ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1892.

In the year 1892 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I.—A total Eclipse of the SUN, April 26, 1892, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, April 26, 7h., 46m., 7, Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude 175° 18' E. of Greenwich, and Latitude 57° 26' S.

Central Eclipse begins generally, April 26, 8h., 2m., 2, in Longitude 148° 35' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 75° 59' S.

Central Eclipse at Noon, April 26, 9h., 13m., 4, in Longitude 138° 58' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 64° 8' S.

Central Eclipse ends generally, April 26, 10h., 42m., 6, in Longitude 81° 53' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 36° 54' S.

Ends on the Earth generally, April 26, 12h., 4m., 1, in Longitude 94° 14' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 10° 27' S.

II.—Partial Eclipse of the MOON, May 11, 1892, visible at Greenwich.

The first contact with the Shadow occurs at 82° from the Northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East.

The last contact at 41° towards the West; in each case, for *direct* image.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the SUN, October 20, 1892, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, October 20, 4h., 15m., 0, Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude 133° 22' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 65° 25' N.

Greatest Eclipse, October 20, 6h., 36m., 2, Mag., (Sun's diam. = 1) 0.908, in Longitude 33° 9' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 61° 33' N.

Ends on the Earth generally, October 20, 8h., 57m., 4, in Longitude 50° 52' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 14° 2' N.

IV.—A Total Eclipse of the MOON, November 4, 1892, partly visible as a Partial Eclipse at Greenwich.

The first contact with the Shadow occurs at 91° from the Northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East.

The last contact at 138° towards the West; in each case, for *direct* image. At Greenwich the Moon will rise at 4h., 21m.

NOTE.—The tide table in the calendar pages may be rendered applicable to various other places on the coast by simply adding or subtracting, as the case may be, the difference between the times of high water on the full and change of the Moon at St. John's, and the time of the full tide at any other harbor; for example, to find the time of high water at any of the principal harbors of Conception Bay, add 45 minutes to the time at which it will be high water in St. John's; for Placentia Bay, add 2 hours; for St. Pierre, 1h., 50m.; for Ferolle, on the North-West Coast, 4 hours, &c.—[See table LVII. of *Norie's Epitome*.

EXAMPLE OF USE OF TABLE.

To find the number of Days from 16th August to 27th February; Find August in the side column and February at the top; the number at the intersection, viz., 184, is the number of days from 16th August to 16th February: add 11, the difference between 16 and 27, and the sum 195 is the number required. Similarly, the number from 16th August to 5th February is 184 less 11, or 173.

In Leap Year, if 29th February be included between the given dates, add one to the result.

A Table for Telling the Weather Through all the Lunations of Each Year, for Ever.

This table is the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

Observations.—1 The nearer the times of the Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2.—The space of this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3.—The nearer to midday or noon the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4.—The space of this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon.—These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5.—The moon's changes, first quarter, full, and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours *ie.* from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent upon the wind, as is noted in table.

Description of Signals in use at the Block House, Signal Hill, St. John's Hill.

Balls and Flags, hoisted in different positions on the Yard Arm, show the numbers of sail that are signalled either North or South, viz.:

One Sail in sight—Ball close up to yard.

Two Sail in sight—Ball midway between yard and parapet of Block House.

Three Sail in sight—Yellow Pennant close up to yard.

Four Sail in sight—Yellow Pennant midway between yard and parapet of Block House.

Five Sail in sight—Same as four, with addition of a Ball placed immediately above Pennant.

Six Sail in sight—Same as three, with addition of a Ball placed immediately beneath Pennant.

Seven Sail in sight—Same as four, with addition of a Ball placed immediately beneath Pennant.

Eight Sail in sight—Yellow Pennant at yard arm; Ball midway between yard and parapet of Block House.

Nine Sail in sight—Ball at yard arm; Yellow Pennant midway between yard and parapet of Block House.

Ten Sail in sight—Both Yellow Pennant and Ball close up to yard, the Ball above Pennant.

A Blue Pennant at the Mast-head denotes a Barque.

A Blue-White-Red Pennant at the Mast-head denotes a Barquentine.

A Red Pennant at the Mast-head denotes a Brig.

