FIVE TONS OF OINTMENT
Weekly Supply for Use of British Soldiers Upon Their Feet.
London, Feb. 10.—An "eyewitness" at the British general army headquarters in France pays a tribute in an article given out yesterday by the Official Press Bureau to the work of the army supply departments. He calls the Ordnance Department a "military universal provider." He says in part:—"The vastness of the work of maintaining a modern army may be gauged by the fact that during the past month the supplies furnished included 450 miles of telephone wire, 530,000 pairs of socks and 10,000 pounds of shoe blacking, while in ten days the Ordnance Department supplied 120,000 fur waistcoats and 300,000 flannel belts. The average weekly issue of ointment for feet is five tons. The complexity of the work is illustrated by the fact that the index of the stores include 50,000 separate kinds of articles. Most of these still are obtained from England, but some are being manufactured by the Ordnance Department in its own workshops in France."

RAMBLING NOTES for 1915.

(L. C. MORRIS.)

CHAPTER VIII.

While at Little River I visited the churchyard, and amongst the inscriptions I noticed two which appealed to our sympathies. They were blown on two small wooden crosses, erected at the head of two little graves, and told the reader that in each of the new-made graves lay side by side a little brother and sister. The names of the children were Mary Margaret Cranbo, aged nine, and John William, aged 7, both of whom died on the same day. Thinking that perhaps some dread disease, such as diphtheria, had suddenly cut down those bright flowers of the home, I enquired at the hotel as to the cause of their death, and the proprietor, Mr. MacIsaac, kindly told me the story, and then I remembered that I had read something of it in our daily papers, in July last.

The children had been at school, and had left at two o'clock for home, as the wind was very high. In their journey they had to cross over a railway bridge, and it seems that in the height of the gale they were blown off, and falling into the swift waters below, they were swept away and drowned. The people turned out en masse and dragged the river, and on the following day, just when they were about to give up the search, they found the bodies of both the dear children at the bottom of a whirlpool, and quite a distance from the bridge.

Amid the trees primeval which still grow in the churchyard, and near the shadows of their branches, the little brother and sister sleep side by side. Life's voyage for them was but brief, and as hand in hand they were blown from the bridge, so now side by side they rest in sure and certain hope of Eternal Life. Neither the wind that bends the trees overhead, nor the waters of the river close by have any terror for them; the current of the one and the rustling of the other are but requiems to the innocence of their lives, and the purity of their souls.

Near Little River is Searston, from which place may be seen Codroy, and near by may also be seen a small house which was built and occupied by a young sailor man named John Chesterton, who some sixty years ago was rescued from shipwreck by the late Capt. James Young, of Codroy, and who told me the story under the following circumstances. Twenty years ago I was standing in the tin-ware shop of the late W. J. Pippy, and Capt. Young and some of his crew were there making some purchases. Among them I noticed a tall elderly gentleman, and what was peculiar

about him was the fact that he kept close to the good Captain and followed him in his different movements about the shop. They were written.

The next day I met Capt. Young on the street and I asked him who the man was, and why it was that he kept so close to him, and followed him as a child would do, and he told me the following story:—

"That is a man whom I rescued from drowning when he was young and I was younger. The night was dark and storm beat upon the shore. It was November month, and about bed-time. Suddenly the cry was heard that a ship was in distress just near Codroy Island. A boat was soon launched and manned, and I was one of the crew and manned the bow oar. Amid the roaring of the storm and the cries of the mariners we pushed out and on, and after a desperate struggle we reached the wreck. She proved to be an English brig with a crew of ten all told. In the rigging I saw one man, and called to him to jump toward the boat, he did so and I caught him and helped him in over the gunwale. Most of the crew were lost. The man whom you saw with me at Mr. Pippy's shop was the man whom I rescued. He was twenty-three years old then and is now nearing seventy. He belonged to Dublin, Ireland, and was married just before he left home. He got such a fright during the shipwreck that he has never since ventured on the water, nor has he ever left Codroy. He lost all trace of his family, but of late he has heard from his only child, a daughter, now a woman of forty, and living in Dublin, and about forty-six years of age, and they rest in sure and certain hope of Eternal Life. The voyage of the children was short, but that of the sailor was long. Such is life, and such are its mysteries.

