### DEATH OF DR. GREGORY.

In Fredericton on Tuesday last, shortly after eleven o'clock Dr Gregory, accompanied by his servant, a young lad named Minnyweather, drove down to the middle ferry landing, and waited for the arrival of the "Sarah H." to get a passage to the other side. As the ferry was approaching, he spoke to the lad, telling him that he might leave the carriage for a moment, as he himself wished to teach the horse, a three year old bay stallion, to go peacefully on to the ferry. The Dr. had been accustomed to have this young lad lead the animal aboard, as it always fared up and threatened damage when an attempt was made to drive it aboard. Young Minnyweather got out, and the Dr undertook to guide the horse down, turning him uphill again to make him obedient to the rein.

As he was driving down the second time, the stallion stopped suddenly and stubbornly, and the Dr. gave him a cut with the whip. Just as he did so, the colt sprang into the air, lifted carriage and all with him so that the latter made a revolution, turning the colt with it, and the Dr. was thrown about six feet into the air, striking on his head and shoulders. His head is said to have struck a small rock, but some think that, from the nature of the injuries sustained, this is not the case, as the wound is such that it seems to have resulted from striking with the full weight of his body on the ground. The stock made the Dr. unconscious, in which state he remained all day, and the following night, and till the next day when he died. Crowds of people were gathered about the doctors residence during his illness, and from the anxious and sorrowful faces of all, it was seen what a favorite he was. The deep sympathy of the community is extended to his wife and children in their sad affliction. The profession in New Brunswick has lost one of its greatest ornaments, and Fredericton has lost one of her most worthy and best respected citizens.

### COMPLAINTS OF PROTESTANT FARMERS.

#### Why the Land League Spreads

#### The Priests maintaining Order.

(From Cor. Montreal "Witness.")

The persons in Fermanagh who complained to me of the landlords were Protestant farmers of the well-to-do class; and in every case they were persons who made profession of religion, and were Orangemen. Everywhere the complaint is the same, "rents raised on consideration of improvements in the land, or on the land, made by the life-labor and means of the tenants, without one penny of assistance from the landlords, and consented to by the tenants from time to time because they had no remedy for it; application for legal relief; only spending money to bring speedier relief; Parliament dead to the voices of the sufferers, yet wide awake when coercion was proposed in any form, and willing to bolster up wrong with unlimited bayonets." These are the reasons given to me

In Enniskillen and Fermanagh at large. On the small farms, in arrears because of the successive bad harvests, one good harvest only has come to them since famine, a majority of the landlords have come down on the people and turned the screw, saying, "You had a good harvest, now pay up or go out." The Land League comes along also and says "You are behind because of bad seasons and because rack-rents left you no means to meet them. Keep your harvests for food for yourselves and your little ones. Pay no rent at all until the rent is lowered so that you can live and pay it." As fairly as I know how to put it this is the state of affairs. The landlords think and say, "Well, if you take this stand we will show you who is master yet." So evictions are out by the thousand, and really the country parts are in an awful state. There are many things contributing to aggravate the state of affairs. For instance, the good times of inflation largely increased the number of small gentry; added to the landlord class a good many squires, who, having scratched their way up and edged their way into the borderland of aristocracy, do not know how to show the people are to be pitied; agitation throws them into straws of hope to clutch at; the fears of eviction, the reality of eviction, the terrors of term day, the grinding taxes, keep them in a state of desperation that makes anything possible. This is

THE EXPLANATION OF OUTRAGES, and there would be more but for the Catholic priesthood. In speaking to some in Fermanagh who complained to me, I told them they had little to complain of by what the Donegal people of the hills had to vex them. They thought they had enough. One man of the well-to-do class, who had always paid his rent, who for his in his abilities as a farmer, asked for three months' grace in paying his rent at one term, because meeting it at the very day involved serious loss. He was refused in a most insulting manner. He joined the Land League because of this; he is under notice to quit for joining the Land League, and is now preparing to emigrate. This man will not leave his bitter feelings behind him when he does emigrate. The day I came to Manor Hamilton was after Mr. Dillon's arrest, which intensified feelings very much. There is one thing which people do not on the ground and near the people do not understand. Matters here have really gone so far between landlord and tenant that I think an outbreak of greater violence than has ever occurred in this land was imminent but for the constitutional resistance advised by the Land League. The day I came here was the day of a sale of cattle for rent, and a collision between the law and the people was apprehended. I felt reluctant to leave Fermanagh without seeing the poorer districts, I saw so many very poor people attending market with asses, bartered with straw harness, carrying wicker creels loaded with what they had to sell. I saw the first mudwalled cottage I ever saw. The land appeared worse, more barren in places, led to grass more extensively, and the grass often had the green brown tint to be seen in Canada, instead of the rich emerald that the good grass lands wear in Ireland. Manor Hamilton boasts of a ruined castle of great extent cloaked with ivy, built by one of the early Hamiltons, who got a grant of the confiscated lands and built this castle to defend