A White-Red Pennant at the Mast-head denotes a Brigantine.

A White-Blue Pennant at the Mast-head denotes a Topsail Schooner.

A White Pennant at the Mast-head denotes a Schooner.

A St. George's Cross at the Mast-head of the Middle pole denotes a steamer in sight from the Block House; but when it is hoisted on the South pole, it denotes that the Steamer is South of Cape Spear.

When any National flag is hoisted above the St. George's Cross, it denotes that a Man-of-War steamer, belonging to such nation as indicated by flag, is approaching the harbor.

A Blue Pennant and Blue Burgee, when hoisted together, shows that a Sail has passed the Narrows, going either North or South.

When a Merchant's House flag is hoisted on the South pole, it denotes that a vessel belonging to said Merchant is South of Cape Spear: and when hoisted on the North pole, it shows that said vessel is in sight of the Block House.

When a Square, White flag, with a red ball in the centre, is hoisted, either on the South or Centre pole, it denotes that a Steam-tug is required.

The International Code of Signals are also in use at the Block House, and the recognized House Signals of the different Merchants.

The attention of mariners is particularly called to the extreme *uncertainty* there is in the range of sounds. A signal that may not be heard, under certain conditions of the atmosphere, more than one or two miles, will, under others, reach twenty or more miles.

Light Dues.—Twenty-four cents per ton on all vessels entering any port or harbor in the colony, except coasting, sealing or fishing vessels; but not to be levied more than once in one year. Sealing and coasting vessels—twelve cents per ton on registered vessels of 40 tons and upwards; three dollars and forty-six cents on vessels less than 40 tons. No vessel to pay over one hundred and fifteen dollars.

Gallantry Head, Island of St. Peter's.—A White Flash Light. Elevation above high water, sixty-four metres (204 English feet). Distance at which the light is visible, 18 miles. The light is hidden at the northward by the high land of St. Peter's—lat. $46^{\circ} 45' 30''$; long. $50^{\circ} 9' 30''$.

The Fog Horn off Gallantry Head, now located north of Hunter's Island, (He aux Chasseurs), at a distance of about 50 yards from the shore, will sound whenever fog or snow makes it necessary. The sound will last for six seconds, with an interval of one minute between each blast.

Light at the South Entrance of St. Peter's.—Since the 1st October, 1862, the entrance of the harbor of St. Peter's, called South Channel, has been marked by two small fixed lights, one of which is a white light, illuminating three-fourths of the horizon, and placed on the battery; and the other, a red light, on the plain at the north of the town. The white light has an elevation of 11 metres, and is visible six miles. The red light is elevated 19 metres, visible three miles. The line connecting these two lights indicates the middle channel.

The position of the red light has also been so determined, that as soon as it is seen on the left of Cape Aigle, vessels coming from Colombier, in beating into the northeast entrance, will have nothing to fear from the shoals of Cape Rouge.

Light on the Southwest Point of the Island of Dogs, called Pointe a Leconte.—From the 1st August, 1874, a light has been exhibited on the Southwest Point of the Island of Dogs at the place called Pointe a Leconte, at 400 metres (437 English feet) above the level of the sea. It will be seen in clear weather seven miles. The extent of the light is circumscribed in a sector of 160° , presenting two cones of light; one white, of 40° , will light the passage of the Southeast, so as to permit vessels, which maintain a position within this cone, to avoid at the right the shoal Bataille, and to the left the rock of Cape Noir, and the rock Bertrand. The second cone is red, of 120° . It should be avoided by vessels entering by the Southeast passage, and will enable them, when they have quitted the white cone, to come to anchor in the roadstead, or in the Barachols, in following the line of the white light from Point aux Cannons, and of the red light from the interior of the city.

EXTRACTS FROM PILOTAGE ACTS.

