MUNICIPAL RETURNS.—We have re ceived a copy of a blue book containing municipal returns for Upper and Lower Canada for 1866. From it we learn that the total assessed value of real estate in the County of Wellington in that year was \$9,151,822, being an increase of about \$50,000; the assessed value of personal property was \$1,021,208, a decrease of more than \$500,000 on the previous year. Our arrears of taxes were \$16,052, of which none belonged to Guelph; and "other assets" \$26,175, of which \$8,743 is on Town account. Our liabilities were Debentures, \$138,050, on which \$76 inter est was over due (in Elora); other liabilities, \$8,419, none on Guelph account. The only liabilities of the Town were \$7,430 debenture, swith three years, interest. There were 10,417 ratepayers in the County, 1,024 in Guelph. The assessed value of real estate in the Town was \$1,-659,783, and of personal property \$279,-166; the expenditure for educational purposes was \$6,889, for salaries and other expenses of municipal government \$2,966, and for roads and bridges \$3,577. The rate imposed for all purposes varied in different municipalities from eight and two-fifths mills to five mills on the dollar. The former was the rate imposed in

Pork Packing.

Pork Packing.

The Chicago Tribune says:—It is generally conceded that the present packing season will be a short one at all the principal packing points. At Clincinnati, it is expected to close about New Year, and the same time is fixed upon at Louis-ville. Here it is supposed that the season will last until the first of February though many of our packers are of the opinion that it will not extend beyond the middle of January. At the present high prices for corn, the majority of the farmers will not feed their stock. This is plainly exhibited in the fact that the great bulk of the hogs now being marketed are, in their flesh only fit for the manufacture of English meats and bacon. The proportion of hogs fit for making mess pork is very small, and it is generally conceded that the yield of mess pork and lard will be lighter than in former years. It is thought that the number of hogs packed will equal that of last year, though at Clincinnai, Louisville, and other points on the Ohio River, it is feared there will be a falling off. We are of the opinion that on the Mississippi an equal if not a larger number will be cut, However, it is too early in the season to make any calculations with safety. The crop of corn is larger and a very excellent quality. There has been a marked norease in the hog crop west of the Mississippi, and though the farmers along the lines of railroad may prefer to market their corn to feeding it to their hogs, we are of the opinion that the receipts later in the season will be of a better quality—more suitable for the manufacture of mess pork and lard—as they will be made up of hogs which have been fattened on corn, which the farmers could not market, except at a loss. The receipts here early in the week were of good quality—better than at any time this season—but they have since fallen off in quality, and are now about on an average with those previously received.

Latest from Ottawa.

Nova Scotian Legislature has taken action against the Union, and it is rumored in Ottawa that there may be a recall of the representatives of that Province from the House of Commons of the Dominion. It is further asserted that threats have been made of resisting the collection of the Revenues by the officers of the Dominion in that Province. We do not attach any importance to these rumors however, believing that they are without solid foundation, and that they are mere idle gossip circulated in Ottawa without any definite object. The recall of the Nova Scotian members from the House of Commons, and resistance to the collection of the Federal Revenues, would be secession and rebellion. We know that the Nova Scotians intend nothing of the kind, and we know, moreover, from the Nova Scotia, members themselves, that they intend to give the Union a fair trial; and, if found necessary, to endeavor to effect some change in the Constitution.

London, Nov. 23rd—His Holiness the Pope who was at first strenuously averse to any conference whatever for the settlement of the Roman question, has, at length, withdrawn his objections, and is now in full accordance with the proposition of Napoleon. The Government of Bavaria, which it was asserted would not join the conference, has also signified its acceptance of the French plan. Many of the details of the Conference have already been, agreed upon. Munich, in Bavaria, has been chosen as the place, and 11th of December as the time.

London, Nov. 24th—The expected demonstration of sympathy for the fate of the Fenians, Allen, Gould and Larkin, took place today at noon. A funeral procession, consisting of about 2000 persons, was formed and slowly marched to Hyde Park. One of the most conspicuous objects in the procession was a large black banner, upon which was inscribed the motto, "Man's inhumanity to man makes countless thousands mourn." On the arrival of the mourners at Hyde Park, a solemn meeting was organized according to the programme previously announced, three stands had been erected on the grounds, from which during the afternoon the people were addressed by various speakers. Strong appeals were made to the sympathies of the audience, and the hurried executions at Manchestel were condemned in bitter terms. Not withstanding the peculiar nature of the occasion and the character of the assemblage, good order prevailed throughout the proceedings, and the police who were prepared for an emergency, were not called upon to interfere. This evening a similar meeting was held at a public hall in this city, which was largely attended by Irishmen. No disturbances whatever occurred, and the city is perfectly quiet.
