1884 and then effected a compromise at 75 cents in the dollar. Since that he has been very poor and his business has gradually dwindled away until his present assignment became unavoidable.

Stnong parties of Momnted Police are in active pursuit of parties of Indians, supposed to be Bloods, who recently fired on Mounted Police scouts, at Cypress, and on freighters forty miles south-cast of Lethbridge. The offenders are supposed to be horse thieves from across the line.
'I'us laborers of St. Thomas who recently demanded 18 cents an hour decided at a mecting held for the purpose to accept 17 cents per hour, which is two cents per hour more than last year. As the men only work nine hours however, the wages are about the same per day as last year.

Tue Department of Marine has been advised that the work of locating the lightships in the Gulf will be completed in a fow days. The work is being performed by the two Government steamers. The lightships could not be placed last week owing to the large quantity of ice floating down the river.

A sumben of leading business men met at the Eerby LIouse parlors, Brantford, and presented Mr. W. Roberts, late manager of the Bank of Commerce there, with au elegant gold watch, a purse, containing $\$ 300$, and an illuminated address, as a mark of the regard
in which he was held by the patrons of the bank.
The Free Press kays Wm. R. Elliott, of Wingham, is reported to have taken a sudden trip to the States, nud the bailiff is now in possession of his store. He effected a composition last September at 40 cents, but could not make it pay. The creditors are secured by his brother and a farmer near Wingham.
'Tus City Council of Toronto at a special mecting passed a resolution to the effect that a by-law be submitted for the issuc of debentures to the extent of $\$ 100,000$, towards the cost of the harbor improvernent works, the Dominion Government having agreed, if this were done, to complete aud maintain the works.
Tres council of the Board of Irade has been notified that the recommendation of Capt. J. $G$. Shaw to the office of port wardenship of Montreal has been acted upon by the governor-in-council, which made the appointment at the last meeting of the Calinet. Capt. G. W. Morrison las been appointed deputy port warden.

The delegates from the Mranitoba Central road, who visited St. Paul in comnection with bringing the Northern Pacific to the boundary, say that by the arragements made that point will be reached by October 1st. If the Provincial Government will indemnify the company against any interference, the work
of construction will be proceeded with immedintely.

The rise in the price of rough lumber at Vancouver, including building, bridge, wharf and strect planke, up to the $17 \mathrm{~h}_{\mathrm{h}}$ inst., according to the News, is 25 per cent. The advance on dressed, flooring, rustic and double-dressed finishing lumber ranges from 5 to 10 per ceut. Shingles and laths are 10 per cent higher.

Clement lenrinaune, general storekecper, of Contrecaur, 'Que., lins assigned. He bought the stock of Duhamel \& Gervain about two years ago, paying $\$ 2,250$ for it, $\$ 2,000$ down, but being a farmer, with no trade experience, has naturally been unsuccessful as a storckeeper in a place where much of the business is necessarily done on credit.
The largest individual transaction in ingot copper on record is that made by the Calumet and Heckla Mining company. It involves between $25,000,000$ and $30,000,000$, pounds, with deliveries rumning from May 1 to December 1. The price is 10 cents per pound, and the transaction will therefore reach $\$ 2,500,000$ to $\$ 3,000,000$ in value.
Tres Grand Trunk railway company is building a number of combinatien cars to be run through between Montreal and Chicago, in which the heater, instead of being placed at one end, is located midway between the ends of the car, where it is cxpected to be

Building operations ure consequeatly on the increase, and the present summer cannot fail to witnoss a large addition to the number of dwellings suitable for persons of moderate or small incomes.