"All ships and vessels shall be obliged to take or pay a Pilot, except Her Majesty's ships, vessels belonging to a Royal Yacht Club, coasting vessels and vessels which have not been boarded, hailed or spoken until after they have entered the Narrows; and no vessel shall be deemed to be a coasting vessel and exempt from the liability of taking a Pilot unless such vessel shall have been usually employed as a *bona fide* coaster, or if such vessel shall have on board any part of a cargo imported in such vessel from any port or place out of this Colony, or if such vessel shall be going to any place out of this Colony or to any Outport to load a cargo for any foreign market: Provided that when, in consequence of stormy weather, extreme danger would arise to any boat going outside the Narrows, the Commissioners may award pilotage to any Pilot who shall in such case have offered his services within the Narrows and have been rejected. For the purposes of this Act the entrance to the Narrows shall be defined by a line drawn from the Northern Head to the Southern Head at the entrance of this Port."

"The rates of pilotage payable by vessels entering or leaving the port of St. John's shall be as follows: When such vessels are hailed, spoken or boarded by a licensed pilot to the southward or eastward of Cape Spear, or to the northward of Sugar Loaf, and five-sixths of the said rates when hailed, spoken or boarded inside of Cape Spear and to the southward of Sugar Loaf, and before entering the Narrows. No steam or sailing vessel returning to the said port, through stress of weather, shall be compelled to take a pilot on her said return to the said port, nor on her second departure therefrom; provided that such steam or sailing vessel shall not have been gone from or remained in such port during the whole space of twenty-four hours. Nor shall any steam or sailing vessel which shall have proceeded from the port of St. John's to any other port in this Island, on the same voyage, be compelled to take a pilot on her said return to the said port of St. John's, nor on her second departure therefrom; provided she shall not have been gone from the said port of St. John's for twenty-four hours. Any pilot exacting a larger sum for his services, or taking a less sum than is allowed by said rates, shall forfeit for such offence the sum of eight dollars, and when he has exacted more, shall refund the excess received by him.

On vessels under eighty tons register measurement, Five dollars and thirty-five cents.

On vessels from eighty to one hundred tons, Six dollars and seventy cents.

On vessels from one hundred to one hundred and twenty tons, Seven dollars and thirty-five cents.

On vessels from one hundred and twenty to one hundred and sixty tons, Eight dollars.

On vessels from one hundred and sixty to two hundred tons, Eight dollars and seventy cents.

On vessels from two hundred to two hundred and forty tons, Nine dollars and thirty-five cents.

On vessels from two hundred and forty to two hundred and eighty tons, Ten dollars.

On vessels from two hundred and eighty to three hundred tons, Ten dollars and seventy cents.

On vessels from three hundred to three hundred and fifty tons, Thirteen dollars and thirty-five cents.

On vessels from three hundred and fifty to four hundred tons, Sixteen dollars.

On vessels from four hundred to five hundred tons, Eighteen dollars and seventy cents.

On vessels from five hundred to six hundred tons, Twenty-one dollars and thirty-five cents.

On vessels from six hundred to seven hundred tons, Twenty-four dollars.

On vessels from seven hundred to eight hundred tons, Twenty-six dollars and seventy cents.

Over that size, for every one hundred tons additional, One dollar and thirty-five cents; and on no sailing vessel is the pilotage to exceed Thirty-two dollars.

Steamers shall pay pilotage on their net tonnage at same rate per ton as sailing vessels.

Steamers employed in the fisheries of the Colony shall be exempt, except on foreign voyages.

Coastal steamers shall also be exempt.

Subsidized mail steamers, in connection with the Colony, shall pay on the horse-power at the rate of eight cents for each horse-power.

No steamer shall pay more than Forty-eight dollars at one time.

All coasting vessels, which may take pilots, to pay one-half of the above rates of pilotage, in proportion to their tonnage. The above scale of pilotage shall be payable on the register tonnage of all such vessels, as ascertained before going out of the harbor.

Her Majesty's vessels, under sixth rate, Fourteen dollars.

Her Majesty's vessels, of the fourth, fifth and sixth rate, Twenty-six dollars.

Her Majesty's vessels, of the first, second and third rate, Thirty-four dollars.

Every vessel and steamer obliged to take or pay a pilot shall show either her house-flag, Board of Trade signal, or national flag, before entering the Narrows, and in case any vessel or steamer shall enter the Narrows, without a pilot, and without having shown such house-flag, Board of Trade signal, or national flag, such vessel or steamer shall be subject to the usual pilotage rates."

Steamers employed in the fisheries of the colony shall be exempt, except when on foreign voyages, and then at the rate of ten cents for each horse-power.

