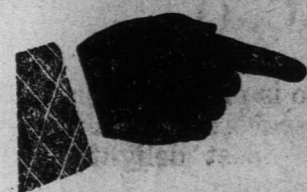

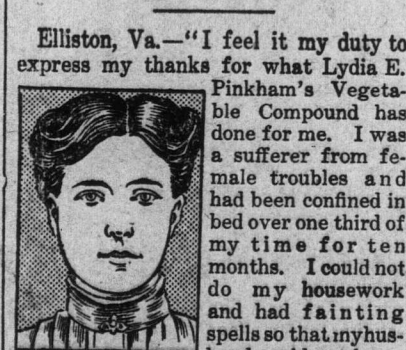
eyes, he carried the paper to the window and read it.

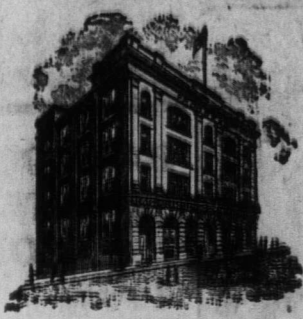

## Household Notes.

Save hair ribbons; wash and iron them and they will be found good for occasional stains for collars and cuffs. Coffee stains may be removed from table linen by rubbing with pure glycerine, then washing in lukewarm water. In papering bedrooms it is a good, safe general rule to choose light papers with scarcely any design at all upon them. Curtains will hang straight if a small lead weight is fastened in each lower corner. For silk curtains use a weighted braid. Nothing makes the summer living room look cooler than the linen couch and table covers and airy wicker furniture. Use sweet milk and ammonia—a teaspoonful of the latter to a quart of the former—for cleansing white enamel woodwork. The general rule about keeping things when moving is not to give away anything whatever that can be used in the new home. It saves a great deal of time on

ironing day if children's dresses are made to open all the way up. Then they can be laid out straight on the ironing board. Save the paraffine from jelly glasses, etc. Pour hot water over it and let stand till cool. The clean paraffine will come to the top and can be removed. Potatoes boiled in their skins are very nearly as good as baked potatoes, but pains must be taken to have them taken off the fire at precisely the right moment. A good water pan for poultry is a cask tin with a "Turk's head" in the centre. Drive a stick through the cone into the ground to keep it from being overturned. Any woman whose work requires much sitting should have an apron that goes around the back, as well as the front. Black eaten or alpaca are good materials. A perch table with a drawer in it is a great convenience in summer weather; one can drop one's work into it when one leaves the veranda, and it will be safe from rain. Good table napkins for summer use are made of cotton crepe. They need no ironing.

Small seeds sown out of doors will germinate sooner if covered with a coarse gunny sack.

If there is a bare spot on your lawn where the grass will not grow, sow flaxseed on it.

Homemade stencils may be made with very heavy wallpapers, waxed with melted paraffine.

Furish chair covers can be knitted of heavy crochet covers and will be both durable and washable.

Nothing as a lining for bureau drawers is quite as good as pure white paper, frequently changed.

Boil new earthenware dishes before using them, and they will lose a good deal of their brittleness.

Broken molds of lemon or coffee jelly can be remade by warming the jelly and turning it into wet molds.

Pictures for the guest room should be those of general interest, not family portraits, on any account.

## Why is it Wrong to Say "Knots Per Hour."

Nine such persons out of every ten will say that such-and-such a steamer is capable of steaming at "twenty-five knots per hour." A nautical man would simply say "twenty-five knots." Now, which is correct? The latter, of course. The mistake arises from the fact that the landsman thinks that a "knot" is just the nautical term for a "sea-mile," which is roughly, 6,080 feet, or about one and one-eighth land or statute miles. Now, a knot is not a distance at all. It is a speed. The word "speed" combines distance and time. For instance, if we wish to speak of the speed of a train we refer to it as so many miles per hour. There is no single word in the language to express speed units, so we must use two words—miles and hour. The sailor has a language peculiar to himself, and he has invented a single word for a unit of speed. Thus a speed of one nautical mile per hour is called, one "knot." Hence it is redundant to tack on another "per hour" after the word knot when the word already includes one "per hour."