THE IRON 'IARIFP.
Our recent articlo on the proposed increase in the tarifl on pig iron, has naturally excited considerablo attention throughoul the comntry and has provoked, as might have been expected, some lostile criticism from those whose interests it mighti be sujprosed to contravene. Usually' this criticism has been moderate, in tone and writien in the same calm and judicial shatu hat we have endeavored to preserve jut our own articles on the subject, the only
exception is one gentleman, who publishes an attack upon our views in the correspondence column of a morning coutemporary, aud who appears to have lost his temper as well as his grip of the facts upon which he bases his arguments. It is not the custom for one paper to take any notice of correspondence appearing in a contemporary, but as this lettor in particular bears traces of a professional pen, we venture to draw attention to one or two points where we believe the writer, in his desire to prove his ease, has somewhat outstripped the facts on which he bases his attack.
For instance, he ridicules, in somewhat ungentle fashion, the suspicion that some of the scrap iron might really be of the nature of piry iron, but imported in this shape to avoid the tarifl rate of $\$ 2$ per ton, and then goes on to make the extraordinary assertion that it would cost from $\$ 10$ to $\$ 12$ per ton to cast the iron in irrogular shape and break it under the hammer. Where he obtained these figures from it is dificult to say, for none of the experts to whom this question has been put, come any where near such an amount, and one even placed the additional cost as low as 50 cents per ton, which would leave a margin of $\$ 1.50$ per ton. We acknowledge that most of the gentlemen consulted regarded the re-melting of the pig a necessity which the the present rate of du1y would render it unprofitable, but should the tariff be raised to any thing near the United States fignres, what is to hinder any enterprising founder from taking advantage of this anomalons condition of aflairs? That we are not alone in this suspicion, is proved by the accompanying extract from the very jommal in which his letter was published, in which it is stated editorially, that:-"As we understand it, the makers "of iron do not so much object to the free "importation of what may legitimately be "iermed scrap iron, but to the practice "of importing under that guse iron that "comes into direct competition with pig, " iud is really of the character of the latter "in diflerent and irregular shape."
The petty orror of substituting the word tons for cwis. in the statisties given, was merely a mistake of the proof-reader and doos not invalidate tho argument in any way. Whether the amount imported was 203,000 tons, or 203,000 pounds, or 203,000 ciwts, the comparison holds good, and consequently the redundaney of adjectives with which he seizes upon what he must have known was merely a petty error in the correction of the proof which, in so far as it aflected the hine of argment was absolutely immaterial, is allogether misplaced. Tho point at issue is really this. Does serap iron take the place of pig iron and thereby decrease the demand and consumption of it? And, is it an absolute necessity to usp it? Or is there any grade
of Canadian iron that can take its place? The existing duty on pig iron amounts io 82 per ton, and the scale of protective duties imposed for the protection of manufacturers using this material in their various industries is based upon this figure. It is evident then that if a mannfacturer can use, say half pig irou and half scrap iron, he only pays in reality, a daty of $\$ 1$ per ton, inasmuch as hall the ton of iron used is imported duty free, consequently he derives 50 per cent more advantage from the scale of protective duties than the original framers of the tariffintended, inasmuch as they based their calculations on an initial duty of $\$ 2$ per ton. Necessarily he obtains this amount of advantage over his neighbor, who may be compelled to use all pig iron.
Much of the serap iron now imporied consists of old shells and railway chairs. These shells have usually been made of the hest pig iron, and in some instances, even of charcoal iron. Is it fair then to admit these duty free and at the same time impose a duty of $\$ 2$ per ton on pig iron? If our iron industries are really to lee protected, should not an equivalent duty be placed on what may fairly be called an altornative prodnct with pig iron?
The statement that the use of scrap iron is absolutely necessary is, we are informed on high authority, both misleading and incorrect. There is no dillicalty in obtaining Canadian iron for any purpose, as it is made in every grade, and, wero a dnty phaced upon scrap iron, no doubt this Cauadian iron would be used instead, as it is now by all high class foumders. We are assured that if the founders who now purchase cheap. Scotch pig iron and harden it with duty-free scrap, were to abandon his practice, there would be fewer finc castings imported from the United States. At present no high-class founders make at practice of using scrap, as they do not care to use an iron whose character they do not know, and consequently the cesssation of its use would tend to improve the character of Caenalian castings and would improve the prospects of Canadian iron.
This is really the point at issue and although we admit that there is much to be said upon either side, if we really mean to protect our iron industries, sone steps to remove the existing anomaly must be taken ere long. It is admitted that this conntry cannot produce the serap iron used at prosent, and that a certain amome of this material may be a necessity for some description of castings, but as the tariff at present stands its admission freo must always militate against the production of Canadian iron and the advancement of home iron industries, and consequently a government pledged to a policy of fostering lomestic manufactures camnot readily overlook it; No donlth any chango in this
direction would be opposed to the interests of fomders, who have based their seale of prices upon the prescnt duties, but it is of great importance that the present stream of British capital which is now pouring in to build up the iron industries of the Southern States, should bo diverted towards our shores, aud that call never tako place until we have inereased and real prolection for Canadian furnaces.
We have in this case to guide us, tho action of the American govermnent, which has hitherlo admitted scrap iron, originally made on Ahticricifit" soil, duly free, but finding that it interfered with the demand for pig iron, has reimposed the pigg iron daty upon what is really an alternative product. Of course it must be understood ${ }^{-}$ that the government will tako no steps that may tend to injure our infint manufacturing industries, already weighted as they are by the attive competition of other commtries and that it will always bear their interests in mind in any revision of the tarifl, but the anomaly we have just drawn attention to, will nol, we believe, injure them by its removal, and as it will advance the prosperity of tu equally important Canadian industry, withont doing so at their expense, it may fitirly be considered as a legitimate expression of the present protective policy.

