THEY BUNCOED THE "RABBI"

WHEN THE VALUE WAS OPENED A DEAD CAT WAS FOUND AND THE TWO VICTIMS PROMPTLY FATED—ONE IS STILL IN HOSPITAL OVER THE LOSS OF HIS THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS.

New York, Nov. 21.—Any one who thinks that the exposure made through the Lexow Committee have put an end to the "green goods" business in New York can obtain information to the contrary by applying to Lawyer William Travers Jerome, who has as clients two investors in "green goods," who when they found they had been swindled fell over together in a fit.

Doctors revived them with much trouble, but the man with the weaker constitution is still in hospital in a hospital ward watched by a nurse at \$5 a day. The other fellow is wandering about the city trying to buy a cheap pedestrian cap covering the country between New York and Buffalo, the place from which he hails.

The worst of it is that the responsible member of the "green goods" acquiring expedition is a Hebrew rabbi. His companion is the leading member of his flock. The rabbi received a "green goods" circular, and he confided its contents to his friend who furnished a capital of \$300, the rabbi agreeing to provide the party with the brains necessary to carry out the scheme. So the rabbi seems to be ahead in the deal.

Armed with the name and telegraphic address of the alleged dealer in counterfeit money, three detectives followed them and left the sunny meadows of their native Buffalo and came to Canal-street. Since Mr. Lexow began to be inquisitive in this vicinity the "green goods" business has been on the wane, and bundles of paper wrapped around bricks can be had at lower rates than ever before. In fact, a countryman can buy three cents' worth of Dominion notes and a cent's worth of newspapers, packed securely in a 90c. value, for as low as \$100. That is the way the "green goods" King McNally, head of the trust, has been disconcerted and is not in charge of the monopoly.

Got a Valise. The rabbi and his partner met the "green goods" men, and for \$500 got a valise, said to contain counterfeit money to the amount of \$3000. But the swindlers so scared the rabbi that he didn't know whether he was standing on his heels or his head.

"We are watched," said they "so let us desecrate. If the train on which you sail is stopped and troops or policemen surround it, throw the valise containing the wealth out of the window. Then the police will talk. On arriving at a telegraph office wire us the particulars and I will telegraph you back your \$500."

"Hit!" exclaimed the rabbi, mysteriously. "We understand." Then all mysteriously winked at one another, and the devil's plot was consummated.

Suddenly a man at the window of the boat at which the valise was thrown yelled, "There's Superintendent Byrnes across the street, talking to the chief detective of the Jersey Office. The other nine policemen loomed up in the offing. Let us see!"