A year or two later I again met the gallant Captain, and I enquired of him the whereabouts of the man, and he told me that he had found his long lost daughter, but it was all so strange to him that he returned to Newfoundland, and resumed his quiet life with his friends at Codroy. And so when visiting Grand River shore, while enquiring, on asking Mr. MacLellan, a business man of that place, what buildings those were on the other side of the late Capt. James Young, of Codroy, he said he informed me that they had been built by the shipwrecked sailor of whom I have written.

The little brother and sister of Little River, sleep side by side; the rescued sailor of Dublin sleeps alone. The voyage of the children was short, but that of the sailor was long. Such is life, and such are its mysteries.

The items were considered by Mr. Steel-Matland, Major Macpherson and self. We decided that at Suvia Bay provisions would be more welcome to our men there.

The War Contingent Association has supplemented this gift by the following, out of the Fund at their disposal:—
1 Suit of warm Undergarments; and
1 Pair of Socks for each man.

We came to the decision to supply those garments owing to a doubt as to whether the War Office had done so. Having mufflers, socks and mittens from the former shipment, our men should be well fed and warm at Christmas.

With reference to the sailor men we have made designs for the inscriptions on the pouches, and are awaiting an estimate of cost. The Admiralty has been moved to furnish addresses or location of the R. N. R. forces of Newfoundland, and you may rest assured that everything will be done on our part to forward the Gifts as soon as we receive this information.

I should add that the Queen Alexandra Field Force Fund is forwarding everything free of cost, so that we have been able to spend the whole amount on the sailors in Gallipoli.

The Recount.

The proceedings for the recount in the Prohibition Election were resumed in the Court House yesterday afternoon. Mr. Justice Johnson gave his decision on the preliminary objections raised by the counsel for the prohibition cause. His Lordship stated that he had decided that there was but one election, and that therefore the affidavit upon which the order for the recount was given was good and sufficient for the Court to grant the said recount. His Lordship also held that the period of twenty-one days, allowed by the act within which to make application for a recount, was from the declaration of the count of St. Barbe and that therefore the application was made within the period. He then announced that he would not begin the count until the boxes from St. Barbe are received. Counsel for the prohibition cause gave notice of appeal from the decision of the Judge on the preliminary objections. The St. Barbe ballot boxes are not expected to reach here before Thursday next and in the meantime, the matter of appeal will probably come before the Full Bench.