## 'LHE FLOOD QUESTION.

That the people of Montreal are at lengh fally alive to the necessity of immediately adopting some meanis of preventing the recurrence of the two suceessive disustrous inundations of 1886 and 1837 was shown by the representative meeting ledd at the Ifechanies' Hull last Friday. Alhough the meeting was called by merely personal invitation, the attendance comprised a large portion of our most enterprising and successful citizens. Sir D. A. Smith presided, aud Mr. James Coristine acted as secretary. A series of resolutions, prepared before hand by practical men, were proposed, embodying the sense of the citizens concerning the great losses sulfered by the mereantile, manufieturing and labor interests of Montreal through the periolic overflow of the river-the hindrance to tralfic by which other centres reaped the benefit from our disststers; the suspenision of manufacturing oproations through the submersion of machinery and the inability of the masses of the wage earners to leave their partially inumdated homes; and the injurious eflect upon the health of the people. A recommendation was included calling for a general meeting of the cilizens to be held shortly to discuss ways and means to provide against future visitations. From the umanimity with which the resolutions in the main were received, it was ovident that the meeting
was vigoronsly in carnest and rather concerned about making a start than in studying low and in what manner the work was to be done and paid for. All wero alive to the present great necessity of providing somo remedy for the evil; the losses entailed were so heavy that the great question of the hour was to take netion withont delay in order not to be eaught murepared another season; the losses of a single overflow would more than pay the interest of any sum reguired to haild the necessary walls or embankments. The resolutions provided for the "pyoniment of a commillee to take steps for carrying ont the objeat of the meeting.

It was evidemt that many of thoso present were not aware of any ohler steps being taken for the same purpose. Intelligenco was convered that the Comeil of the Board of 'Trade was moving in the matter and that a depatation from the City Conncil was also aboul to visil Ottana on the subjeet. Mr. (ieo. A. Drummond, president of the Boart of 'Irate, suggested in viow of these facts, that the commille apminted endeavor rather to co-operate with the other movements than to proved indenomently in the mater, and as the Comencil of the Board of 'Irate would hold a $\begin{aligned} \\ \text { precial meeting on Mondaly, that the }\end{aligned}$ eommittee should meet them for the purjuse.

The committe appinted a year tho by the government to report on the Muntreal Hoods was subjeeted to some hmmorons criticism by Senator Thibandean and Geo. W. Stephens. That commited had been allowed \$10,000, and "there was nothing to show for il." Mr. Stephens satid committees of the kiad matally sat, as long as the money lasted. What they wated now was promptation that would prevent another foow next spring. 'The legishature at gucher, which would sit only a lew dayes longer, should be asked fur a special amembent to the city charter to emable thent to borrow money if necessary, to hohb an embankment or dyke atong the river fiom. 'The sense of the meeting was in lator of assistance from the government. Tho raising or rebuilding of the revelment wall :and making it of a width at top to provide wharfage hesides spate for malway tratiks in winter as well ats in smmmer, with ramps leading to the neighboring streats would ippear to le the phan most generally receiveci, and it is probable that the recommendation of the committee of engineers of 1 ast will assume this form.

Tho various aspects of the case have doubntess heen presented to the gentemen of the longesitting committee. Everyone is not aware how poroas is the soil beneath Whe streets and houses of the thooded distriet. So great is this porosily that during the recent hood, several hours pumping with corporation fire- engines
produced bat little visiblo effect upon basements along the margin of the overlow. Where the space was small enough to be affected, the water roturned therein to the outside or river level, although saveral blocks distant, in a fraction of an hour after pumping was discontinued. It disappeared according and as rapidly as the flood in the river subsided. Had this taken place only on a level with and where the drain or sewer pipe service comected with the premises, a remedy for basements above that level were simple enough ; bit the fact is otherwise,-the water rises in cellars and basements laving solid stone walls and cement or mortar fomdations little less rapidly than it dons along the open streel or in basements into which it may flow through the windows from the strect. It will doubtless be decmed necessary to build the embankment or wall as water-tight as possible on an equally secure foundation, as well as to keep the sewers fairly free by pumping over the revetment wall or extending the main conduits to empty below St. Mary's current.
Mach importance appears to be athached to the removal of the old long wharf at St. Lamberl's and the islets and shoals in the vicinity in orter to allow of a portion of the down-coming iee to escape sotuth of St. Helen's island. Many hold the opinion hhat the dredgings deposited hast year or two some littlo distance down the river have contributed largely to the flood danger, even with the remembrance of thoods at irrogular intervals for two generations batk - belore any attempt was made to build wharves or otherwise affect the chamel-and these strongly contend that the city should not bear all the expense of providing against the overflow. In view of the delapidated condition of the revetment wall the government will be expected to render some assistance, should the work assume the shape outlined. It is to be hoped that any over zeal may not "rive us to " o'erleap the saddle." We had betler get the "maderwater camal" hrough hake St. leter completed to the 27 feet depth before pressing for the assumption of the cost of that howe ver strictly mational undertaking. This the Govermment camool fail to do in good time, and the influential Harbor men, those of them who are working harder and more effectively for ont interests than they conld, perhaps, if they were in Parliament, may be trusted in this matter to know what they are abont.