Coastal steamers shall also be exempt.

Subsidized mail steamers in connection with the colony shall pay on the horse-power at the rate of ten cents for each horse-power.

No steamer shall pay more than Forty-eight dollars at one time.

All coasting vessels which may take pilots to pay one-half of the above rates of pilotage, in proportion to their tonnage.

The above scale of pilotage shall be payable on the register tonnage on all such vessels, as ascertained before going out of the harbor.

Her Majesty's vessels under sixth rate, Fourteen dollars.

Her Majesty's vessels of fourth, fifth and sixth rate, Twenty-six dollars.

Her Majesty's vessels of first, second and third rate, Thirty-four dollars.

Pilot's Flag: Red with White Ball.

If the pilot is on board a vessel more than twenty-four hours before the first day of June, or after the first day of September, to be paid at the rate of seventy cents per day during the time he is on board, and from the first of June to the first of September, inclusive, to be paid at the rate of one dollar and forty cents per day, if on board more than twenty-four hours.

When a pilot is hired to go to Seldom-Come-By for a vessel, his daily pay, at the above rates, to commence from the time he leaves Fogo till his return with the said vessel.

Rates of Postage.

Postage on letters addressed to the United States, the Dominion of Canada, the United Kingdom and Foreign Europe is as follows:—

For letters under 1-oz., five cents, and five cents for every additional 1/4-oz.

For Bermuda, West Indies, Brazil, Peru and Uruguay, eight cents under 1-oz., and eight cents for every additional 1/4-oz.

For East Indies, China, Japan, Nicaragua, Panama and Java, ten cents per 1-oz. rate.

For Anstralian Colonies and South Africa, ten cents *via* London, and fifteen cents *via* United States per 1-oz. Newspapers, three cents per 2-ozs.

Local newspapers to United States, the Dominion, West Indies, Foreign Europe and to England, one cent per 2-ozs., or a half-cent each if under 1-oz.

Inland Postage.

For letters per 1-oz. or fraction thereof..... 3 cents.

For city delivery, per 1-oz. or fraction 1 cent.

Circulars 1 cent.

Post cards..... 1 cent.

For book-packets, pamphlets, magazines and periodicals—for every 2-ozs., one cent; must not exceed three pounds in weight.

Newspapers under 4-ozs., free; over 4-ozs. in weight are charged as books. Local newspapers free to any place in the colony, if under 4 ozs. each.

Postage on letters for French Islands—St. Pierre and Miquelon—five cents per 1/4-oz. rate, and registration, five cents.

Inland Parcel Postage.

Parcels not exceeding eleven pounds in weight may be transmitted by post within the colony, except to and from places with which postal communication is maintained by couriers carrying mails on foot, on payment of eight cents per pound weight, or two cents per quarter pound or fraction of a quarter pound above one pound. Such parcels shall not exceed three feet six inches as the greatest length, or six feet in length and girth combined, the girth being measured round the thickest part of the parcel. No parcel will be accepted which weighs more than eleven pounds, or that is not sufficiently paid; the postage on such parcels must in all cases be *paid in advance*, by means of ordinary adhesive postage stamps. Such parcels may be registered, the fee therefor being three cents.

The parcel should have the words "*by parcel post*" plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the name of the district in which the Post Office is situated. The following is an example of the mode of address recommended:—

Foreign Parcel Postage.

UNITED KINGDOM.—Parcels for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, as follows: On every parcel not exceeding 1-lb. in weight, 18 cents, this being the minimum charge; over 1-lb., 12 cents per lb. or fraction thereof; maximum weight, 11 lbs. Such parcels must not exceed three feet six inches in length, or in length and girth measured together, six feet, the girth being measured round the thickest part of the parcel. A Customs' declaration of the contents and value of each parcel must be filled up at the Post Office by the sender.

DOMINION OF CANADA.—Parcels for the Dominion of Canada must be prepaid at the rate of 15 cents per lb. or fraction thereof. No parcel can be forwarded if over 5 lbs. in weight, or if it measures more than 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. A Customs' declaration of the contents and value of each parcel must be filled up at the Post Office by the sender.

