GOVERNMENT CONTROL FOR U.S. EXPORTS

Established By Wilson In Proclamation; Big Blow At Fo

Washington, July 9.—President Wilson today issued his first proclamation providing for absolute government control of the exports of essential war-time commodities to 56 nations and their possessions, including the allies of America, neutrals and the enemy countries. The proclamation is dated July 9, and its rulings are to become effective next Sunday. On and after that day none of the commodities named may be taken from this country except under license.

The "essential" thus placed under restriction are many and varied. The scope of the proclamation was a surprise even to those who have urged upon the president the necessity for immediate and drastic action to prevent the draining of America. Not only are coal and fuel, wheat grains and other foodstuffs included, but steel, which might be used for shipbuilding, arms and ammunition, through additional items are put under the ban. Lumber was omitted. That the President is determined to see that no more foodstuffs from the United States leak into Germany through contiguous neutral nations was made evident. Both in the proclamation and in a statement with which Mr. Wilson supplemented it he referred to this problem. He said it was the duty of the Government to see that Germany did not receive succor.

Emphasis was laid by the President on the need of ameliorating the food conditions in America, which, he said, was in view of issuing the proclamation.

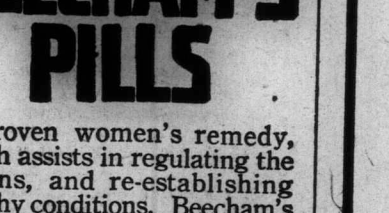

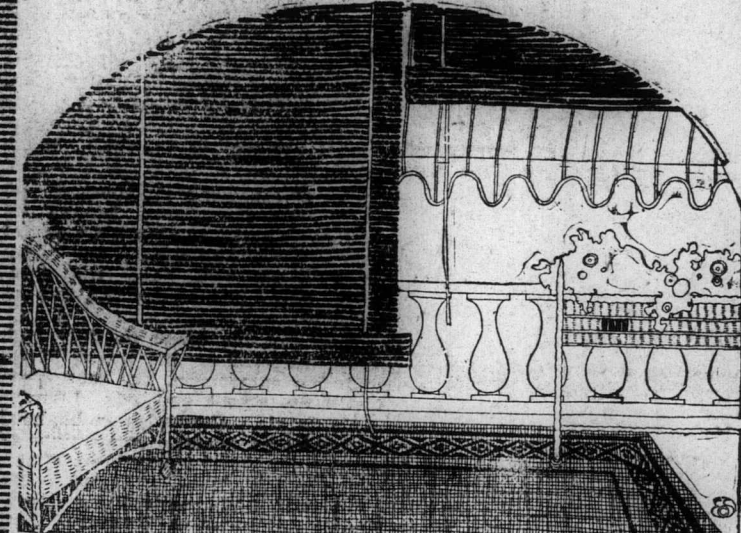

DEATH ROLL FROM AIR RAID CLOSED

No Further Fatalities Reported In London; Ruins Being Searched

By Courier Leased Wire London, July 9. - Although some of those injured on Saturday are in serious condition, in most cases they are progressing favorably, and no further deaths have occurred in the two hospitals which received the largest number of patients. Some of the streets in which bombs were dropped were closed to traffic this morning. The police were still searching this morning among the ruins of east-end tenements for a number of persons who are missing.

When over London the raiders always were within range of anti-aircraft guns, with which the authorities registered as though none of the airplanes were brought down by the artillery. British airmen often returned from German lines with machine guns punctured by bullets and pilots wounded, so it is not surprising that the difficult targets were not raiders flew in gobs, a formation most difficult to break up and destroy.

Though the program for London's defenses is completed, it is not claimed that no improvement is possible, as no general ever is satisfied with the size of his army.

Montreal, July 9. - The McLeod-Teller Commission, appointed to consider the evidence submitted before Mr. Justice Gault in regard to the Manitoba agricultural college scandal, will begin the taking of evidence in court here tomorrow. The first witness will likely be Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of public works, who was criticized by Judge Galt in his report.

Believing that Willard Carter, who broke parole in 1911, when under sentence for assault, is with a Canadian battalion in France, Governor Cox, of Ohio, has granted him a full pardon.