As it is almost inpossible for any man or boily of men to nssist in promoting any great mblic henefit such as that proposed without boing suspected of and charged with having axes to grind, it is to be hoped that citi\%ens will look upon the presont needed work, whatever shupe it
assume, from a broader point of view and let no obstacles, social or legal, interfere with its prompt prosecution. Had the proposals made during last year received even slight encouragement, the city had probably escaped the calamity of the last fortnight. Is it a matter to be very greatly regretted that a man who honorably undertakes and completes some great national or public work has been able to make $a$ handsome profit thereby? At all events let us see to it, before it is again too late, that eflective measures be taken to prevent the possibility of another cry over spilt milk-in the spring of 1888.

## RADHVAYS AND CANALS.

The amual report of the Minister of Railways and Canals discloses less features of general interest than was usual before the completion of the Canarlian Pacifie Railway. It shows that the present length of the railways owned and operated by the Government amounts to 1,190 miles, of which 978 belong to the Intercolonial Railway system, and 212 to the Prince Edward Island Railway.
The working of these roads cau hardly be considered satisfactory, and have entailed upon the conntry a net loss of $\$ 190$,(izis during the year. On the Intercolonial there is a net loss of $\$ 106,042$, on the eastern extension a loss of $\$ 27,862$, the Prince Ed ward Island shows a loss of $\$ 61,150$, and the only line showing the least profit is the Windsor branch, which has relieved the prevailing monotony of deficits by showing a surplus of $\$ 4,425$. But it must be remembered, as an offset to all these shortages, that a sum of $\$ 115,000$ has -heen charged against the earnings of the Intercolonial this year for improvements such as are usually charged to capital account, and which represent works outside of those necessary for maintenance and renewal. Were this sum transferred to capital account, the year's carmings would show a prolit of $\stackrel{\beta}{3}, 15 \mathrm{~s}$, but doubtless the Government considered that the present capital account was already sulficiently large, and therefore preferred to charge it with the year's expenses.
The coal transported during the year shows a considerable increase, as 165,791 tons were carried, or 52,893 tons more than in the preceding twelve months. In fact the incroasing ontput from the mines now taxes the road's resources to the utmost, and a larger nomber of coal cars is necessary to handle this class of freight satisfactorily. This shows a gratifying amount of activity at the mines, but unfortunately is not of much service to the railway, as the low rate of freight fixed by the Government in order to develop the resources of the Lower Provinces, not only precludes any idea of profit to the road, but even
causes at times an actual loss. Still the gross earnings of the Interco.onial have doubled during the past decade; the amount of freight carried is one and a half times as great, and the number of passengers is larger by one-third.
So far as the important question of canal enlargement is concerned, the report is not nearly so satisfactory. Although it is now acknowledged that the proper depth of these important methods of communication should be fourteen feet, the Welland is the only one that will be ready for uavigation at this depth at the opening of the season. None of the others are tonched, and although the Lachine Canal is equipped with locks, bridges and culverts adapted for this depth, the actual depth of the caual is only twelve feet. In the Cornwall Canal a still less promising condition of affairs is visible, as ten and a half miles out of the eleven and at half comprising the canal will only permit of nine foot mavigation. The Beauharnois, Williamsiuny and Galops cauals have not been touched during tho year, and consequently the much talked-of enlargement of our canal accommodation to the uniform depth of fourteen feot is confined at present to the Welland only.
This is not satisfactory, aud all tends to indicate a cortain amount of neglect of our important water-ways during the past year. Thanks to the energetic action of the mercantile community and the vigorous altitude of the press, the Government's attention has been finally roused to the importance of increasing our facilities for transportation in order to meet the severe competition of American water-ways, and a kind of half-hearted promise has been given to the effect that some action will shortly be taken in the matter of increasing their navigable dopth as well as in the permanent reduction of the existing tolls. But it is hardly likely in the existing condition of Government finances that any expenditure will be entered upon which can by any means be avoided or postponed, and consequently we cannot look for any steps in the direction of increased navigation facilities during the coming. year unless some unusual pressure be put upon the Cabinet.

