known Mr. Pope for many years. I believe he scarcely ever voted at an Election. It was the third last vote polled. I particularly remember he voted for Mr. Green. I think I saw Mr. Green speaking to him a little before. I am quite confident he so voted.

34. Was Mr. Pope your Poll Clerk?—Yes.

By a Member.

35. Were you the Returning Officer at the late Election at St. Eleanor's?—I was.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

36. In totting up the number of votes in the column in which Charles Peters's vote appears, was his vote counted for Green and McLennan, or was it omitted in the calculation altogether?—I believe it was omitted, from the fact of the erasure I have mentioned not being removed.

By Hon. J. Hensley.

37. Can you not speak with certainty as to this, by referring to the Book?—I can. I am quite satisfied it is omitted. From reference to the Book, it is omitted—in the addition of the column.

38. When you state that you believe that Nathaniel Pearson and George Doull voted for Green and McLennan, do you or not form this belief from your own knowledge and recollection of what took place at the time?—I think I do. They were outside voters, not resident in the District, consequently I took more particular notice.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

39. What do you mean by outside voters?—was it that they owned a qualification in the District, but resided outside of it?—Yes; non-resident electors.

40. Can you state for whom John McFadyen, Albert Anderson, and Benjamin S. Mills, or either of them, voted at the said Election?—I won't make any statement from memory. I may have an idea, but I would not swear to it.

By Hon. G. Coles.

41. Did the Poll Clerk call out the names of the candidates for whom he had recorded the votes at that Election?—He did. I never polled a second vote until he reported the vote polled, and the names of the Candidates.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

42. Presuming that Charles Peters,

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Nathaniel Pearson, George Doull, and Charles Pope voted for Daniel Green, had Mr. Muirhead an actual majority of votes at the said Election, over Mr. Green?—If those votes were placed in the proper columns, he would not.

By Hon. J. Hensley.

43. What would be the relative positions as to numbers of votes, of Mr. Green and Mr. Muirhead, on the poll, if those Electors were placed to Mr. Green instead of Mr. Muirhead?—

(Witness examines the Poll book and answers)—The figures would be reversed. Mr. Green would be 212, and Mr. Muirhead 208, if those votes were placed to Mr. Green instead of Mr. Muirhead.

44. Do you think there is any probability that you may be mistaken with respect to the way in which any or either of the parties named, voted? and was your conviction the same on declaration day, as now?—On declaration day, we did not examine how individuals voted; we only summed up the votes. We discovered the discrepancy when I gave Mr. Green a copy of the Books after the declaration.

The witness was then discharged.

George Doull was then called in, sworn and examined as followeth:

By a Member.

45. Did you vote at St. Eleanor's, at the late General Election for Members of the House of Assembly, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County? I did

46. State the name or names of the Candidate or Candidates for whom you voted?—McLennan and Green.

The witness was then discharged.

Charles Pope was then called in, sworn, and examined as followeth:

By a Member.

47. Did you vote at the late General Election of Members to the House of Assembly, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County?—I did.

By a Member.

48. State the name or names of the Candidate or Candidates for whom you voted?—Mr. Daniel Green.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

49. Were you the Sheriff's Poll Clerk at the said Election? and if so, did you correctly enter the vote so given by you?—I was. To the best of my ability and recollection.

50. Will you examine the Poll Book, and then state whether your own vote is correctly entered?—It is not correctly entered, according to my intentions at the time. It is an error of mine.

51. For whom does your vote appear to be recorded in the Poll Books?—It appears for Mr. John Haszard.

By Hon. G. Coles.

52. Did you call out the Candidates' names for whom you had recorded votes, before another vote was polled?—In general, after having received those from the Sheriff, I waited to hear the Sheriff proclaim the votes before I recorded them, and as he proclaimed, so I recorded them.

The last preceding question was again read to the witness, and he answered:—In general the voter's name, and those he polled for.

By Hon. J. Warburton.

53. How do you account for the error in the Poll Books, if, as you say, you voted for Mr. Green?—At that time there was a great commotion, a great excitement in the court house. It was excessively full. I was placed in a position very inadequate for the duties I had to perform; and at half past 4, p. m., that day, the Sheriff made proclamation that all persons who were disposed to give their votes should come forward and give them within that period, or otherwise, they would not have the opportunity of recording them any further. There was a considerable excitement at that period, to know the state of the Poll, and how the Candidates stood with respect to each other; and at that period of time, I got up to request the Sheriff to proclaim my vote for Mr. Daniel Green. I left the seat on which I sat, which was the Sheriff's seat in the court house, and pressed my way towards the Sheriff for him to proclaim my vote, for between the

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Sheriff and me, persons were crammed in so, that he and I could not see each other. On my return to my seat, to record my vote, that Book which you have just put into my hand, was knocked off the desk I occupied, and the inkstand upset by persons passing and repassing over the rails of the Jurymen's box, to get on to the platform where the Candidates stood, their Agents and Inspectors. I had no protection. I imagine, that at the moment of my return, finding things so displaced caused me to make that error.

54. Are you certain that in all instances you called out the name of the voter, and the persons for whom he voted? and could you not, under the circumstances of the bustle and commotion you speak of, have omitted this formality as to some votes?—It might be the case. None but those there at that time, could judge of the commotion taking place.

By Hon. J. H. Gray.

55. Do you recollect the vote of Chas. Peters?—I have some recollection of it.

By a Member.

56. Refer to the Poll Book. Did Charles Peters vote for McLennan and Green? and is his name carried out correctly, in the proper columns?—[The witness examines the Book] To the best of my recollection I have entered it here, as given me by the Sheriff; as he gave it to me, so I have recorded it here. As far as my recollection serves me, this man was recalled, and his vote was admitted afterwards. As the Sheriff remarked to me "sworn and allowed," so I have entered it here, "sworn and allowed." I was not ordered to make any alterations afterwards. I entered it as the Sheriff ordered me, "sworn and allowed," as it is entered here.

57. But you will find it erased; was this your act?—The erasure, when the vote was objected to, is mine, and the further entry also, "sworn and allowed," is mine. The conversation that took place

between himself and the Sheriff, I know not.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

58. Does the vote of Charles Peters appear by the Poll Book to be carried out for any Candidates or Candidate? or is it not struck out, and not carried in to account at all?—It appears on this Book obliterated,—not renewed, as it should have been, I think. I had no orders to do it, but to record, as I have done, "sworn and allowed."

59. Why did you not enter it?—Whose vote?—Peters's vote?—I had done with it, after the Sheriff ordered me to make the entry I did, "sworn and allowed."

By Hon. J. Longworth.

60. Did you think the entry of those words "sworn and allowed," was a sufficient entry, without restoring the vote on the Poll?—I did not think anything about it. I was under the order of the Sheriff. I had no choice of my own; as he dictated, so I did it.

By Hon. J. Warburton.

61. Do you think you might have made mistakes in the Poll Books, besides those which have been pointed out to you?—I do.

By Hon. J. H. Gray.

62. Do you mean to say you did not know that it was your duty to enter into the column, the figure which serves to shew for which Candidate Peters voted?—I was not aware of it that I was bound to do it, unless ordered by the Sheriff.

By a member.

63. Were you away from your post, at any time, during the time the polling was going on? if so, who occupied your place, and for what time?—Not a second.

By Hon. G. Coles.

64. Was there any commotion during the day, sufficient to cause you to misplace any vote but your own?—I think there was plenty.

65. Are you aware of recording the vote of any Elector, for a Candidate, not named

o you by the Sheriff, except your own?
—No. I am not aware of it.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

66. Can you state from your own knowledge or recollection, for whom Nathaniel Pearson or George Doull voted, at the said Election?—I cannot.

By Mr Howlan.

67. Did you at any time during the time the Poll was open, compare your Poll with any of the other Poll Clerks, and if so, what was the result?—Not at any time.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

68. Examine the Poll Book, and state for whom you recorded the votes of Nathaniel Pearson and George Doull?—
[The witness examines the Poll Book] Nathaniel Pearson is recorded for Haszard and Muirhead; George Doull, for Haszard and Muirhead also.

69. Have you any reason to think that those two votes, or either of them, are incorrectly recorded?—I think so.

By Hon. G. Coles.

