THE POPESS ALLOCUTTON. The Vatican has pronounced its policy in
face of the threatened persecution of the Church. The Pope has giren to the world a docament remarkable for its oxposure of the
treachery of Italian statesmen, and for its determination not to abandon one inch of the
rights of the Pontifical See. This Allocution rights of the Pontifical Sce. This Allocution it. Italy promised great things for the Church
up to 1870 . Not only was the Pope to be free, up to 1870 . Not only was the Pope to be free,
but he was to be protected in his freedom. No sacriligious hand was to disturb the Catholic
Institutions, and the Pope was to possess and Institutions, and the Pope was to possess and
exercise all the spiritual powers which were his before the invasion of Garibaldi and his fol-lowers-Victor Emmanuel and the rest. But
what has happened? One by one all the appliances for governing the Church in Italy have been taken amay. The Religious Orders have been suppressed, and their property has been
conficated. The Missionary Colleges have been destroged, and thus a blow was struck at the faith, and at civiilization all orer the world. The re-union of Religious communities was
probibited, and the secular clergy was attacked; the students had to bbandon their vooation, and some of them had, against thoir will, to enter mony of the Church, and the existence of the clergy beeame dependent on the charity of a
State that had robbed them of They became, in fact the dependents of $a \mathrm{Go}$. verment that despised and plundered them. Berume " Clerical Abuses bill", the priests are

fiction and a fraud. He is insulted by Cabine Ministers, and he is lowered by the impiou surroundings of an unbelieving Court. He i a prisoner in his own house. Like a true step, and the Allocution he now publishes is an expression of determination to fight it out to the end.