Perhaps some will ask how the word "knot" originated. The explanation is simple. When a seaman wishes to ascertain the speed of his ship he does so by means of a log-line. This consists of a piece of wood called the "log" or the "logship," to which is attached a length of line. The line is knotted at regular intervals; the distance between two consecutive knots bearing the same proportion to a sea-mile that the time of a sand-glass used in connection with the operation bears to an hour. Thus, for instance, if after the log is thrown overboard the line paying freely out lets out fifteen of its knots in the time that the sand-glass takes to run down, then the ship is making fifteen knots.

A new departure in the prosecution of the lobster fishery has been made by Mr. Vincent Singleton, an enterprising packer of St. Joseph's, Salmonier. During the past winter, his brother, Mr. Joseph Singleton, built for him a large boat, which has been fitted with a 5 H.P. Fairbanks gasoline engine by Mr. Geo. M. Barr. Mr. Singleton had a spin in her on the harbor, while here, and is very enthusiastic about his new venture, which he hopes will enable him to reap a richer harvest of the valuable crustacean, besides the cod and other fisheries of our fertile bay. The boat was shipped to him by the s.s. Portia last week. She is the first to be used in St. Joseph's, and if a paying proposition, will be followed shortly by others. No one doubts that the motor is the boat of the future for inshore fishing, but few are willing to incur the expense of procuring them. No doubt Mr. Singleton will find the motor of material assistance to him; and with pluck and perseverance success will crown his efforts. The outcome of his new venture will be watched with interest by his fellow-packers; and gradually the old will give place to the new, and the "chug chug" of the motor will give place to the brown sail of the dory around our coast. We wish Mr. Singleton all the success his enterprise deserves (which is going some), and trust he and the rest of our boys will have a "good summer."—Com.

**Kyle Made 13 3-4 Knots**

The new S. S. Kyle built at New-castle-on-Tyne for the Reid Newfoundland Co.'s Labrador service made her trial trip yesterday forenoon, running over a 6 hour course. The ship made 13 3/4 knots which is most satisfactory, as the contract called only for 13 knots. The ship is a beauty and is a duplicate of the Lintrose with the exception that she is 35 feet shorter in length and a couple of feet less beam. Her accommodations are first class, and she is fitted with a finely equipped hospital, etc. The ship, it is thought, will leave for here Thursday with Capt. Stephens, chief officer of the Lintrose, in charge.

**Cable News.**

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON. Soon. A militant suffragette was caught this morning after placing a bomb at the entrance of the Grand Hotel, in which court of tourists were present. She gave her name as Ada Ward.

LONDON, To-Day. An end was put to-day as to the possibility of a divorce on the ground of force and other suits in the United Kingdom by a judgment delivered by the House of Lords, sitting as the highest Court of Appeals. The Divorce Courts had adjudged Mrs. Scott guilty of contempt of court for circulating among her friends a report of a case heard in camera, in which she had been accused of infidelity, but had been vindicated. The Lord Chancellor's opinion, in which the other Law Lords concurred to-day, reversed the judgment for contempt of court, which the Court of Appeals had sustained. The Lord Chancellor declared that "Every court of justice in the land is open to the subjects of the King, and the court has no power to sit otherwise than with open doors."

OTTAWA, To-Day. A bill to provide for more advantageous conditions for telegraphic communications between Canada and the United Kingdom, and other parts of the British Empire, introduced in the House yesterday by the Hon. L. P. Pelletier, occasioned some debate. It was intended to ratify a contract to fill the gap in the present All Red Cable Service. At the same time it creates an ocean telegraph line from the United Kingdom to Vancouver by contract with the Postmaster General, the Minister of Marine, the Minister of Railways to make regulations governing the system. At present the governments of Britain, Canada, Australia and New Zealand control the trans-Pacific cable and the Board of Management of that line has leased a telegraph line from Vancouver to Montreal from the Canadian Pacific Railway's Telegraph Company, by contract with the Postmaster General. He explained to the House a wireless service will be secured to complete the communication between the Antipodes and Britain.