70. For what reason?—There was a great commotion at that period of the day; so much so, that I could scarcely keep my book on the place where I was writing, and I had no opportunity of keeping my position without much inconvenience, from the state of excitement at the time. The desk I sat at, was not nearly the width of this book (the Poll Book), and when entering the lower part of the columns, my book had to go over the desk; persons were passing and repassing continually, over the rail of the petty jurors' box, near which I was placed, and slewed my book about. I had no management of it.

71. Did the other Poll Clerks, during the day, object to the way you had recorded any vote when calling it out?—Not that I am aware of.

The witness was then directed to withdraw and was discharged from further attendance.

Benjamin Mills was then called in, sworn and examined, as followeth:

By a Member.

72. Did you vote at the late General Election of members of the House of As-

sembly, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County?—I did.

73. State the name or names of the Candidate or Candidates for whom you voted.—McLennan and Haszard.

By Hon. G. Coles.

74. At the time you voted, was there a great commotion?—Not at the time. I can't say there was much; a great many were standing round and walking about.

The Poll Book was handed to the witness.

By the Petitioning Candidate, Daniel Green, Esquire.

75. I wish you to state how the vote is recorded in the Poll Book in your hand.—For McLennan and Muirhead.

By Hon. G. Coles.

Did you hear the Poll Clerk call out the Candidates' names for whom he had recorded your vote?—I did.

76. What names were they?—On second consideration, I do not know that I can positively swear that I heard the names. I did not pay particular attention.

The witness was then directed to withdraw, and was discharged from further attendance.

Albert Anderson was then called in, sworn and examined.

By a Member

77. Did you vote at the late General Election of Members for the House of Assembly, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County?—I did.

78. State the name or names of the Candidate or Candidates for whom you voted?—For Haszard and McLennan.

By Hon. G. Coles.

79. Did you hear the Poll Clerk call out the names of the Candidates you voted for?—No.

80. Was there a great commotion at the time you voted?—No.

The Poll Book was then shown to the witness.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

81. Examine the Poll Book and state for whom your vote is entered?—
[The witness then examines the Poll Book, and answers]—For Haszard and Muirhead.

The witness was then directed to withdraw, and was discharged from further attendance.

John McFadyen was then called in, sworn and examined.

By a Member.

82. Did you vote at the late General Election of Members for the House of Assembly, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County?—Yes.

83. State the name or names of the Candidates for whom you voted?—Haszard and McLennan.

By a Member.

84. Examine the Poll Book, and state for whom your vote is entered therein.— [He examines the Poll Book and answers]—For Haszard and Muirhead.

85. Did you hear the Poll Clerk call out the name of the Candidates you polled for?—Yes; I am positive I did.

86. Was there a great commotion at the time you voted?—No, there was not.

By Hon. J. Longworth.

87. What names did the Poll Clerk so call out?—Haszard and McLennan.

The witness was then directed to withdraw, and was discharged from further attendance.

Progress was then reported, and leave being asked and obtained to sit again, the Committee rose.

Adjourned.

SECOND DAY

House in Committee of Privileges and Elections on the further consideration of the petition of Daniel Green, Charles Green and other Electors, complaining of an undue Election and return of James Muirhead, Esquire, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County.

Mr. Montgomery in the Chair.

Mr. Muirhead, the sitting Member, in his place, addressed the Committee.

Daniel Green Esquire, the petitioning Candidate appeared at the bar and addressed the Committee.

Mr. Muirhead then retired without the bar.

A Resolution was then proposed.

An amendment to the said Resolution was then moved and seconded, and the question being put thereon, it passed in the negative.

The question being then put on the said Resolution, it was carried, and

Resolved, accordingly.

On motion the Speaker took the Chair, and the Chairman reported the Committee had made some progress and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

The House again resolved itself into a Committee of Privileges and Elections on the further consideration of the petition of Daniel Green, Charles Green, and other Electors, complaining of an undue Election and return of James Muirhead, Esquire, for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County.

Mr. Montgomery in the Chair.

Several Resolutions were proposed and carried, when, in lieu of the said detailed Resolutions, one comprehensive Resolution, embracing the substance of the foregoing Resolutions was offered by the Hon. J. C. Pope, as follows:

Whereas it appears by the evidence before the Committee, that at the Election held at St. Eleanor's, in Prince County, on the Twenty-first day of January last past, for the Election of two Members to serve in the General Assembly for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, Nathaniel Pearson and George Doull polled their votes for Daniel Green, the petitioning Candidate, and that such votes were erroneously entered on the Sheriff's Poll-book as having been polled for James Muirhead, Esq., the sitting Member; and also, that John McFadyen and Albert Anderson, at said Election, polled their votes for Messrs. Haszard and McLennan, two of the Candidates at said Elec-

tion, and that the votes of the said John McFadyen and Albert Anderson were erroneously entered as having been polled for the said James Muirhead; and that Benjamin Mills polled his vote for Hazard and McLennan, which said vote was erroneously entered for McLennan and Muirhead; and also, that Charles Peters polled his vote for the said petitioning Candidate, which vote was not so returned by the Sheriff; and further, that John McWilliams, Inspector for Cornelius Howat, Esq., a Candidate at said Election for the Fourth Electoral District of Prince County, at the Polling Division held on Township No. 28, on said Fourth District, polled his vote for the petitioning Candidate, Daniel Green, and that such vote was specially entered upon the Poll Book for said Polling Division, at Township No. 28, and duly returned to the Sheriff, but omitted by him when casting up the total number of votes on the declaration day; and *whereas* it appears that on the said declaration day, the Sheriff of Prince County at his Court held at St. Eleanor's on the Twenty-fourth day of January last past, for the purpose of declaring the Candidates duly elected for the Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, did declare James Muirhead, Esq., to have polled 212 votes, and Daniel Green, Esq., to have polled 208 votes, and whereas it appears that by deducting from the number so returned for the said James Muirhead, the votes of the said Nathaniel Pearson, George Doull, John McFadyen, Albert Anderson and Benj. S. Mills, the number of votes remaining for the said James Muirhead would be

207; and by adding to the number returned for Daniel Green, the votes of the said Nathaniel Pearson, George Doull, Chas. Peters, Charles Pope and John McWilliams, the number of votes for the said Daniel Green would be 213, thus giving to the said Daniel Green a clear majority of six votes over the said James Muirhead: *Therefore resolved*, that the said Daniel Green is entitled by law, to take his seat in this House, as a Member for the said Fifth Electoral District of Prince County, and that the said Sheriff of the said County be directed forthwith to appear at the Bar of this House, and amend his return to the Writ of Election for the said District, by striking out the name of the said James Muirhead, and inserting that of the said Daniel Green, as a Member returned for the said District.

And the said Resolution being again read,

The Hon. John Longworth moved, in amendment thereto, to strike out of the preamble to the said proposed Resolution, all relating to John McWilliams.

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon, it passed in the negative.

The question being then put on the said proposed Resolution, it was carried in the affirmative.

A motion was then made that the Speaker take the chair, and the chairman report the Resolution agreed.

And the said motion being put was carried in the affirmative, and

Ordered accordingly.

Report of the Medical Attendant of the Lunatic Asylum, including a statistical chart or tabular statement of the Inmates, and the cases of each, in that Institution.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
31st January, 1863.

Gentlemen;

In conformity with the requirements of his prescribed duties, the Medical Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum has the honor to present to your Board the accompanying Report, as the result of the annual operations of the Institution for the year ending January 31st, 1863.

The number of Patients remaining at last Report, was thirteen males and nine females, amounting in all to twenty-two.

There have been admitted during the year seven males and one female, making a total of eight. The number discharged has been nine, viz., six males and three females.

During the past year no deaths have occurred in the Asylum. The unimproved cases amount to three; six have improved, eleven much improved, and ten have regained their reason, while twenty-one yet remain under treatment, as shown by the accompanying statistical chart.

Of ten cases admitted during the last nineteen months, eight have recovered, realizing the large proportion of eighty per cent., a figure but rarely attained in the best conducted Hospitals.

With respect to the details of the household economy, the Hospital is kept clean

and comfortable, warm and well ventilated. Many improvements have been adopted during the past year, with regard to heating the wards, furnishing comfortable bedding, constructing isolated apartments for the sick, with improved alterations in the diet-table, etc. But I regret to state that we have still to quarter many of the patients in the basement cells, to their obvious disadvantage and discomfort, when a moderate grant to elevate a part of the building (as I formerly had occasion to remark), would enable us to command the accommodation of 18 additional bedrooms, and thereby remove all the patients from the cellar.

We still labor under the anomaly and reproach of having an Alms-house incorporated with our Lunatic Hospital, where at present 8 superannuated Paupers are kept and fed, at double the cost to the country they might be boarded out for in private families. Beside the nuisance of their whereabouts, they absorb the time of the attendants, the funds of the Hospital, and the accommodation of the building,—the original purpose of forming the pauper department into a partly remunerating "Workhouse," having long since been found illusive, and abandoned. Although we can most successfully compete with our neighbors in the Provinces in affecting recoveries, it is a matter of regret to have

still to struggle with make-shift accommodation in our endeavors to administer to the cure and comfort of the Insane.

A small sum of £175 was granted last year to make some minor alterations in the building, but on receiving an estimate of the cost of the alterations contemplated, it was found to be totally inadequate to the purpose required, and the matter was allowed to stand over till the present Legislative Session.

The rate of board fixed being so exceedingly low, and the facilities for admission so easily attainable, patients laboring under unsoundness of mind should be forwarded for treatment with the least delay, in order to insure their speedy recovery.

Nothing of unusual interest has occurred worthy of communication; but I may

here observe that, during the past year, the patients in general have enjoyed a more than ordinary share of real comfort and attention, and the remedial results have more than exceeded our most sanguine expectations.

With these brief remarks, I beg most respectfully to submit the accompanying statistical chart to the consideration of your honorable Board.

The Honorable the Provincial Secretary moved that the House do come to the following Resolution :

“ WHEREAS the subject of a Union of the North American Provinces, or of the Maritime Provinces of British America, has been from time to time mooted and discussed in all the Colonies ;

“ And whereas, while many advantages may be secured by such a Union, either of all these Provinces, or of a portion of them, many and serious obstacles are presented which can only be overcome by mutual consultation of the leading men of the Colonies, and by free communication with the Imperial Government, therefore Resolved, That His Excellency the Lieut. Governor be respectfully requested to put himself in communication with His Grace the Colonial Secretary, and His Excellency the Governor General, and the Lieutenant Governors of the other North American Provinces, in order to ascertain the policy of H. M's Government and the opinions of the other Colonies, with a view to an enlightened consideration of a question involving the highest interests, and upon which the public mind in all the Provinces ought to be set at rest.

MY LORD ;

I have duly received your Lordship's Despatch, No. 47, of the 21st of May, accompanied by a copy of a Resolution, which was passed in the House of Assembly on the 15th of April, 1861, relative to an amalgamation of part or all of the British Provinces in North America. The Resolution points out that the question might be considered either of a distinct union of the maritime Provinces, or of a general union of them with Canada, and suggests that it might be desirable

upon so important a subject to ascertain the policy of Her Majesty's Government, and to promote a consultation between the leading men of the Colonies.

Your Lordship explains that, for various reasons, your Government were of opinion that it would be inexpedient to act on this Resolution last year, but that they now wish it to be brought under consideration.

No one can be insensible to the importance of the two measures which are alluded to ; and I am far from considering that they do not form a very proper subject for calm deliberation. They are, however, of a nature which renders it especially fit that, if either of them be proposed for adoption, it should emanate in the first instance from the Provinces, and should be concurred in by all of them which it would effect. I should see no objection to any consultation on the subject amongst the leading members of the Governments concerned ; but whatever the result of such consultation might be the most satisfactory mode of testing the opinion of the people of B. N. A. would probably be by means of Resolution or Address, proposed in the Legislature of each Province by its own Government.

Beyond this expression of the views of Her Majesty's Government as to the preliminary steps which might be taken towards the decision of this great question, I am not prepared to announce any course of policy upon an invitation proceeding from one only of the B. N. A. Provinces, and contained in a Resolution of so general and vague a character as that which you have transmitted to me. But if a union, either partial or complete, should hereafter be proposed with the concurrence of all the Provinces to be united, I am sure that the matter would be weighed in this country both by the public, by Parliament, and by Her Majesty's Government with no other feeling than an anxiety to discern and to promote any course which might be the most conducive

to the prosperity, the strength, and the harmony of all the British communities in North America.

SIR ;

It has been brought to my notice that persons born of foreign parents in British Territory, are exposed to various inconveniences by their inability to procure such evidence as will satisfy foreign Governments that they are British subjects.

There is no doubt, that the children of foreigners, born in the British Dominions, are entitled to the character, rights and privileges of British subjects, unless their parents at the time of their birth were alien enemies, that is to say, subjects of a power then at enmity with Great Britain.

The Law Officers of the Crown, to whom this question has been referred, are of opinion that it would be impossible without risk of inconvenience to authorize British functionaries to issue official certificates declaring absolutely, that the person named in said certificate is a British subject ; but they do not see any objection to a mere statement of belief to the same effect.

In case, therefore, it should be proved to your satisfaction that any person has been born in the Colony, under your Government of foreign parents, not being alien

enemies, you will be at liberty to give either to them, or to any person applying for it on his behalf, a written statement of your belief that he has been so born, and that he is consequently, a British subject.

I annex a form of statement which appears to me calculated to answer the proposed purpose, leaving you to vary it according to the circumstances of the application on your own judgment.

Copies of the regulations which would be applicable to the transaction of Money Order business between the United Kingdom, and New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, are enclosed for transmission to these Colonies, and I am further to state that, upon learning that these regulations are concurred in, and that the Colonial Governments are prepared to carry out the measure, the Postmaster General will fix a date for bringing it into operation.

It will be necessary that from each Colony lists should be forwarded, showing the names of the Post Offices which

will be authorized to issue and pay money orders.

The Hon. the Postmaster General reports that it is desirable to extend the exchange of Money Orders to the other B. N. A. Provinces, including Prince Edward Island, that the basis of such an arrangement should be the granting of such orders reciprocally, and settlement of balances in sterling, in order to avoid troublesome questions arising upon differences or fluctuations in relative values of currency — that such orders should be limited to amounts of £10 sterling upon a single Order, and that the advices of such Orders must pass through the Head Quarter's Offices of both Provinces, before payment of the Orders, to which they refer. That with these leading principles agreed upon with Prince Edward Island, the arrangement of minor details would present no difficulty.

The Committee concur in the above recommendation of the Hon. Postmaster General.

SIR ;

A difficulty has been experienced in a recent case, in apprehending in this

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country an offender, who had absconded from one of Her Majesty's Colonies, taking with him Public Moneys. That difficulty arose from the omission to transmit to this country the document necessary to legalize his arrest in this country. I therefore thought it right to obtain from the Treasury Solicitors a statement which might serve as a guide to Colonial Governments in future cases, showing the nature of the documents which should be sent to England, and the course which should be pursued in order to secure the committal here of any persons, who might have fled to this country from a British Colony in order to escape from justice.

The Imperial Acts, which bear upon this subject, appear to be the Acts 6 & 7 Victoria, Cap. 34, and the 16th & 17th Victoria, Cap. 118. Copies of which are enclosed, and from which it will be collected that under these Acts the following steps are proper and necessary to be observed :

1. A Warrant must have been issued against the offender by some person having lawful authority to issue it, in that part of Her Majesty's dominions where the offence was committed.

2. This Warrant must be sent to England to be endorsed by the Secretary of State.

3. But the Secretary of State cannot endorse it, until it is proved by oath or Affidavit, that the seal or signature, is the seal or signature of the person having lawful authority to issue such warrant, (whose seal or signature the same purports to be.) It is necessary, therefore, to send witnesses or affidavits, or both, sufficient for such proof.

4. The Warrant must have been issued upon depositions ; and these depositions must be such as appear sufficient to warrant the committal of the offender for trial.

