



Outfits for inflat-ing with sterilized air can be purchased from dealers in veterinary in struments for from \$2 to \$3, and ordinary bicycle pump with a teat syphon attached may be used, but complications from the introduction. of septic material are more liable than when gas or sterilized air is

The udder and teats must be thoroughly washed with an antiseptic such as a 5 per cent, solution of one of the coal tar antiseptics, the hands of the operator and the instruments also sterilized. All milk is drawn off, less with inflation. The syphon is introduced into a teat, and all the gas or air that the quarter will hold s forced in, and the teat then tied tightly with tape to prevent escape of it. Each quarter is inflated and the teat tied. The udder is then well massaged every hour until the cow rises to her feet, which is usually in from one half to two hours. The tapes should be removed in at most two hours. If not on her feet in at most six hours the udder should be re-inflated. She should be given some easily digested food, or a reasonable amount of her usual food, and all the water she will take. If the weather be cold, the chill should be emoved from the water and the ow kept as comfortable as possible. he should not be milked at all for 24 hours after inflation, and for the econd twenty-four hours she should be milked frequently, but very little after inflation she should be milked and attended to in the ordinary man-ner.—Dr. J. 

CHOOSING LUBRICANTS

Practical Advice Regarding Use of Machine Oils.

Adhesion and Cohesion-Mineral, Vegetable and Fish Oils All In Use-Planting Potatoes for Seed. (Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

Oils for lubricating purposes cohesion and adhesion. Their cohesive properties lie in the character of their molecules to cling to each other, and their adhesive quality to stick to anything else. The union of these two properties make up what is known as viscosity, that is the body of the lubricant. This in a greater degree than any other factor determines the lubricating value of the oils. While viscosity of an oil determines its value as a lubricant, fluidity indicates its a aptability to any one particular machine. It is because of the struggle between viscosity and fluidity that the same oil will not do for the heavy engine shaft, and for light weight machinery. resisting body is needed for the line shaft of an ocean liner, but a drop of the same oil would put a watch out Practically all the lubricants now in use are of the mineral oil foundation treated to free them from acid, and to improve their suitability for

special purposes. Sperm oil is spe-cially good for high speed light machinery: for heavy bearings castor oil, but both are expensive. For great pressure at slow speed lard, tallow, and other solid lubricants are suitable. If pressure is great, and speed high, castor, sperm, and heavy min-eral oils are used. For low pressure at high speed, olive, sperm, rape and refined petroleum give satisfaction.

Vegetable and fish oils are drying

oils, that is, they exidize rapidly, causing gumming or clogging of the bearings to which they are applied.

A mineral oil does not oxidize, neither does an animal oil. But mineral oils have a low flash point: that is, they fire at a low temperature. Animal oils develop fatty acids; these corrode and pit the metal they are used to lubricate.

Adulterants of various kinds are added to oils and greases to give them "body." Gum, soap, lime, resin, tar, soda and free acids all have their own distinct purpose to serve. Simple tests may be applied to lubricants for quality and viscosity. To test for acid saturate a bit of cotton waste with the suspected oil, and lay it open upon the surface of polished steel or brass for twenty-four hours. If steel shows even a slight corrosion or, if the brass turns green, free acid is present. To test for gummy adulterants place a drop of oil upon a piece of glass inclined at such an angle as to rmit it to flow gently down. If any gum, resins or other viscosity producing elements are present, they will be apparent by the color of the oil streak, as the adulterants deposit themselves upon the

glass in the form of sediment. A good quality of lubricant will not break down, when rubbed between the finger tips, as quickly, as It would be economy in three ways

at least to use two different kinds of oil; ecenomy of power, of machine wear, and of oil, and in addition there would be greater efficiency.-Jno. Evans, O. A. College, Guelph.

Planting Potatoes for Seed. This refers entirely to the producion of seed potatoes; not those intended for human consumption. The growing of seed potatoes is better divided into two sections, the early and the late. For growing early po-tatoes of the Irish Cobbler variety the seed should be selected true to type and free as possible from any of the various diseases which affect the potato plant or tuber. These should be from 8 to 12 ounces in weight and cut up into pieces 2 ounces in weight with two eyes to the piece. They are planted about the 10th of June and are given every possible cultivation with the soil in a state of high fertility; better having been clover sod well fertilized with barnyard manure to which has been added a considerable quantity of commercial fertilizer, about 800 lbs. per acre. Thorough spraying to control leaf diseases and the Colorado Beetle should be given throughout the season. For the late seed the Green Mountain or Rural New Yorker is used. The planting is generally done about June 1st to June 5th under similar conditions to the for-mer. In all cases it is necessary to select a soil that does not dry out during the summer time, as potatoes for seed should not be subjected to a check at any time during their growing period.





ALL persons residing ra Canada, employed in Canada; or caurying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:-

- 1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
- 2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or
- 3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A. CORPORATIONS and joint

Also any person making a false statement in any return or in information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprison
