Mrs. Rockefeller was content with old friends, familiar paths and normal occupations. She might have had anything else, everything else, that money could buy; but these gave her happiness, a quiet contentment and a sphere of influence that she felt to be ample for her powers. And it is all so natural that it sounds mazing. Perhaps, however, it holds the lesson that American women need nost to-day.