### Archimedes.

BY H. L. RAY.



Archimedes was a celebrated Grecian mathematician who became famous as the only person born considerably B.C. who could run up a column of figures without having to verify them on an adding machine. There were a great many people in Archimedes' time who could count up to ten after making a few false starts, but Archimedes was the only one who could walk up to the multiplication table and throw one leg across it in a familiar manner. Archimedes was a gloomy person who had been scalded in early life by the patent dandruff remover, an occurrence which embittered his whole career and forced him to have his photograph taken with his hat on. Mr. Plutarch, who knew Archimedes well, says he was so bald that the Grecian housewife couldn't get any satisfactory foothold on him without strapping on a pair of climbing irons. On this account, Archimedes never wore a skull cap and exposed himself with the utmost fearlessness.

The most celebrated thing that Archimedes ever did was to cry "Eureka" several times in succession after taking a bath and finding that the water would run out of the tub if he sat down in it with sufficient ardor. This was something that nobody had ever thought of before, and is directly responsible for the invention of the toilet-bathroom floor and the plumbers' friend, "History relates that it was 1806 years before science discovered an easier way to let water out of a tub.

During the siege of Syracuse by the Romans, Archimedes invented a number of deadly weapons, including the catapult, the pea-shooter and the air gun, with which he repelled the invaders until the Grecian army ran out of coffee and tobacco, upon which it starved and died. Several of these weapons are still in use, in the form of the spit ball and the debates in the Congressional Record.

While Syracuse was surrendering, Archimedes was trying to decide whether 9 times 9 is 81 or 63, when he was interrupted by being stabbed with entire success by a coarse Roman private who had no interest in mathematics. It is probable that if Archimedes had lived fifteen minutes longer he would have solved this problem, and thus prevented thousands of people from adding up the grocery bill on their fingers.

LONDON, April 29.—In reviewing the Guards yesterday King George paid them a high tribute. He said: "I do indeed feel proud to be Colonel-in-Chief of such a splendid body of men."

Accompanying the King were Queen Mary, Prince John, Princess Mary, the Duke of Connaught, Prince Arthur of Connaught, General Lord William Seymour, Lord Methuen and Earl Roberts.

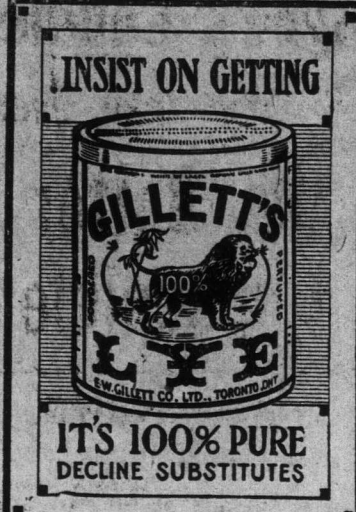
There was a touching incident, during the review, when the Princess Royal went to the help of a Chelsea pensioner, bent and infirm with age and service.

### The Placentic Bridge.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—Since the opening of the Legislature, I have been scanning all the newspapers in the hope of seeing a determined effort made to get the long-suffered-for bridge on Placentic Gut. It seems to me that the people here do not show their union and strength at the proper time, or in other words, when all should be united, very many stand back with a view to their own personal interests. We deem the bridge a dire necessity. One should live in Placentic some winter to see the risks that we take and only when some lives will be snuffed out, the necessity of the bridge will become apparent. During the summer months we have a motor ferry, but as regards our freight we are not one jot better off to-day than twenty years ago. The cost to get our packages from the station to our homes on the town side is about double of the cost from St. John's to the station.

A rumor is current that the station is to be changed from its present site down to the water-side. This improvement has been asked for many years, and should have been done before any branch railways were started. It is even now in the hands of the R. N. Co. to make this change, which would save money for every individual of this town. We should, each and every one of us, take a determined stand, on the bridge question, for our personal welfare, unite one a "ball" demand, this concession from the present Government. We were promised this bridge a few years ago by members of the present Government, on the public streets of the town.