GENERAL.—No parcels should be posted in a letter box, but must in all cases be taken in the Post Office, and presented at the wicket, where forms can be supplied and information obtained.

Commercial papers, invoices, insurance policies and papers, &c., are chargeable with five cents for the first rate of two ounces or fraction thereof, and one cent per two ounces, or any fraction thereof over the first two ounces.

Book packets must be left open for inspection, and must not contain any written enclosure. Postage, one cent for two ounces, or fraction thereof, to the United Kingdom, United States and Dominion of Canada, and within the colony.

All parcels containing books, patterns, newspapers or printed matter of any kind, must be so put up that the contents may be easily withdrawn for examination; if sealed, such packets become liable to letter rate, and will be charged accordingly.

Unpaid books for the United Kingdom, or other countries, will not be forwarded.

Letters for officers serving in Her Majesty's service abroad are chargeable with the ordinary rates of postage. For soldiers or seamen in Her Majesty's service, two cents per half ounce; over that weight, charged full rates.

The attention of the public is called to the fact that the General Postal Union Treaty positively prohibits the transmission in the mails of gold or silver money, jewels or precious articles, or any other articles whatever liable to Customs' duties. Therefore, correspondence originating in Newfoundland and addressed to any of the countries of the Postal Union, whether ordinary or registered, should not contain these interdicted articles. Any letter found to contain coin, as well as any having the word "registered" written upon them, which may be posted in Newfoundland, will be forwarded to any part of the colony, charged with a double registration fee. For United Kingdom, foreign countries and Dominion of Canada, they will not be forwarded on any terms. Valuable letters, whether containing money or not, should be registered.

No half-pence to be introduced in the orders. Business of Money Order Office closes one hour before closing the mails by steamer.

SYSTEM.

1. Money Orders are made out in forms supplied for the use of the Money Order Offices.

2. Persons applying for Money Orders are recommended to use printed "Application Forms," printed for that purpose.

3. Place of payment of a Money Order may be changed in accordance with instructions provided therefor.

4. Alteration of payee's name may be effected by issue of a new order and payment of commission thereon.

5. Applicants for Money Orders are expected to observe due care in the examination of the same, relative to filling and stamping. Defect in orders, when presented for payment, may cause difficulty and delay, for which the paying office is not to be held accountable.

6. Postmasters should be particularly careful to obtain from the person who presents a Money Order, whether the rightful owner or not, full information as to the Christian name, surname and address of the party who originally obtained it, unless such party be a firm, when the name of the firm will suffice. The only exception to this rule is, when an Order is presented through the Bank, in which case it will suffice that the Order, being properly signed, be also crossed with the Banker's name.

7. As, however, after once paying a Money Order by whomsoever presented, the office will not be liable to any further claim, the public are strictly cautioned:—

- 1st. To take all means to prevent the loss of the Money Order.
- 2nd. To be careful, on taking out an order, to state correctly the Christian, as well as the surname, of the person in whose favor it is drawn.

8. Although, at the end of twelve months from that in which it was issued, a Money Order, if still unpaid, becomes legally void; nevertheless, when a good reason can be given for the delay in presenting it, an application for payment to the Postmaster General is entertained.

9. Postmasters should recommend the use of Money Orders for the transmission of money, in preference to other modes of transmission.

Foreign Countries.

Money Orders are issued in Newfoundland on the following foreign countries and British possessions:—

Foreign Countries—Belgium, Denmark, Danish West Indies, Dutch East Indies, Egypt, France, German Empire, Gibraltar, Holland, Iceland, Italy, Japan, Norway, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland, Tangier (Morocco).

British India—Including the Agencies of the Indian Post Office at Aden, Bagdad, Bander, Abas, Bushire, Busrah, Gurdur, Jask, Linge, Muscat and Zanzibar.

British Colonies—Australia: New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria, Western Australia and New Zealand.

Other Colonies—Bermuda, Ceylon, Falkland Islands, Hong Kong, including the Agencies of the Hong Kong Post Office at Amoy, Canton, Foo Chow, Hankow, Hohow, Ningpo, Shanghai, Swatow, and Straits Settlements, Cyprus, and North Borneo.

