oluters About Patents-How the Inventors Fare Who 'Run Their Own Show.'

From our Special Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5th. 1887.

There are ten books in the secret archives of the United States Patent Office for which patent attorneys in Washington would be willing to give \$100,000. They are the books containing the names and addresses of inventors whose cases have been rejected during the past ten every year for the last ten years and a it with his head." yearly average of 18,000 patents granted. Last year there were 35,000 applications filed and 24,000 patents issued, the largest number in any one year. On this showing something like 60 per cent. of the applications have been patented. So there have ben during the last ten years about 100,000 rejected cases. These in part include cases defeated in interferences and applications allowed, but on which final fees have not been

paid.
Now good attorneys get fully 90 per cent of their cases allowed and patented; hence there must be some reason for only 60 per cent of the applications being a lowed. The reason is this: fully 8.000 inventors every year make out try to get them through the Patent Office. Not know ing the routine they almost invariably get involved in the meshes of red tape and the intricacies of Patent Office proceedure. The difficulty may be slight, a mere informality, a defective drawing an improperly worded application, an indefinite specification, or a slight inter-ference requiring a few amendments, which a skilful patent attorney could obstacle; his appliction is rejected, and

he gives up in disgust or despair.

Applications for patents in the United States Patent Office go first to the twenty eight principal examiners, according to the subject matter. If they are rejected, two years are allowed in cessary action. If no action shall have been taken at the end of two years, such cases are treated as abandoned, and are sent to the division where they are entered in the books which the Patent Attorneys so much coyet. Fully 50,000 of the rejected cases of the last ten years put in the hands of a competent attor-ney, could be patented. A patent attorney's fees on such conditional cases would be about \$25 per case-a gross inventors and those not ables to pay, still an enormous number would get out patents if they knew how. JAPAN-THE E KINGDOM. To the United Stres it was given to unlock the doors of this island empire.



Ginger Bread. - One cup of molasses, one cup of boiling water, one tablespoon-ful of lard, one teaspoonful of baking powder, one teaspoonful of ginger, two cups of flour.

Cooking Without Eggs or Milk.—Two teacups of light brown sugar rolled fine with rolling pin, one teacup of lard, one of water, one teaspoonful of soda dis. solved in water, mix and roll thin, cut out and bake quick; as much in baking as making.

Potato Croquettes .- Pare, boil, and mash smoothly about six good-sized po-tatoes. Add one tablespoon of butter, two-thirds of a cupful of hot rich milk or cream, and whites of two eggs well beaten, salt and pepper to taste. When cool enough to handle work into shape, roll in egg and bread crumbs, and fry in nice, wholesome hot lard.

"Conching" is a very effective form of needlework, and the title may be applied to all forms of embroidery in which threads of crewel, silk or gold are laid on the surface to be ornamented and stitched on it by threads coming from the back of the material. Conching outlines nowadays are unusually thick strands of double crewel, filosselle, silk cords, or gold thread, used to finish the edges of applique, or in gold outline work. These strands, cords or threads are caught down at regular intervals either by silks or tine gold thread.

Red Rice.-Take one and one half pints of red currants and one-half pint of red raspberries. Put them into an earthen dish and set inside a kettle of boiling water until the fruit is broken and the juice runs freely. Strain off the juice, which may then be diluted with one part water to two of juice if desired. Put a large cup of vinegar in the saucepan with butter size of an egg, when melted, stir slowly into it the egg yolks, and when all is in pour over the slice potatoes.