## NaturaL gas.

Although comparatively unnoticed until of recent years, natural gas has of late made such gigantic strides in its application to industrial purposes that its discovery, even, within miles of any city, is now considered tantamount to making that fortunate locality an industrial centre. Probably but fow of our business men have suspected that Montreal might come to enjoy such an advantage as the abundant supply of a natural and easily applicable fuel, and conseynently the anomucement that na-
tural gas has been struck within a few miles of the centre of this busy city will be received with some amount of pardonable incredulity.

It is only a few months since the engineer of what is now "The Combustibie Gas Company," first discovered traces at Lougue l'ointe, on Monireal Islani, which encouraged him to commence drilling for gas in that neighborhood. The well, which is being drilled by Pittsburgh experts, is now down some fifteen hundred feet and, when emptied of its water, already shows a pressure of gas estimated at 40lbs. When the gas bed is reached, a far greater pressure is reasonably expected as the present supply of gas is merely that which has filtored through the strata and forced its way up a tube containing between fourteen and fifteen hundred feet of water. Another and still more promising well is being drilled by the same company at Louisville, Quebec, and within a few weeks some interesting developments are mobable.

Natural gas, like petroleum, appears to have been known for hundreds of years before any attempt to convert it to practical uses was attempted. The ninth edition of the Encyelopedia Britamica, (that issued complete by Charles Soribner's Sons, of New York,) states that this gats was first used for illuminating purposes at the town of Srechnen, in China, and subsequently at Marmaro, in Hongary. On this continent, the first discovery was made at Findlay, in Ohio on an October evening in 1S36. A well was being sunk for water when a sudden rush of gas became ignited from one of the lights and continued to burn for about three months. Jhe first use of this gas was made two years later, when Mr. Daniel Foster conducted the gas into his house by means of wooden tubes and burned it there from an old gun barrel. This fire has, it may be said, burned continuously to the present time. In 1872 attention was again directed to the enormous supply of natural gas ruming to Waste, but it was not until five years ago that some drillers in Pennsylvania, boring for oil, struck the enormous MuGugin well of gas which blazed for months skyward, and furnished a novel centre of attraction to excursion parties who never dreamed that, a fow years later, these apparently useless gas wells would revolutionize the fuel question.

We may say 1884, was the first year in which the fact that this apparently inexhaustible supply of naiural gas might be valuable as a source of light and fuel first dawned upon the manufacturing community but, when once the idea struck root, it was not long before it developed into that natural gas "craze" which took possession of the Pittsburg region for many months and is still raging in Ohio and

Indiana. The rpring and summer of 1854 wituessed a rush to drill wells and lay pipe lines that made conservative people hold their breaths, and from that time to the present moment, natural gas has become one of the greatest factors in deciding the industrial fate of cities, and has consequently been eagerly and pertinaciously sought by capitalists and manafacturers.

One fact is very encouraging for the wells now being drilled in this vicinity, and that is, that the geological formation is similar to that obtaining in the Findlay dield, namely, limestone of Lower Silurian age. The discovery of the gas producing strata at lindlay was a genuine surprise both to the geologist and the oil borer. It is the first instance, we believe, of large stocks of oil and gas existing in limestones of the Lower Silurian age and at the bottom of that great division of geological time, and the additional fact that the face of the gas bearing country is approximately level and shows but litule ontward signs of disturbance, is another unusual oceurrence. Both of these conditions are mexpected and tend to show that the theories already formed upon this subject are mot always applicable.

If the well at lougue lointo justifies the anticipations of its projectors, the benefit to Montreal will be very grat and will extend to every hranch of her very extensive and varied mannfacturing industries. the possession of a cheap and cleanly fuel and illomimant, within atainable distance, will be a factor in her development whose importance it is impossible to decry. With her present position at the head of ocean mavigation to aid lier, with large and increasing railroad atcommodation to extend her freight facilities, it only needs the discovery of matural gas to enable her manufacturers tocompele successfully with their most favored rivals. The news seems to be almost too good to be true, and its practical confirmation will be looked for with great interest, but ir the future justifies present anticipations it is impossible to overrate the importance of the undertaking or the benefit that will accrue.

## THE MARITHME BANK.

The meeting of the shareholders of the defunct Maritime Bank, held on Wednesday last, to receive the report of the provisional liquidator, disclosed a condition of affairs much worse than was at first imagined. The books of the concern have been examined and reported on by an oflicial auditor, Mr. John 'J. J'. Knight, of the Merchants Jank of Halifax, with the result that now, for the first time, those who placed their confidence in the bank can form a true idea of its standing.

In the sworn statement of February the 2Sth last, the totill liabilities vere placed at
\$1,409,482, and the assots showed a surplus of $\mathrm{s} 16,501$; but if this statement be correct the liabilities must have increased at a most alarming rate, for a weok later, according to the report of the export, they amomed to $2,142,355$, besides 865,000 worth of exchange bearing the bank's encorsation.