5. Sufficient evidence must be forthcoming in England, before the Magistrate, to prove the criminality of the offender to

an extent, such as if the offence had been committed in England, would have justified the Magistrate in committing the offender for trial, in this country. But besides oral witnesses, the Act 6 & 7 Victoria, Cap. 34, enables the Magistrate to receive in evidence, copies of the depositions, upon which the original Warrant issued, provided that they are certified under the hand of the person or persons who issued the Warrant, and are attested upon the Oath of the party producing them to be true copies of the original depositions.

If it is intended, therefore, to offer the depositions in evidence, instead of, or in addition to, oral testimony, they must be authenticated as above mentioned.

With reference to the various communications which have passed between the Treasury and the Colonial Office, on the subject of the incorporation of Colonial

Banking Companies, and more especially as regards Canada and the Australian Colonies, I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to request that you will inform the Duke of Newcastle that the attention of my Lords having been drawn to proceedings for the establishment of Banks for carrying on the business of Banking in Her Majesty's Colonies or Possessions abroad, under the Joint Stock Banking Companies and Limited Liabilities Acts, their Lordships considered it right to ascertain the legal status of such Corporations in the Colonies or Possessions in which they may establish themselves.

I am to transmit herewith, for the information of His Grace, copy of a Case which has been laid by their Lordships' orders before the Attorney and Solicitor General, with the opinion of those officers on the questions submitted to them. As it appears to be within the power of Colonial Legislatures to pass laws to prevent, regulate, or restrict the operations of Banks of this description, my Lords do not consider it necessary for Her Majesty's Government to interfere in the matter, but they suggest that copies of the Case and Opinion should be forwarded to the Governors of the several Colonies for their information and guidance.

As to the establishment of Joint Stock Banks, with Limited Liability for carrying on Banking Business in the Colonies.

The following is a copy of the Minute referred to :—

Copy of Treasury Minute, dated 31st October, 1862.

The Assistant Secretary brings under the notice of the Board an advertisement which has appeared in the public papers, of the establishment of a Joint Stock Bank under the Joint Stock Banking Companies Amendment Acts, by the title of "The London and Colonial Bank (limited);" likewise an advertisement of the Standard Bank of British South Africa (limited).

In the memorandum of the first mentioned Association, registered under the Joint Companies Acts, 1857 and 1858, it is stated that the object of the establishment of the Company is the "transacting of every kind of banking business in India, and the Colonial Dependencies of Great Britain beyond the limits of the United Kingdom."

But it appears from the advertisement, that "in the first instance it is intended to confine the operations of the Bank to Canada," and it is announced that "the management of the Bank will be in London, and a Branch Office will, in the first instance, be established in Montreal, under the control of a Local Board of Directors."

On referring to the Acts relating to Joint Stock Companies and Joint Stock Banking Companies, my Lords observe that a distinction was drawn by the Legislature in the earlier enactments between the two descriptions of undertakings. An Act was passed in 1814 for the regulation of Joint Stock Companies generally, and

in the same year another Act was passed for the regulation of Joint Stock Banks in England.

In the year 1846 an Act was passed extending the provisions of the last mentioned Act to Scotland and Ireland.

"The Limited Liability Act, 1855," applies only to Joint Stock Companies formed under 7 and 8 Vic., c. 110.

The Joint Stock Companies Act of 1856 excepts from its operation Banking and Insurance Companies.

Thus far legislation relating to banking in the United Kingdom was kept distinct from that relating to Joint Stock Companies for other description of business.

A further Act, was, however, passed in the year 1857, for the regulation of Joint Stock Companies construed as one with the Act of the preceding year, and which may be cited with it as the Joint Stock Companies Acts, 1856-1857.

In the same session, an Act, entitled "Joint Stock Banking Companies Act, 1857," was passed, which repeals the second section of "Joint Stock Companies Act, 1856," and incorporates with its enactments the "Joint Stock Companies Acts, 1856 and 1857," except that it does not permit banks to be registered with limited liability.

This latter restriction was removed by an Act passed in 1858, except as regards banks of issue in the United Kingdom.

From the foregoing recital of enactments, it would seem that the intention of Parliament had been, in the first instance, to provide a different system of legislation for Joint Stock Banking Companies in the United Kingdom from that applicable to Joint Stock Companies, and it may be presumed that by the latter legislation which removed that distinction (with exception of Banks of issue in the United Kingdom), Parliament had in view only Joint Stock Banking Companies in England, Scotland, and Ireland, which formed the subject of the Acts of 1844 and 1856.

A more extended view of the operation of these Acts, was however taken by the "Agra and United Service Bank (limited)," which having obtained a charter

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under the Act of 1844, reciting a deed of settlement, which purported to recognize a power of carrying on the business of banking beyond the limits of the United Kingdom, was afterwards registered under the Limited Liability Acts.

My Lords understand also that proposals have been made for the establishment of other Banks under the Joint Stock Banking Companies Acts, for the purpose of carrying on the business of banking abroad or in the Colonies, under the control of Boards of Directors in London.

The "London and Colonial Bank (limited)" now advertized, is, however, as far as this Board is aware, one of the first establishments which have been organized under the Joint Stock Banking Companies Acts for the avowed object of carrying on the business of banking in Her Majesty's Possessions beyond the limits of the United Kingdom; and my Lords apprehend that very serious considerations may arise from that proceeding as affecting legislation for local purposes, under powers conferred by Parliament on many of Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions.

In the case of a Bank established for the purpose of carrying on business in a foreign country, as in that of the London and Brazilian Banking Company, the same questions would not arise. Whatever may be the propriety or legality of an understanding of this nature, promoted under the assumed authority of Acts of the Imperial Parliament, the authority of those Acts cannot extend beyond the limits of the British Empire, and persons carrying on business in a foreign country under the direction of a Company incorporated in London, must be subject to the laws of the country in which the business is transacted.

But in case of a British possession, the authority of the Crown and of Parliament may still have force, notwithstanding the concession of the right of separate legislation.

As for example, it has been held that even after Parliament had conferred on the East India Company the power of granting Charters of Incorporation to Banking Companies in India, the inherent right of the Crown to grant similar charters was not thereby restrained. A Company incorporated, therefore, under the laws of this country may possess the rights of an incorporated body in British Possessions, although governed by Independent Legislatures in a more extended sense from that which it could obtain in a country out of the limits of Imperial Legislation.

It becomes important in this view to ascertain how far the Acts of Parliament referred to authorize the incorporation of Banking Companies, for the purpose of carrying on business beyond the limits of the United Kingdom.

As the "London and Colonial Banking Company (limited)," propose to confine their operations in the first instance to Canada, the condition of the legislation affecting Banks in that country will afford the best illustration of the questions to be considered.

The Act 3 and 4 Vic. cap. 35, for the union of Upper and Lower Canada, confers powers on the Legislature there, which may be applied to the regulation of the trade of banking to an extent at least which may not be inconsistent with the prerogative of the Crown, or the rights of the Imperial Parliament. In virtue of these powers, the Parliament of Canada passed an Act, some years ago, for the regulation of the issue of promissory notes, by which the privilege of issue was reserved under certain restrictions to Banks incorporated by Royal Charter or by local enactment.

Since the passing of that enactment many Acts have been passed by the Canadian Parliament, for the incorporation of local banks, on the principle of the liability of the shareholders to half the amount of the subscribed capital, the concession

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of limited liability to this extent being accompanied by various restrictions for the security of the public, regarding the management of the Banks, and the nature and extent of the business to be carried on by them.

The position of Banks incorporated by Royal Charter in reference to Canadian legislation has on several occasions formed the subject of communication between the home and local governments. On the occasion of an application from the North American Bank for the renewal of its charter, the term of which was about to expire, it was represented by the Canadian Government that a general revision of the banking regulations of the Colony was contemplated at the termination of the period to which the privileges of the local incorporated Banks were restricted, and in deference to a wish expressed to that effect, my Lords (in concurrence with the views of the Secretary of State for the Colonies) recommended that the term of the new charter, granted by the Queen in Council to the North American Bank, should be restricted to the same date. On two subsequent occasions Her Majesty's Government refused compliance with applications for the grant of charters to London companies for banking in Canada, in consequence of a disinclination expressed by the Canadian Government to an interference with their independent control over the Banks in the Colony.

In these proceedings Her Majesty's Government has been governed by the policy of allowing Colonies possessing representative institutions, free power of regulating their own concerns.

