CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Editor—I am sending you a few lines for your paper from Manitoba. Wheat is heading out. Prospects very bright for an early and bountiful harvest.

The crop report issued here is of the most encouraging nature. In all parts of the province the wheat crop is growing splendidly and the weather conditions are all that can be desired.

Plenty of sunshine is now all that is required to assure one of the greatest yields on record. In about four or five weeks time the hum of the binder will be heard throughout the land. It is reported that the prospects of the harvest are so good that about 30,000 men will be required in Manitoba and the North-west this year, the most of which will have to come from the east.

Mr. Kruger's Ally and His Hopes

We trusted in God's help and foreign intervention. So wrote President Steyn of the Orange Free States in the official correspondence with the Transvaal authorities, which the British have captured and published. It is not exactly a pleasing variant of the old exhortation to trust in God and keep your powder dry. The Boers looked after their powder carefully enough, but that such astute men as their leaders should have believed for a moment, unless they were basely deceived by Dr. Leyds, that any great power would forcibly intervene on their behalf, one would have said in advance to be impossible. They knew, or, if they did not, they were the only ones in the world who did not know, that Germany was out of it. The Anglo-German agreement was an open secret. From France, it is true, the Boers may have thought they had something more than polite good wishes. It has been pretty angrily asserted by men professing to be in Kruger's confidence, that the French Foreign Office promised him "moral and material aid." But this has been given a formal denunti by M. Delcasse, and would scarcely, in any case, deserve to be credited. President Steyn's confession is, however, the first one that has been officially and explicitly made that the Boer ultimatum would never have been launched except in the home of foreign intervention. This is the crowning proof of its folly.—N. Y. Post, July 19.

The new White Star liner Celtic is the biggest vessel afloat, the Great Eastern large as she was, being as a pigmy beside her.

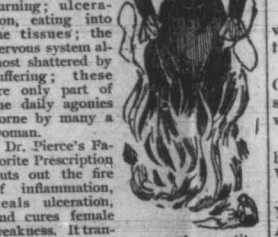

Hamilton, Bermuda, July 24.—The Boer prisoners of war confined on Darrell's Island make almost nightly attempts to avoid the patrolling gun boats Medina and Medway, and gain the mainland by swimming.

The water between Darrell's Island and the beach is calm, and all night long the gunboats sweep it with their searchlights. Sharks abound, and the British guard will shoot on suspicion, yet several of the Boers have escaped from their detention camp.

On the night of July 9 four Boer prisoners evaded the guards and the sharks and reached the shore half a mile away by swimming. By daybreak they had reached the southern shore of the islands. Here they approached a colored man, asking him for food. He charged them with being Boer prisoners, and they admitted it. The colored man at once informed the guards at Warrick Camp, and the escaping prisoners were captured. A night or two after, three others tried to escape by padding ashore on planks. They were seen, however, and were caught.

Banquet

On Saturday evening last, at the Aberdeen Hotel, Mr. Tom E. Dennis, partner in the firm of W. Dennis & Sons, Covent Garden, London Eng., accompanied by Mr. Howard Bligh of Halifax, the acting General Agent for the firm throughout the province, entertained at a dinner carefully prepared by host Cole about one hundred of their former clients, hailing from the several districts of Kings County.

At the termination of the refreshment proceedings, Mr. Bligh in a eulogizing and felicitous speech, proposed the toast of the health of their host Mr. Dennis and that of the other partners of the firm, commenting on their abilities and facilities, both financially and otherwise to bring perhaps more than their share towards the prosperity of the province.

Mr. Dennis in acknowledging the hearty reception of the toast primarily explained that the object of the gathering in his own words was to "meet in a oneness of interest those gentlemen, who, during the day, might be too busy to accede to his impromptu request for some enlightenment on the apple situation."

He forcibly put before the farmers of the assembly the reason why they should entrust their consignments to the care of his House. Explaining at some length the inducements which they held out to shippers so to do, their interest in the province, as manifested by their willingness to take upon themselves the responsibility and expense of warehouse accommodation along the line of railway, for the benefit of growers, their system of sale in London, their unique position of being the publishers of printed sale catalogues and their unequalled facilities for the handling of large quantities of apples. All of which could only have the effect of impressing his hearers in the most favorable manner.

He referred briefly to the New Law which comes in to force this season, and remarked that it could not but have a most wholesome effect on the industry of the province. If carried out it meant, a better looking package, a better packed article, the ensuring of the confidence of the buyer and a general improvement in the reputation of Nova Scotia apples.

He noted by the way that during the past season in spite of the large quantities consigned to his House, he had yet to meet the gentleman armed with complaint of dissatisfaction.

Mr. Peter James in a short humorous speech touched upon the various complexing features of the business and his remarks as to the package of the future and the necessarily improved packing, met with the general approval of the meeting. His pointed questions put to Mr. Dennis on matters which were the subject of some contravers, elicited from that gentleman most satisfactory replies.

Then followed an interesting and clever survey of the advantages held by the Annapolis Valley by Mr. A.S. McDonald of Upper Dyke.

Councillor J. A. Kinsman and Mr. W. J. Burgess of Lakeville, briefly put forward views on the apple situation generally as regarded from the standpoint of farmers and growers. And with the singing of "God Save the King" a most enjoyable and instructive evening came to a midnight close.
