Where They Get Results.
In the unending deluge of news ap-
pearing in the newspapers day after
day a little item will have attracted
the attention of most readers. In six
lines it chronicled the return to civi-
lization of a patrol of the Royal
North West Mounted Police bringing
in a prisoner from the wilds of the
north. Some feat has been entertained
of only two men, had perished, other-
wise his safe return would not have
been given even the meagre notice it
was.

It was charged that a half-breed
had kidnapped a girl. He had van-
ished into the frozen north, some-
where beyond the northern boundary
of Saskatchewan. He would be any-
where between there and the Arctic
Sea, between Hudson Bay and the
Pacific Ocean or in his S. A. Nobody
knew where he was or whether or
not he was guilty. These two men
were called up and told to go and find
him in a desolate territory half as
large as a continent, in the depth of
winter. O her and bigger patrols had
been while trying to carry out similar
tasks, but these two men didn't stop
to think about that. They just went
and didn't come back until they got
their man. It is this sort of thing, done
again and again, without question or
comment, that has put the R. N. W.
M. P. where it is, at the top of the
world's constabulary forces. It has
done more than this, it has instilled a
respect for law and order on the West-
ern prairie which would give some
thing to see in the great cities of the
East. It is a common saying in the
West that if you wish to commit a
crime the place to do it is in the city,
not where the mounted police will get
you, as get you they will. It is the
inevitableness of capture that goes
farther than anything else to keep
crime at a minimum under the just
dictation of the mounted police. It has
paid heavily for it in suffering
in lives, but the result has been
worth far more than the price paid.—
R.

ix-President Tatt delivered an ad-
dress on popular government before
the Literary and Scientific Society
at Toronto recently.
Canada, he said, with its eight mil-
lions of people, had the advantage of
profiting by the mistakes of the
United States with a population of
sixty million. In the past Canada
had exhibited discretion in studying
the defects that the United States
system had developed and in seeking
to avoid them. Popular government
should not be made a fetish. It was
a means to an end, and if any form of
popular government did not serve
society best, its adoption or contin-
uance was not justified. It was im-
portant that the majority in its rule
should be limited and controlled.
Magna Charta secured for the citizen
a practical procedure by which he
was most likely to secure justice.
The principles contained in it were
practically founded for the vindica-
tion of the individual. That was why
Anglo-Saxon liberty had proved to be
the light of freedom in the world.

Editorial Notes.

The first woman judge to be appointed in Canada is Mrs. R. R. Johnson, President of the Local Council of Women of Calgary, who has been appointed by the attorney-general to be commissioner of the juvenile court in Calgary.

The estimates for the year ending March 31, 1915, were brought down in the Canadian Parliament on Jan. 29th. They total \$190,735,176.42.

Among estimates for public works in Nova Scotia appear, under the head of Harbors and Rivers, Annapolis Harbor, ice piers, \$16,000; Canoeing, approach to wharves, \$2,000; Goat Island—wharf, \$1,000; Hantsport, repairs to wharf, \$22,000; Horton Landing, \$1,000; Mochelle, wharf, \$9,000; Picket Pier, \$1,000; Port Wade, \$4,000; Windsor, Harbor improvements, \$25,000; Wolfville, \$5,000; Young's Cove, breakwater, \$4,000.

Grants for Public Buildings include Bridgetown, Post Office, \$4,000; Canoeing, Public Building, \$2,000; Hantsport, \$4,000; Middleton \$15,000.

Making the Weather.

Sir Oliver Lodge's proposal to control the weather looks good at the first glance. It would be splendid to be able to get fine weather whenever we wanted it by shooting positive electricity into the clouds, or rain by a discharge of negative electricity, still, the scheme has its drawbacks. Supposing somebody at Ottawa were put into a position to create Canada's weather day by day, what chance would there be of his giving satisfaction? A timely shower of rain to suit an Ontario farmer might spoil a Nova Scotia farmer's hay, and ruin the chances of the Government at the next election in a whole constituency. And supposing the weather man were to keep the weather well above zero in all Canada during January and February he might please a lot of people, but he would earn the undying hatred of the coal men. Somebody or other would always have his plans and profits upset, no matter what weather the Federal Government decreed. If the Federal Government did not keep the matter under its control, imagine the confusion which would result from the exercise of private weather-making! Perhaps, after all, it is a good thing that while Sir Oliver Lodge tells us the art of weather-making could be mastered, his main energies have been diverted from the problem into the realms of psychology and spiritualism.

Town Council.

The first meeting of the new Council was held on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor and all the members present.

The regular oath of office was administered to Mayor Chambers and Councillors, Haycock, Regan and Harris. Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Finance Committee reported receipts during the month of January, \$2032.86 with expenditures \$5310.25. The debit bank balance at the end of January was \$6978.68.

Verbal reports were also presented by the Streets and Poor Committees.

The report of the auditors for the past year was read.

Mr. A. V. Rand asked permission to install a gasoline outfit on Main street opposite his property. This was granted, the work to be done under the direction of the Streets Committee.

It was resolved that the accounts of the Town Clerk for the year 1913, having been reported as accurate and in good order by the auditors, be accepted and passed by the Council.

An application for re-appointment to the position of medical health officer for the town was read from Dr. G. E. DeWitt.

The standing committees for the coming year were all re-elected and Dr. G. E. DeWitt was re-appointed Health Officer. The appointment of superintendent of streets, water and sewers, inspector of plumbing, etc., was laid over until next meeting.