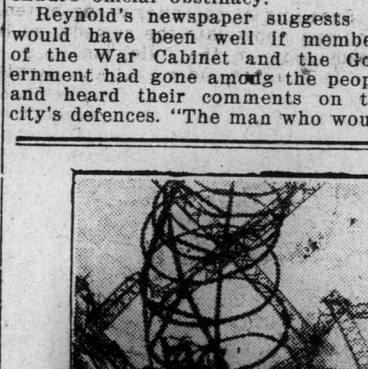

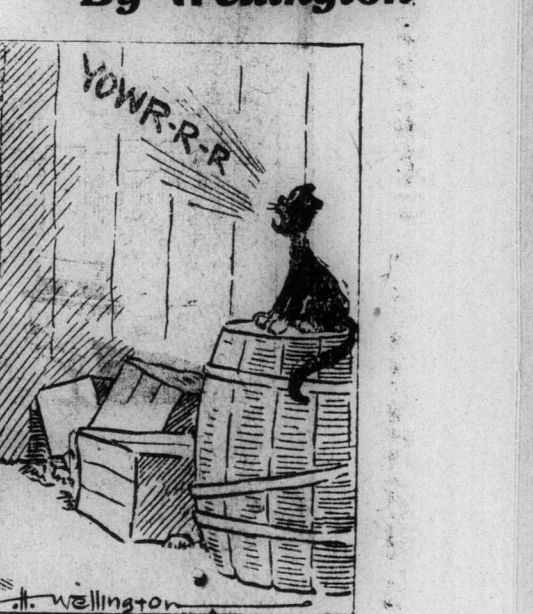
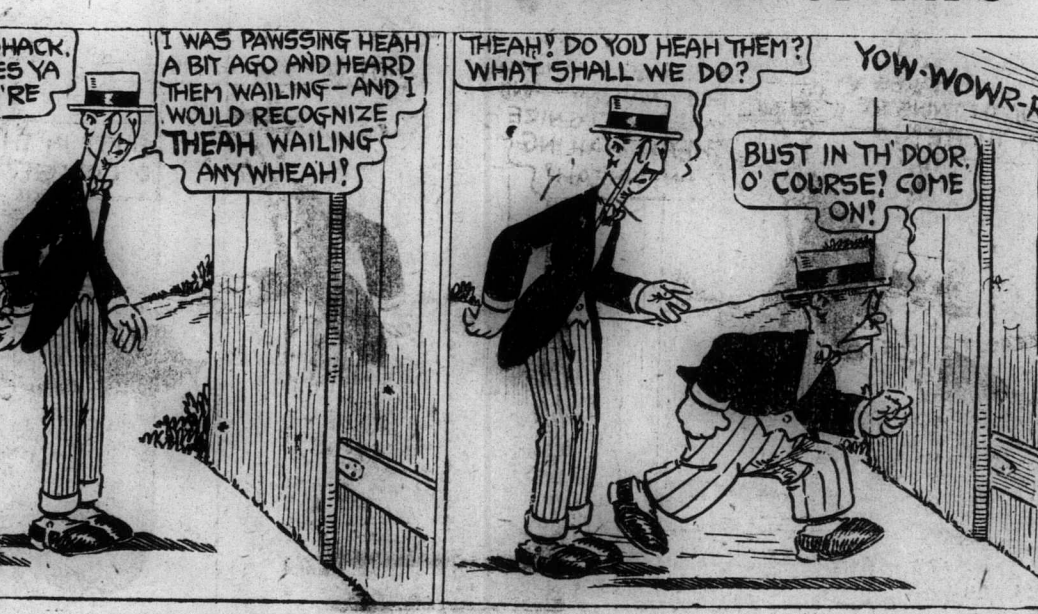

THE ENEMY LOST TEN MACHINES IN ALL

After the Air Raid Upon London - The Death Roll Consisted Largely of Women and Children

London, July 9.—British airmen brought down ten German aeroplanes following the raid on London on Saturday, as a result of which 37 were killed and 141 injured. One enemy machine downed by the Royal Flying Corps fell into the sea off the mouth of the Thames, three were brought down by pursuing machines from England. British airmen at Dunkirk watching for the returning raiders missed them owing to the fact that they returned over Dutch territory, but the British drove down seven other German machines, several of them in flames.

