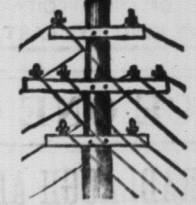

William Hendry last night arrested on a warrant Patrick Karna charged with assaulting his wife. A gang of Italians arrived here yesterday from Buffalo on route for Millbrook, where they will work on the C. P. R.

The Toronto women's medical college will be formally opened in October, of this year, when the lectures of the session will commence. The ferry John Harris, in charge of Capt. Dugald Taylor, leaves in a few days for the Spanish river, on the north shore of Georgian bay.

Permission has been granted to W. & P. Hynes for the erection of a one-story brick building at 222 Queen street west, C. C. P. R. Mat. Lamb was sliding down a fire escape from the court street last night, when the rope broke and Mat fell fifteen feet, bruising his side and leg.

Isabelle was repeated at Horticultural garden last night. It was well sung. The engagement closes with a matinee and evening performance. It is understood that Sir John Macdonald is to retire from the firm of Macdonald & Marsh, and that his place will be taken by James Bethune, Q. C.

During the trial of Hutchinson at the Police court yesterday, the witness brother salvatorians met in the witness room and offered up prayers in his behalf. County court chambers yesterday: Ham v. Phipps, order granted to produce documents into court. Mills v. Crews, appointment granted to put defendant out of possession.

Two men were brought down from St. Paul's ward to No. 2 station in an express wagon last night, both being very drunk. One had a box of watchmaker's tools in his possession. A young man named William Jones was fined out of a Yonge street saloon last night when drunk and noisy, only to find that the saloon was closed at a few moments afterwards as he was locked up at No. 1.

The mother came from England a few days ago and is utterly destitute. LICENSES ON THE ISLAND.

THREE OF AID. MILLICHAFF'S COM. MITTEE SEE THE COMMISSIONERS.

The Protest Against Mr. Ward's Motion Takes a Sudden Extension—The matter is to come before the City Council next week.

Ald. Millichauff's resolution at the last meeting of the city council for a deputation to bid to wait on the license commissioners to enter a protest against granting a liquor license to William Ward for his new hotel near the public baths at the island, was given effect yesterday evening. The committee named in Mr. Millichauff's resolution was Ald. Turner, Clarke, Moore, Carlyle and the mover. The first two named gentlemen did not turn up. When the deputation entered the board room in the Union block, Commissioner Doherty glanced quickly up and asked where the other two were, and wanted to know if they were "afraid to face the music." No one present, however, could account for the absence of Ald. Clarke and Turner. Ald. Clarke was the seconder of Ald. Millichauff's resolution.

Ald. Millichauff was the first to address the commissioners. He said that, as stated in the wording of the resolution, he firmly believed that the granting of a liquor license in such close proximity to these baths would be highly detrimental to their popularity, and would have a demoralizing effect on their surroundings. He believed that it was the unanimous wish of the council, and through that body of the citizens at large, that a license should be withheld from Mr. Ward. It was also the earnest wish of Mr. Wiman, the donor of these healthful public resorts, that those who visited them, more especially ladies and children, should not come in contact with the annoyances arising from persons under the influence of liquor, which could be procured so close at hand.

He hoped the commissioners in their wisdom would grant this request, which the speaker was sure was the wish of a large majority of Toronto people. He (Ald. Millichauff) had spoken to several people who were engaged in their own business themselves, and they also were opposed to the license asked for by Mr. Ward. Mr. Ogden, the chairman of the board, said he was at a loss to quite clearly understand the true meaning of Ald. Millichauff's resolution. If the sale of liquor was demoralizing on that particular part of the island, he did not see why it would not be demoralizing on other parts. He would like to know just how far the council would go in the matter of asking the abolition of licenses all over the island.

Ald. Millichauff replied that as far as he was concerned personally he had not previously made up his mind to ask the withholding of licenses from those who had them. He was, however, brought to that opinion by the fact that he had seen the city council, and he thought they could raise the cry of vested rights. (Commissioner Hamilton—There are no vested rights on the island.) However, he would go any length, and would do all in his power to stamp out the total sale of liquor on the island.

Mr. Ogden then asked the commissioners had been waited upon by hundreds of citizens with the same feelings as Ald. Millichauff's. But, as he said before, he would rather like to see or hear the real feeling of the city council on the question, as pertaining to the whole area of the island, and not of one individual part of it.
