



The Monetary Times says :--Antici-pations of a commencement being made this year with the Pacific Rail-way and the financial operations it would give rise to are likely not to be realized. Whatever political re-sult may issue from the pending in-vestigation, one thing is manifes that this great scheme has received a heavy blow and Canadian credit abroad must be anything else than improved by what has transpired. It is said that a new charter will be required, and to the original difficulty of raising capital abroad will be added the very serious, possibly insuperable one which has been created by the heavy discounting which has occurred of certain prominent reputa-tions in the political and monetary world of Canada.

The best that can be said for the state of things in Spain is that it has grown no worse in the last few days. The Government, in fact, appears to exercise a reasonable degree of energy and discretion in its treatment of the Cantonal insurrections. The loyal troops are completely successful in Seville. Several wavering places have returned to their alle. giance. Meanwhile, the enemies of the Republic do not seem to profit by their momentary advantage. The Carlists are making no progress toward Madrid, and the insurgents of Carthagena can apparently make no use of their stolen navy, which now seems getting too hot to hold.