South and West Africa—Cape Colony, Gambia, Gold Coast, Lagos, Mauritius, Natal, St. Helena, Seychelles and Sierra Leone.

West Indies—Antigua, Bahamas, Barbados, British Guiana, Dominica, Grenada, Honduras (British), Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Kitts, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Tobago, Trinidad and Turks Island.

Suggestions to the Public.

Facility will be given to the Post Office in the discharge of its daily duties, and greater security afforded to the public, by careful attention to the following recommendations:—

Post all letters and newspapers, &c., as early as practicable, especially when sent in large bundles.

When a number of newspapers are addressed to the same office, put them up in one parcel.

When a number of circulars are posted, tie them up in a bundle, with the addresses all in one direction.

Address letters, papers, &c., in a legible and complete manner, always giving the name of the Post Office; and if there be more than one Post Office of that name, the name of the district in which situated. In case of letters going abroad, the name of the country, as well as of the town and city, should be given in full. Letters, for example, intended for London, Canada West, if simply addressed "London," would be forwarded to London, England, and thus be delayed.

Letters, papers or parcels for outports should have the name of the district and Post Office distinctly written as part of the address. For instance, letters for Bonne Bay, St. Barbe, are sometimes sent to Bonne Bay, Fortune Bay District, being simply directed Bonne Bay. There are several settlements named Broad Cove, Little Bay, English Harbor, Black Head, Bauline, Caplin Cove, Deer Island, Flat Islands, Fortune, Fox Cove, Freshwater, Island Cove, Long Harbor, Burgeo, New Harbor, Salmon Cove, Seal Cove, Ship Cove, and, unless properly directed, are liable to go to the wrong office for delivery. The loss and inconvenience arising from imperfectly directed letters is caused by the carelessness of the sender, and no blame can attach to the Post Office. Other places, besides those named, have settlements with corresponding appellations, hence the necessity of being particular in addressing all letters, &c.

See that every letter, newspaper or other packet sent by post is securely folded and sealed. Every such packet has to be several times handled; and even when in the mail-bag, is exposed to pressure and friction. Unless, therefore, the article be light and pliant, it should be enclosed in strong paper, linen, parchment, or other material which will not readily tear or break.

Fasten the covers of newspapers firmly, so as to prevent them from slipping out.

Fully pay postage on newspapers, otherwise you lose both papers and stamps, as such are not forwarded.

When dropping a letter or newspaper into a letter-box, always see that the packet falls into the box, and does not stick in its passage.

Never seal letters for the East and West Indies, and other hot climates, with wax. Such a practice is attended with much inconvenience, and frequently with serious injury, in consequence of the melting of the wax, and the adhesion of the letters to each other. In all such cases use wafers or gum, and advise your correspondents, in the country referred to, to do the same.

Never send money, or other articles of value, through the Post Office, except either by means of a money order or in a registered letter. "Any person who sends money or jewelry in an unregistered letter not only runs the risk of losing his property, but exposes to temptation every one through whose hands his letter passes, and may be the means of ultimately bringing some clerk or letter-carrier to moral ruin." Carefully secure every letter or packet containing money or value, first with gum and afterwards with good sealing-wax, on which mark the clear impression of a seal. This only applies to local correspondence, the forwarding of such articles to other countries being prohibited.

On posting a registered letter or packet, always obtain a receipt for the same at the office where posted.

When letters or newspapers are delayed and missing, at once communicate the fact to the Postmaster of the division in which is situated the Post Office at which the delayed or missing letters were posted. In case of a missing letter enclosing value, state the exact contents, the exact address, and the office at which posted; the name of the person by whom posted, and the name of the person by whom received at the office. In the case of a delayed letter or paper, send the cover or wrapper in an entire state, in order that the place of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the postmarks.

Trouble and loss occasionally arise out of the carelessness or dishonesty of parties employed in the Post Office service; yet instances are not wanting in which it has been shown to the satisfaction, even of the complainants, that the fault at first attributed to the Post Office in truth rested in other quarters. Theft by private hands, although very difficult of proof, has frequently been brought to light, and it is greatly to be desired that those who suffer loss should in the first instance, and while the circumstances are fresh, endeavor to ascertain, with the utmost precision, all particulars respecting the despatch or receipt of the lost letters or papers, and lose no time in communicating the information to the Postmaster. Indeed, generally speaking, it is only by careful enquiry into minute details that the offender can be detected, whether he be a servant of the department or not.