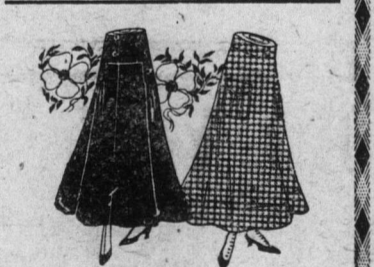

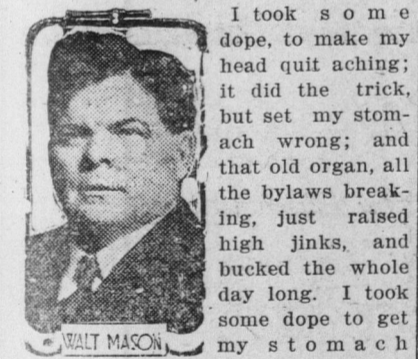

Up to the Government.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Justice Johnson overruled the objection of Mr. Dunfield to his order for a recount on the ground that there was but one election, one counting of votes, and that therefore an affidavit was sufficient for a recount of the whole votes cast in the island, that the application was in time on the 26th within 21 days of the count for the whole island. Mr. Dunfield intimated that he would take steps to appeal to the Full Court against the ruling. Even if the notice of appeal has not yet been given, we shall treat the matter at issue as sub-judice, and offer no comment on the merits of the contention. Mr. Justice Johnson also intimated that he would not commence the re-count until all the boxes were in his custody as he was not checking the counts by districts but for the whole island. As Mr. Justice Johnson refuses to recognize the dates on which the 18 Returning Officers made the declaration of the Polls in their several districts, he refuses to recognize the certificates made by them for their several districts in the form of Schedule B of the Prohibition Act, and he will not recognize any act of these Returning Officers? Were the Deputies legally appointed? Were the booths legally opened? Were the ballots legally cast? If there should have been only one District and one Returning Officer has there been a legal count, and if not what is the Justice's ruling will recount? We have made these remarks, not in the way of discussing the legality of the ruling, which if not actually sub-judice, will soon be, but for the purpose of endorsing the advice of the Daily News, that the Government take up the matter at this stage. If any mistake has been made in appointing 18 Returning Officers instead of one; if 18 Returning Officers have illegally appointed deputies; if it is an administrative mistake of the Government Council. It is therefore up to them to follow up the appeal, mentioned by Mr. Dunfield, and undertake it through the Attorney General and such counsel as he may appoint. It is their business to get a decision from the Full Court. If the Supreme Court sustains the ruling of Mr. Justice Johnson, and the Prohibition cause has sustained any damage by their administrative mistakes, it will be for them to remedy it by legislation. If under the Act, for instance, there should have been only one district and one Returning Officer, means should have been provided by which 1,500 or more electors who happened to be out of their districts, could vote in any booth. They were stopped from voting because their names were not on the Voters' List in the district they happened to be in Nov. 4th. The Prohibition Measure was a Government Measure. Mistakes in the Government. The blunders in administration, if any, were Government blunders, and it is up to the Government now to correct their mistakes.

Off For Russia.

HELLA VENTURE AND ADVENTURE SAH AT LAST.

100,000,000 SUBSCRIBED. OTTAWA, To-day. The Canadian domestic war loan has been increased from 50 to 100 million dollars.

NATIONAL SERVICE. LONDON, To-day. The principle of training for national service throughout the Empire as already adopted by certain Overseas Dominions, has been endorsed by the Council of the Royal Colonial Institute.

EASY ON GREECE. LONDON, To-day. The Daily Mail states the British Foreign Office denies the report of the resumption of restriction on Greek commerce.

WILL USE STEAMERS. LONDON, To-day. The British Government, as is confirmed in official quarters, has requisitioned the steamers Hecking and Geneze of the American trans-Atlantic S. S. Co., but this action, it is added, is only of a temporary character.

NOTHING DOING. PARIS, To-day. The night passed without incidents of importance, the War Office announced this afternoon.

HEAVY FIGHTING ON ISONZO. ZURICH, To-day. Despatches from the Isonzo front in the Austro-Italian theatre of war state that despite the icy cold, the fighting was blowing at the rate of 60 miles an hour over the bleak heights of Carso.

MONASTIR EVACUATED. PARIS, To-day. The Havas Agency at Athens, bearing to-day's date, says a Florida Greece despatch says the Serb Prefect and Mayor left Monastir a few moments before the entry of the enemy.

RUSSIANS MAKE PROGRESS. LONDON, To-day. The Russians have taken twelve miles of trenches, 700 prisoners and a large quantity of munitions and food supplies on the Tukum-road, west of Riga, according to a despatch from Geneva.

BULGARIAN GUNS SILENCED. LONDON, To-day. A Reuter despatch from Saloniki says the Bulgarians yesterday shelled the British left on the Strumitza front but were soon silenced by the British guns.

GERMANS RETIRING EASTWARD. LONDON, To-day. Monastir became untenable for the Serbs on Wednesday when the Bulgarians occupied Kanali on the railway between the Macedonia capital and the Greek frontier, cutting off the Serbian retreat to the south.

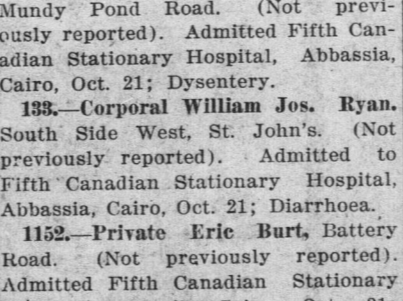

YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS

The formation of good teeth has to begin in childhood if they are to remain good through life. The best of care should be given to the child's mouth. He must not be allowed to suck his thumb, as that throws the upper jaw above the lower jaw. If he has adenoids so he has to breathe through his mouth they must be removed or his mouth will become misshapen and his teeth will not grow against each other as they should. If they do not grind properly they will be more likely to break. The child should be taught early to wash the teeth well after each meal. Teeth should be washed with an up and down motion rather than with a side motion. The side motion fails to remove the food particles which lodge between the teeth.