Let us take no more promises and have the matter accomplished fact. We are spending enough of money on the present motor ferry to meet the interest on the loan required to build the bridge. Other bays are urging great improvements, and succeed in getting them. Bonavista Bay, in addition to the new railway is now to receive thousands of dollars for a breakwater and thousands more for above the ordinary grants are to be spent there on roads. What have we got out of the present party? They tell us they gave us a fog signal that only benefits a few of us, and is more of a benefit to those in the bay, than to us.

We have the ferry and that is practically all we have received from the Morris Government.

Surely they, at this stage, when electric power is even in some lands, would not expect us to cross the Gut in the black punt, and I suppose they do not expect to be thanked for having contented us with this favor.

We ask the present Morris party then to give us a brakwater in Placentic. It is as if not more, necessary than one in Bonavista Bay. Give us our bridges, give us our freight ferry. See that our water pipes are sunk low enough so as not to have them torn away by the ice. All these improvements we shall and must obtain, if we keep together united, for there is union in strength, and whenever a Government finds strength, it will grant requests if not from love at least from fear.

### School Drawing Exhibition At Harbor Grace.

On Monday last, Coughlan Hall, Harbor Grace, was the scene of a gathering to witness the display of American and Newfoundland School Drawings, on exhibition there. A constant stream of visitors poured in all day until 10 p.m.; about 1200 visited the hall. The exhibition proved a treat and all were charmed and surprised at the great progress made by our School Drawing Course. At 9 p.m. the formal presentation of prizes won by the children took place. Rev. Canon Noel occupied the chair, and was supported by Rev. T. B. Darby, B.A., Mr. Goodland, Principal of the C. E. High School and Professor Nichols. The chairman spoke of the comparisons to be drawn between the American school work and the local school work, and showed how teachers and scholars could learn valuable lessons by comparing the two for themselves. It was an excellent idea to show both side by side, and he felt that good must result.

He then called upon Prof. Nichols to address the meeting, and that gentleman gave valuable information as to his new feature in our educational work. He had been striving to create a love for drawing and to help on teachers to give it its due share of attention. Drawing was a necessary part of the education of our boys and girls, but unfortunately the teachers themselves, in many cases had never been taught to draw, nor to teach it to their scholars. For the past four or five years he had been trying to remedy this neglect and they were able for themselves to see that evening that the schools had made great progress. He had found great talent all over the country and it was the duty of the Government to develop that talent. He instanced many cases of boys of Newfoundland who had prospered wonderfully through their skill in drawing, taught in this country, and more boys and girls should have the chance presented to them.

Rev. T. B. Darby, B.A., and Mr. Goodland moved and seconded respectively, a vote of thanks to Prof. Nichols for his labors. The following prizes were then distributed: Private Study—Ernest Trapnel, 12, for Model Drawing; Honour Certificate; Free Arm Drawing. Susie Parsons, 12, C. E. High School, for Model Drawing. 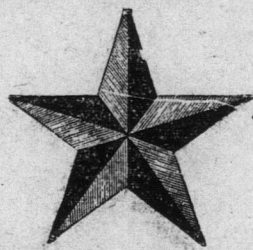

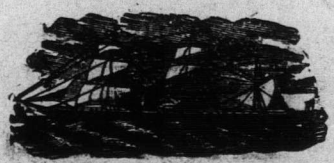

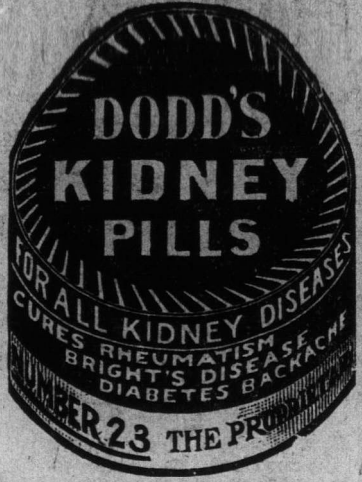
**LONDON, May 5.**

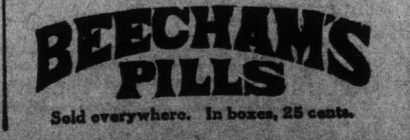

## Robinson Stunned by 10 Years Sentence.

First Policeman Convicted of Grafting Reels and Lowers Head—Clemency Plea Fails.

