THEir TOTAL EARNINGS.

Denny Higgins' My Fellow Won Upwards of \$20,000 on the Turf.

My Fellow, the racehorse who broke his neck at Washington last Saturday, never distinguished himself by winning any of the big ribbons of the turf, but few horses were better known to the racing public.

My Fellow was foaled in 1887, his sire being the famous Follow-up and his dam Directa.

Mr. C. Littlefield, Jr., purchased him at sale of yearlings in New York city for \$800. As a two-year-old My Fellow started five times, and though he did not earn brackets he showed his good quality by taking third place in the Red Bank stakes for two-year-olds at Monmouth in a large field.

As a three-year-old he won three races and was placed once in 15 starts, increasing his owner's bank account by \$4335. He started in the Realization Stakes, Salvador winning at odds of 25 to 1 and led his field from the fall of the flag to the head of the stretch.

He won the Spirit Stakes for 3-year-olds at odds of 12 to 1, the 1 1/4 miles in 2:10.5 and later beat the Dwyer crack, Longstreet, and a neck in a selling sweepstakes at a mile and an eighth in 1:52. Mr. Littlefield won over \$8000 in purses in 1890 before disposing of him to Mr. Higgins.

His new owner never had cause to regret his purchase. He won for him in purses during the summer and fall of 1891, and had for his record as a four-year-old fourteen wins and fifteen places in fifty-seven starts.

His best race that year, and perhaps the best one he ever ran, took place on July 24, when, with 96 up, he ran a mile in 1:40 flat, beating Major Domo, Loutnik, Orlifans and a number of other good ones.

In 1891, the year of his first appearance at the Woodbine he won six races, the Toronto cup was one of them, and was placed 11 times in 44 starts, winning \$4550 thereby.

In 1891 his owner trained him for steeplechase and hurdle events. In 27 starts he won 10 times and was placed twice, earning \$2470. He was not in the best condition when he ran at the Woodbine that year, being unplaced three times.

In 1892 he started 26 times, won four races and earned places 10 times, winning close to \$2500. In the last race in which he started he made his show for such good timber toppers as Pat Oakley and Futurity.

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HORSES GIVEN STIFF GALLOPS.

Trainers Take Advantage of the Beautiful Morning—Candidates Sent the Plate Distance.

Another beautiful morning gave trainers at Woodbine Park an opportunity to further preparations for the coming meeting. Full advantage was taken, and nearly all the horses were given stiff gallops, while the knowing ones stood with watches in hand ready to click whenever a horse "broke."

Among the interested spectators was Mr. Joseph Saegran, who watched the movements of the various candidates. The first horse to put in an appearance was his own, Joe Miller, accompanied by Bonnie Bull, going the Plate distance, which was covered a shade under a two minute gait.

Victorious, in the same stable, was sent the same distance in 2:19, while Saragossa, in company with Miraphes, covered the distance in 2:19, with Morpheus beaten off. Stenstrom was also worked the same distance, which he accomplished in 2:30.1.2. The other Queen's Plate representative in the Saegran stable was sent a mile in 1:52 all out.

Charlie Wise sent Reckless, or better known as the brother to Kingston, a mile in 1:52, being accompanied by Wacker. Baronet was breezed three-quarters in 1:24, while Rom traversed a mile at a 2-minute gait. No other work of importance was done, trainers being contented to subject their charges to moderate exercise.

Three Serious Charges Laid—The Defense a Sordid One.

ROME, May 2.—The trial of the directors and officials of the Banca Romana began to-day. The defendants are jointly indicted on charges of embezzlement to the amount of 60,784,879 lire, for permitting a cash deficit of 29,000,000 lire and for allowing the bank to issue notes to the amount of 41,000,000 lire.

Consent promised to submit documents in support of the defence and to accept the terms of the agreement. The Government in its endeavor to assist the bank has been successful in securing an increase in Italian notes in foreign markets. WASHINGTON, May 2.—Commissioner of Labor Carroll D. Wright has submitted his annual report dealing with building and loan associations in the United States.

The total net assets are \$450,067,504. The average value of shares is \$34 and the total profits \$80,064,116. The number of homes acquired through the associations is 314,753. The average age of the associations is a little over six years.

### BI-METALLISTS IN CONFERENCE.

A Large Gathering of Financiers in London—Rehabilitation of Silver Recommended as a Monetary Safeguard.

LONDON, May 2.—The international bi-metallic conference was formerly opened in the Mansion House to-day.

The opening address was delivered by ex-Lord Mayor Sir David Evans, who presided.

A large number of delegates were present, including some of the best known British and foreign financiers.

