

Opening Day Furnished a Spectacle That Delighted the Galleries. Washington, Dec. 2.-The opening day of the first session of the 57th Congress in the House of Representatives furnished a pectacle that delighted the crowded galeries. Trading was light again to-day in Mont-real and values generally show a shrink-age. C.P.R. closed over a point lower at 113%. Toronto Railway was easier at 116%. Dominion Steel preferred brought 81% to 81 and the bonds 83. Halifax Rail-way sold for 99% and Montreal Light, Heat and Power 95. Dominion Coal pre-ferred was higher at 121.

There was a dragging, downward tendency in the New York stocks to-day and gold engagements of 1% millions for to-morrow's shipment added to the pressure on values. The President's message is anxiously awaited as it is thought that that might relieve the situation. Louisville & Nashville was the only railroad to make any upward movement of consequence to-day, and this stock lost most of its gain towards the close. Copper was strong early in the day, but dropped off about three points from its highest. The closing prices were about the lowest of the day.