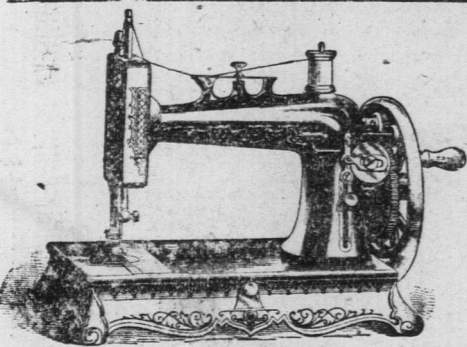

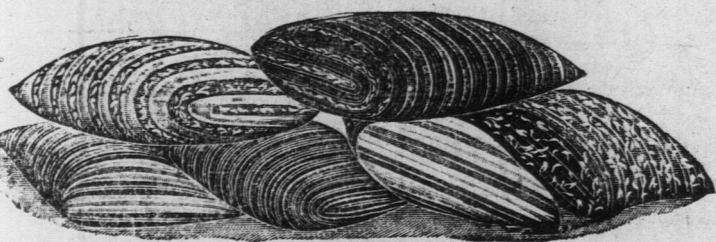

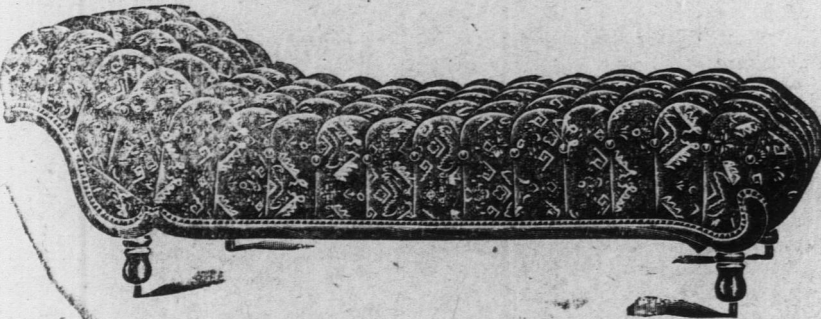

CINEMA V. C.S.

It is computed that 7,000 men connected with the cinema business in the British Isles have enlisted in the new armies. On the "Bust."

A Hand-Grenade Tells the Story of Its Adventurous Career. They talk, some of them, of long descent! Now, I am so old that my origin is unknown. According to some I was born in Granada, in Spain, whence my name, in 1594; while others assign me to the fifteenth century. It is certain, how- ever, that I was extensively used in the seventeenth century, and that in all armies companies of picked men were formed to know me. I was then a small, thin, spherical shell, weighing about three pounds, and provided with a fuse, which was lighted at a fire before I was hurled— from a distance of twenty or thirty feet—at an enemy's works. My first appearance with the British Army was made in 1667. After I had been used for a considerable time I was entrusted to special troops, called Grenadiers—strong, highly-courageous soldiers, who were trained to throw me. Regiments as Godchildren. The name now survives in one regi- ment of the British Army. This is the Grenadier Guards, in whose record room are preserved two original gren- ades. So it is in the Russian Army. One of the Tsar's crack corps, the Gren- adier Guards, similarly owe their title to me. In the wars of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries I played a great part, particularly when I was well made; but I became obsolete in the nineteenth century, and seemed to be doomed to perpetual oblivion. Then a strange thing happened. The Rus- sians fell back on me in the defence of Port Arthur.

At one part the Japanese constructed a stone breastwork, forming three sides of a triangle, and their troops lay behind this for nearly a week, unable to advance or recede. Falling to get at them in any other way, the Russians threw on them grenades, charged with a high explosive. These burst with terrible effect, blowing the bodies of some of the Japanese into the air. When, again, a number of the Mi- kado's soldiers broke into a Russian trench at each end, the defenders hurled at them blazing tow, explosive grenades, and grenades filled with petroleum. The latter variety, on bursting, burnt brightly for a few seconds, and then exploded violently, scattering burning fragments all around. Revived by Tommy. On this occasion the petroleum gren- ades, in conjunction with the flaring tow, set fire to the woodwork of the trench, and not a man escaped. But the Russians did not have it all