Among them were: Sir William Houston, M.P.; Right Hon. W. Liddell, M.P., governor of the Bank of England; David Barbour, ex-secretary of the India Council; Right Hon. Henry Chaplin, M.P.; Samuel Montagu, M.P.; Brooks Adams of Boston, Mass.; Mr. Vanderberg, President of the Netherlands; G. M. Boisvivant of Amsterdam; Alphonse Allard of Brussels; George DeLarocque of Brussels; Henry Ceruzzi of Paris; President of the French Bi-metallic League; David Murray, President of the Chamber of Commerce of Adelaide; South Australia; and President of the South Australia Bi-metallic League; Hugh M. Matheson, M.P.; Sir John Lubbock, M.P.; Sir John Lubbock, M.P.; Sir John Lubbock, M.P.

Letters were read from Archbishop Walsh of Dublin and the President of the Bank of France, regretting their inability to be present.

Prof. Shield Nicholson read a paper of the general level of prices in relation to the appreciation of gold and the divergence in the relative value of gold and silver.

During the discussion which followed the reading of Prof. Nicholson's paper, Dr. A. Heald, a member of the Prussian Diet, declared that bi-metallic was making progress in Germany, and he thought that if any international conference was held now it would have very different results from the Brussels conference.

The features of the conference was the speech of Mr. Balfour.

He said that many who were suspicious of the double standard and bi-metallic system now recognize in view of great impending dangers that the best safeguard is to rehabilitate silver as one of the great instruments of the monetary transactions of the world.

It was absolutely necessary that the monetary functions of silver should be restored if business was to be carried on upon a solid basis.

The difficulties of an international agreement, were merely as to the details, and if any question should be settled by an international agreement, such a one should be so settled.

Mr. Balfour said there were three questions with which bi-metallicists had to cope. They were: Was a double standard possible? Was it just? Was it expedient? He said that the answer to these questions was an overwhelming "Yes."

He would not say whether the closing of the Indian mints was a wise step, but he did not doubt it was the most stringent attempt a civilized government had ever made to solve a monetary difficulty that was directly in front of it.

Mr. Balfour said he saw signs of a change in English opinion. The leading commercial men had abandoned their former hostility to bi-metallic and come to the conclusion that the only way to meet the grave danger was to restore silver to its former place as a circulating medium.

Right Hon. Leonard H. Courtney said a treaty between gold and silver under an international bi-metallic agreement and discussion on the paper followed.

A letter was read from H. W. Cannon, President of the Chase National Bank of New York, in which the writer said that the solution of the problem of bi-metallic rests with Great Britain.

The object of the Bi-metallic League is to urge upon the British Government the necessity of co-operating with other leading nations for the establishment of the free coinage of gold and silver at a fixed ratio.

### STREET SPRINKLING.

An Order from the Toronto Railway Company to sprinkle the Railway Allowances.

The Board of Works will meet this morning at 11 o'clock to consider the following letter received by Chairman Lamb from Mr. McKenzie, president of the Street Railway Company:

"The Toronto Railway Company will be willing to enter into a contract for street sprinkling with the city, to sprinkle the track—allowances—viz., 40 miles of the route of streets, four times per day, for 65 cents per mile of street per day, water to be furnished by the city free of charge and the company not to pay any percentage to the city on this account. In doing the work for this price it is understood that the whole of the tracks will be done. We would be willing to do some sections oftener and some less number of times at a proportionate rate, as may be directed by the City Engineer."

The Street Commissioner approves of the offer, as it will allow him more cars at his disposal and he will be able to give more attention to the residential streets.

It will cost about \$9000 Per Annum. If the offer is accepted the city will pay the company about \$2000 for the season.

### MR. GLADSTONE AS A FINANCIER.

He Was Always Governed by a Scrupulous, Old-Fashioned Sense of Honor.

A stately figure has left the political arena since the last number of this Review appeared. It is already while yet he lives, his apotheosis has begun. The man who but the other day refused him now as "a great man" even the Times writes, the most spiteful and raucous political sheet in the three kingdoms, except perhaps its instigator, the Scotsman, now mourns only over his later career. In a few years or months, it and its kind will be quoting his utterances as words of golden wisdom compared with those of their own political sages. Degrading, roving, vicious, the spectacle—viewed close—of political strife always, and we want none of it in these pages. To us, all too frequently, politicians of all hues seem mostly on the side of the devil in human affairs. They are a race, not a sect, not a class, but what they think their polling-book supporters will esteem true. Such has become the law of "popular" government—a savage war of self-interest for the most part, whose ultimate result no man can forecast.

It is not as a politician, then, that we note the departure of Mr. Gladstone from the office of Prime Minister and from public life—a politician, however, as a political and social economist. The present generation has forgotten most of his life's work, but his political sagacity owes to his labors, and we can but briefly recall the past here. In doing so one general observation may be made: Gladstone is never found among the "unscrupulous" of the Stock Exchange; no limited liability company ever got him to be a director.

A single financier ever conjure with his prestige because of any selfish interest he might have in view. Mr. Gladstone's very method of mind and conduct in this and other respects was doubtless a source of weakness to him in practical affairs, and for one thing he never failed to see that.