The Post Office is a department which admits of constant improvement and expansion. The public, by sending to the Postmaster General clear and correct information respecting faulty arrangements, may materially benefit the service. It must be remembered, however, that changes in machinery so extensive and intricate as that of the Post Office, must be made cautiously, and with much previous consideration.

New Post Offices are established by the department whenever it is ascertained that a sufficient number of inhabitants can be accommodated, and a sufficient amount of postal revenue collected to warrant such a measure. When a new Post Office is required, a petition should be addressed to the Postmaster-General, signed by as many of the inhabitants as can conveniently subscribe the same. The petition should state the name of the settlement and district in which it is desired the office should be established; the distance from the neighboring offices; whether at the site of the proposed Post Office there is a village; the number of mills, stores, taverns and houses thereat; the extent of the settlement to be served, and the probable cost of the mail, together with any other facts that may form any ground for the accommodation applied for.

Every vessel of more than four hundred tons, \$6.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS

FOR GRANTING CERTIFICATES TO MASTERS AND MATES.

EXAMINATIONS OF MASTERS AND MATES.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY FOR A FOREIGN-GOING SHIP.

EXAMINATION IN COLORS.—All candidates for certificates of competency must pass the examination in colors.

A SECOND MATE.—A second mate must be seventeen years of age, and must have served four years at sea. He must also prove that he has served one year at least in a square-rigged sailing vessel.

IN NAVIGATION, &c.—He must write a legible hand, and will be required to give, in writing, definitions of various astronomical and other terms used in navigation. He must have a competent knowledge of the first five rules of arithmetic, and the use of logarithms. He must be able to work a day's work complete, correcting the courses for deviation, leeway and variation. He will, be required to find the latitude by meridian altitude of the sun, and the difference of longitude from a given departure by parallel sailing; also to find the

course and distance from one position to another by Mercator's method. He will be required to find the time of high water at a given port, to observe and calculate the amplitude of the sun, and to find the error of the ship's compass therefrom, and also the deviation, the variation being given. He must be able to find the daily rate of the chronometer from error observed, and to find the longitude from altitude of the sun by the usual methods. He must understand the use of the sextant, with its adjustments, and be able to observe with it, find the index error by the horizon, and read off and on the arc. He must also pass a satisfactory examination in the International code of signals.

IN SEAMANSHIP, &c.—He must give satisfactory answers as to the standing and running rigging of ships; as to bending, unbending, setting, reefing, taking in, and furling sail; as to sending masts and yards up and down, &c., &c.; as to the management of a ship when under canvas, and as to dunnaging and stowing cargo, &c. He must have a thorough knowledge of the rule of the road as regards both steamers and sailing vessels, their regulation lights, and fog and sound signals; and be able to describe the signals of distress, and the signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penalties incurred by the misuse of these signals. He must be able to mark and use the lead and log-line. He must also understand the use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of his vessel being stranded, and other questions of a like nature appertaining to the duties of the second mate of a ship.

AN ONLY OR FIRST MATE.—An only mate must be nineteen years of age, and must have served five years at sea.

A first mate must be nineteen years of age, and must have served five years at sea, of which one year must have been as second or only mate. He must also prove that he has served at least one year in a square-rigged sailing vessel.

IN NAVIGATION, &c.—In addition to the qualifications of second mate, above stated, he must be able to find the true bearing of the sun, and error of the ship's compass, from an observed azimuth of the sun, both from an altitude and also from the "Time Azimuth Tables," and, with the variation given, compute the deviation; to find the latitude from a single altitude of the sun off the meridian, and to be able to use and adjust the sextant, and to find the index error by the sun; and also to ascertain the true bearing of the sun, and the ship's position by Sumner's method by projection. He must also be conversant with the use of Mercator's chart, and be able to find on either a "true" or "Magnetic" chart the course to steer, and the distance from one given position to another, and find the ship's position on the chart from cross-bearings of two objects; from two bearings of the same object, the course and distance between the bearings being given; and also the distance of ship from the object at the time of taking the second bearing. He must also understand how to keep a ship's log-book.