Policeman Thomas F. Robinson, who was convicted of extortion recently, was sentenced to not less than six years or more than ten years in Sing Sing by Justice Seabury in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court.

Robinson is the first policeman to be convicted of grafting in the present police investigation. Policeman John J. Hartigan is already in Sing Sing under sentence of not less than two years and six months or more than three years and six months on conviction of perjury before the Grand Jury.

The first of the sentences for actual grafting appeared to stun the prisoner and his friends in the court room. Robinson had worn a smile throughout his trial and he heard the verdict of the jury with the same expression on his face. He had lost the smile when he was brought into court later and when he heard the sentence he reeled slightly. He soon regained control of himself, however, and went out of the court room on his way back to the Tombs with lowered head. Several friends shook hands with him again as he left the room.

Justice Seabury pronounced sentence without comment. According to friends of the policeman, Robinson did not expect nearly so heavy a sentence. He had based his hopes for a short term on the minimum of two years and six months received by Hartigan. Hartigan, however, was not even mentioned as ever

having had to do with the collection of protection money. He was convicted of having committed perjury in order to shield Inspector Denis Sweeney.

Robinson was convicted of having extorted \$50 from Ludovico Tancredi, proprietor of the Venice Restaurant in 125th street, under threat of arrest if the money was refused. Tancredi testified that he had been convicted and sent to the workhouse by the police when he had refused to pay graft on an earlier occasion. Robinson appeared as a witness against him, and on a second arrest, he said, he paid \$150 to Tom Lloyd for the police, and the case was dropped. Tancredi also said that Robinson urged him to "put a few girls" into the rooms of his hotel so that he would be able to pay the protection money demanded.—N. Y. Sun.

## Aviator Was Lost In Flight.

Paris, April 29.—Aviator Gilliaux was "lost" for more than twelve hours, when a 1,000 mile flight landed him in Kollum, a small town in Holland. Yesterday he managed to communicate with Paris friends, relieving their anxiety.

Gilliaux arose from Biarritz at 4.22 o'clock yesterday morning, and remained in the air until 7 o'clock last night, when he landed at Kollum.

It was impossible for the aviator to get telephone or telegraphic communication with Paris until yesterday, and great uneasiness was felt for his safety.

## Strange Convict Republic Has Been Found in Siberia.

EXTRAORDINARY CODE OF LAWS IN OPERATION—OVER THREE HUNDRED PEOPLE EXECUTED SINCE SETTLEMENT BEGAN.

St. Petersburg, April 14.—One of the most troublesome tasks of Privy Councillor N. A. Maglakoff, who has just been brought from governing Tchernigov to the Ministry of the Interior, is to decide what should be done with the Imanak Republic, the mysterious commonwealth whose deeds and terrors have astonished Russia during the past six months. For twenty years this Imanak Republic has existed in the Czar's dominions with its own constitution, laws, punishments, printing press and police, yet its discovery is only recent.

The Imanak Republic was found last year by the traveller, Kasimir Veliki, who had made a tour up to the Ussuri and up part of the Inman River to look for furs. It lies three hundred miles from Vladivostok, in an unexplored part of Primorsk Province, in the valley of a tributary of the Ussuri. It is entirely within the Russian Empire, and all other villages and settlements in the neighborhood are officially known, and are subject to the jurisdiction of the Czar's government.

Veliki hit upon it accidentally, and with peril to himself. When crossing country which in the maps is marked blank, he came upon some isolated farms, and further on, a town of about a thousand houses. Imagining himself to be near an unknown Chinese settlement, he went on and came across Mongolian-looking infants, who, to his surprise, cried out to him in a mongrel Russian dialect. A moment later he was challenged by an armed man, and seized.

