PREACHING OF JOHN THE BAPTIST. [JAN. 21. Luke 3. 1-17.

GOLDEN TEXT.-Prepare ye the way of the Lord.-Luke 3. 4.

MEMORY VERSES, 3.6.—And he came into all the country about Jordan, preaching the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins.

- 7. Why did he do this? To set us a good example.

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
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When a holy voice is sent Saying to our hearts, "Repent," Jesus, Saviour, take us in Save thy little flock from sin.