IN SEAMANSHIP, &c.—In addition to the qualifications of second mate, above stated, a more extensive knowledge of seamanship will be required as to shifting large spars, rigging shears, taking lower masts in and out, how to moor and unmoor a ship, and to keep a clear anchor, to carry out an anchor, how to manage a ship in stormy weather, how to cast a ship on a lee shore, how to secure masts in the event of an accident to the bowsprit, and how to rig purchases for getting heavy weights, anchors, machinery, &c., in and out. He must give satisfactory answers to the ventilation of holds and the stowage of explosives. He must also know how to rig a sea anchor, and what means to apply to keep a vessel disabled or unmanageable out of the trough of the sea and lessen her lee drift; how to get the cast of deep sea lead in heavy weather; and answer any question appertaining to the duties of an only or first mate which the examiner may think necessary to put to him.

A MASTER must be 21 years of age, and have been six years at sea, of which one year must have been as first or only mate in a foreign-going ship, and one year as second or only mate, or he must have been six and a half years at sea, of which two and a half years must have been as second mate of a foreign-going ship, during the last twelve months of which service as second mate he

must have been in possession of a first mate's certificate. He must also prove that he has served at least one year in a square-rigged sailing vessel in the capacity of either apprentice, seaman, mate or master.

IN NAVIGATION.—In addition to the qualifications required for an only or first mate, he must be able to compute the latitude from the meridian altitude of a star, to find the magnetic bearing from equi-distant compass bearings of any fixed object when at sea, and compute the deviation therefrom. He must construct a deviation curve upon a "Napier's" diagram, which will be furnished by the examiner, and understand the practical application of the same, and give written answers to certain practical questions on the effects of the ship's iron upon the compasses, the method of determining the deviation, and compensating the same by magnets and soft iron. He will be required to find the course to steer by compass in order to counteract the effect of a given current, and find the distance the ship will make good towards a given point in a certain time, and to work out practically the correction to apply to soundings, taken at a given time and place, to compare with the depth marked on the chart.

IN SEAMANSHIP.—In addition to the qualifications required of an only or first mate, he must be able to construct jury-rudders for both wooden and iron vessels, and also rafts. He will be examined as to his resources for the preservation of the ship's crew in the event of wreck; as to the management of ships in heavy weather, and as to rescuing the crew of a disabled ship; as to steps to be taken when a ship is on her beam ends or in any danger or difficulty; or, if disabled or unmanageable and on a lee shore; heaving a keel out, &c. He must explain the mode of procedure when placing a ship in dry dock, directing repairs, and if putting into port in distress with damage to cargo and ship. He must possess a sufficient knowledge of what he is required to do by law, as to entry and discharge, and the management of his crew, and as to penalties and entries to be made in the official log, and a knowledge of the measures for preventing and checking the outbreak of scurvy on board ship, and the law as to load line marks, and the entries and reports to be made respecting them. He will be questioned as to his knowledge of invoices, charter party, bills of lading, Lloyd's agent, and as to the nature of bottomry; also bills of exchange, surveys, averages, &c., and must answer any other questions of a like nature which the examiner may consider necessary to touch upon.

He will also be required to give satisfactory answers as to his knowledge of the management of steamships in heavy weather. How to utilize steam appliances in the event of fire, and the best arrangements for towing vessels under various circumstances; as to the methods of constructing jury-rudders suitable for a screw steamship, and other questions of a like nature appertaining to the management of a steamship.

A candidate possessing a certificate "for fore-and-aft rigged vessels only," and desiring to obtain an ordinary certificate of the same grade, must prove that he has served at sea at least one year in a square-rigged sailing vessel, and will be re-examined both in navigation and seamanship.

FAILURE.—In all cases of failure the candidate must be examined *de novo*.

If a candidate fails in seamanship he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of six months.

If he fails three times in navigation he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of three months from the date of the last failure.

If a candidate has failed in his examination, but the subjects in which he has failed are not included in the subjects required for a certificate of a lower grade, he may, if he desires, receive a certificate of such lower grade.

No part, however, of the fee he has paid will be returned to him.