Thle assets on the other hand have diminished with equal rapidity. The alleged loan of spot,000 to the frovincial Govermment, which figured as an assel, is wiper out hy a comptra afepont, which makes the bank debtor wolle extent of Sin, ofo more. Over a million dollars is represented by orerdrawn accomats, bills discomoded and hypothecated, and collateral secarities alse hypothecated. Of the overhawn acemonts which figure for some000 in the assets, su0, 000 belonges to bankruph estates, and in every othor case there is a similar propertion of worthless paper liguring as langible assets. Of the locat bills receivable, the ambitor elasses sibit,
 for R. \& J. Stewat and Guy levand Co.'s exthange, may to fairly wijed off at one as worthless. Thase two firms appear to have sucked the bank fitrly dry, and it is evident that Mr. Robert. A. Stewat, who rombeted the business of lowh tirms, was far more than a mateh, linameially, for the president of the bank, who appears to have helieved and trusted in him to the very lass.

Ahomg the ereditors the iargest daim is that made by the bumb of Montreat, which ealls fors sith, ste. The confession, for so it may latry be called, of Mr. Meldeltan in his adress to the shatelolders is most pathetie reading. Although no impulation of any sort can be anst upon his integrity, it appours evident that he was absumtely unlited for a hanker. His blind contidence in others, and carelessness of the tirst principles of hamking, have lod to the downfall of the very institution ho labored so hard to haid up, and minfortunately the ruin for which ho confesses his responsibility falls not upon himself alone but upon other and imnoeent shonklers far less able to bear it.

If the failure of the Maritime Bank proves nolhing else, it shows that amatew bankers are a mistake, and it will, we hope, finally explode the common theory that it is an easy matler to manage a bank. What the final result of the liquidation will be it appears impossible to predict, but it is evident that if the assets pay the noleholders :and the Government claims, it is all they will do, and that the rest of the liabilitios must be met by recourse to the double liability of the shareholders, a fact which may mean poverty to many and ruin to some.

## DRESS FABRICS.

Very few prettier labries are in the market this year, from an artistic point of view: han the new French sateens, with thair close, firm twills and smooth, glossy surfaces. They look more than ever like satin foubards, and their delicatoly tinted patterns are really works of art. 'They bid fair to be favorites for morning woar, and for eveniang wear will be much used for backgrounds to lace and other trausparent tissues.
The \%ephyrs, ginghams, and chambrays brought out this season are much beyond the averago. The fulted striped ginghams shown are especially noticeable, as they have the designs woven so elosely resembling the silk and wool stripes of last summer, that it is dificult to realize that they are only cottons, while in leataty of colorims and novelty of combination they far exteed the fabrics on which they are modelled. 'the solid colored chambrays and ginghans come in all tho new shates of pink, heliotrope, and corn-color, and will be used incombination with etamines, grenadines and other fabries of that class, while the embroidered patierns to mateh come in varions widhts of flouncing. It scems abundanly evident that cotons and washing fabries will be much worn during the coming season, and overy eflort has been directed to render them more durable in coloring. Unfortumately, up to the present more than half lose their beaty ufter washing, but with care this is mot so important, and many, even of the most delicate tints, will ondure for months withont any reconse to the laundress.

In light-weight woollens the now white Wool, camel's hair, albatross and imperial serge will be much used, trimmed with heary watered ribbon in rows upon the overdress. A new sample dross has the wool fibrice kilted on one side of the skirt, the kilts trimmed with the moire ribbon. On the other side is a finely plaited panel banded auross with the ribbons run through a slide and tied in bows with loose ends. On the corsage the ribbons are tied to imitate a l'ompulour waist, crossing each other at right angles. 'This style is applic-
able to all white wool goods of which numberless new styles are shown, crossed with fine lines of golden brown, blue pistachio, black, cardinal, heliotrope, terra cotta or the new copper color. These goods make up beautifully with velvet or silk, and seem to command a large share of attention from the beiter class trade.

It really seems as if, in spite of all the recent modifications, the reign of the tailormade gown was drawing to a close. Ladies complain of their weight and that they are far too heavy for summer wear, and there seem to be indications that fashion is turning once more toward silks. It seems certain that, this year, silks will be more worn and that the wheel of fashion is turning slowly bat surely in favor of the lighter textures. Even the beautiful lirench serge backgrounds, with velvet eflects, in combination with plain lironch serges to matel, do not seem to draw altention from the silk counters.
Of course the Queen's Jubilee has been lumed to accomet, and Jubilee serges are among the novellies shown, both in silk and wool, by the leading English houses. The wool serge is beautifully soft in texture and drapes like a fine caslmere, while the silk serge is of pure silk, does not crease, and (if its makers are to be believed) will neither split nor torn shiny with wear. These are strong recommendations and will undoubtedly attract the favorable attention of carefnl buyers. In every fabric a staty improvement is visible and purdhasers can complain neither of the variety nor the quality of the goods offered for their upproval.