The other town officials were appointed practically as last year, except that C. M. Vaughn was appointed Port Warden in place of Capt. J. E. Righton, deceased.

T. R. Wallace and Aubry Dykens were appointed extra constables.

Died in Idaho.

A telegram received the first of the year from Hally, Idaho, stated the death of George Edmond Pick, who died Jan. 1st, aged 59 years. He was a native of Nova Scotia, being the eldest son of the late Thomas and Letitia Pick, of White Rock. He has not been home for over forty years, having spent the years among the mines of Idaho. Later news by letter states that he died very suddenly from congestion of the lungs. He was married and leaves three brothers and two sisters, Mrs. Henry Alken, Hally and Stanley in Mass., Jacob in White Rock, and Mrs. George I. Fraser, in Greenwich.

The Government.

The London Advertiser, which is the leading organ of the Liberal party in southwestern Ontario, recently made the assertion that 'if you were to ask the man on the street to name a single act of constructive legislation originally devised and carried through in twenty months of Borden rule, he would have difficulty to name it.'

'The man of the street' might not be prepared to give an answer offhand—so numerous have been the acts of constructive legislation originally devised and carried through by the Borden Government during its twenty-eight months in office, but if possessed of ordinary intelligence, he could, after due consideration, point to the following administrative acts of our present rulers as coming within the prescribed category:

1.—The furnishing of adequate facilities for the transportation to tide water of the crops of the Western Provinces.

2.—The beginning of the construction of a new Welland Canal, and the provision of long-needed harbor facilities at Halifax, Toronto and many other points.

3.—The provision of much-needed rural mail facilities; also parcel post.

4.—Liberal grants in aid of agriculture.

5.—Necessary additions to the military establishment of the country.

6.—The settlement of the Ontario-Manitoba boundary question, with which the Laurier Government had trifled for years.

7.—The construction of the Hudson Bay Railway.

8.—The completion of the Canadian Northern Railway by means of necessary financial assistance.

9.—The carrying on to completion of the National Transcontinental Railway from Moncton to Winnipeg.

10.—The transformation of the Intercolonial Railway, by means of a Commission, from a burden on the country into a revenue producer.

11.—The reduction of the public debt by eighteen million dollars.

12.—The appointment of a Commission to investigate the high cost of living with the view of providing a remedy for the present oppressive conditions which are a direct outgrowth of the conditions existing under the Laurier regime, to which the present Government fell heir.

Such are some of the 'constructive' acts of the present Government, and these would have been materially added to had not the partisan Senate blocked the measures for good roads and for the appointment of a permanent commission to advise on tariff matters.

Truly, the Borden Government is a Government that 'does things.'

Should Be Stopped.

We had begun to hope that the day when Canada was regarded by British magistrates as a modern Botany Bay to which might be indiscriminately shipped the overflow from British prisons had passed. Evidently we were too optimistic, if we are to judge by a report in the London Times. It appears that a few days ago, a Liverpool magistrate found himself called on to pass judgment on an international crook who had undergone punishment in Ghent, Paris, New Orleans and Brighton. Arrested on a charge of robbery in Liverpool he faced the prospect of a long term, one which, apparently, would have been thoroughly justified in view of his long and versatile career. However, the Liverpool judge saw a way out. To send him to prison for ten years meant a considerable charge upon the country. The obvious solution was to unload him upon Canada. Accordingly, upon the prisoner's promising that he would come to this country as soon as possible, the judge gave him the minimum penalty, twelve months in jail.

It is very hard for Canadians to keep their patience in the face of such cases as these. Canada has protested time and again against the dumping into this country of the outcasts and the unfit of Europe and the British Isles. Our protests, official and unofficial, do not seem to be having the desired effect, in some quarters at least.

Strathcona's Gift to Boy Scouts.

One of Lord Strathcona's very recent benefactions, showing the deep interest he took in Canadian boyhood, was a promise to contribute \$5,000 a year for three years to a fund being raised to permit of the appointment of a Dominion secretary to travel through Canada and organize the boy scouts. His Lordship's offer was conditional on the raising of an equal amount from other sources. A passage from Lord Strathcona's letter on the subject reads:—

On the initiation of the boy scouts movement some years back, by General Robert Baden Powell (now Sir Robert Baden Powell), he consulted me on the subject, and as I found it impossible to procure the necessary means for proceeding with the project, owing to the fact that at that time very few had any belief that it would be a useful association, I was very happy to give him the substantial aid which enabled him to proceed with the work. I mention this to show that I have always had faith that under proper organization and management the movement could not fail to be of the utmost value both to the boys themselves, to the mother country, and to the empire. The present position of the Boy Scouts association in the United Kingdom, in Canada, and in the other dominions, shows how wisely General Baden Powell judged of the outcome of the project.

The young artist, a pupil of Leo Aner, shows in quality of her tone, her masterful phrasing and the naturalness of her interpretation, the individuality of her conception. These qualities with which the young artist is so generously endowed by nature, have been heightened by careful training.

Miss Starr began her program with the classical Italian Music of the 17th century, the great Corelli, and his predecessor, Vivaldi.

It was a special pleasure to note that with what clearness and understanding she rendered these works. Giuseppe's Concerto, in A, minor, afforded ample opportunity for showing the beauty of her singing tone and highly developed and easy technique. Mozart-Aur's 'Gavotte,' she played with much grace and animation.