This policy would be seriously prejudiced in the case of banks if the enactments above referred to enable companies to obtain the privileges of a corporation for banking in Colonies, without the sanction of the local governments, and without conforming to the principles by which the Colonial Legislatures may have been governed in the establishment of their own banking institutions.

As the London and Colonial Bank (Limited), has been associated for the purpose of transacting every kind of banking business in the Colonies, it is obvious that the issue of notes may be included in such business, and supposing that the power of issuing notes in a Colony may be derived from the Imperial enactments referred to, it is possible that claims might be preferred on the part of the inconsistent with Colonial regulations. In the matter of the duration of the corporation, the establishment of this Bank would be opposed to the expressed wish of the Canadian Government, and in regard to the limitation of liability in a more restricted degree than that which has been allowed by the Canadian enactments in the case of other Banks, and without the restrictions imposed by those enactments, the constitution of this Bank would be at variance with the course of legislation adopted in the Colony.

My Lords think it desirable, in order that they may be enabled to consider fully the course which should be followed in this matter, that the true legal force of the enactment of 1858 should in the first instance be ascertained, and they desire that the Solicitor will prepare a case for the opinion of the Attorney and Solicitor General on the following points:—

1. Whether the effect of the Acts referred to has been to authorize the establishment of Banks of the character of the London and Colonial Bank

2. If the statutes do not apply to such a Bank, whether any and what means are open for restraining the promoters

3. Whether the Canadian Parliament has the power of passing an enactment to prevent, regulate, or restrict the operations of the Bank, if established as proposed in the colony.

When the above minute was written, the Acts above mentioned were in force.

Upon the 2nd November, "The Companies Act, 1862" (Stat. 25 and 26 Vic., cap. 89) came into operation.

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That Statute repeals almost entirely the above mentioned Joint Stock Acts (see sections 205, 206, and 3rd Schedule), re-enacting in substance the greater part of their material provisions.

In addition also to the banking projects mentioned in the Minute, a variety of other banks have been projected and advertized, to which the same observations apply as to the London and Colonial Bank; for example, the Bank of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick (Limited), whose head establishment is to be in London, with the Right Hon. Sir Edmund Head, K. C. B., late Governor General of Canada, and Lord Bury, M. P., late Civil Secretary in Canada, at the head of the direction; the Bank of Queensland (Limited), with an ex-Chief Justice of Jamaica for Chairman, besides various others for carrying on banking operations with limited liability, out of Her Majesty's dominions (such as the Union Bank of England and France (Limited), the London and Brazilian Bank (Limited), with influential mercantile names in the direction.

As to the particular Bank in question (the London and Colonial Bank), the following is an abstract of what has been hitherto registered:

The Company is registered under the "Joint Stock Banking Companies Acts, 1857 and 1858."

It was registered on the 17th March, 1862, and its number is 2610.

The documents at present registered are:—

1. Memorandum of Association signed by John Barnard Locke and six others, all of whom subscribe for twenty shares each.

2. Articles of Association signed by the same seven persons.

3. Notice of situation of Registered Office, No. 2, New Palace Yard, Westminster.

4. Notice of change of situation of Registered Office to No. 83, Lombard Street.

In the Memorandum of Association the object of the establishment of the Com-

pany to be the "transacting of every kind of Banking business" in India and the Colonies and Dependencies of Great Britain beyond the limits of the United Kingdom.

"The Head Office shall be in the City of London.

The Attorney and Solicitor General are requested to favor the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury with their opinion,—

1. Whether the effect of the Acts referred to (including the late Act of 25 and 26 Vic., cap. 89) is to authorize the establishment of Banks of the character of the London and Colonial Bank.

2. If the Statutes do not apply to such a Bank, whether any and what means are open for restraining the promoters.

3. Whether the Canadian parliament has the power of passing an enactment to prevent, regulate, or restrict the operations of the Bank, if established as proposed in the Colony (see Stat., 3 and 4 Vic., cap. 35.)

1st. We think that the effect of the Act 25 and 26 Vic., c. 89, is to permit the establishment in this country upon the footing of other companies regulated by that Act, of Banks such as projected London and Colonial Bank. The Act however would not authorize them to carry on the business of banking in any Colony or Foreign Possession of the British Crown in any manner not authorized and permitted by the local law prevailing from time to time in such Colony or Possession. It would, we conceive, merely invest them throughout the British Dominions with the character of English corporations domiciled in England, with limited liability (which it is to be observed is the normal condition of corporations, as such, the individual members of corporations not being, by the common law, liable for

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their engagements); and subject both as to the nature and extent of their corporate powers and management, and as to the conditions on which they may be dissolved and wound up, to the rules and provisions of that Statute.

2nd. Whether the Act applies or not, we think that as to everything which such companies or their promoters may propose or attempt to do elsewhere than in the United Kingdom, they may be re-

strained in such manner as may be thought expedient by local legislation.

3rd. Our answer to this question is in the affirmative, the question being confined to the operations of the Bank in the Colony, and not extending to its corporate capacity or constitution as defined by the Imperial Statute.

6. *Letter of Mr. Christopher C. Proudfoot, Commissioner of Highways for the Third District of Queen's County, setting forth the condition of the Oyster-bed Bridge at Rustico.*

To the Lieutenant Governor in Council convened.

Whereas the Oyster-bed Bridge in Rustico, is now out of repair, the plank covering being worn down, so that in a short time it will be impassable, if something is not done to it. Last year it cost £5 to keep it in repair, and it is not likely one could be found who would do it this year for a less sum than £10 or £15; therefore, it is, in my opinion, advisable to have the bridge in question, planked anew in the centre, ten feet wide, from end to end, with plank 4 inches thick. The bridge will take about 10,000 feet of plank, which valued at 13s. per 100 feet, will cost £65, to which must be added the cost of putting it on, to arrive at the cost of the bridge.

If the said bridge is sold this Winter, the contractor can do the work much cheaper than it can be done if left until next Summer, for the lumber cannot then be procured without paying an enormous price for it, as it must be ten feet long, and cut for that special purpose; and if it is left undone, under the existing circumstances, it would cost more in a few years than would make a complete job of it.

In view of these circumstances, I would beg leave to recommend that the said bridge be sold this winter, to be completed some time next Summer, and that you grant me the power of selling it as aforesaid, the contractor to be paid by the Government.

Mr. Longworth says it is no harm to make another attempt to obtain the amount. I think if the matter is explained, that the boat was put, and kept running on the route, that the most benefit was derived from, and the object fully completed in meaning (though not to the letter), that the Government will not refuse to order the sum to be paid.

Had the sum not been appropriated by the House, the boat would not have been placed on, and the parties interested depended on the amount being paid. The boat was a great benefit to the community on the Montague River,

I am told the Council will meet on Monday first; will you please bring the matter before the Board? and if it is possible to obtain a Warrant for the amount, you will please do so, as we do not wish, and in fact, do not see any reason why we should, the second time, go before the House of Assembly to ask the amount. I may notice that the wording of the grant is very loose indeed, but the object or meaning was fully accomplished, as far as the travelling public were interested. Prince Edward Island.

No. 77. GOVERNMENT HOUSE,
10th November, 1862.

MY LORD DUKE ;

1. I have the honor to transmit, herewith, duplicate copies of the Blue Book for the year 1861.

2. I am not surprised at observing how few, and unimportant the changes are in the statistical information, which these Annual Returns contain, when I consider how little room there is for enterprize in a Colony dependant principally upon the cultivation of land for its advancement.

3. The War in the North American Union caused considerable depression in every branch of trade throughout the year. It affected seriously the Fisheries on the coasts of this Island, which had previously been carried on chiefly by American enterprize and capital.

4. Under several heads the statements in the Blue Book for 1861, are more accurate and more detailed, than those of the preceding year.

5. I allude to those which have been compiled from the Census taken during the year. These comprise not only Returns of the Population, but also various statistics concerning the land, its cultiva-

tion, and produce, and the tenures under which it is held.

6. I shall now direct your Grace's attention to various details under their several heads.

7. *Finance.*—The Revenue of the Colony for the year (£28,016 6s. 2d) was principally derived from Impost Duties, which yielded £18,655 17s. 5½d. The remaining Revenue is composed of Assessments on Lands, Sales of Public Lands, and various Fees.

