Cruelly Murdered

William Ashley Shot By His Aunt's Husband Thomas Connell.

Murderer Laid in Ambush Until His Victim Went to Work.

Crime the Result of Family Difficulty—Had Frequently Threatened.

William Ashley, a young man about 23 years of age, working for his aunt, Mrs. Connell, at her nursery on the Esquimalt road, was last evening shot and killed by Thomas Connell, his aunt's divorced husband.

The theory that Connell might have committed suicide arose from the fact that he said to Mrs. Connell during the day: "You had better make out your will, for when I go you will go."

Superintendent Hussey, of the provincial police, upon being notified, detailed Constable Murray to take charge of the case, he having associated with him Constable Campbell, of Esquimalt, and Constable Hosking, of the office staff.

Superintendent Hussey last night sent the following circular to all points in the province:

WANTED FOR MURDER. Thomas Connell, aged 50 years; height six feet one and a half inches; weight about 150 pounds; eyes blue; hair iron grey hair and moustache; red face; large prominent nose; large feet; a little weak in the knees; walks with a limp. Dressed in grey suit, check pattern, and light fedora hat. Military appearance; a pensioner of Her Majesty's government; heavy drinker. A suitable reward will be paid for such information as will lead to the arrest of Connell.

Monument and Fountain Unveiled by the Lieutenant Governor.

THOUGHTS AT BURNS' MONUMENT. Lone pilgrim! Should thy musings lead thee near, Suspend thy haste, and yield a gen'rous tear.

Under smiling skies and in the midst of a goodly gathering of interested spectators, the monument to the memory of Robert Burns—Scotland's bard—was unveiled yesterday afternoon in Beacon Hill park with fitting ceremony.

THE BURNS MEMORIAL. The ceremony, which commenced at 2:30 p.m., was in charge of a committee consisting of Messrs. Macdonald, M.P., president of St. Andrew's and Caledonian Society, John Rennie Maclean, K. H. Macdonald, J. H. Macdonald, Rev. Dr. Campbell, E. J. Smith, John C. 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Seeks Refuge In Death
Thomas Connell the Murderer of Will Ashley Hurls Himself.

After Trying to Frighten off an Officer He Attempts Suicide.

Thomas Connell, who on Monday evening shot and killed his nephew, William Ashley, at the Council nursery on Esquimalt road, lies in a cot at the Jubilee hospital at the point of death from the effects of a self-inflicted bullet wound. The wonder is that he did not die yesterday afternoon, doctors trying to save his life, but that he had survived long enough to attempt to frighten off an officer by throwing a revolver into the street.

It was about 9 o'clock yesterday morning when Connell shot himself. An ambulance came to the scene, and the police officers, with the exception of Provincial Constable Hoskins, who was left in charge of the search, were ordered to return to the scene from the hospital early in the morning.

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MR BOND HAS LARGE MAJORITY

His Party Have Carried Newfoundland with Exception of Four Seats.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 12.—Complete returns from the Bona Vista district in the colonial general election show that Messrs. Morice, Blandford and Chalmers (Heidito) have defeated Messrs. Cowan, Hutchins and Martin, Liberals, by an average majority of 880, as against 1,680, at the previous elections.

The Liberals are jubilant over this reduction, because Mr. Reid had exerted every influence to elect the Hon. Mr. Morice. Mr. Reid's son canvassed the district with Mr. Morice, and the contractor's name was a familiar one to members of the legislature.

St. George's district, Mr. Howly, Liberal, defeated Mr. Macdonald, Conservative, 683. It went in the last election to a Tory candidate.

Complete returns from the Burin district show that Messrs. Gear and Davy, Liberals, have secured a majority of 600 over Mr. Howly, Conservative, the Liberal. The district was won by the Tories at the previous election by a majority of 60.

In St. George's district, Mr. Way, Liberal, has defeated Mr. McQuish, Tory, securing a majority of 778. Mr. Bond carried the district in the bye-election last November by 113 votes.

Partial returns from the Placentia district promise the election of three Liberals. With these Mr. Bond, the premier, would have 24 supporters in the new house, and Mr. Morice, 17.