their own way in this particular direc- tion. I was soon adopted by the Jap- anese also. And now I am used in the Great War. Like many other things, I owe my appearance in it—at all events on the western fighting line—to the initiative of the soldier. Steel caps for the head, body plates, breast pro- tectors, long knives for use in trench- es—too narrow for the "nice conduct" of the bayonet—these and numerous other articles of equipment were ex- temporized by the troops long before they were officially issued, and such was my case also. On one of the early occasions when Germans made my acquaintance I consisted of a one-pound jam-pot filled with gun-cotton, and subsequently I was apparently a harmless bully- beef tin. Even in so simple a form, however, I created havoc among a trench full of Hunns, though sometimes a German dexterously caught me, and lobbed me back into the trench from which I had been thrown. Once I was loosed from a British trench, returned, and then again sent into the enemy's front line.

A New One Every Day. But many varieties of manufactured grenades are now supplied to British and French troops, some of them un- known before the present war. Incredible as it may seem, it is none the less a fact that since the begin- ning of the present year the number of bombs, grenades, and the like, pat- ented in England alone average nearly one per working day; and inventors have been correspondingly pro- lific in France. The fact is that, under certain con- ditions, I am the only practical mis- sile in warfare. Did not Sir Robert Baden-Powell drag me from oblivion during the siege of Mafeking, to cope with a state of things similar, on a small scale, to that which has so long existed in France and Belgium?

RUSSIA WANTS FILMS. Russian cinematograph companies have received many orders from Lon- don recently for films of Russian ori- gin. The Russian cinema repertoire is very rich in historical dramas, but since war broke out the market has been short of comic films because they were mostly supplied by Germany. This is a good opportunity for the British companies to supply Russia with films of this kind.

Then, because of brevity, there will at all times be left to the student a sense of exhilaration and renewed en- ergy, instead of fatigue. Breath is the basic principle of all physical en- ergy, and the only exercise which naturally and subconsciously involves the whole body. Everyone should cultivate the art of avoiding friction by moving along the lines of least resistance. Take time to stretch on a full breath. Then gently change, on a controlled breath, the residual air of the lungs. Alternate the nostrils on the first breathing exercises of the early morn- ing, because that is the way of ener- gizing the nasal chamber, respiratory

THE THOUGHTS OF THEOBALD.

STOVES VS. OPEN GRATES.
 Almost the whole space of all newspapers is, and has been devoted to the war and war topics, and because one has very little to say that has not been said, I more often than not write upon what may be called domestic subjects. It is a relief to talk about other subjects than the war and I hope that the readers of the Telegram and of this column in particular will share this relief with me to some extent. I have come across an old argument concerning the relative values of stoves and open fireplaces and in this period of approaching winter and talk of coal and high prices, perhaps we may learn something to our advantage. In the case of open grates we are told that anywhere from 50 to 80 per cent of their heat is carried up the chimney; that all the "ills that flesh is heir to" come when one is seated before the fire. There is also an objection, and a very weighty one to those who live in a city like St. John's, that the smoke of soft coal pollutes the atmosphere, makes the air sooty and therefore dirty and deposits its dirt on buildings. For this last reason I think that in some States of America the burning of soft coal has been prohibited. So much for the case against the open grate.
 Put a stove in a room and you will at once find the difference. The air of the room becomes dry, so also the walls, the ceiling, the furniture and everything in the room. There is a sense of suffocation unless artificial ventilation is made in the walls or ceiling to carry off the super-heated air and allow fresh cool air to enter. This dry effect of course is more noticeable in countries where the climate is dry. The winter atmosphere of the United States is very dry and some attribute the lank aspect of the typical American to this, and also the great fires that devastated some cities of U. S. A. appear to be due to the general dryness of buildings rendering them ready to catch fire. In England this is not the case as an English house is enveloped in a foggy atmosphere and encased in damp surroundings and the coal is not necessary to provide comfort. In this connection I should think that Newfoundland has a fairly dry climate in winter.
 So there you have the bad sides of both. The stove is more economical than the grate, except when you burn anthracite at present prices! But after all, who would not rather see a bit more coal go up the chimney for the sake of sitting before and looking into a glowing fire? Is it not the most pleasant looking spot in the room? Is there any old Scrooge who would try and save money at the sacrifice of such heat-warming influences as come from a blazing grate? I know of a house that has been built lately without a single open fire place. It is surely one of the most unimaginative proceedings that we could think of, but of course, steamed to his taste! I suppose steam heated houses are comfortable, though it is a wonder how our grandfathers stood the cold when they don't seem to have suffered much through the want of hall stoves and furnaces!
 After all I think the best arrangement for us, at least is to have a grate heated by a stove or furnace and to have open fire places in the rooms. Thus the cold air in the halls is warmed before it filters under the doors, etc., into the rooms, and the inevitable draught is a warm one, while the open grate sees that the