He found himself in a big village with houses and church mainly in Russian style, but showing strong Chinese influences; and he learned that he was in a Russo-Chinese community which called itself "Imanaska Respublika," and claimed to be independent both of the Czar and of the government of Pekin. Over a dirty inn floated a flag which resembled the Russian tricolor, but was embroidered with a bad copy of the Chinese dragon. By a stroke of luck, and after surprising adventures, Veliki escaped before he could find out more about this unknown republic.

Started as Retreat: Beccane Convents' Town.

At Vladivostok Veliki's story was at first not believed. Afterwards, a commission of enquiry was sent out

under the escort of 500 Cossacks with three mountain guns. The commission accepted the town by surprise and returned to Vladivostok with a complete report.

It discovered that the republic had first been started as a holy retreat for ascetics and that it afterwards fell into the hands of Russian and Chinese convicts and prospered amazingly. The founder was the millionaire ascetic Innokenti Sibirskoff, who inherited a fortune of \$25,000,000; fell under the influence of mystical persons; and finally gave up his property and wandered about Siberia and Russia as a "Besserebrennik"—a beggar.

When travelling in East Asia he was struck by the secluded position of the Inman. He gave \$5,000 to three holy men to build log houses and a log church. The good men and about twenty other persons, prayed there for three years.

In the fourth year there descended upon them a band of Yakuski convicts, who murdered the whole twenty-three persons. These invaders started the Imanak Republic which was at first a mere robbers' den, and for two years kept pirate boats on the Ussuri River. The republic developed. More bandits and convicts came, fought, murdered and drank. Next came Chinese with their wives. The bandits murdered the Chinese and stole their wives. The settlement grew; made its own constitution and laws; and in the village and country around counted nearly 5,000 adherents at the time it was discovered by Veliki.

Terrible Code of Laws in Force. The Russian Commission carefully guarded by the 500 Cossacks, set itself to examine the laws and economic state of the republic. They had opportunities to see the law at work. When they entered the village a man was being hung up by the heels for stealing a horse. And not far off a naked Chinese, who had been beaten to death, lay in the snow. Around his body danced the Imanak women, and sang menacing songs. The punished Chinese, it appeared, had broken the local fishing law.

The Imanak population had invented, in their native ignorance, a code of laws a hundred times more severe than that of the ancient Hebrews. For instance, among these is not counted murder. The punishment for murder is beating and the payment of a fine of thirty pounds of meat or fish. The "State Attorney" of Imanak, an ex-convict named Kobuleff, gave the following as offences for which the only punishment is death:

- Whoever steals a sable skin is buried alive.
- Whoever steals the roots of the yenschen plant is drowned.
- Whoever does not keep a dog as watchdog against intruders in the Imanak settlement is drowned.
- Whoever leaves the village and

tries to make for a Russian settlement is beaten to death.

Whoever lets his house catch fire is hanged. If his wife only is guilty, she is hanged and he is beaten with sticks.

Murdered All Who Discovered Them. The Imanak "Starshina," or Elder, is the constitutional chief of the republic. The real government is carried on by an oligarchy consisting mainly of relatives of the convict, Znamensky, who led the first bandit invasion, and organized the massacre of the original ascetic settlers. All these families are of mixed Russian and Chinese blood and the present chief of the settlement, Vassil Znamensky, looks like a pure Chinese.

The Imanak republicans have taken extraordinary precautions to keep their existence a secret from the outside world. The trappers, explorers, and tramps who have fallen into their hands have always been put to death, except where they undertook to join the republic, and never to leave it. This choice, however, was very seldom given to an educated person, as such would be likely to tire of life in the republic, and make an attempt to escape.

The Commission discovered that M. Kyriil Fedoroff, the rich grain merchant of Marlinsk, who disappeared mysteriously five years ago, fell a victim to the republic's laws. In July, 1907, M. Fedoroff, with two Cossack servants, went exploring in the Sungari and districts. They were seized near Imanak town by Znamensky and the guards of the Republican government. One Cossack was killed, while resisting, Fedoroff and the other Cossack were beaten on the soles of the feet and given pardon on condition that they stayed in the republic and abandoned all hope of ever returning home. In order to save their lives they promised, Fedoroff was given up for dead; his wife sold his house in Marlinsk, and migrated to Moscow.