8. The Revenue for the year falls short of that of the preceding twelve-month by £736 2s. 9½d. This decrease arises from a corresponding one in the Impost Duties.

9. The expenditure for the year is £32,799 17s. 7d — £3396 10s. 11d. less than that of 1860. But in 1860 there is an item of £8612 which was applied to the purchase of the Estates of the Earl of Selkirk, and Mr. Stanfield, and cannot be considered as ordinary expenditure.

10. The heaviest item occurs under the head of Education, it amounts to £10,502 8s. 5½d. or more than ¼ the Revenue, and is, moreover, an expenditure ever increasing with the Population.

11. It is clear that sooner or later some measure must be introduced either to change the free system of Education,

which entails a charge so disproportionate to the resources of the Colony, on an additional Revenue must be raised to meet it.

12. The system, which, at present, obtains in the House of Assembly respecting the initiation of money votes, appears to me to be objectionable. It is competent for any member to propose a Grant for any purpose. I cannot but think, that it would be more satisfactory were the Legislature to yield to the Executive the initiation of all Money Votes, and then place the whole expenditure of the Colony directly within the responsibility of the Government.

13. The Expenditure exceeds the Revenue by £4793 11s. 5d, and increases the Public Debt by that amount. This Debt was on the 31st January, 1862, £41,213 10s. 3d. The assets to meet it were—the sum of £21,918 19s. 2d. due as instalments on sales of land bearing interest at 5 per cent., and 51,776 acres of land unsold.

14. *General Commerce.*—The value of the Imports for the year was £209,935 15s. 11d. That of Exports £163,114 7s. 10d. In each of these, there appears a decrease; £20,118 4s. 1d in the value of commodities imported, and £38,319 15s. 6d. in that of those exported.

15. The Imports, by these Returns exceed the Exports in value by £46,821 8s. 1d; but 48 vessels, measuring 8095 tons, built in the Island, and transferred to other Ports are not taken into account. The value of these vessels, at an average of £5 10s a ton, nearly equalizes the value of Imports and Exports.

16. The principal decrease in Trade has been in that with the United States of America, viz, £13,420 4s. in value of Imports, and £31,630 9s. 8½d. in that of Exports.

17. Shipping Trade shows a decrease corresponding with that in the Imports and Exports.

18. *Population.*—The Population of the Island by the Census Returns of 1861, is 81,857, an increase of 9361 since the year 1855, or 13 per cent. in six years. I have the honor to enclose, marked B, a return which in a concise tabular statement exhausts all the information on this subject.

19. *Agriculture.*—The number of acres of Land under cultivation has increased since 1855 from 322,298 to 368,127 acres. There still remain nearly 1,000,000 acres in a wilderness state, of which but little is incapable of cultivation. Enclosure C gives a summary of Returns, containing the number of persons holding land,—the tenure on which they hold it,—the terms of years for which land is leased, and the rents reserved. It also gives the quantities of the various crops and manufactures, and contrasts each of these Returns with those of the previous Census.

20. *Grants of Land.*—I herein also enclose, marked D, a summary of the accounts of the several Estates which are in the hands of the local Government. This summary is taken from the Returns of the Commissioner of Public Lands, and all sums of money are in currency money, which is one-third less value than sterling.

21. I have much satisfaction in observing that, after meeting all the ordinary expenditure on these Estates, making an allowance for loss of land Tax and interest on Debentures, there is a balance for the year of £1,333 18s. 7d., sterling, in favor of the receipts.

22. *Crime.*—I have great satisfaction in reporting that crimes of an aggravated character are scarcely known in this Colony, and also that minor offences have diminished with an increasing population.

23. It appears from returns extracted from records of the Supreme Court, that only four criminal offences were tried in this Island in the year 1861, with a population of 80,857; while in 1855, with a

population of 71,496, there were 24 such offences. It must be borne in mind, too, that as there are no Courts of Quarter Sessions in this Island, all the offences tried before those Courts in England, fall here within the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, as well as the higher description of criminal offences.

24. *Volunteers.*—I cannot conclude this Report without referring to the satisfactory advancement made by the Volunteer Force of this Colony in 1861, during which year the enrolment of men extended to 1500.

25. It affords me much pleasure to be able to inform your Grace, that the attention to drill, the proficiency attained by

the Volunteers in the use of the rifle, and the zeal generally displayed, reflect the highest credit upon them.

At the same time, it is due to the leading gentlemen of the Colony to acknowledge the continued support with which they have at all times seconded me in the organization of the Volunteers.

Report of the Superintendent of Public Works on the state of the Bridge on the Morell River.

CHARLOTTETOWN, March 30th, 1863.

SIR ;

I have examined the bridge across the Morell River, and find it in a most dangerous condition. The timber in it is water logged and sunk down level with the edge of the water, and there is no rail upon it to prevent people from going over into the river. I do not think it worth repairing ; in my opinion it has always been a poor substitute for a bridge.

I would recommend that a new piled bridge be erected, as a block bridge cannot be built there in consequence of the depth of the mud. To give some idea of this, I took a fence pole about fifteen feet long and ran it down the whole length, and did not then reach the bottom. I am not an advocate for piled bridges, but in this case, I think it will be the only thing that will answer.

The number of Students who have been in attendance during the year, is 110, —an increase of 53 over the previous year ; the number of pupils has decreased in like proportion, making the average daily attendance of all—students and pupils—about the same as in 1861.

While regretting that the facilities for improvement afforded by the Institution are not equal to those of the Normal Schools of larger and wealthier colonies, I have much pleasure in testifying to the general good conduct and progress of the students.

FLAT RIVER, March 31st, 1863.

SIR ;

In reply to your letter of the 20th inst , I beg to let you know, for the information of His Excellency the Lieut. Governor in Council, that I made it my business, yesterday, to call on the people referred to in your letter, owning land in Wood Islands, through which the road runs leading to the harbor.

The first is Malcolm McMillan, Donald Bell, James McNeill, and Archibald McIsaac. In front of those four farms, there is still from thirty to thirty-six feet outside of their fences. The next is Dugald McIsaac and Norman McPherson ; there is no more than twelve feet outside of their fences. The last named two persons agreed to remove their fences as far in as the fences of the first named four men, for the sum of Six pounds currency, each, compensation.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

COPY OF A COMMISSION under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, appointing Viscount Monck to be Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Island of Prince Edward.

Letters Patent, Dated 2d November, 1861.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, to Our right, trusty and well-beloved Cousin, Charles Stanley Viscount Monck, Greeting:

I. Whereas We did, by certain Letters-Patent under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the twentieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the eighteenth year of our reign, constitute and appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Sir Edmund Walker Head, Baronet, (now Our right trusty and well-beloved Councillor Sir Edmund Walker Head, Baronet, Knight Commander of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath), to be Our Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Our Island of Prince Edward, during Our pleasure, as by the said recited Letters-Patent, relation being thereunto had, will more fully and at large appear: Now know you, that We have revoked and determined, and by these presents do revoke and determine the said recited Letters-Patent, and every clause, article and thing therein contained: And further know you that We, reposing

especial trust and confidence in the prudence, courage and loyalty of you, the said Charles Stanley Viscount Monck, of Our especial grace, certain knowledge, and mere motion, have thought fit to constitute and appoint, and do by these presents constitute and appoint you to be, during Our pleasure, Our Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Our said Island.

II. And We do hereby authorize, empower, and command you in due manner to do and execute all things that shall belong to your said command, and the trust We have reposed in you, according to the several powers, provisions, and directions granted or appointed you by this Our Commission, and the Instructions herewith given to you, or by such further powers, instructions, and authorities as shall at any time hereafter be granted or appointed you in respect to the said Island under our Sign-Manuel and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and according to such reasonable laws and statutes as are now in force, or shall hereafter be made and agreed upon by you, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Our said Island,

III. And We do by these presents, grant, provide, and declare that there shall be within Our said Island a Council, to be called "The Executive Council" of Our Island, and that all and every the powers and authorities heretofore vested in or exercised by the Executive Council of Our said Island shall continue to be exercised by Our said Council hereby re-established.