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.
 LONDON, Dec. 3.
 The Governor, Newfoundland:
 In Russia an enemy bivouac was surprised on the Dvina. The enemy fled, leaving a hundred killed and wounded. On the left bank of the Sty the enemy was driven south-west. Otherwise, nothing to report.

QUIET IN FRANCE.
 PARIS, Dec. 3.
 The night passed without any incident of importance, the War Office announced this afternoon.

NO DIRECT CONFIRMATION.
 LONDON, Dec. 3.
 No direct and specific confirmation has been received in London of the statement that the Russians had entered Bulgaria. It is recalled, however, that last week Emperor Nicholas was said to have promised Premier Pachitch of Serbia, the appearance of a Russian army in Bulgaria within a week.

"WILL WIN OR DIE?"
 ROME, Dec. 3.
 The Giornale Italia today prints an interview with the Serbian Minister to Italy, concerning the rumour that Serbia might capitulate. The Minister is quoted as follows: "I absolutely deny that there will be any capitulation, this word being unknown in Serbia. Their people either win or die. The Serbian people and Government are determined to fight to the bitter end. Next to their Allies, Serbia will be loyal to the last man. In a short time Serbia will have a fresh army of over a hundred thousand men, full of enthusiasm, to throw on the flank of the enemy. She only needs supplies of arms and ammunition."

REPORTED ON ALBANIAN SOIL.
 ROME, Dec. 3.
 Foreign Minister Sonnino, in his statement concerning Albanian and Italian assistance for the Serbian army, is interpreted in some quarters here as meaning that the Italian expedition to the Eastern Coast of the Adriatic is in course of execution. In some instances mention is even made of the number of troops already landed on Albanian soil, which, according to the rules of the Italian censorship, it is not permissible to state.

HEROIC SERBIANS.
 MILAN, Dec. 3.
 The correspondent of the Corriere Della Sera, who departed from Monastir by the last train which left that city, telegraphs that ten thousand Serbian troops, sent to assist Colonel Vassitch, the Serbian Commander, were too exhausted on their arrival to be of value. They had marched for 17 days over rough Albanian roads, struggling through snow or rain. Sometimes they went forty-eight hours without food. It was not a fighting force, but groups of ghosts which entered Monastir. The correspondent says that although they were fit only for hospital, they went immediately to the front to cover the general retirement of the army. It seemed only the spectre of an army as it faded out of sight, with the snow swirling about the soldiers in icy blusters. As the train drew away from Monastir the correspondent saw at a distance a faint gleam of light, which was the Serbian headquarters, where Col. Vassitch was still at work determined to be the last man to leave the city.

Items of Interest.
 For the first time on record the National Debt is over a thousand millions.
 Over £20,000 has been added to the Australian war funds by Mme. Melbourne's concert.
 The Russians are providing respirators for horses to safeguard them against the German gas attacks.
 The total staff at the Press Bureau is 122, including two directors and 40 censors. Each director receives a salary of £1,000 per annum.
 Over £2,500 has been collected in pennies in Monmouthshire for ambulance funds by the Hon. Lady Herbert and a number of helpers.
 Over 2,000 members of the London Stock Exchange are either on active service or directly employed by the Government on war work.
 One of the social problems to be faced after the war is that there are upwards of a million girls now between sixteen and twenty who will never be married.
 Pensions for disabled Canadians vary from £15 to £55 a year. A British private can get as much as £65 a year pension for his wounds according to their nature.
 Some idea of the cost of the Red Cross organization may be gathered from the fact that the fleet of motor ambulances at the front alone costs £2,000,000 a year.
 C.M.R.C.—The Class will meet in the Synod Building to-morrow at 3 p.m. The address will be given by His Excellency the Governor, who will speak on matters in connection with the war. After the closing of the Class, the General Committee will meet for important business. Visitors from the outports are heartily welcome.