Fiendish Murder of Grain Merchant. In the spring of 1898 Fedoroff and the other Cossack tried to escape. They laid their plot with a Chinaman who also wanted to leave the republic. The Chinaman pretended to be going fishing, and took the two Russians in his boat, covering them up with matting. The canoe capsized in a rapid and the Cossack and Chinaman were drowned. Fedoroff swam ashore and fell into the hands of the Republicans.

He was taken back to Imanak where the three brothers Znamensky held a court. They found him guilty of being a spy sent by the Russian Government, and ordered him to be beaten eighty times with pine staves and then buried alive. This sentence was carried out. The half-fainting Fedoroff was buried up to his neck. On being asked ironically how he felt, he complained of cold, whereupon a Chinaman was told to throw a bucket of nearly boiling water over his head. He died of shock.

Altogether it is estimated three hundred persons have been executed during the existence of the republic. Nevertheless the Russian Commission admits that the town and country around have been administered in an orderly fashion. The reason of this was that the punishments for even slight offences were so terrible that no man dared take risks. The problem before M. Maklakoff at present is whether to punish these guilty of executions and tortures or not. If the decision is to punish them, then practically the whole population of Imanak must be put on trial for murder, and it is very doubtful whether any jury would convict them.

What will become of the Imanak republic is not yet settled. It is still flourishing. The Cossacks withdrew when the Commission returned to Vladivostok. The Imanak people thereupon held a meeting and threatened to resist by force any attempt to make them submit to Russian laws. M. Maklakoff's present plan, it is stated, is to disperse the Republicans and use them for colonizing the Loy-e-Ussuri. They will make good colonists, as they are first-rate men at fishing and forest work and are skilled trappers and hunters.

Canadians Poor Fish Eaters. Ottawa, April 25.—A special bulletin issued by the Marine Department to-day deplores the fact that Canadians are poor fish eaters, and announces that steps will be taken to educate the public to the physical and financial advantages of this food. The department will make a comprehensive fisheries exhibit at the Toronto Exhibition this year, and at a number of other exhibitions.

Through modern express and cold storage facilities fresh fish can be conveniently placed on the markets of any interior section of Canada.

## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

TOKIO, May 6. Takekichi, a Japanese aviator, who recently returned from America, was killed at Osaka, to-day.

LONDON, May 6. Suffragettes set fire to the residence of the editor of "The Light," at Finchley, on Saturday night. The fire was quenched before serious damage was done.

SEATTLE, May 6. A Dawson City despatch says the Dawson Electric Light and Power Company's premises were burned on Saturday night. The estimated loss is \$2,000,000.

FALL RIVER, Mass., May 6. The Fall River Cotton Works Co., to-day, posted a notice saying that seven mills of the plant would be closed down on Saturday for an indefinite period. No reason for the shut down was given. The Company employs 5,000 hands, and their weekly pay roll is \$35,000.

ROME, May 6. Pope Plus gave his first audience since his illness, this morning. The honor fell to Cardinal Dominic Perata, who recently returned from Malta, where he had presided over the Eucharistic Conference as Papal Legate. The Pope said that the success of the great religious gathering had given him the keenest consolation.

PEKIN, May 6. President Yuan Shi Kai has warned the people that although he has refrained up to now from employing military force against plotters, he will not permit conspirators to foment trouble in future. After the next Presidential Election he desires to be relieved from the care of office.

LONDON, May 6. The Women's Suffrage Bill was introduced in the Commons this afternoon, the second reading being moved by W. H. Dickinson, M.P. (Liberal) for St. Pancras. The bill proposes to enfranchise 6,000,000 women. It is thought that the fate of the Bill will be settled one way or the other to-morrow night.

TOKIO, May 6. The Navy Department has contracted for three battleships to be built in Japan. They will be sister ships to the Fuso, now building in the naval dockyards at Kure. Little is definitely known about the Fuso, but it is supposed that her armour, in accordance with the Japanese practice since the Russian war, will consist of a moderately heavy belt, probably ten inches thick, extending over nearly her entire length. Her speed is reported to be 27 knots.