An Admiralty announcement reads: "The enemy raiding squadron that bombarded London yesterday was chased by Royal Naval Air Service machines from this country and engaged forty miles out at sea off the east coast. Two enemy machines were observed to crash into the sea and the third enemy machine was seen to fall in flames off the mouth of the Scheldt. All our machines returned safely."

Work of Dunkirk Aviators.
The text of the announcement regarding the achievement of the Dunkirk aviators reads: "The vice-admiral at Dover has reports from Dunkirk that information was received that enemy aircraft were attacking England. Five flights were sent up to intercept them as they returned to their bases. Three enemy aeroplanes were encountered and destroyed and one enemy aeroplane driven down into the sea. Another enemy aeroplane was driven down over the beach, damaged, near Ostend.

"During their operations none of the raiding enemy aeroplanes were encountered, and it is thought highly probable they returned near the Scheldt and over Dutch territory."

The London Casualty List.
Lord French reports that the total casualties in Saturday's German raid reported by the police up to the present are:
Killed—Metropolitan area, men, 37; women, 4; children, total, 34; Isle of Thanet, men, 1; women, 2; total, killed, 37.
Injured—Metropolitan area, men, 139; women, 27; children, 36; total, 192; Isle of Thanet, men, 1; women, 2; total, 2; total injured, 141.

The Berlin Version.
The German report says: "On the morning of July 7 one of our aviation squadrons attacked London. At 11 o'clock in the morning bombs were dropped freely on docks, harbor works, and warehouses on the Thames. Fires and explosions were observed. One British aeroplane was shot down over London. Our aeroplanes all returned except one, which was compelled to make a descent to the sea and could not be saved by our naval forces.

"In aerial encounters at the front and by anti-aircraft fire, the enemy yesterday lost nine aeroplanes."

Details of Raid.
London, July 9.—The second descent upon London by a squadron of aeroplanes was made Saturday morning between nine and ten o'clock, when the business section of the metropolis was most crowded. Although the German contingent was larger, more daring, more deliberate in its movements and descended much lower than on June 13, the number of killed and wounded was, roughly, one-third the previous casualty list. The destruction of property may have been greater, but that is impossible to estimate.

The flight of the Germans over London last twenty minutes. British airmen engaged the enemy for several minutes over the city, and anti-aircraft guns were firing briskly, dotting the sky with shrapnel puffs, but without success, so far as concerned the destruction of any of the

twenty or more machines which constituted the invading force.
The Admiralty was able to report last night, however, that naval airmen who followed them to sea, brought down three machines. A British squadron sent up from Dunkirk to intercept the returning raiders did not encounter them because they taken a more northerly route, but the British airmen met and destroyed seven other German machines.

Haze Favors Raiders.
The morning was one of haze, weather most favorable for crossing the Channel at a height without being observed. On their previous trip, made in similar weather, the Germans kept high up in the mist, but yesterday, when they neared their objectives, most of them descended. Their formation was like a flock of wild geese as they approached, and the British pursuers now (the guns were able to scatter them until they spread out before letting loose the bombs).

Hundreds of thousands of persons on roofs, from windows and gathered in the streets heard the noise of battle. At first there were a few minutes when the anti-aircraft guns were crashing sharply and the machine guns were rattling aloft. Then came three or four minutes, when the heavy explosion of bombs and the shattering of glass was the dominant sound; then a few minutes when the artillery fire receded into the distance.

The Germans steered a course across London from north-west to south-east. They dropped the last of their bombs on the east side of the Thames. Some observers say that a giant aeroplane piloted the enemy aeroplanes and that the bomb carriers were in the centre, flanked by scouts for fighting off the British airmen.

Take Amazing Chances.
The low altitude and slow pace at which the Germans crossed London and the dare devil way they circled over their objectives has caused great surprise. When they were steering a steady course for north-west, evidently in the act of making a long sweeping curve, which would ultimately bring their heads in the direction of home. They completed the manoeuvre over the Thames, and as the British machines came into the picture the raiders quickened their pace.

