WALKING AND DRIVING.

THE LOCOMOTIVE RAN OFF THE TRACK.—The result of last year's business was about as satisfactory as that of 1856. The maintenance of the roads is to be entirely owing to the steady enlargements of the trade of the country and the enormous losses in shipping. The number of vessels lost in 1856 or near the coast of the United Kingdom amounted to 1,141, making an aggregate of 176,000 tons. The official returns of 1856 have not yet been completed; there is, however, too much reason to believe that the destruction will be nearly as great as that of 1855. Prizes have been recently maintained in spite of a full supply; the tendency has however been downward.
