

APRIL FROSTS KILLED MUCH ONTABIO WHEAT

Central Counties Suffered Worst-Seeding and Growing Season Late.

OTTAWA. May 10 -A builetin of the census office issued to-day makes tracting considerable attention at the livestock of Canada:

he whole of Canada has opened late note within a short time. this year, and the month of April has een marked by hard frosts. But May has been favorable to cultivation of the land, and the rainfall has been officient for healthy vegetation,

In Ontario, however, the April rosts were destructive in some re-ions; and from 12 to 34 per cent. of the area sown has been reported as winter-killed. The central count-ies, north of Lake Ontario, suffered worst, the average loss as reported being 34 per cent. In the western counties 27 per cent. of the area in grop has been destroyed. In the southern counties, north of Lake Eric the loss is 10. loss is 10 per cent, in the northern counties and districts 12.6 per cent., and in the eastern countles, between the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Rivers, 15 per cent. For the whole of Can-ada the area winter killed is reported to be 21 per cent., and the per cent. condition of the growing crop is 82.

About 12 4-2 per cent. of the clover was heaved out by the spring frosts, and the average condition of hay and clover at the end of April was 89 percent. 