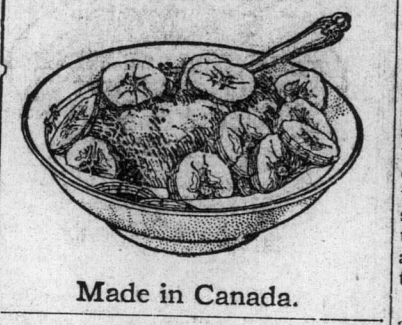
A fierce running fight ensued between a strong force of British machines and the raiders toward the mouth of the river. The machines flew fairly low, and the rattle of machine guns was distinctly audible from the ground. None of the Germans had been brought down when the combatants disappeared from view, but the British squadron continued the pursuit and engaged them heavily.

To-day's attack was plainly directed against the civilian population and business and financial buildings. There is no question that the Germans knew where they were and it was not a matter of scattering explosives blindly from a great height. How it happened that more persons were not killed is hard to explain. Thousands were in the streets in the area bombed, but probably a much larger proportion took shelter in the solid buildings taught by the lesson of June 13.

The upper story of one building where several hundred men and girls were employed was partly wrecked. First reports were to the effect that great loss of life had occurred in this building, but it later developed that no one was even injured, as all the workers had been quickly marshalled into the basement when the gunfire began.

The upper part of a solid office building was crushed. Large concrete blocks were thrown about the street, but no one in the building suffered any injury, as refuge was early sought in the basement.

BRUSILOFF EXTENDS RUSSIAN LINE TO REGION OF HALICZ

Great Success Continues. Armies Engaged on a Front of Over Thirty Miles, Important Gains Recorded East of Lemberg

Petrograd, July 9.—According to semi-official reports, the Russian offensive against the German and Austro-Hungarian lines in the region of Galicia, which was virtually under the guns of General Brusiloff when the advance of a year ago came to a standstill, Halicz is important as the key to Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, and is about 60 miles southeast of that city.

Three armies are now engaged on a front of more than thirty miles along the Narayevka River. The enthusiasm among the troops is increasing. A train carrying 500 soldiers from Reval, who organized the "storming battalion" and wear several ribbons inscribed "to the trenches," passed through Petrograd to-day.

Some activity is reported along the heights northwest of Presovoe, on the Galician front, the villages of Lavrikove and Travotokli are also occupied. Devintach, and pressed back the enemy in the Jamnica-Paschna sector northwest of the Stanislaw region. The war office made this announcement to-day.

Violent fighting has begun on the Radoszka front west of Pinsk. The city of Pinsk is in flames, according to an announcement yesterday by the semi-official news agency.

The Russian artillery, the announcement says, is leveling all obstacles.

Success on All Fields.
The renewed Russian offensive, this time a series of strong attacks at separated points on the Galician front has met with considerable success on practically all of the battlefields. Despite stubborn counterattacks, made with fresh reserves which the Germans have put into action, valuable positions and 1,049 prisoners have been captured.

General Brusiloff's troops demonstrated yesterday and to-day that the offensive of July 7 was no mere flash in the pan, and that the new Russian army has every whit the staying power of the old. Though their losses were heavy, the Russians persisted alike in attack and in fighting back counterattacks. Sixty German and Austrian soldiers were captured.

Their greatest success was gained in that region of Galicia east of Lemberg. The strong German trenches on the heights northwest of Presovoe and the second range east of Godov were stormed and held after the fiercest fighting. The two villages of Lavrikove and Travotokli were also held. At one time the Russians penetrated the village of Godov itself and seemed in a fair way to capture it.

Then came the German counterattacks, in which the fighting was with the bayonet. Six strongly fortified positions captured by the Russians changed hands three times after the brown or the grey lines swept over them. At some places the Germans forced back the Russians, but at the end of the fight the two lines of hills and Lavrikove and Travotokli remained firmly Russian. In this fight, 17 officers and 672 men were taken.

