The Great Chinese Envoy to See Our Big Show.

WILL ARRIVE AT THE GROUNDS AT 3.30 P.M.

To Be Received By Mayor Fleming and the Exhibition Directors.

Hon. R. W. Scott, Secretary of State, telegraphed Manager Hill on Saturday afternoon: "His Excellency Li Hung Chang proposes visiting the Toronto Exhibition on Monday afternoon at 3.30 if the weather permits."

In consequence of the receipt of the above telegram a meeting of the directors of the Exhibition was held at the Queen's Hotel in the evening to consider the necessary arrangements for the reception of the eminent Chinese statesman. Mr. Hill announced that His Excellency would leave Niagara at 10 o'clock on Monday and that his car would be side-tracked at some point on the road between there and here in order that he might rest for two or three hours.

The train bearing His Excellency will reach Toronto at about 6 o'clock, and will be drawn up at the Exhibition platform, where Local Government and civic representatives and representatives of the Exhibition Board will be in readiness to receive him.

His Worship Mayor Fleming will have four stalwart policemen ready to carry him in his sedan chair through the throng.

Li Hung Chang's arrival at the station was witnessed by a great concourse of Americans who, despite the efforts of the police, crowded and jostled the visitors, and this in fact was the story of the whole day's doings. While Building With Flames of Benton Harbor, in Michigan.

OTHERS WERE SERIOUSLY INJURED.

Hill, married; Frank Seaver, married; Robert Wolfe, single; all of St. Joseph; John Hoffman, married; Thomas Kidd, single; Frank Woodley, married; Will Matson, married; Scott Rice, single; Louis Hoffman, single, of Benton Harbor.

Several others were injured by falling walls, but will recover.

Mr. Laurier to proceed to Rome for the purpose of interesting His Holiness the Pope in the question of keeping the Quebec Bishops quiet while the Premier carries out his school policy.

Chevalier Drolet is the gentleman who was admitted to the cabinet of French Liberal members the other day at Ottawa, and has spent several years in Montreal.

It is also reported that a strong effort will be made by parties in Montreal to secure the appointment of Drolet to the position of Canadian representative in Paris in place of Hon. RECENT DISCOVERIES OF ORE IN ITS LEDGES