PORT AU PRINCE, May 6. Michael Cassuto, the new President of Haiti, elected yesterday, displayed great energy in restoring order in the city, and declares he will maintain peace with a strong hand. General Dely, who attacked the Parliament building during the voting for the presidency, yesterday, was repulsed, together with his followers, by the regular troops commanded by General Pottievien. General Dely fled and took refuge in the Cuban legation.

LONDON, May 6. The suffragette conspiracy case was resumed at Bow Street to-day. There were nine prisoners, seven women, Drummond, Kerr, Laker, Barrett, Saunders, Kenny and Lenny, with Clayton, the chemist, and Drew the printer. Aveline Boken, the prosecuting counsel for the Treasury, described the law of conspiracy, and said that the accused had been constantly engaged in conspiring. He referred to Mrs. Drummond as a violent and unscrupulous woman. Clayton had supplied the brains for carrying out the crimes, while Christabel Pankhurst, from comfortable seclusion in Paris, had sent articles weekly to the suffragette paper, commenting what had happened and inciting to further crimes.

LONDON, May 6. At to-day's meeting of the Ambassadorial Conference Sir Edward Grey announced that Montenegro had unconditionally placed the question of the future of Scutari in the hands of the European Powers. This decision, reached by King Nicholas at the very last moment, had the effect of immediately relieving the great tension in European politics, and caused unbounded satisfaction to diplomats and the general public. The stock exchange at once responded. It is generally hoped that Montenegro's action will now do away with any necessity for military incursions into Albania. It is also thought that it will have a salutary effect on other disturbing elements in the Balkan peninsula and cause them to bow to Europe's will.

### Weights and Measures!

The following sections of the Act Respecting Weights and Measures are published for general information:  
"Any person who shall use a beam, scale, weight, or measure, in the sale or exchange of any commodity, not assayed and stamped, or who shall alter the same after being so assayed and stamped, or who shall use steel-yards, except for the purpose of weighing hay or straw, or who shall use a beam made of wood, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars."  
"Salt may be sold by measure, or by weight; if sold by measure, there shall be eighteen gallons to a tub (liquid measurement), and three tubs to a hogshead. Any person who shall sell or dispose of salt by measure otherwise than according to the standard hereby established, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars."  
"The Chief Inspector, and Inspectors shall, when required, inspect and adjust all beams, scales, weights and measures, brought to the office of either of them, according to the said standard, and they shall stamp or mark thereon the initials of the reigning Sovereign, and their own proper initials."

### Art Exhibition at Bonavista.

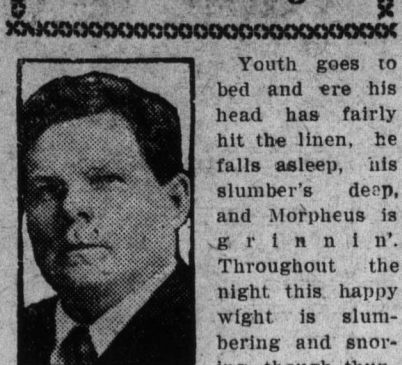

**STANDING BY WRECK**—Capt. Plumb is still standing by the wrecked steamer Glace Bay. Mr. Eric Bowring is also on the scene in the interests of salvors. The ship is now almost submerged. The forward part of her is high on the rocks and with a strong easterly wind she will be broken up.

**SLEMP IN SALMON**—Owing to the comparatively large quantity of salmon on the market yesterday the price which was from 20 to 25 cents per lb. in the forenoon fell to 15 cents in the afternoon as sale was not brisk. After a few more days no doubt the price will reach the normal figure of 10 cents.

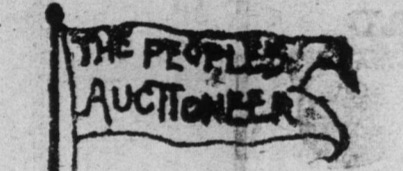