IV. And We do hereby declare Our pleasure to be that the said Executive Council shall consist of such persons as you shall from time to time, in Our name and on Our behalf, nominate and appoint by instruments to be passed under the Public Seal of Our said Island; all which persons shall hold their places in the said Council during Our pleasure; Provided nevertheless, and We do hereby declare Our pleasure to be, that the total number of the members of Our said Executive Council for the time being resident within Our said Island shall not at any time, by any such appointment by you, be raised to a greater number in the whole than nine.

V. And We do by these presents grant, provide, and declare, that there shall be within Our said Island a Council, to be called "The Legislative Council" of Our said Island, and that all and every the powers and authorities heretofore vested in or exercised by the Legislative Council of Our said Island shall continue to be exercised by Our said Council hereby re-established.

VI. And We do hereby declare Our pleasure to be, that the said Legislative Council shall (until otherwise provided by law) consist of such and so many members as have been, or shall hereafter be, from time to time, for that purpose nominated and appointed by Us under Our Sign-Manuel and Signet, or as shall be provisionally appointed by you, until Our will therein shall be known, all which members shall hold their places in the said Council during Our pleasure: Provided nevertheless, and We do hereby declare Our pleasure to be, that the total number of the members of the said Legislative Council for the time being resident within Our said Island

shall not at any time, by any such provisional appointments, be raised to a greater number in the whole than twelve.

VII. And We do further direct and appoint (until otherwise provided by law) that seven members of Our said Legislative Council shall be a quorum for the dispatch of business thereof, and that the senior member, for the time being, of the said Council shall preside at all the deliberations thereof.

VIII. And We do hereby authorize and empower you to constitute and appoint Judges, and in cases requisite Commissioners of Oyer and Terminer, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers and Ministers in Our said Island, for the better administration of justice, and putting the laws into execution.

IX. And We do hereby give and grant unto you, so far as We lawfully may, full power and authority, upon sufficient cause to you appearing, to remove from his office or to suspend from the exercise of the same, any person exercising any office or place within Our said Island or its Dependencies under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted, by Us or in Our name, or under Our authority.

X. And We do hereby give and grant unto you full power and authority, with the advice and consent of Our said Executive Council, from time to time, as need shall require, to summon and call General Assemblies of the frecholders and settlers in the said Island under your government, in such manner and form as has been already appointed and used, or according to such further powers, instructions, and authorities as shall at any time hereafter be granted or appointed you under Our Sign-Manuel and Signet.

XI. And Our will and pleasure is, that the persons thereupon duly elected by the major part of the electors of the respective counties and places, and so returned, shall before their sitting take the Oath of Allegiance, which oath you shall commission fit persons, under the Public Seal of Our Island, to tender and administer unto them;

and until the same shall have been so taken, no person shall be capable of sitting, though elected.

XII. And We do hereby declare that the persons so elected and qualified shall be called "The General Assembly" of Our Island; and that you, with the advice and consent of Our said Legislative Council and Assembly, or the major part of them respectively, shall have full power and authority to make, constitute, and ordain laws, statutes, and ordinances for the public peace, welfare, and good government of Our said Island, and the people and inhabitants thereof, and such other as shall resort thereto, and for the benefit of Us, Our heirs and successors, which said laws, statutes and ordinances are not to be repugnant, but, as near as local circumstances will admit, agreeable to the laws and statutes of this Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland: Provided that all such laws, statutes and ordinances, of what nature or duration soever, be, within three months, or sooner, after the making thereof, transmitted to Us under the Public Seal of Our said Island for Our approbation or disallowance of the same, as also duplicates thereof by the next conveyance.

XIII. And in case any or all of the said laws, statutes, and ordinances not before confirmed by Us, shall at any time be disallowed, and not approved, and so signified by Us, Our heirs or successors, under Our or their Sign-Manuel and Signet, or by Order of Our or their Privy Council unto you, then such and so many of the said laws, statutes and ordinances as shall be so disallowed and not approved shall from thenceforth cease, determine, and become utterly void and of none effect, anything to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

XIV. And to the end that nothing may be passed or done by Our said Legislative Council or Assembly to the prejudice of Us, our heirs and successors, We will and ordain that you shall have and enjoy a negative voice in the making and passing all laws, statutes, and ordinances aforesaid.

XV. And you shall and may likewise, from time to time, as you shall judge it necessary, adjourn, prorogue, or dissolve all General Assemblies as aforesaid.

XVI. And We do hereby authorize and empower you to keep and use the Public Seal of Our said Island, for sealing all things whatsoever that shall pass this Seal.

XVII. And We do hereby give and grant unto full power and authority, as you shall see occasion, in Our name and on Our behalf, to grant to any offender convicted of any crime in any Court, or before any Judge, Justice, or Magistrate within Our said Island or its Dependencies, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender for such period as to you may seem fit, and to remit any fines, penalties, or forfeitures which may become due and payable to Us.

XVIII. And We do by these presents give and grant unto you full power and authority from time to time to give order and warrant for the preparing of grants of the custodies of idiots and lunatics, and of their estates, as are or shall be found by inquisition thereof taken, and returnable into our Courts of Chancery, and thereupon to make and pass grants and commitments, under Our Public Seal of Our said Island, of the custody of all and every such idiots and lunatics, and their estates, to such person or persons suitors in that behalf as, according to the rules of law, and the use and practice in those and the like cases, you shall judge meet for that trust.

XIX. And we do by these presents authorize and empower you, within our said Island, to grant licenses for marriages, letters of administration, and probates of wills, as the same have been granted by your predecessors; and to present any person or persons to any churches, chapels, or other ecclesiastical benefices to which We shall from time to time be entitled to present.

XX. And We do authorize and empower you to make and execute in Our

name and on Our behalf, under the Public Seal of Our said Island, grants and dispositions of any lands within Our said Island which may be granted or disposed of by Us.

XXI. And in case of your death, incapacity, or absence out of Our said Island, We do by these presents give and grant all and singular the powers and authorities herein to you granted, to Our Lieutenant-Governor for the time being of Our said Island; and in case of the death, absence or incapacity of any such Lieutenant-Governor, to such person as We may, by Warrant under Our Sign-Manuel and Signet, authorize and appoint to be the Administrator of the government of Our said Island, such powers and authorities to be by him executed and enjoyed during Our pleasure. But if upon your death, incapacity, or absence Out of Our said Island, there be no person upon the place commissioned and appointed by Us to be Our

Licutenant-Governor, or especially appointed by Us to administer the government within Our said Island, Our will and pleasure is, that during such absence or incapacity, or until Our further pleasure shall be known, the Senior Military Officer for the time being in command of Our forces within Our said Island shall take upon him the administration of the government thereof, and shall execute in Our said Island this Our Commission, and the several powers and authorities therein contained, in the same manner and to all intents and purposes as other Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief should or ought to do.

XXII. And We do hereby command all Our Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, and all other the inhabitants of Our said Island, to be obedient, aiding and assisting unto you, in the execution of this Our Commission, and of the powers and authorities herein contained.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

INSTRUCTIONS to Our Right Trusty and Well-Beloved Cousin, Charles Stanley Viscount Monck, Our Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Our Island of Prince Edward, or, in his absence, to Our Lieutenant-Governor or Officer administering the Government of Our said Island for the time being.

Given at our Our Court at Windsor, this 2d day of November, in the 25th year of Our reign.

I. WHEREAS We have, by our Commission, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing even date herewith, constituted and appointed you, the said Charles Stanley Viscount Monck, to be, during Our pleasure, Our Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Our Island of Prince Edward; and whereas We have thereby authorized, empowered and commanded you, in due manner, to do and execute all things that shall belong to your said command, and the trust We have hereby reposed in you, according to the

several powers, provisions, and directions granted or appointed you by Our said Commission, and the Instructions therewith given to you, or by such further powers, instructions, and authorities as therein are mentioned, and according to such reasonable laws and statutes as are now in force, or as shall hereafter be made and agreed upon by you, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of our said Island: Now by these Our Instructions, under Our Royal Sign-Manuel and Signet, being the Instructions so referred to in and accom-

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panying our said Commission, We do declare Our will and pleasure to be, that you, so soon as may be after the publication of Our said Commission, do take the oath appointed to be taken by an Act passed in the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Our reign, intituled "An Act to substitute one Oath for the Oaths of Allegiance, Supremacy, and Abjuration, and for the Relief of Her Majesty's subjects professing the Jewish Religion;" and likewise that you do take the usual oath for the due execution and performance of the office and trust of Our Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over our said Island, and for the due and impartial administration of justice, all which said Oaths Our Executive Council of Our said Island, or any three or more of the members thereof, have hereby full power and authority, and are required, to tender and administer unto you.

