DEMOCRATS AND PROHIBITION.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24. That the question of prohibition enforcement in the United States be the only issue to be carried to the floor of the Democratic National Convention, opening here on Monday next, was the view expressed to-day by Homer S. Cummings, Chairman of the Democratic National Committee. UNITED STATES-CANADIAN FISH-ERIES TREATY.

Should the proposed Fisheries United States be ratified, "It is beyond Senate Merchant Marine Committee nade public to-day by the Senate. Colby regarding the proposed Treaty vessels preferential privileges the exclusive prorogratives of the U. States. "In exchange for these valuable privileges which it is proposed to secure to subjects of His Majesty for a period of at least seventeen years," said Senator Jones, "fishing vessels of the United States are to be accorded what are presumably like Canada, privileges which, in part, are now available as a right under the Treaty of 1818. In addition United States vessels are to be accorded very questionable benefit of being permitted to sell in Canadian markets free from payment duties their wares so landed. What is required for our fisheries is some truly protective legislation rather than a Treaty, and cer-Premier Lloyd George, answering tainly a Treaty based upon so onesided consideration of the subject as that accorded by the American-Canadian Fisheries Conference should not be further considered. If a Treaty must be considered, let it be only ed to join the League of Nations after full opportunity to present all

Goodland, secretary, with the Board of Food Control, which took place at the office of the latter on Tuesday evening last at 8 o'clock, proved very interesting and successful. The question of the price of milk, which to-day is to 24 cents per quart, was discussed and it is contended that, now while the cows are in the fields and are not hand-fed nor stabled as in the winter, the price should be reduced and a flat price charged by all milk vendors. This matter will be investigated. Also a bill is being introduced which will check the adulteration of this very useful and necessary article of food by the addition of water

and Klim, a practice now being indulged in by some milk vendors, and who stand to pay a heavy fine if caught. The meeting discussed the buying in of potatoes in the fall at a fair market price, and advancing the price each time the imported potato advanced, which by the time spring arrived gave a profit of from two to three hundred per cent. Again some grocers are giving as little as pounds should be given to the galon. Flour is also being sold at the store of G. Knowling, Ltd., at \$1.10 per stone, while other stores are charging as high as \$1.45 per stone another matter which will be investigated. The above stores are also selling cooked corned beef at 45c., while others are selling as high as 60c. per pound. Ham again is being sold at prices ranging from 47c. to 80c. per pound. Consumers would do well to note the prices charged on all necessaries and take good care they are not being "roasted." The price of tobacco is also said to vary a great deal; one brand, "B.C." selling at a difference of 6c. per plug, while cigarettes are selling at 21c., 22c., and 25c. per pkg. 
Prize Day at Shannon Munn Orphanage.

A few days before Dr. Hugh Cabot out-Society his plans for the establishment of community hospitals, the British public was familiarizing itself with the details of a government scheme which, if carried into effect, will bring such hospitals into existence and practically revolutionize health service in the United King-

The system recommended for adoption is based on the principle that "any method of medical aid must be open, though not necessarily free, to all classes of the people." There were barers in the way: causes of separa-These are (a) Theological, (b) Government. Theological lifferences arose in the early Chrisian church. Later a revolution came within the catholic church and among the revolutionists themselves theological differences prevailed. In earlier days in Canada there were different schools of theology and these differences found expression in pulpit and congregations. These theological church government. They are three orms: Prelacy, Presbyterianism and Congregationalism. Their coming torether is not a surrender of a particular form, but it is possible to find a system comprehensive enough to embrace all that is good in three systems. Dr. Pedley presented his argument in the form of a syllogism and stated his major premise. Whatever in the way of church government in itself subject to the Kingdom of God, that should be in the ideal church. All forms of church government have their value.

It is an integral p rt of our loyalty to Christ to work for a united church. Christ came to break down the walls of partition. Loyalty to Christ demands that we lift up heart and voice and prayer for the fulfilment of the Master's words,






GEORGE B. TAYLOR.