When it is remembered that the consmmption during both these years was two million bags more than the production, and that the crop of 188 t will be two million bags less than the reduced figures of 1880 , it is seen that the statistical position of cofieo is extremely favorable to higher prices. A comparison of the price of green cofice, in cargo quantities, in New York on the 20th of this month with that paid at the similar date of last year, shows an advance of 7 ze per pound in lio, bge in medium Tava, 6c in low grade Java, 5c in high grade Java and te in Maracaibo, the prices being, according to the same authority, as follows :-

Mr. Wra. Robarts, for the lust ten years manager of the Bunk of Commerce at Brantford, appenrs to have won golden opinions from the lending representative busiucss men of that city. On the occasion of his departure to take charge of the Hamilton branch, to which he had been appointed some weeks ago, a number of primejpal citizens, including Mayor Henry, the Mossrs. Watt, J. S. Inmilton, Clayton Shater, Jeffrey lhale, his suceessor, I. Cockshuti, Mr. Wisner, and other prominent customers of the bank; met in the Kerby House parions, on the 30th ultimo, and presented Mr. lioberts with an appropriate address, read by Mr. Welding, and with a valuable gold watch, chain and locket, and a purse containing about \$40. The inner case of the watel bears the inseription :
" Presented to Wm. Roherts, Esq, by his Brantford friends on his promotion to the mamagement of the Camadian Bume of Commerce at Lamilton, April 30th, 1887."
The address was prepured in a large book or allum form, beautifully illuminated, with mororco buck, and gold lettered with suitable inseription on the cover. Mr. hoberts is an example of the banker who can. combine businers ability with unfailing courtesy to his chents, great and small. There appears to be an impression among some brach managers that their importance will suffier unless they occasionally snub with more or less delicacy or rudeness, according to their nature, some of the poorer customers of the lank.

A vary largely attended and influential meding of the managers of the leading banks and prominent lumber merehants was held at the St. Lawrence Hall this week to deprecate any increase in the ground rents of timber limits in the Provinee of Quebec. It was moved by W. J. Buchamm, lisq, of the Bank of Montreal, and seconded by George Hague, Esty, of the Merchants' Hank,

What the baking inferests of the Province of Quebec, buing largely interested directly and indirectly in the humber industry in common with alf the other coimmercial interests in the Province, and being fully conversant with the fact that the profits derived from the lumber trade are small in comparison with the risks involved nad the eapital employed, believe that any considerable increase in charges upon the trade would so impair the security in timber licenses as to deter the banks from making the advances from time to time necessary for the efficient carrying on of the trade, and that any serious curtailment of such adrances would reduce the outpat of lumber and thereby diminish the provincial revenue.

As this might further result in impairing the credit of the province they venture to express the liope that the Government of Que-
bee will be induced to reconsider their recent nction in incrensing to so serious an extent the charges upon timber limits.

'Tne; Customs authorities are now investigating a case of alleged wrongful classification of dyestuffs in which one of our cotton mills is interested. It nppears that the Valleyfield Cotion Mill has been importing a dyestuff called " cutchine," which gives the same dark brown tint that cutch does, but is more convenient to handle. This the mill have been entering as "cutcl," from which the name is derived, and which is supposed to form its basis, and thas obtaining its daty free, outeh being on the free list. A short time ago a man employed for six or cight months as a chemist in the mill was discharged for some irregularity, of what nature does not appear, aud in revenge is suid to have given intormation to the athorities. Should their decision be adverse, the mill will be called upon to pay duly at the rate of 20 per cent., but it is not generally believed that any fine will bo exacted. Mly. R. R. Stevenson, who was better known a few years ago than he is to-day, is surely "too much of an N. P. man" to be guilty of any such attempts. The total amount at issue is between $\$ 1,200$ and $\$ 1,400$.

The assessment of the town of Woodstock, Ont., for the current year shows an increase of $\$ 222,335$ over that of last yeur, the ingures for 1887 being $\$ 2,082,155$, against $\$ 1,859,620$ in 1886. At the same time the population within the town limits has increased during the year by 803, the official figures being now 7,521. Since the assessor made his rounds, however, a large number of the employees of the new Patterson works have arrived with their fumilies, bringing the total within the corporation up to at least 8,000 . In addition there is a population of about 1,000 in whatis
known as " The Gore," which though not in the municipality is practically a part of the town. It will be seen, therefore, that Woodstock will soon be in a position to claim the right of incorporation as a city, and in view of its large and increasing wailroad facilities, there is every reason to believe that its growth during the next few years will be rapid.