II. And to the end that Our said Executive Council may be assisting to you in all affairs relating to Our service, you are to communicate to them these Our Instructions, and any additional Instructions which may be in like manner thereafter given to you by Us.

III. And We do hereby declare, and it is Our pleasure that our said Council shall not proceed to the dispatch of business unless duly summoned by your authority, nor unless five of the members of the said Council be present and assisting at any meetings at which any such business shall be dispatched: And We do further direct that, if in any case you see sufficient cause to dissent from the opinion of the major part, or of the whole, of the said Executive Council, upon any question brought by you under their consideration, it shall be competent to you, upon any such occasion, to execute the powers and authorities vested in you by our said Commission, and by these Our Instructions, in opposition to such their opinions; it being, nevertheless, Our pleasure that, in every case, it shall be competent to any member of Our said Council to record at length, on the Minutes of Our said Council, the grounds and

reasons of any opinion or advice he may give upon any question brought under the consideration of such Council.

IV. And it is Our pleasure, and you are hereby authorized to appoint, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, one member of Our said Executive Council to preside in your absence, and to remove him and appoint another in his stead; and if, during your absence, the member so appointed shall also be absent, then the senior member of the Council actually present shall preside, the seniority of the members of the said Council being regulated according to the order of their respective appointments.

V. And We do further direct and command, that a full and exact Journal, or Minute be kept of all the deliberations, acts proceedings, votes and resolutions of Our said Executive Council; and that at each meeting of the said Council, the Minutes of the last preceding meeting shall be read over, confirmed, or amended; as the case may require, before proceeding to the dispatch of any other business.

VI. And whereas We have, by our said Commission, declared our pleasure to be that there should be within our said Island a Council, to be called the Legislative Council of our said Island, with certain powers and authorities therein mentioned, and have further declared Our pleasure to be, that (until otherwise provided by law) the said Council shall consist of such and so many members as have been, or may thereafter for that purpose be, nominated and appointed by Us, under Our Royal Sign-Manuel and Signet, or as should be provisionally appointed by you until our pleasure therein shall be known: Provided always, that the total number of the members of the said Legislative Council resident within our said Island shall not at any time, by any such provisional appointment, be raised to a greater number in the whole than twelve: Now know you, that We, reposing especial trust and confidence in the wisdom, prudence, and ability of the persons who are now members of the said Legislative Council, do by

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these our Instructions reconstruct and re-appoint each and all of them to be Legislative Councillors for Our said Island during Our pleasure.

VII. And We do especially require and enjoin, that whenever you shall think fit, in the exercise of the authority hereby vested in you, to appoint any person or persons provisionally as aforesaid to be a member or members of Our said Legislative Council, you do in every such case forthwith transmit to Us, through one of Our principal Secretaries of State, the names and the qualifications of the several members so provisionally appointed by you to be members of Our said Council, to the intent that the said appointments may be either confirmed or disallowed as We shall see occasion.

VIII. And We do hereby authorize and require you from time to time, and at any time hereafter, by yourself or by any other person to be authorized by you in that behalf, to administer to all and every person or persons as you shall think fit, who shall hold any office or place of trust or profit, or who shall at any time or times pass into Our said Island, or who shall be resident or abiding therein, the oath commonly called the Oath of Allegiance, together with such other oath or oaths as are usually given for the performance of official duties, or for the clearing of truth in judicial causes.

IX. And it is Our will and pleasure that (until otherwise provided by law) if any of the members of our said Council, residing in Our said Island, shall hereafter wilfully absent themselves from the said Island, and continue absent above the space of six months together, without leave from you first obtained under your hand and seal, or shall remain absent for the space of one year without leave given them under Our Royal signature, his or their place or places in the said Council shall immediately thereupon become void; and if any of the members of our said Council, residing in our said Island, shall wilfully absent themselves hereafter from the said Council when duly summoned by you,

without good and sufficient cause, and shall persist in such absence, after being thereof admonished by you, you are to suspend such Councillors so absenting themselves, till our further pleasure be known therein, giving immediate notice thereof to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State. And We do hereby will and require you, that this Our Royal pleasure be signified to the several members of Our said Council, and that it be entered in the Council books as a standing rule.

X. And whereas by Our said Commission you are authorized and empowered, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Our said Island, or the major part of them, respectively to make, constitute, and ordain laws, statutes, and ordinances for the public peace, welfare, and good government of Our said Island; it is Our will and pleasure that the following regulations be carefully observed in the framing and passing of all such laws, statutes and ordinances as may be passed by you with the advice and consent of Our said Council and Assembly, videlicet: that the style of enacting the said laws, statutes and ordinances be by the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or officer administering the government, as the case may be, Council and Assembly, and no other; that each different matter be provided for by a different law, without including in one and the same Act such things as have no proper relation to each other; that no clause be inserted in any Act or Ordinance which shall be foreign to what the title of it imports; and that no perpetual clause be part of any temporary law.

XI. When any Bill is presented to you for Our assent, of either of the classes hereinafter specified, you shall (unless you shall think proper to withhold Our assent from the same) reserve the same for the signification of Our pleasure thereon; subject, nevertheless, to your discretion, in case you should be of opinion that an urgent necessity exists, requiring that such Bill be brought into immediate operation; in which case you are authorized to assent

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to such Bill in Our name, transmitting to Us, by the earliest opportunity, the Bill so assented to, together with your reasons for assenting thereto; that is to say :

1. Any Bill for the divorce of persons joined together in holy matrimony.

2. Any Bill whereby any grant of land or money, or other donation or gratuity, may be made to yourself.

3. Any Bill whereby any paper or other currency may be made a legal tender, except the coin of the realm, or other gold or silver coin.

4. Any Bill imposing differential duties.

5. Any Bill the provisions of which shall appear inconsistent with obligations imposed upon Us by treaty.

6. Any Bill interfering with the discipline or control of Our forces in our said Island by land and sea.

7. Any Bill of an extraordinary nature and importance, whereby our prerogative, or the rights and property of Our subjects not residing in the Colony, or the trade and shipping of the United Kingdom and its Dependencies, may be prejudiced.

8. Any Bill containing provisions to which Our assent has been once refused, or which has been disallowed by Us.

XII. And it is Our will and pleasure that all Commissions to be granted by you to any person or persons to be Judge, Justice of the Peace, or other necessary officer, shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be granted during pleasure only.

XIII. And Whereas by Our said Commission We have authorized you to present any person or persons to any church, chapel, or other ecclesiastical

benefice, within our said Island, to which we may from time to time be entitled to present, We do declare Our will and pleasure to be that you do not present any Minister of the United Church of England and Ireland to any ecclesiastical benefice without a certificate from the Bishop of Nova Scotia. or his Commissary, of his being conformable to the doctrine and discipline of the said Church. And it is Our will and pleasure that the person so presented shall be instituted by the Bishop of Nova Scotia, or his Commissary, duly authorized by him.

XIV. And whereas you will receive through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State a book of tables in blank, commonly called the "Blue Book," to be annually filled up with certain Returns relative to the revenue and expenditure, militia, public works, legislation, civil establishment, pensions, population, course of exchange, imports and exports, agricultural produce, manufactures, and other matters in the said "Blue Book" more particularly specified with reference to the state and condition of Our said Island : Now We do hereby signify Our pleasure that all such Returns be accurately prepared and punctually transmitted to Us from year to year through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State.

XV. And Whereas great prejudice may happen to Our service, and to the security of Our said Island, by the absence of Our Lieutenant Governor, We direct that he shall not upon any pretence whatever quit the said Island without having first obtained leave from Us for so doing, under Our Sign-Manuel and Signet, or through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State.
