Household Hints. Rice Griddle Cake—One quart of sweet milk, three eggs, two cups of sifted flour, one tablespoonful of melted butter, as much soft-boiled rice as you like.

Virginia Corn Pie—Take one heaping coffee-cupful of boiled hominy, heat it, and stir in a tablespoonful of butter, three eggs, and nearly one pint of sweet milk. Add as much cornmeal as will serve to thicken it till it is like the batter of Johnny-cake.

Ginger Bread.—One cup of molasses, one cup of boiling water, one tablespoonful of lard, one tablespoonful of baking powder, one teaspoonful of ginger, two cups of flour.

Potato Croquettes.—Pare, boil, and mash smoothly about six good-sized potatoes. Add one tablespoon of butter, two-thirds of a cupful of hot rich milk or cream, and whites of two eggs well beaten, salt and pepper to taste.

RETALIATION.

Text of the Great Abolition Catechism, as it is read.

To authorize the President of the United States to protect and defend the rights of American fishing vessels, American fishermen, American trading and other vessels, in certain cases, and for other purposes.
That whenever the President of the United States shall be satisfied that American fishing vessels or American fishermen, visiting or being in the waters or at any ports or places of the British dominions of North America, are, or then lately have been denied or abridged in the enjoyment of any rights secured to them by treaty or law, or then lately have been unjustly vexed or harassed in the enjoyment of such rights, or subjected to unreasonable restrictions, regulations or requirements in respect to such rights or otherwise unjustly vexed or harassed in said waters, ports or places; or whenever the President of the United States shall be satisfied that any such fishing vessels or fishermen having a permit under the laws of the United States to touch and trade at any port or place, or places in the British dominions of North America, are, or then lately have been denied the privilege of entering such port or ports, place or places, in the same manner or under the same regulations as may exist therein applicable to trading vessels of the most favored nation, or shall be unjustly vexed or harassed in respect thereof, or otherwise unjustly vexed or harassed in said waters, ports or places or shall be prevented from purchasing such supplies as may there be lawfully sold to trading vessels of the most favored nation; or whenever the President of the United States shall be satisfied that any other vessels of the United States, their masters or crews, so arriving at or being in such British waters or ports or places of the British dominions of North America, are, or then lately have been denied any of the privileges therein accorded to the vessels, their masters or crews, of the most favored nation, or unjustly vexed or harassed in respect of the same, or otherwise unjustly vexed or harassed in said waters, ports or places; then, and in either or all of such cases, it shall be lawful and it shall be the duty of the President of the United States, in his discretion, by proclamation to that effect, to deny vessels, their masters and crews of the British dominions of North America, any entrance into the waters, ports or places of the United States, with such exception in regard to vessels in distress, or stress of weather, or needing supplies as to the President shall seem proper, whether such vessels shall have come directly from said Dominion on such destined voyage, or by way of some port or place in such destined voyage elsewhere; and to deny entry into any port or place of the United States of fresh fish or salt fish or any other product of said Dominion, or other goods coming from said Dominion to the United States.

The president may, in his discretion, apply such proclamation to any part or to all of the foregoing named subjects, and may revoke, qualify, limit and renew such proclamation from time to time as he may deem necessary to the full and just execution of the purposes of this act. Every violation of any such proclamation of the president, if it shall be proved, shall be deemed to be an offense against the laws of the United States, and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$1,000, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years, or by both such punishments, in the discretion of the court.

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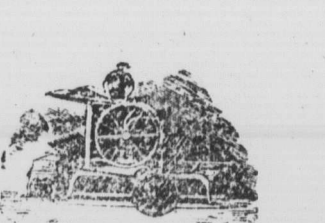
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