Closing in on Lemberg.
A second attack was delivered in the region of Stanislaw, and directly toward Halicz, the key to Lemberg. In this fighting on the first rolling ground that leads up to the Carpathian range, the Russian troops forced the Germans and Austrians from their trenches on a front of several miles from Jamnica to Paschna, northeast of Stanislaw. Still farther south and almost in the main range of the Carpathians, the Russians took the village of Svinich, north of Nadworna. In these engagements the Russians took 360 prisoners.

The third Russian attack was near Ziochhoff, almost directly east of Galicia. Here the Russians attacked the Teutons' fortifications at Katkovmanuliv, after artillery preparation. In the first rush of the attack

the Muscovite troops stormed three lines of Teuton trenches. The German counter-attacks were exceptionally strong here, however, and finally they succeeded in winning back the lost ground.

Foe Hides Defeat.
The net result of the Russian offensive—or group of offensives—is, however, far different from that claimed by Berlin in another statement of the kind that was issued after the July 1 attack. The whole affair was "an exceedingly sanguinary struggle here, however, and finally they succeeded in winning back the lost ground."

This statement also endeavors to convince the Russians and the Germans that the other allies, especially France, are forcing the soldiers of free Russia to fight, reaching this conclusion by the fact that the Russian army orders were written in French, which has long been the language used for much official and army business in Russia. This statement also is part of the propaganda to weaken Russia's loyalty and to reassure the Germans themselves.

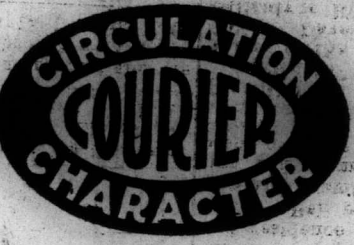

Crisis Facing Entente Less Huge Shortage Is Made Up

Mr. Hanna, who was introduced by Miss Louise Mason, the president of the Women's Press Club, prefaced his remarks by saying that it was his intention to make the press an important factor in his organization. He would give the press from time to time, he said, the story of how desperate are the needs of the allies and of what we are doing to meet them. It is important, he said, that the facts should not be overstated. It is equally important that the people should know the facts as they are before it is too late to act on them. The reasons for the appointment of food controllers in Canada, Belgium and Italy, and why the millions of men in these countries engaged at the front or in munitions, in the home, and in the industrial plant, are so important, he said, that they should be known to the people of the United States. The total requirements of the allies and neutrals in 1917 are 1,105,000,000 bushels of wheat. The production of Europe for this period is estimated at 645,000,000 bushels which necessitates the export by Canada and the United States of 460,000,000 bushels. As these two countries would have under normal conditions, but 300,000,000 bushels, it was the duty of their food controllers to readjust conditions so as to permit of the full quota being sent.

A Great Organization
Organized under way. Mr. Hanna said to reach every household in Canada with the co-operation of the Provincial Governments, and working through the farmers, women's institutes, schools, Red Cross, Daughters of the Empire, National and Local Councils of Women, Y.W.C.A., Y.W.C.A., church societies, municipal bodies, and newspapers. Local units will be organized in every community. Through these local committees, Dr. Hanna said, the greatest shortage of evaporating of perishable products, in order to release the exportable, will be demonstrated.

Another salient feature of Mr. Hanna's address yesterday was the assertion that the burden of food conservation will not be thrown entirely upon the consumer; that those supplying foodstuffs will be affected by this work. Mr. Hanna exemplified this in dealing with some of the complaints that have been and will be directed against his department. One of these is, he said: You ask us to drop meat, but we can't afford to buy fish.

"I do not pretend to speak with full knowledge," said Mr. Hanna, "but I have long had the idea that Toronto and this part of Canada pays altogether too much for fish. We are taking steps at once to see that the fish from the Canadian waters shall get from the net to the consumer's table without doubling and trebling the price paid to the fisherman."

"The price of bread," he went on, "is complained of. There are those who advocate the use of whole wheat flour. They suggest wheat flour and bran. All say that we do not get enough bread out of the wheat and that it costs too much."

"Then there is a complaint from many sections of the spread of the price of fruits between the producer and the consumer. We are advised this condition is a result of our own wheat permits of remedy if we will give some of those who know