Is concluding an article on the Fishery dispute, Marper's Weehly says:-"The people of this country hare no disposition to go to war with Great Britain about the fisherics. It would have been very much wiser, therefore, to invite a negotiation upon the subject, with a view to the abrogation of the eonvention of 1818. The other course was taken, however, and now, if the President should retaliate upon Canada severely, there would be a great increase of hot blood mad much greater difficulty in a reasomable settlement. Retaliation would be of no use unless there should be a complete 'backing down' on the other side. But mational 'backing down' is always much more dillicult when passions have been inflamed. Fortumately the l'resident can be trusted to manage a very difficult situation with signal discretion."
'I'ue Post Magazine is authority for the siatcment that the directors of the Alliance Assurance Company of London, lave under consideration the question of begiming fire businuss in the United States, and of lite and fre busincss in Camada. The directors, it is said; wish to limit the operations of the company in the United States to about filly of the principal eities, and plate each agency in direct communication with the lead oflice in London ; in other words, to manage the business from the other side, and dispense with an American branch manager and oflice. This is the company referred to in these columns, in December last, as preparing to enter the Camadian field.

The New York Bulletin says, French prunes are moving out rather more freely. "Regular" goods are offered at low prices, as the advancing season is affecting somewhat the quality and apparance. "Double prepared" are, however, holding their color well, and the fur sizes are realizing 6ya7c. 'I'omatocs are certuinly improving. In Baltimore, Maryland goods have advanced to $\$ 1$, and in this market Jersey and Delaware brands are held firmly at $\$ 1,05$, while some holders insist on $\$ 1.07$. The stock is small and the indications are favorable for a firm market for some time.

The Wiadsor Oil aud Natural Gas Company, which has for some time pust been boring for oil and gas at Belle River is asking to have its franchise extended to ten years, and a ly-law to that effect has been drawn up and will be considered at a special mecting of the Council. The company chams that the project will give Windsor a great boom, as the town can be illamimated for about onefifth of the present cost. To encourage manufacturers to locate in Windsor the company will oller gas for fuel for one year free of charge.

Is their lamable maxicty to furnish nevss to their sulberibers, the \%eal of one or two of our contemporaries is apt to outstrip their discretion. One of them, a few days ago, published that Mr. W. B. Craig, of St. Lawrence Main sitreet, was being sued for $\$ 2,000$. Mr. Craig requests us to saty that he has never heen sued in his life, beyond a trille of three or four dollars-and that was for taking down a partition. Fortumately Mr. Craig's credit is ahove being affected by such statements.

A nusisess man's word shonde bo "as good as his boud;" but when the bond is worthless what can be said? 'I'his mach-that he is not fit for his calling-that he can never onjoy even temporary prosperity-lant he is not of the "filtest" who "will survive," that he mast walk way sooner or later for a truer wan of business.

The business man who tries to hide his weakness by disputing his necounts is only making matters worse: he lind better throw himself upon the generosity of his creditors before his assels are reduced below a percentage that offers any hope for recovery.

Whem a man with a salary of $\$ 2,000$ a year lives in a house big enough to call for the expenditure of $\$ 3,000$ to $\$ 4,000$, and keeps $n$ liveried conchnan to drive him to and from his place of busineses, it is apt to set shareholders a-hinking of the future.
The city retail grocer sells his goods at prices that would astonish his brother in tho country; but then the city customer must huve his goods delivered in his kitchen or puntry, while the country dealor will not take them outside of his own shop-door.

Tus report of the commissioner of works and mines gives the following summary of the mineral production of Nova Scotia during the year 1886.


The total snles of conl for the year 1886 amounted to $1,373,666$ thins, made up of $789,-$ 000 tous of round, 305,322 tons of run of mine, and 270,338 tous of slack coal, as compared with $1,254,510$ tons sold during the year 1885. The home sales were 460,237 tons compared with 444,652 tons in 1885. The province of Quebec took 538,762 tons, rguinst 493,918 tons in 1885. The salen to New Brunswick were 175,918 tons compared with 148,634 tons in 1885. Newfoundland took 71,476 tons, ngainst 74,32: tons in 1885. The sales to Prince Edward Island were 49, 168 tons, against 52, 770 tons during the preceding year. Tha West Indian salces were 10,721 tons compared with 5,372 tons in 1885 The sales to the United States comprise 22,127 tons of round, 35,179 tons of slack, and 3,040 tons of run of mine coal, compared with 10,497 of round and 23,986 of slack during the provious year.
